Born on Nov. 9, 1731 near Elliot City, Ma., Benjamin Ban neker was one of America's greatest intellectuals and scien tists. Banneker was an essayist, inventor, mathematician and was labeled the "sable genius.
Banneker was a self-taught mathematician and
astronomer. While still a youth he made a wooden clock astronomer. While still a youth he made a wooden clock is believed to be the first clock wholly made in America. In 1791, he served on a project to make a survey for the District of Columbia, helping to design the layout for our Nan's capital.
Deeply interested in natural phenomena, Banneker started until 1802. He published a treatise on bees, did a mathematical study on the cycle of the 17-year locust and became a pamphleteer for the anti-slavery movement. He was internationally known for his accomplishments and on his farm on Oct. 9, 1806.

If an honest history of the deep South is ever written, Dr. George Washington Carver will stand out as one of the truly great men of his time. Born of slave parents in 1860 in Diasouthern agriculture.
From his small laboratory on the campus of Tuskegee in stitute flowed hundreds of discoveries and products from the once neglected peanut. From the peanut, Carver discovered metal polish, paper, ink, shaving cream, rubbing oil, linoleum synthetic rubber and plastics. From the soybean he obtain d flour, breakfast food and milk
