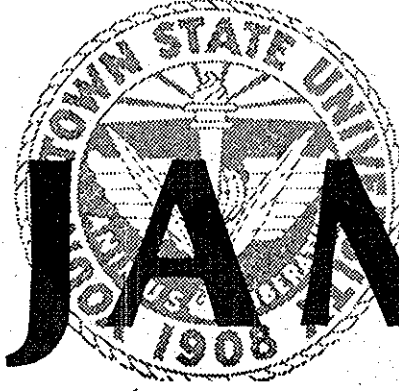

Most YSU Students Are Registered

9,081 of a projected 9,150 students have undergone registration procedures as of Wednesday evening, November 26, Mrs. Mary Smith, registrar, announced yesterday. The figures are unofficial, however, until bills are paid.

Registration will continue through Friday, December 5 for students with less than 34 completed hours.

Mrs. Smith stated she expects approximately 1,000 freshmen to register each day of this week to bring the total registration figure close to the 14,000 plus mark.

Upperclassmen are asked not to register either today, tomorrow, or Thursday, Mrs. Smith stated, because these days are designated as freshmen registration days.

New students registering for winter quarter will do so by appointment on Saturday, December 6.

Students who have not completed the registration process by Friday, will be permitted to register on January 2.

Uncle Sam Wants You

WASHINGTON (AP) - Here is the order of call for the 1970 military draft as determined by the lottery drawing held Monday night.

This list applies to every man who is at least 19 but not yet 26 as of Dec. 31, 1969. Each man's place in the order of call is the number next to his birthday; the order of call will be applied by each local draft board to the men registered in its files.

Men now classified "1-A" or "1-A-O" may be called in this order in 1970; men now exempt or deferred will keep the same place in line they drew last night if they should become 1-A or 1-A-O at any time in the future.

Phys. Ed. Center Contracts Awarded

Contracts totaling nearly \$5 million have been awarded for the construction of YSU's new Beeghley Health and Physical Education Center, Dr. Albert L. Pugsley, University president, announced yesterday. The contracts, which were approved by the Office of Health, Education, and Welfare, do not include the cost of architectural fees.

The general contract of \$3,368,000 was awarded to the Youngstown firm of Joseph Bucheit and Sons, who are already in the process of moving equipment to the building site and marking off the ground. Other companies receiving contracts for construction were Scholl-Choffin Company, Youngstown, plumbing, heating and air-conditioning - \$1,129,000; Lake Erie Electric,

Niles, electrical work - \$415,000; and Hasely Waller Company, Cleveland Heights, folding bleachers and moveable stage - \$87,843.

The University has set a completion date of December 1, 1971 for the structure, which is being financed by Federal, state and private funds.

The Center, which will house physical education classrooms, a 6,000-8,000 seat gymnasium, an Olympic-size swimming pool, plus various exercise rooms and offices, will be located on Urban Renewal property between

Grant and Spring streets, west of the present School of Education.

A public groundbreaking ceremony will be held later this month.

Council Hits Faculty Library Privileges

A resolution asking for the "immediate enforcement of the library 'quarter rule'" for faculty members and an eventual change in rules which would limit faculty members to the same library privileges as students was introduced at yesterday's Student Council meeting by Margaret Barsodi. The resolution passed unanimously after Council

debate. Miss Barsodi informed Council that petitions would be circulated among students to show their support. Both the resolution and the petition are to be presented to the Library committee.

The "quarter rule" which Miss Barsodi claims has not been enforced allows faculty members to keep books for a quarter (continued on pg. 5)

Burglars Hit Jambar Building

The Jambar building was broken into early Sunday evening for the third time this quarter. An inoperative typewriter was taken.

The break was discovered at 8 p.m. that evening by Jambar editor John Greenman who said the thieves broke, unlocked, and entered through a northside window.

Other breaks occurred in September and October.

