

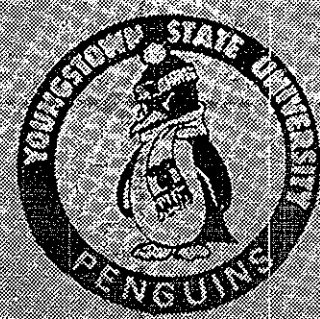

Norville talks of women in the 90s

Bright, witty, spunky and blonde.

Broadcast journalist Deborah Norville kept the audience captured with her southern belle charm and uptown flair as she spoke about "Media Images" this past Friday afternoon at Stambaugh Auditorium as part of the Junior League of Youngstown's Town Hall Lecture Series.

"Hi, everybody! I'm so excited to be back in Youngstown," Norville said with a burst of enthusiasm that radiated out through the audience.

She said the last time she was in Youngstown was for a business trip with her family. Even though Norville was only 5 years old at that time, she said she remembers Youngstown vividly, especially her stay at the Holiday Inn.

Norville recently joined CBS News as the newest correspondent on "Street Stories," a primetime news magazine. This newest project marks her return to television after an 18-month hiatus.

It was her position as co-host of NBC's "Today" morning television program in 1990 that made her nationally known. She left the program after the birth of her son.

Stu Gov features speaker

Her talk on Friday afternoon centered on the images of women in the '90s.

"They just don't get it," Norville stated. She explained that this particular phrase was uttered by women in the workforce in regard to sexual harassment.

Along with issues about sexual harassment in the workplace, Norville explained how today's women are "engulfed in a malaise—a nagging sense that all is not right with our world. Women no longer know who they are," she stated.

"American women don't know who they are because there are no reliable guideposts

out there," she said.

Norville explained how women are still only making 80 cents on every dollar compared to their male colleagues. But, she said progress is being made. Norville reminded everyone that the glass ceiling that has kept women from achieving top positions is slowly being cracked.

When speaking of cases revolving around sexual harassment in the workplace, Norville cited the Clarence Thomas and Anita Hill case.

"It struck me, not who's story you believe, but the surprise register of people who said: 'I didn't know that could happen.'"

Norville meshed stories about the problems and lives of women in the workforce with funny anecdotes about her own private life and how she learned to balance her private and public life.

"I'm finding out what it really means to balance my family and work."

She explained how motherhood has made an impact upon her life.

"One day the Secretary of State is saying to me: 'Hey, how ya doing Deb,' and the next day the baby is vomiting all over me."

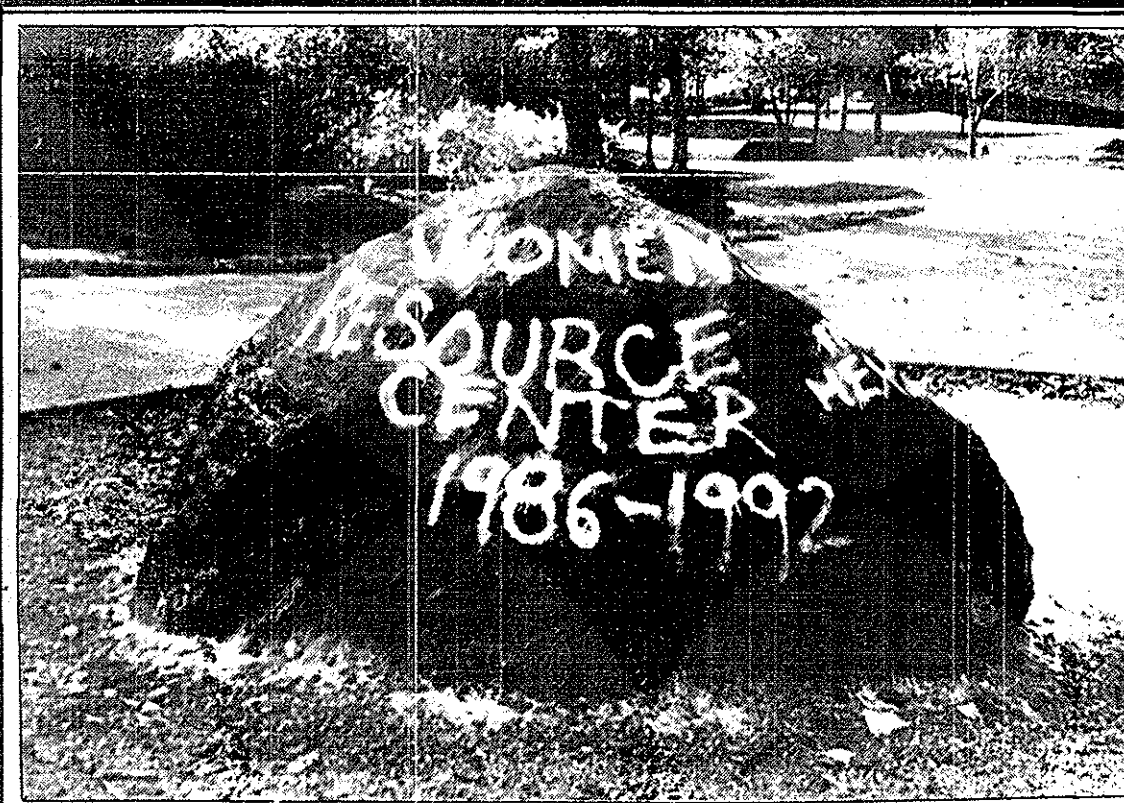
"I've learned several things: Number one is that you'll never get it all done. Accept defeat and don't set your expectations too high. Second, the experts aren't. Just look at Washington and the economy to see it. I've learned that you have got to trust yourself and believe in yourself."

