## Possible lab fees worry Stu. Gov.

In addition to a tuition hike, YSU students now may have to pay a \$50 quarterly lab fee if they want to use computer facilities in Meshel Hall.

Student Government President Scott "Gus" Smith said at yesterday's Student Government meeting that he is concerned about this proposed idea.

Smith explained that the proposal stems from YSU's Computer Services Committee. Students wanting to use Meshel Hall and other designated computer facilities would pay a \$50 quarterly lab fee, and would be issued some type of authorization documentation to present.

The money generated from the lab fees would be accumulated into a fund to be used. See Government, page 3

## Peaceful rally, forum set to protest court decision

A rally protesting a Los Angeles court decision to acquit four L.A. police officers of brutally beating a black motorist will be held today in the Spring Street Mall in front of Kilcawley Center at noon.

The rally, sponsored by the Pan-African Student Organization, will also consist of a forum featuring several speakers, as well as a march if time permits.

The rally is organized to protest the L.A. court decision on a highly publicized case of police brutality.

The case involves Rodney King, who was pulled from his car by police after a high-speed chase. King was then severely beaten as was evidenced through an amateur videotape made by a witness.

The decision handed down by the court resulted in rioting and looting in Central L.A., as well as related outbreaks of violence across the country.

According to Michelle J. Murphy, coordinator for Multicultural Student

Services and an advisor to the Pan-African Student Organization, this rally will be a peaceful one.

"I do not condone the violence," said Murphy, but she said she does understand the level of outrage and frustration felt by people involved in the violence.

Murphy said there is a need for America to focus attention on areas of employment, health care, problems with the homeless and education.

"We have a lot of hopeless people out here," said Murphy. "And they have to have hope again."

Based on what she has heard, Murphy said, "The majority of America is outraged that those police officers were acquitted."

"We would like the world to know that we [YSU community] are outraged as well," she said.

Speaking at the forum will be Murphy; Ron Daniels; Brother K.; Reverend Jim Ray, campus ministry; Paul Davis, Students for Peace president; Colleen Kemp-Queener, associate director of Multicultural Student Services; and Shareef Ali.

## Student Presidential candidates battle for the high office

The two presidential candidates for Student Government battled in a head-to-head debate last Thursday to clarify their positions.

Tisha Brady, junior, A&S, and Bill Burley, junior, F&PA, were asked questions by four panelists.

The panelists included Robert Yallech of the YSU debate team; Tim Hollis, vice-president of Pan-African Student Organization; Desiree Lyonette, representing *The Jambar*; and Roy McMillan, representing Non-Traditional Student Services.

The candidates were asked about their views and what is being done regarding the cuts

being made by the state in the area of higher education.

Burley responded to the question in terms of need for the state to acquire funds while also maintaining the quality of higher education.

"We understand what the governor is trying to do," said Burley. "But we also understand that we have an academic empire to run. Youngstown State University has to move forward and we need the finances to do it."

Brady urged students to write to their state representatives and, if not satisfied with the way they have done their jobs, to vote them out of office.

According to Brady, working students will find it more difficult to afford to pay tuition. If further cuts continue, bringing in outside sources of funding may be necessary.

"We need to find a way to cut the budget," said Brady. "We need to find a way to project YSU as a marketable item. We have to find a way to sell

ourselves to the community and also we have to find a way to bring in corporations."

The candidates were asked what programs they would begin or, due to cutbacks, eliminate in the upcoming year.

Burley acknowledged that cuts are inevitable, but that the students don't care.

"The students still expect everything that they received before. They still expect the University to run as it always did," he said.

According to Burley, it will be necessary for groups to form coalitions and work in conjunction with Student Government if programs are to continue.

"We may have to do a lot of our own fundraising," said Burley. "We may have to do a lot of the leg work, but that's okay. We can do it."

Brady responded that creativity is the key to sponsoring programs as opposed to spending a lot of money.

## Awareness: A primary factor in crime prevention

YSU — If the recent assaults on campus have you worried about safety then it is time to channel that fear into positive energy.

Chuck Duncan, H&PE professor, teaches a self-defense class at YSU which focuses on individual crime prevention. Duncan stresses the importance of crime prevention through awareness.