YSU Security Office Patrolman Robert Brown responded to a call shortly after the discovery. A typewriter ribbon cover plate was found beneath the broken window and tracks of two men were noticed leading to and

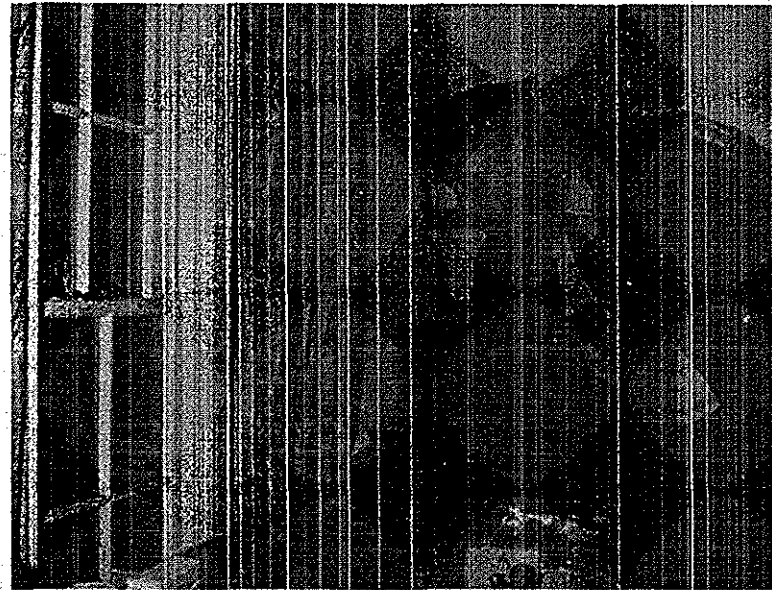
away from the window.

Early in September, a telephone and a typewriter were stolen from a Jambar basement office. A darkroom door was forced open but the equipment, locked in a steel cabinet for the summer, was untouched.

A southside entrance was forced open in early October but entry was blocked by a filing cabinet stationed in front of the door.

Greenman told police following the Sunday break that Jambar equipment is clearly marked and serial numbers are recorded on file with the University.

Money is not kept in the building.

Question and answer sessions will follow each speaker. At 11 a.m., Dr. Irwin and Mr. Babson will participate in a panel discussion with Hugh Frost, assistant to the president, acting as moderator.

The meeting is open and registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. for those attending without previous notification.

Guest speaker will be Jack Widner, the Ohio Student Education Association consultant for the OEA who will talk on how the OSEA fits into the OEA program.

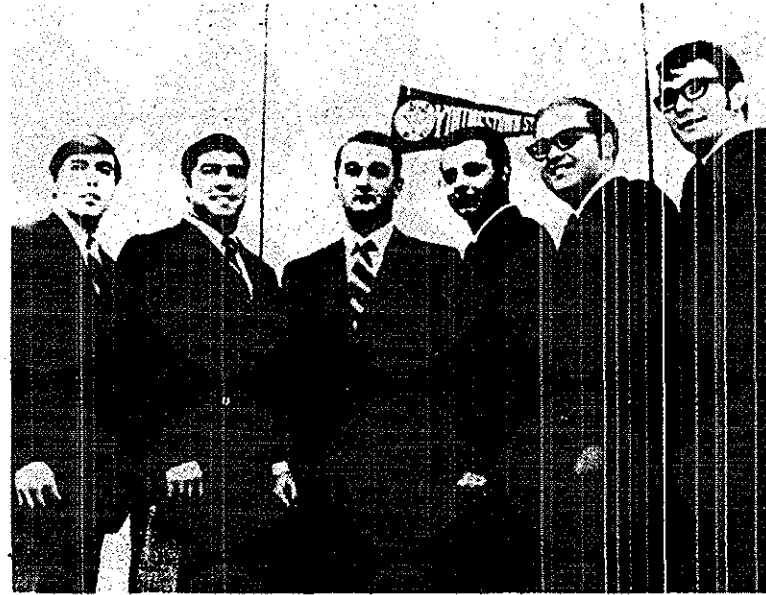
All members are urged to attend.

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Says No Co-operation Social Critic To Speak On Contemporary Scene

To the editor of the *Jambar*:

It is with some understanding that the Editor of the *Jambar* has written an editorial suggesting inactivity within the realm of Student Government. However it must be understood by the members of the Student Body that Student Government has not been inactive during the last eight weeks, perhaps the lack of publicity and coverage is responsible for this misconception. I, as Student Government President, realize that the purpose of the editorial written on Nov. 18th, was to stimulate and to motivate Student Government toward progressive action as well as progressive thought. We appreciate your comments, however it is our desire to communicate to the members of the Student Body some of the activities and goals of Student Government.