"I applaud Dan Quayle. It is time that we get back to the basics and family values, but my skin gets cold when people tell me about what my essential role should be as a woman," Norville stated.

Norville encourages women to get involved.

"I hope you are registered to vote," she said.

"Doubt is what makes culture grow. When doubt exists, people get involved," she said.

YSU president addresses cultural diversity

President Leslie Cochran was a special speaker at a Racial Awareness Program (RAP) meeting Thursday, where he gave a presentation of his views on racial diversity, and ways of improving YSU.

"A tremendous strength of this University is its ethnic diversity," said Cochran. He also made it known that YSU pro-

grams do not currently reflect the diversity of the campus.

However, Cochran said he is interested in utilizing ethnic diversity at YSU. For instance, it was mentioned that the Foreign Language program as an academic program could be united with the community.

"There are grants available for us to go to some of the former Eastern Soviet block countries and connect with entrepreneurship programs," Cochran said. He also pointed out that com-

parisons of some of YSU's hiring practices indicate that minorities are not represented in a proportional way on campus, and nonracial implementations were discussed.

Another point Cochran brought up is that he is interested in making YSU's campus safer. He said while he believes the inner section of campus is safe, he plans to make the outer part of campus equally safe.

Cochran said in order to

achieve that goal he would like to work with city government. Cochran wants to divide Campus Police into two sections and have a precinct in the Elm Street area.

Cochran also encouraged members of the audience to share their views with him about YSU.

"We can make a difference," he said to the audience. "We can change the institution. It may only be 5 or 10 percent, or this idea or that idea, but if we don't

get started we certainly won't make any changes."

While some of Cochran's plans are in the process of being implemented now, others are part of his "Campus 2000" plan. "Campus 2000" is the structure by which Cochran wants YSU to be improved in diversity, academics and economics by the year 2000.

One aspect of this plan is to encourage businesses to come into the YSU area.

Cochran is using a step-by-step process in developing YSU's potential. He said he realized some people who have been at YSU longer than he has might be "frustrated" at the slow pace YSU has previously had in ethnic diversity and campus development.

However, he encouraged the audience to be patient and help him to understand the needs of the YSU community.

Some Women's Resource Center services to get funding

Earlier this month the YSU Board of Trustees passed a resolution to set aside funds within Student Services, "to bring back some part of what the Women's Resource Center did," according to Dr. Charles McBriarty, vice-president of Student Services.

The action taken by the Board of Trustees, "has been in direct response to the concern that so many people expressed regarding the center," said McBriarty.

The Women's Resource Center has been on the YSU campus since the mid-'80s and has "served as a place for women students to gather, share ideas, concerns and interests," he said.