"A lot of self-defense skills are really mental habits that people have to develop," said Duncan.

By mentally planning daily activities, said Duncan, people can recognize the potentially-dangerous aspects of crime and attempts to minimize the risk of becoming a victim.

"To get people to think in a preventative way is the biggest skill," said Duncan.

The primary factor in crime prevention is constant awareness, according to Duncan. People must be aware of their surroundings and alert to any changes.

Many recent crimes in Youngstown have involved people being taken from their car. According to Duncan, the simplest form of prevention in the car is to always lock the door as soon as you get in.

Another aspect of awareness about car crime involves coming to a stop or a red light.

"Leave a car length between yourself and the car in front of you," said Duncan. He said many crimes involving automobiles result from someone being trapped between two cars making them unable to move out fast enough.

Duncan said that when a car is parked people must also be aware of the environment.

"If it is light when you are parking your car you have to think if it will be dark when you come out; park under a light," said Duncan.

"Always have your keys out and ready when you walk to your car. A common mistake is to stand by your car fumbling in your pockets or purse looking for your keys," said Duncan.

"Most criminals are opportunists. They're looking for the easiest way to get what they want," said Duncan. "The more obstacles we put in their way, the less likely we are to be the easiest opportunity."

If you are faced with a robbery attempt, it is usually best to give the assailant what they want, Duncan said.

"Don't keep your valuables on you unless you are willing to part with them," said Duncan.

"If you carry keepsakes you are more likely to fight for them and you then stand a chance of being seriously injured."

"If you have to carry a lot of money, keep it in two different places. It is important to keep the criminal from getting violent but you don't want to hand over your life savings," said Duncan.

"In a sexual assault it is a low probability that you will be able to reason your way out of the situation," said Duncan.

Typically, there are two schools of thought on avoiding harm from sexual assault.

One view says not to resist and not to provoke your attacker.

"Unfortunately, this does not statistically lower the probability of being seriously injured," said Duncan.

"If you decide you have to fight don't hold back. Statistics show that those who attempt to fight off an attacker recover more quickly mentally than those who don't struggle at all," said Duncan.

"Nothing works 100 percent all the time," said Duncan. "The important thing is to keep something until it does work."

 imagination you have," said Brady. "If you have a lot of imagination you can do just about anything."

According to Brady, the programs that request funding will have to be wanted by a large portion of the student population, since low attendance will result if students do not want the program. She said this will reduce wasted funds.

When asked what could be done to lessen the amount of ig-

norance about multiculturalism, Brady said she is planning to have a multicultural festival May 11 through 15 so people can experience other cultures.

"I think a lot of the problem with multiculturalism is that people do not take the time to get to know other people because of their skin color," said Brady.

According to Burley, the only way by which we will be able to end the ignorance of race is by making "the ignorant realize how ignorant they are."

 ed for hardware and software replacement.

YSU's Academic Senate will be voting Wednesday on whether or not to recommend the proposal. If recommended, it will then be accepted or rejected by the administration.

Smith said that he understands that the University is facing a budget crisis and it wants to make up for the losses,

but it isn't fair to students.

"I am really concerned about this," said Smith. "Students are already facing an increase in tuition. Fifty dollars is a large sum of money. Fifty dollars is way out of bounds. The chemistry and biology departments charge a \$20 dollar lab fee. This is acceptable, but \$50 dollars is an exorbitant amount for students

to pay. I hope the Academic Senate votes this down."

In other business, Smith said he wants to encourage all students to vote in tomorrow's Student Government elections.

Smith also announced that he is endorsing Bill Burley and Pat Billett for Student Government president and vice-president for next year.

 only has a better chance in a fighting atmosphere but they don't normally appear as vulnerable as those less fit," said Duncan. "Just the way you carry yourself may be enough of a deterrent to keep assailants

from attacking."

"The physical skills are a reserve," said Duncan. "You want to use your intelligence; that's what separates people from other animals."

"A person should realize every environment they have to deal with in their life and minimize their vulnerability as best they can," said Duncan.

### Burley-Billet is best choice for Student Government

Three years ago, a tradition was begun in the way that Student Government was run. Running as write-in candidates, Brian Fry and Dan Haude became Student Government president and vice-president respectively. With their win, Student Government became a viable force on the YSU campus. Not only were Fry and Haude visible to students and the Youngstown community, they worked with and for the students.

