### Spanish Club Hears Report On Mexico

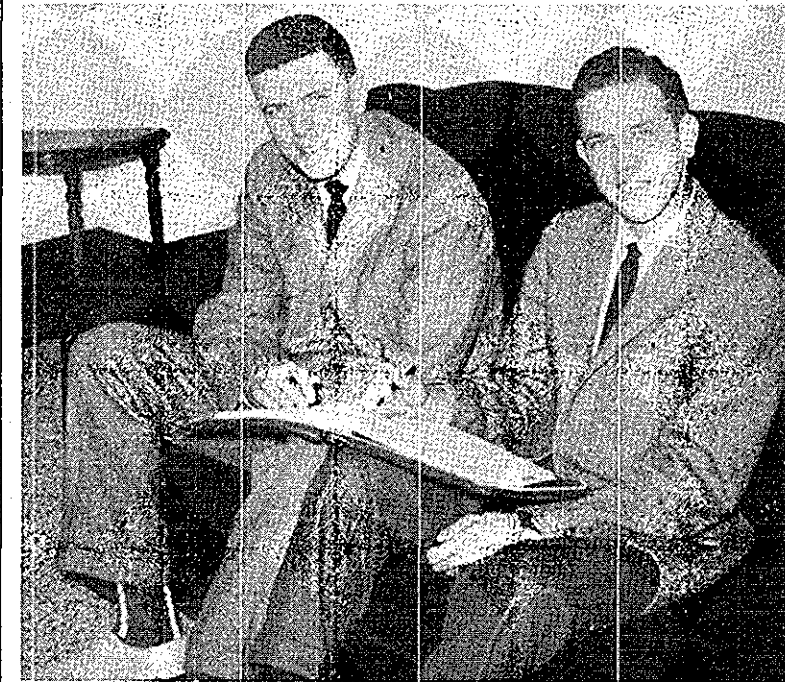

## Chaperoning Is Work

Student Council social regulations require the presence of chaperones at every all-university function. They also require that proper invitations be sent to the faculty members being considered at least ten days prior to the event.

When chaperones are being sought, organizations should keep in mind that there are over 400 faculty members from which to choose. Many have yet to be asked while several have chaperoned at not less than four dances this year.

Most faculty members would be more than willing to chaperone if they were notified at a reasonable time rather than the day before the event.

It would be courteous, however, to exclude advisors from the list of possible chaperones. This way they would not have to evaluate themselves when they send their report to the Dean's office.

If an organization is having trouble finding chaperones, they might use the following suggestions:

1. Send invitations as soon as dates are assigned by the calendar committee.
2. Offer to provide transportation to and from the event via taxicab.
3. Offer to pay chaperone's baby-sitting bill.
4. Be sure to send a thank-you note.

The use of any of the above suggestions will not only result in harmony between organizations and faculty, but it will also lay aside any difficulties in securing chaperones for future events.

## THE WHEEL — PROGRESS, DEATH

Automation began with the discovery of the wheel. Its use has grown in all ways to make a comfortable, happy and prosperous existence. The 'wheel's' part in making the automobile available for work and play directly touches all our lives.

It is saddening to know the darker side of this picture wherein the misuse of the automobile alone has killed one million Americans in its first half century of use. This amounts to more deaths than in all our wars. An added million fatalities are forecast for the next twenty years.

What can we do about it? Effective communication to insure proper attitudes in driving and walking; screening of persons for their mental, moral and physical capabilities; an awareness of the responsibilities involved and willingness to accept them at all times. Then too, we must have roadways and control not hitherto designed. We should have streets and highways in which vehicles are not in conflict with each other nor with pedestrians. They should be adequate in length, width and access; not crowded; not subject to driver error; unaffected by the elements or time of day; convenient for travel and not subject to obsolescence.

The vehicle itself should be designed for maximum safety. An altogether new look in problem solving is needed with a combination, of education, engineering business administration, legislation and whatever else is needed to insure our successful living alongside the 'wheel.'