"The original purpose of the Center was a library of resource materials that offered assistance to women students," McBriarty said. The Center's library has been maintained and the books, periodicals and other materials that have accumulated over the years have remained intact and will be re-established.

"The Center's program addressed issues important to women: parenting skills, rape,

and the changing role of the women in society since World War II were some of the issues," McBriarty said.

Danna Bozick, former director of the Center, maintained a level of involvement that was more than just a job.

"A large cadre of volunteers helped Danna with the program and many of these people are still on campus," said McBriarty.

McBriarty said that making the decision to close the Center was "tough." He asked his department to tell him what kinds of things were essential and had to continue in the area of students services. He said it was clearly a matter of priorities.

"There are certain things that are required of us because of law, because we are an institution," he said. "We receive federal and state money and we are required to do certain things. There were certain services that had to be maintained. One example would be Career Services."

"Some programs had to be eliminated," he continued. "They had to be stopped in order to meet the budget target, and the Women's Resource Center fell into the category of a service

that enriched or enhanced the student experience," explained McBriarty.

"Good, better and best programs were cut and even when we cut good, we're cutting good," McBriarty said.

A group of women came in and told McBriarty how much the program meant to them personally and a large group of people circulated a petition. McBriarty and President Leslie Cochran received letters from faculty, administration and many others who showed their support and concern for the Center.

"What was going on in there had an impact on a lot of people," said McBriarty.

In direct response to the outpouring of concern by so many people, the YSU Board of Trustees voted to resolve to "set aside money within Student Services to bring back part of what the Women's Resource Center did," said McBriarty.

"The acting provost will identify a faculty member to serve in a liaison role with the Women's Studies program and the money to continue the Center will be made available to that faculty member," said McBriarty.

6. Trade Vice President Dan Quayle to Japan for spare Toyota parts and a Sony to be named later. (Proposed by *The Jambar* sports staff).

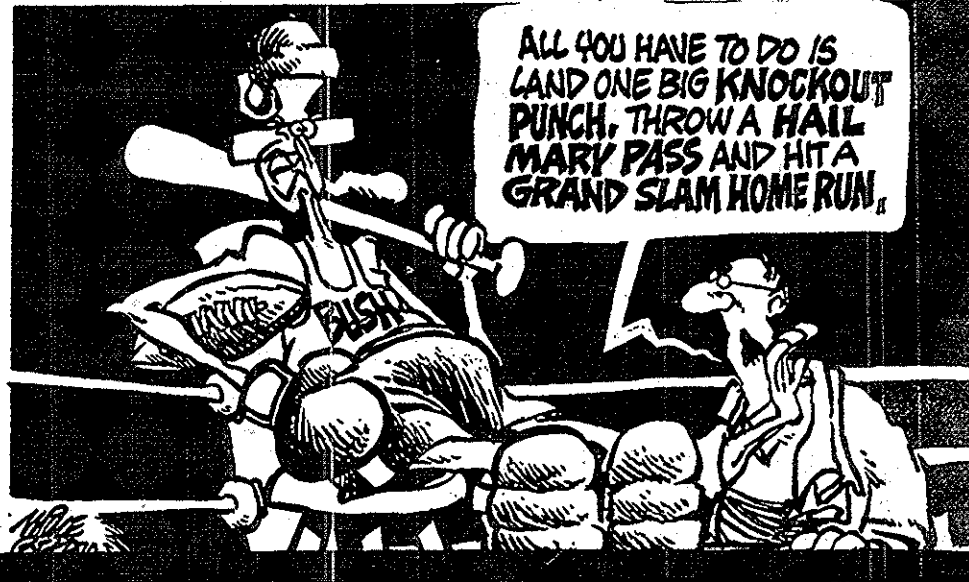
5. Set up a White House garage sale then auction off oil portraits of past presidents to the Vatican.

Dear Editor,

I'm not a vulture, but I have a couple of bones to pick with this University and its Department of Scholarships and Financial Aid. This is, unfortunately, my second full year back at YSU after a 17-year hiatus from education. I am attending through the grace of grants from Pell and PHEAA.