After their two-year reign, Scott Smith and Paul Conley continued the tradition and bettered the already excellent Student Government. *The Jambar* believes that the only two people who qualify to carry on the tradition are Bill Burley and Pat Billett. Unlike Tisha and Pia Brady, Burley and Billett will work with and for the students.

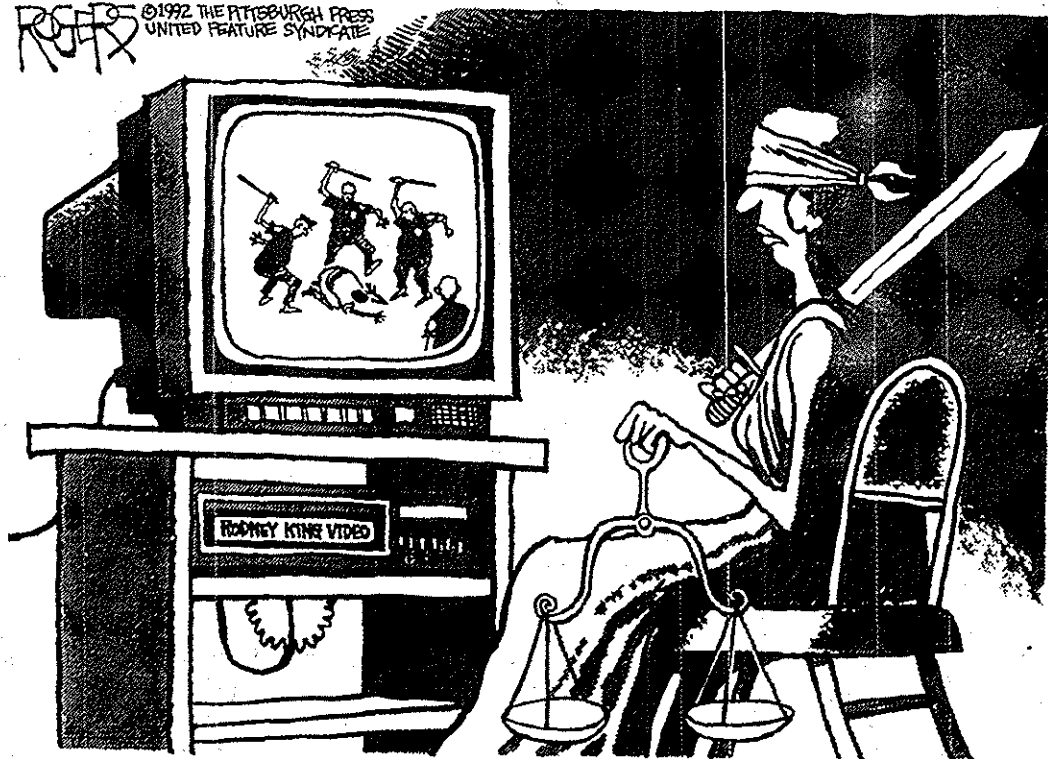

## Blatant injustice was not rectified

Dear Editor:

There comes a time when things are so blatantly wrong that you think something has to be done. You tell yourself that inevitably, justice will prevail. This is how I felt last spring as I watched the videotaped beating of motorist Rodney King. But it seems that justice is not always the inevitable outcome of blatant injustice. In fact, it would appear that justice is reserved only for certain people. Four police officers have been found not guilty of this brutal attack upon an unarmed and defenseless man. The only remaining question is whether or not an officer who struck King over 45 times used excessive force.

The police officers and the defense argued that King appeared to be under the influence of drugs and continually resisted arrest. I would like to state at this point that I have seen — not just heard about — a man high on crack who was wrestled to the ground and handcuffed by two police officers. These officers never used their nightsticks or swung a single blow at the man, and he was under control in moments. Now, some members of the LAPD would have us believe that approximately a dozen officers could not subdue one man without such brutality as witnessed in the King video tape. I have made a personal note of the fact that never once throughout my entire viewing of the incident did I see one attempt made to handcuff or subdue Mr. King. I did, however, witness a man who was being beaten into submission as if surrounded by a mob rather than law enforcement officers.