No, the average college boy doesn't own a tux, and many of them would rather stay away from the dance rather than buy or rent one.

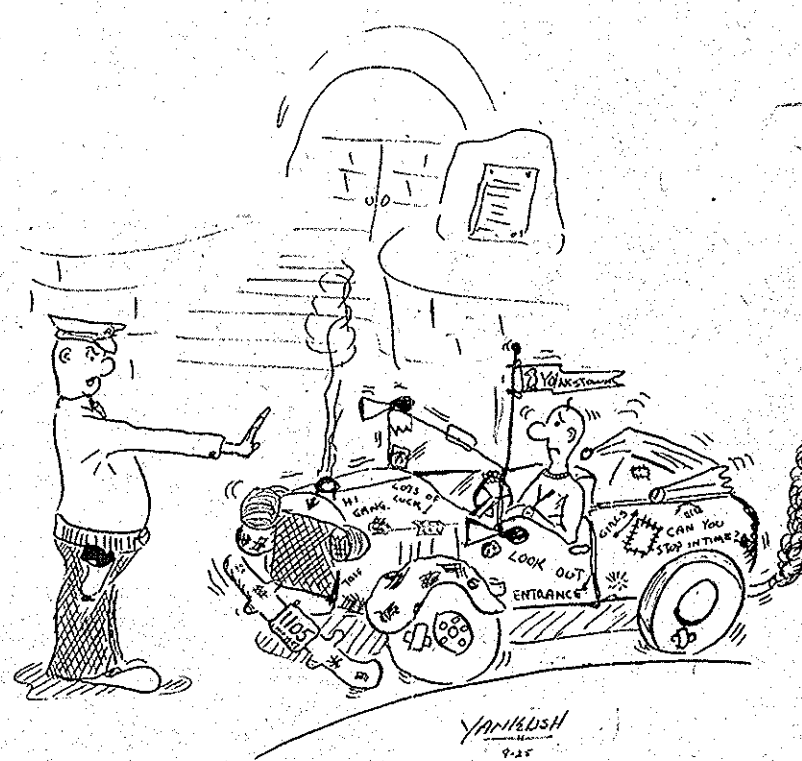
At a semi-formal dance even though her escort wears a suit, a girl can still wear her formal. This way, I feel more couples will attend a dance.