Bone one: I submitted my Student Aid Report to the Financial Aid department in June of this year. It had been in my possession for only two days. Come fall, I received my tuition bill but no vouchers to pay the bill with. Upon investigation, it seems that the office had no record of my SAR and I would have to get another. But in order to pay my bill, I would have to take out an "emergency loan." Bye-bye \$21 for something that wasn't my fault and isn't a loan but simply a forbearance on the University's part.

"I know," she said. "I wish I could explain that to my kids."

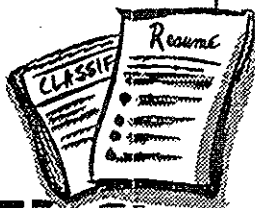
"They won't understand for another 20 years," I said.

Previous participants of The National Association of Black Journalists summer internship program are ineligible to apply. Nov. 1 is the deadline for applications. Tailgating makes a comeback

If you enjoy football and soaking in the fall weather with your friends, then come party with the Penguins at a YSU tailgate party. The parties are open to all YSU students to celebrate both the season and the YSU championship football team, and are held before all home football games.

"The parties are open to everyone," emphasizes Bill Burley, president of Student Government, which sponsors the event. "All you need is your YSU I.D. to participate," he said. Students can bring their own refreshments and games, such as volleyball and bocce. Music is broadcast by CD106.

This year the tailgate parties have been expanded to include a special student lot, explains Dan O'Connell, director of marketing, intercollegiate athletics. The lot is located in the grass field behind Beeghly between the stadium and the tennis courts. Students can enter the area through the F-6 parking lot behind Feder Hall and admission into this lot is free, he says.

The reason for expanding the tailgating area, said Burley was "To open it up and get more people to the game." Burley said that the additional lot allows students without cars to tailgate and the opportunity to participate in the tailgate parties, which are officially called "Party with the Penguins." He continued: "We wanted to have an area especially for students."

So far, the parties, which start several hours before every home game, have been "very successful," said Burley. "Last week it was jam packed. We got a lot of excitement generated for the game," he added.

O'Connell said that the excitement is felt by the football team. "It's a lot more fun for the players knowing that several hundred people are out there" at the parties, he said. O'Connell said that the addition of the student lot has really added to the excitement of the pre-game parties. "The cooperation from student government really helped put it together," he said.

In addition to the new student lot, tailgating also occurs in the M-24 lot on Fifth Ave. across the street from DeBartolo Hall. While this lot is open to YSU students, it is also used by alumni and the community in general. In this lot, a fee is charged for parking lot space and passes can be purchased at the athletic ticket office.

O'Connell notes that while alcoholic beverages are permitted, "drinking is not the focus." "It's just a lot of fun," said Burley. "I encourage everyone to participate," he added.