One of the jurors Thursday morning claimed that King was in control of the situation, and that the actions of the police officers were a response to his resistance. How can anyone possibly see Mr. King as having been in control of the situation where he was nearly beaten to death? Who can place themselves in the position of a man who is being continuously beaten and repeatedly shocked and claim to be in control? The fact that Mr. King should not submissively lay there and take that beating was most likely because he was scared for his life. How could he possibly know whether

or not he was going to be killed that evening?

I would like to state at this point that I am not claiming that all police officers are brutal racists. I am sure that there are police officers both in Los Angeles and even here in Youngstown who are outraged at the actions of these men. There was even one officer who was present that night who stated that he believed the officers used excessive force and he testified against their actions. The actions of these four men did not take place in a void, however. I find it hard to believe that these were the actions of individuals operating completely against the norm. Somewhere these men received the idea that this sort of behavior was acceptable. We cannot forget that even though only four officers were brought up on charges, many more stood by and witnessed the beating of an unarmed man.

The general feeling which has led to the rioting is that Mr. King didn't receive justice because he is an African-American who was beaten by white police officers. I firmly believe that the actions of these men were wrong, regardless of the victim's ethnicity. This interpretation is based upon the idea that no one should suffer such brutality during arrest. If Mr. King was perceived as such an uncontrollable threat, then I believe that he would have been shot or at least warned at gun point. Guns have a funny way of making people very cooperative.

My largest concern with this entire occurrence is that our society missed an opportunity to take a firm stance against racism and brutality. Had this situation been handled fairly, we could all claim that we saw brutal racism punished in 1992, but instead we saw it excused. I am certain that this incident angers many whites who have fought against racism and police brutality. This court ruling is a step back in years of progress between blacks and whites. I am not sure about what response the black community should take. However, do people who have no protection under the law have any duty to obey the law?

I am hoping that this issue will be addressed by other leading syndicated commentators such as William William Bo Billiam Banana Fanna Fo Filliam F. Buckley. I, however, need to deal with another, even MORE troubling issue that was just brought to my attention by several alert readers, namely: the Pregnant Judy Doll.

This is a doll that is being advertised for \$14.95 in various magazines and newspapers. You might have seen the ad: It says "Judy Is Having a Baby!" and there's a picture of Judy, a blue-eyed doll with a perky smile and 11 pounds of blue eye shadow and a blond hairdo the size of Iraq. She looks a lot like Barbie, except that she obviously has what leading medical authorities refer to as a Bun in the Oven.

"Judy is more than a toy," the ad states. "She's a natural way for your child to learn while playing."

I have no problem with using dolls as a teaching device. Most of what I know about the human anatomy, such as that it is medically incorrect to have a foot sticking out from the middle of your face, I learned as a child from studying Mr. Potato Head.

But the Pregnant Judy Doll has some dangerously misleading anatomical characteristics. The way she works is, when it's time for her to have the baby, you REMOVE HER TUMMY. That's right: Her tummy, which is shaped like half a walnut shell, pops right off. There's a photograph in the ad of Judy going through a delivery: a hand has lifted off her tummy, and there's a perky little baby inside with its arms and legs folded up neatly like a TV tray. Judy, her hairdo still perfect, is paying no attention to the fact that a giant hand has removed her tummy. She's looking into the distance with her perky smile, as if to say: "What FUN to deliver a baby! Perhaps this afternoon I shall play tennis!"

The reason she can smile is, SHE HAS ANOTHER TUMMY. Yes. And it's a FLAT tummy. You pop it on her, and suddenly, seconds after delivery, Judy has the body of a Dallas Cowboys Cheerleader. (Judy comes with both tummies. The ad says you can also buy some accessories, sold separately, including maternity outfits, a crib, a tub, and "Judy's Husband Charlie.")

I have some BIG problems with using a toy like this to teach young people, particularly young female people, about childbirth. I saw my son, Robby, get born. Well, OK, I didn't actually watch Robby come OUT. I had mentally divided my wife, Beth, into two major sectors: (1) the Head Sector, and (2) the Rest of Beth Sector. I was concerned that I'd pass out if I saw what was happening in Sector Two, plus there were what seemed like several hundred masked medical personnel down there. So I focused my attention exclusively on Sector One, Beth's head, trying to keep its morale up.