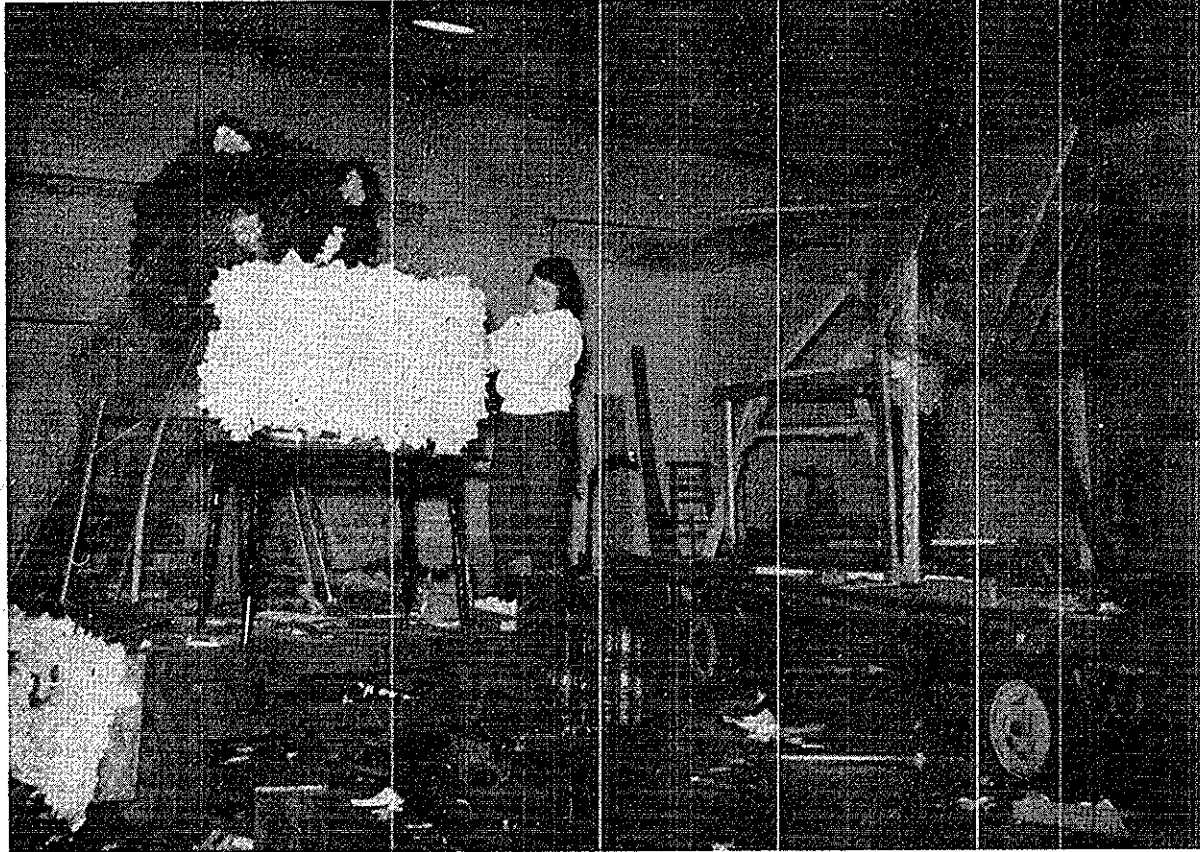

Youngstown University's football team got Dike Beede's 25th coaching year started on the winning foot by tripping Colorado Western 25-6. It was fitting because the Penguins scored a point for each of Dike's twenty-five coaching years.

The Penguins showed their potential to move the ball by rolling up 414 yards. N.A.I.A. statistics for the initial week of gridiron action showed the Penguins rushing unit to be tops in the nation, and the senior speedster, Davey Kimmel topped national statistics in individual ground-gaining. Kimmel traveled 189 yards and hit paydirt twice on long, beautifully executed runs.

#### Carter and Santor Aid Attack

Ray Carter and Mike Santor also shone offensively for the Cardinal and White. Featured were a 57 yard T.D. jaunt by Carter and a 20-yard scamper by Santor on a neat "boot-leg" play in the third and fourth stanzas.

The Penguins defense only yielded one touchdown and that was on a pitch-lateral play early in the game. Colorado Western's split-T seemed to crumble under the Penguin's might. The entire defensive team looked good, especially the bruising play of line-backer Jim Vechiarella and tackle John Krafcik. Southerners Top Locals

Two second period touchdowns stopped Youngstown University's bid for victory in the second game of the season. Tennessee Tech drove 98 yards, to score the first touchdown. The second T.D. came late in the second period. A 19 yard pass was the clincher.

The Youngstown score came late in the game with only eight seconds remaining. Mike Santor, Penguin quarterback, guided the drive of 70 yards. His passes of 16 and 18 yards to fullback Ray Carter were the big gainers. With the ball on the one, Carter surged over. Tom Smolanovich booted a perfect placement and the final score was 12-7.

#### Visitors Tough

The visitors were one of the toughest Penguin opponents in recent years. Their straight split-T attack worked like a bull-dozer through the Penguin defense. The Golden Eagles gained 333 yards, while in comparison Youngstown had 261 yards on the ground and through the air.

Youngstown men felt the effects of the bruising battle. John Abdoo was unfortunate to break his ankle, and Santor, Gmuca, and Stoops all came out with minor injuries.

#### Kimmel Held Down

Davey Kimmel, the red-haired speedster, was held to only 95 yards in 12 carries. Not since the Western Kentucky game of a year ago has