During the past 8 weeks the members of the Executive Branch of Student Government with the aid of Student Council have been working towards goals established at the beginning of the academic year. The search for qualified and interested students has resulted in the lowering of the grade requirement, an investigation into the cost of the rental of cafeteria facilities resulting from labor fees has resulted in a recommendation by the Executive Branch to the Financial Aides and Scholarship Subcommittee that the possibility of increasing Student Labor and the no. of Student employees; in the area of registration, through our efforts more faculty names have been listed in class schedule catalogs; in the area of teacher evaluation a committee has been formed, the questions chosen, and a finalized format will be presented to the Student Body at the beginning of next quarter; in the issue of housing, an off campus housing commission has been created and last week it presented to the Univ. Admin. its recommendations — as of yet we have not received a reply; although it is generally realized that the 1969 Homecoming was a success, a number of problems did exist, the weekend has been evaluated and new procedures will be initiated for the benefit of the Student Body, one possibility being holding a double concert; further progress is being made in curriculum development, student services and student activities.

As of yet I still can not follow the logic behind your personal attack on Chuck Hettler in regards to his letter of Nov. 25th. Chuck is one of the few Council Members who is actively concerned with the problems facing Student Council and Student Government. Chuck is very dedicated to his work as representative at large, and anyone who would take the time to examine Chuck's record on Council would soon agree. I can not understand how Chuck or any other student should be personally attacked because of their lack of knowledge about editorials that have appeared in past *Jambars*. Could you in turn, if your logic follows be held responsible for Student Council minutes of two or three years ago, especially if you were not involved in these particular activities????? Why crucify a person for trying to do his job?

In my opinion, the relationship between the old Student Council and the new Student Government with the *Jambar* has been one of complete antagonism and lack of total cooperation. This can be seen quite readily by citing a few examples: as Pres. of Student Government I asked a member of your staff if there could be placed in the *Jambar* an article concerning the resignation of Robt. Lackey as Sec. of Special Projects and also to inform those interested students that applications are being accepted for that position; also two weeks ago I was interviewed by a member of your staff in regards to the Faculty Evaluation Program and as of yet NEITHER of these have appeared in the

Social critic and novelist Nat Hentoff will relate his personal experiences regarding key figures and forces in the contemporary scene when he appears as the third lecturer in the Youngstown State University Artist Lecture Series, at 2 p.m., Tuesday, December 9, in Strouss Auditorium.

Speaking on "Connection In to Our Time," Hentoff's frame of reference encompasses Che Guevara, John Lindsay, Janis Joplin and Malcolm X, while his discussion will center on the directions and intensity of current issues and today's activity toward change.

Also known as an activist and music critic, Hentoff is a pungent and provocative analyst who contributes regularly to a wide range of periodicals including *Playboy*, *The New Yorker*, *Commonweal* and *The New York Times*.

A "prolific and skillful

writer," according to *Newsweek* magazine, Hentoff's fiction includes *Call the Keeper*, *Onwards Jazz Country*, and *I'm Really Dragged but Nothing Gets Me Down*.

Among his non-fiction works are *The New Equality*, *Our Children Are Dying*, *Peace Agitator*, *A Doctor Among Addicts*, and *The Jazz Life*.

He spent nine years gathering material for the recently published profile, *A Political Life: The Education of John V. Lindsay*, in which he focuses on the question "are the cities morally governable?"

Recently completing a definitive history of dissent in America, he is currently engaged in a study of the postcollege alternatives of humanism versus professionalism.

Educated at the Boston Latin School, Northeastern University, Harvard University, and the Sorbonne, Hentoff has presented his

challenging and arresting viewpoints to audiences throughout the country.

The lecture is free and open to the public.

without renewing them. Miss Barsodi, who is a library employee, stated that since many books are kept even longer than a quarter, faculty members "are making a library in their own homes." She said the university should "change the system to the same rules as students have to obey by the 10th week of Winter quarter." The current student rules which Miss Barsodi would like to have extended to cover faculty members include a two week withdrawal period, a two week renewal period, 5 cents a day fine for overdue books, and a replacement fine for lost books.

Miss Barsodi also introduced a motion to "remove 'Pete the

Penguin' by the end of Fall Quarter." The measure failed by a vote of 2-18 with RAL Simko voting with Miss Barsodi.

Other Council members felt otherwise and said so. Council member Don Leone said, "He doesn't look like he's suffering

to me." Council member Mike Marquard argued that all the money spent on Penguin equipment should not be let to go to waste and "we should at least keep him until its (equipment) depreciated."