"You're doing GREAT!" I would tell the head, patting it in a reassuring manner.

"AWWWRRRRROOOOGGGGGGGGGHHHH," the head would say, looking like it might attempt to bite me.

"Yes!" I would say. "Fine!"

Meanwhile, in the other sector, scary things were happening that I cannot describe to you in detail because I squinted my eyes up whenever I looked in that direction. But I can tell you this much: They did NOT pop Beth's tummy off like a walnut shell and lift Robby out, and he was NOT at all perky, and despite the fact that Beth is a naturally slim person it was some time before her flat tummy arrived in the mail.

So we need to ask ourselves whether it's a good thing, exposing impressionable young children to the Pregnant Judy Doll. We don't want to raise a generation of new mothers who have highly unrealistic expectations about childbirth and show up in the Delivery Room carrying tennis rackets. I think the government should look into this, and that is why I am urging you to write to President George Herbert Herbert Bo Berbert Banana Fanna Fo Ferbert Fee Fie Moe Merbert Walker Bush, as well as to your congressperson (sold separately).

# Noted journalist Georgie Ann Geyer to speak at YSU

YSU — Noted journalist Georgie Ann Geyer will visit YSU as a Thomas Colloquium Lecturer at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 19, in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center.

Known as the woman who got stories from places that others dared not go, Geyer has had a whirlwind career of ground-breaking journalism. She was the only American to interview Argentine President Juan Peron, one of the first to interview the Ayatollah Khomeini, and she interviewed Prince Sihanouk of Cambodia when all American reporters were forbidden to enter the country.

The Palestinians held Geyer as an Israeli spy in 1973, and in 1967 she was imprisoned in Angola for writing about the revolutionary government.

She masqueraded as a waitress at a Mafia wedding, winning her the Chicago Newspaper Guild Prize for best human interest story. *Newsweek* named Geyer one of the four outstanding woman journalists in the country.

As a professional journalist for 25 years, Geyer has worked with the *Chicago Daily News*, the *Los Angeles Times*, and the *Washington Star*. She is currently a syndicated columnist with Universal Press Syndicate.

Geyer is a graduate of Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism and was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Vienna in Austria. She speaks five languages: English, German, Spanish, Portuguese and Russian.

She is the author of four books, in-

cluding *Buying the Night Flight*, an autobiography of her odyssey as one of the first women foreign correspondents. She also contributes regularly to such publications as *The Saturday Review*, *The Atlantic*, *Encyclopedia Britannica* and many others.

The Thomas Colloquium on Free Enterprise was established in 1981 through the income from an endowment established by Paul J. and Marguerite K. Thomas.

## Penguin thinclads finish fourth at MCC

Keith Gorby ran to a first-place finish in the 1,000m run in 31:45.8 at the Mid-Continent Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships this past weekend.

Gorby was the only Penguin thinclad to capture a gold in any event. He also ran to a second-place finish in the 5,000m run.

"Keith capturing a first place at a meet this size is an incredible accomplishment," said head coach Jack Rigney. "He really did well."

Overall, the Penguins finished fourth in team standings, six points behind Akron, who finished third. Eastern and Western Illinois ended with first and second place respectively.

Rigney said he was pleased with his team's performance.

"I felt we did real good at the meet," Rigney said. "I am very proud of the guys and the job they did."

Rigney said the team fell short of the points it needed to catch Akron because of weakness in two events.

"We started the meet without the benefit of a decathlete or seasoned hammer throwers," he said. "These spots are developmental spaces that the team is aware of, and we are looking to fill these spots in recruiting."

Even without these two events the Penguin harriers still managed to score heavily in other events.

Several YSU thinclads topped their personal records over the weekend.

Freshman George Schinker beat his own personal distance in both the long jump and the triple jump. Schinker leapt 21'1½" in the long jump and 41'6" in the triple jump.

In the javelin, Sean Boraveic and Jason Horvath both topped their own personal best.

In other throwing events, sophomore Randy Closson was the only weightman to add to the scoring effort. Closson threw to a sixth-place finish in the shot put with a toss of 47'2¼".

In the field events, Randy Miller, who broke a school record in the pole vault at the YSU Invitational, vaulted to a fourth-place tie with Eric Heinz of EIU with a jump of 13' even.

In distance competition, Brian Snow and R.T. Clingan ran to a sixth- and seventh-place finish in the 3,000m steeplechase. Steve Boyd placed fifth in the 1,500m run with a time of 4:01.7.

The major Penguin points came in sprinting events.

Jay Payne took second place in the 400m hurdles with a time of :53.34 and fourth in the 110m hurdles in :15.5.

In the 100m dash, Jamal Smith and Rich Norman captured second and third places to aid the Penguin effort.

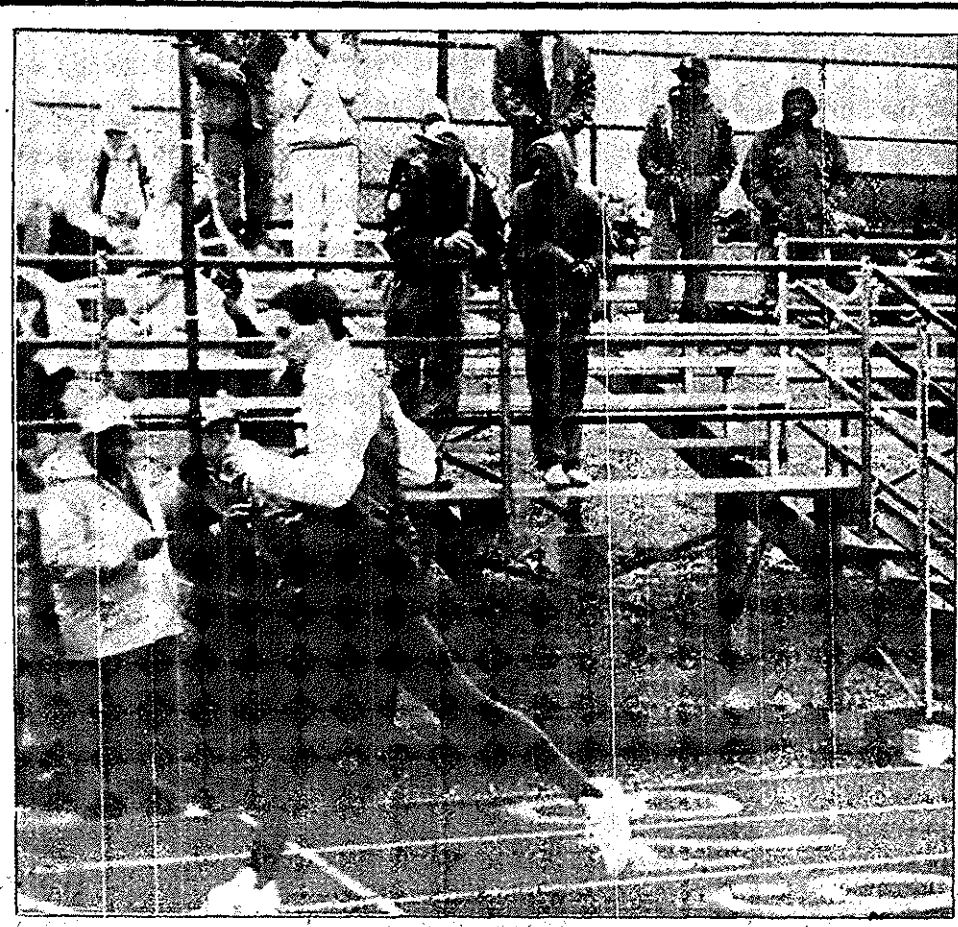
The Penguin relay squads were once again in a winning mood at the MCC meets. The 4x100m relay team, consisting of Smith, Ed Bradley, Rich Norman and Payne, finished second with a time of :41.99.

The 1,600m relay crew, consisting of Payne, Brent Kelly, Tim Small and Sean O'Neill, captured fourth place in

3:25.86.

No Penguin thinclad has yet qualified for the NCAA meets. YSU's men's and women's teams travel to the Kent State

Invitational on Saturday. There are two meets left for the Penguins to qualify for the National meets.