Jeffrey Bishop, a sophomore political science major, yesterday made known his resignation as president of the Community of Concern.

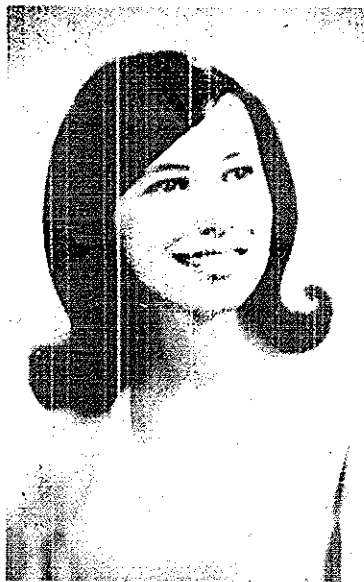

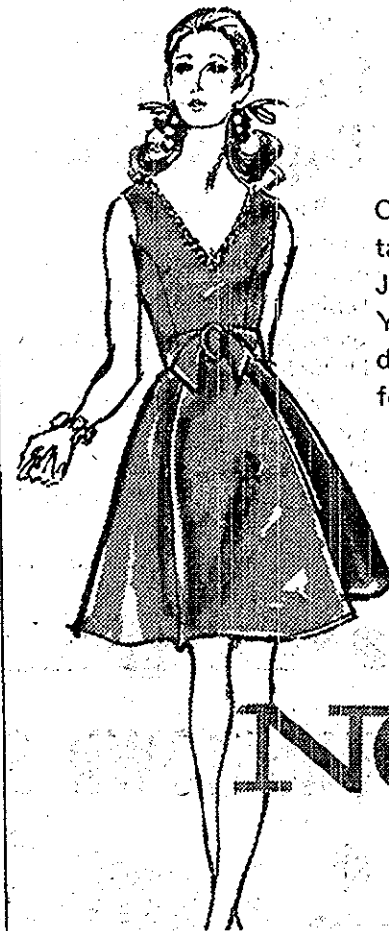
The cast consists of 6 men and 3 women.

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Vikings for Cage Debut

Youngstown State University's Penguins open their 1969-70 basketball season tomorrow when they battle Cleveland State University at 8 p.m. in the newly-built Austintown Fitch field house.

Coach Dom Rosselli, having drilled his team since Oct. 15, stated "We've been stressing team balance and defense, but it's still hard to see where are key scoring will be. That's a big question mark. As of now, no one has indicated in workouts that they will be a stickout in getting points. Balance is the answer."

This means, of course, that YSU will lack a hot-shot gunner like John McElroy, who was lost to graduation.

Players of this type are not common and for the first time in more than 10 years, the Penguins will begin their cage season awaiting the debut of a key man.

Will Teague, a 6-9 three-year letterman, looms as a large threat to opponents. Not only does he rebound quite well, but he also initiates the fast break with quick flips to the little men downcourt.

Bill Johnson, a 5-11 sophomore playmaker; Rich Denamen, a 6-5 sophomore; Ron Smith, a 6-3 high jumper; and Chris Ellis, another 6-3 sophomore are the other probable starters against Cleveland State. Denny Steinbeck, a three-year letterman, is another regular but is currently suffering from a strong case of influenza and has been unable to practice extensively.

Rosselli has indicated that he is again going to the strong zone defense, which permits Teague to work inside and hinder the

opposition. The offense sets up the plays and looks for the open man while trying to get inside for layups.

The Cleveland State team is also a big question in quality. Rookie coach Ray Deiringer pilots the squad in the place of John McLendon, who joined Denver in the pro league. Four of the starting five of last season are gone via graduation, so they are also in the midst of a rebuilding season.

paigned and 35th victory in his last 44 starts, Coach Johnson is pinning his hopes on a fine group of freshmen tankers and seven returning lettermen.

The YSU Karate Club, competing in Cleveland over the weekend, ran up an impressive score of wins.

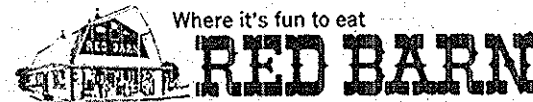
Judy Kolesar of Youngstown, placed first in Women's Division; while Michele Murphy of Warren, placed second on just her first time in competition.