## Red captures annual spring gridiron crown

If the weather Saturday afternoon was any indication of the way things will be this year for the Penguin football team, it

looks as if it will be business as usual on the sunny side of the stadium.

YSU finished up the spring practice season with the annual Red-White game in 78-degree weather Saturday as senior-

quarterback Nick Cochran lead the Red team to a 24-7 trounce over the White squad.

Cochran threw 35 times, completing 17 of the aeriels for 195 yards. Sophomore Mark Brungard anchored down the

signal-calling position for the White team with 152 yards on 37 attempts and 16 connections.

Running back Darnell Clark got Red on the scoreboard first as he scampered in from 13 yards out. A PAT by sophomore Jeff Wilkins (who kicked for both squads) made the score 7-0 with 15:18 remaining in the first half.

The Red team collected three more points with six seconds remaining in the half when it got into scoring range, and Wilkins kicked a 23-yard field goal which put the team up 10-0 at the half.

The White team got into the scoring with 23:06 left in the second half as David Newby snagged a 14-yard pass from Brungard. Wilkins kicked the PAT to notch the score at 10-7.

Clark wasn't done scoring for Red, however, as he hit paydirt on a four-yard run with 15:58 on the clock. Wilkins again kicked the extra pont to put Red up 17-7.

With 8:23 remaining, the Red squad iced its victory as Ryan Wood snuck in from the one-yard line. After a Wilkins' kick, Red secured the 24-7 advantage that took it through the remainder of the contest.

Clark lead all rushers with 54

yards on eight carries while fellow Red teammate Micheal Ghent collected 43 yards on two runs.

Hudson and John Steele lead all receivers with 62 and 60 yards respectively for the White team.

Defensively, the Red team was lead by Mike Book and Jeff Johnston who each tallied seven tackles. The White squad was lead by Marcus Evans who collected nine tackles and Derek Pixley marked up seven.

The game, which helps the coaches get an early look at the players, took the form of two 40-minute halves with a running clock. Sticking with tradition, the Penguins gridders were lead by a corp of "guest" coaches. Dr. John Geletka was at the helm of the victorious Red squad as Dr. Ernest Perry directed the White team.

For Red, Mickey Monus, Dr. Y.T. Chiu, Betty DeLuca, Jack O'Connell, Dr. John Yemma, Dr. David Ruggles and Dr. David Sweetkind served as Geletka's assistants.

Their counterparts on the White team were Atty. Edward Flask, Mark Lyden, Atty. Richard McLaughlin, Dr. George Sutton, Dr. James Cicarelli, Dr. Sally Hotchkiss and Dr. Gordon Mapley.

# Baseball team drops 3 in weekend play

The Penguin baseball team had a disappointing weekend as it dropped two games to Wright State University at Pemberton Park Saturday and then split a doubleheader at Gordon Field in Cleveland against Cleveland State University, making the weekend record 1-3.

Junior Brian Myers lead YSU's bats as he slammed out a solo homerun in the Penguins' 5-1 loss to Wright State.

Neither team was able to collect any hits in the first two innings, but both scored a run in the third. The Raiders started the inning with one runner crossing the plate on three base hits. The Penguins then turned in a run of their own on Myers' homer.

From there, though, the ball was literally in the hands (and off the bats) of Wright State.

The Indiana team registered one run in both the fourth and the fifth innings and two in the sixth while keeping the Penguins scoreless for the remainder of the contest.

Senior Dean Cicoretti, junior Jeff Davenport and sophomore Joe Ayyette each registered a base hit for YSU.

In the second game of the doubleheader, Wright State kept the domination coming in a 5-0 shutout of the Penguins.

The Raiders had two runs in both the second and fourth innings and one in the sixth and 10 hits en route to their blanking of YSU.

Myers again lead the Penguins with a double and a single while junior Jay Hall, Cicoretti, Davenport and Ayyette each collected a single.

On Sunday, YSU dropped the first game of a two-game series to the Vikings of Cleveland State, 9-2.

The Penguins got behind in points right away as they failed to register any points in the first inning as Cleveland State brought home four on five hits.

The second stanza was scoreless for both teams, but the third was explosive. The Penguins started off the inning with two runs in three hits as Ayyette registered a double and junior Tim Birkmeier knocked out a homerun. The Vikings answered with three runs of their own on four hits to end the inning.

After a scoreless fourth, Cleveland State tallied two more runs in the fifth to end the scoring with a 9-2 advantage for the Vikings.

YSU collected six hits during the game, with Ayyette contributing two while Birkmeier, Cicoretti, senior Joe Roscoe, and sophomore Mike Caggiano each had one.

In the second game of the

doubleheader, the Penguins finally got on the winning side of the score as they notched a 6-3 win over Cleveland State.

YSU got on the scoreboard first as senior Torry Zerrilla knocked in Myers. In inning three, both teams captured three runs to put the score at 4-3.

From there, the Penguins kept the Vikings from crossing home plate again while YSU brought in two more runs, one in the fourth and one in the fifth.

After a scoreless sixth and

seventh for both teams, the Penguins captured their first win of the weekend, 6-3.

Sophomore Lou Vassalotti and Cicoretti each had a double while Hall had two singles in three at bats.

The Penguins are away again today, as they travel to New York to take on the Bonnies of St. Bonaventure University. Tomorrow they will be home against the University of Dayton. The game is set to begin at 1 p.m.

## Volleyball team hosts three-team tourney

That built CSU's momentum to take the next three sets.

YSU stayed close with CSU in the fourth set, which was scored on rally points, by tying the game seven times before the Lady Vikings pulled away.

"[YSU] battled and hustled out there," said McKenna. "The only problem we really had out

there [Saturday] was our consistency."

The third and final match of the day featured YSU and Kent State, in which Kent won in a shortened four-set match, 15-6, 15-10, 15-0, 15-13.

The Lady Flashes dominated the entire match with their crisp passing and stubborn defense. According to McKenna, crisp passing is the one thing he would like to see from YSU.

"Last year, our passes weren't that close to our setter," said McKenna. "This year, we're getting them closer to the setter, but not exactly where we want them. It's just going to be a matter of fine tuning our passes."

The low point of the day for the Lady Penguins came when KSU shut them out in the third set. Even though YSU lost both matches, McKenna said he is not disheartened by them.

"This entire spring has been a learning experience for us," said McKenna. "This gave us a good look at the core of our team for next season. I'm very encouraged by the way we played overall."

In between YSU's matches, Kent State beat Cleveland State three sets to two, including an exciting 22-20 win by Kent in the fifth set.

It is likely that YSU will meet Kent State in the fall. The Lady Penguins, who join the Mid-Continent Conference (MCC) last fall, will meet Cleveland State twice next season.

On Saturday, YSU hit the road to Buffalo to take on Canisius. Again, the Lady Penguins split the two games, losing 1-2 in the opener and taking the nightcap, 13-7.

YSU did not get a hit until Henson got an infield hit in the fifth inning of the first game. The team mustered only four hits in the entire contest to the Lady Griffins' 11.

The second game of the doubleheader turned out to be a slugfest as the two teams combined for 27 hits. The Lady Penguins pounded out 16 hits, four of which came in the seven-run fourth inning.

With the exception of sophomore Sandy Pleskovic, every Lady Penguin starter scored at least once in the game. Molasky and senior Michelle McKee had three RBIs apiece.

YSU then traveled to Niagara Falls on Sunday to take on Niagara College. In the first game, Molasky pitched a no-hitter en route to a 7-0 win for YSU.

Molasky only allowed three baserunners in the game, two on walks and one on an error by first baseman Carey Johnson. Johnson did make up for it by going 1 for 3 with two runs scored.

McKee and Brendza each had two RBIs in the opener.

In the second game, Henson gave up four hits as YSU took the second game, 4-1, to complete the sweep. Four straight singles by the Lady Penguins provided three runs in the third inning to give Henson all the runs she needed. Junior Rachel Cowley went 2 for 3 in the nightcap for YSU.

The Lady Penguins are now 17-19 on the season. Their last game will be tomorrow afternoon when they visit Cleveland State.



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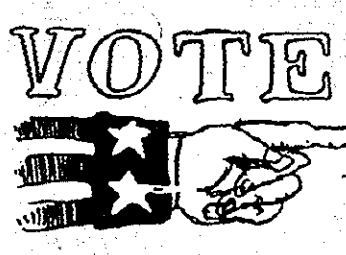