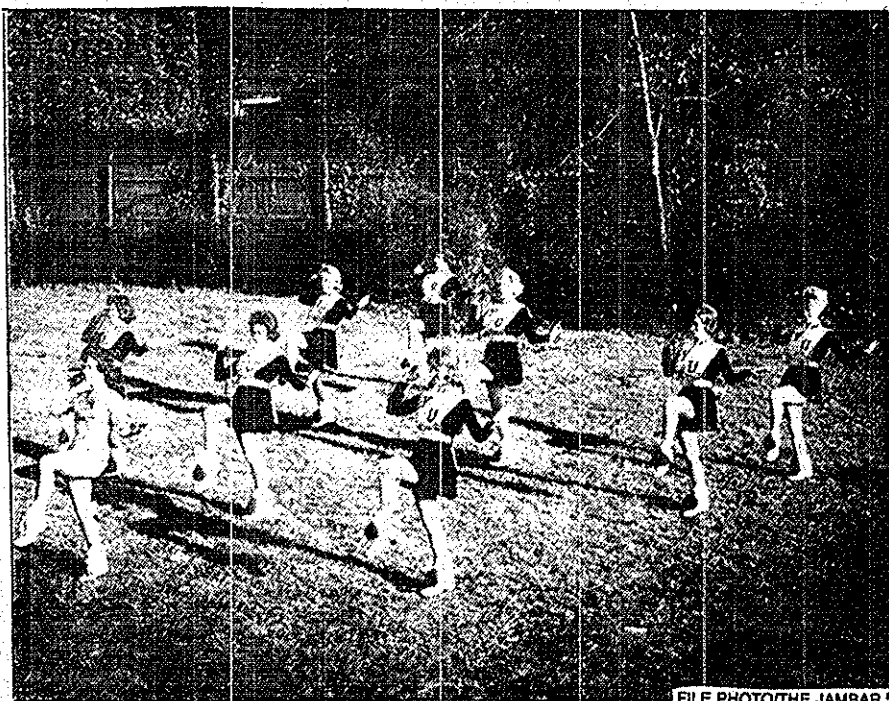

WYSU fundraiser very successful

The on-air fundraiser by WYSU-FM, which was held all last week, proved to be a very successful event for the station. The results surpassed both the amount of telephone calls and the dollar amount goals that were set at the start of the event.

According to WYSU Program Director, Robert Peterson, the

goal was to get 750 calls and raise \$36,000. Early totals suggest amounts in excess of \$37,000; exact totals are still being calculated.

WYSU had to make up 28 percent of its budget that was cut last spring.

"The station was able to make up this deficit by using money from reserves and raising more money," Peterson said.

The funds generated from the drive are among other sources,

including memberships and corporation sponsors, that comprise 30 percent of the station's budget. Another 26 percent comes from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The University supports 38 percent of the station's budget.

The recent fundraiser was the first of two that will be held this year.

Rock legends perform at Park Inn, talk about future plans

If you're a person who loves great guitar playing, then the Park Inn was the place to be last Friday night.

The Artimus Pyle Band, featuring Artimus Pyle of Lynyrd Skynyrd, Allen Woody of the Allman Brothers Band and the legendary Sammy Stafford, started their performance instrumentally then went into "Whole World Upside Down," a song on the band's upcoming CD.

Along with some new tracks, the band did Lynyrd Skynyrd's "Swamp Music," "Call Me The Breeze," "Sweet Home Alabama," "Give Me Three

Steps" and an instrumental version of "Free Bird." They also performed an Allman Brothers song.

"Sweet Home Alabama" is a song written by a friend of mine," Pyle said when introducing the classic tune, "and tonight it's 'Sweet Home Ohio and Pennsylvania.'" He then concluded by saying, "This is for Ronnie up in heaven," and started into the familiar opening.

He dedicated this song to Ronnie Van Zant, the singer of Lynyrd Skynyrd, who died when the band's plane crashed on Oct. 20, 1977. Pyle told me that he really misses Ronnie and the others they lost that day.

Near the end of the show,

Pyle came out from behind his drums, put on his black cowboy hat and mooned the crowd.

Before leaving the stage, Pyle came back to the front again and said, "Thanks for coming out on a Friday night. My name's Artimus." The crowd began to cheer and whistle urging the three back on stage. They returned and played two more songs.

After the show, I asked Woody how he got together with Pyle and he said it happened when he and Pyle were doing a solo. Pyle was with Lynyrd Skynyrd for 17 years. I asked if it felt strange being on stage without the Lynyrd Skynyrd gang.

"Not really. I love playing

with these two (Woody and Stafford)," said Pyle.

Woody and Pyle have surprisingly different views about playing the small club scene. Woody said he prefers larger arenas because it's less nerve-racking in a big place, whereas Pyle said that he preferred playing in smaller clubs like the Park Inn.

"This place is really nice," said Pyle about the Park Inn. "I like it here."

Woody has been with the Allman Brothers Band since 1989 and said that they are going back into the recording studio in January.

Woody also said that before the Allman Brothers he played with Peter Criss, formerly of

Kiss, and he didn't have to wear make-up.

Pyle said that Lynyrd Skynyrd is also going back in the recording studio soon.

"This CD will be more of a blues classic sound," said Pyle. "We want to take our time and make every song special."

A movie about Lynyrd Skynyrd is in the making. The screenplay will be based on Pyle's book *Best Seat In The House*. The movie starts out with the plane crash and then flashes back to the band's history.

I really enjoyed talking with Pyle and Woody. What people say about Southern hospitality is definitely true.

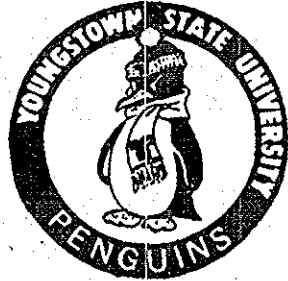
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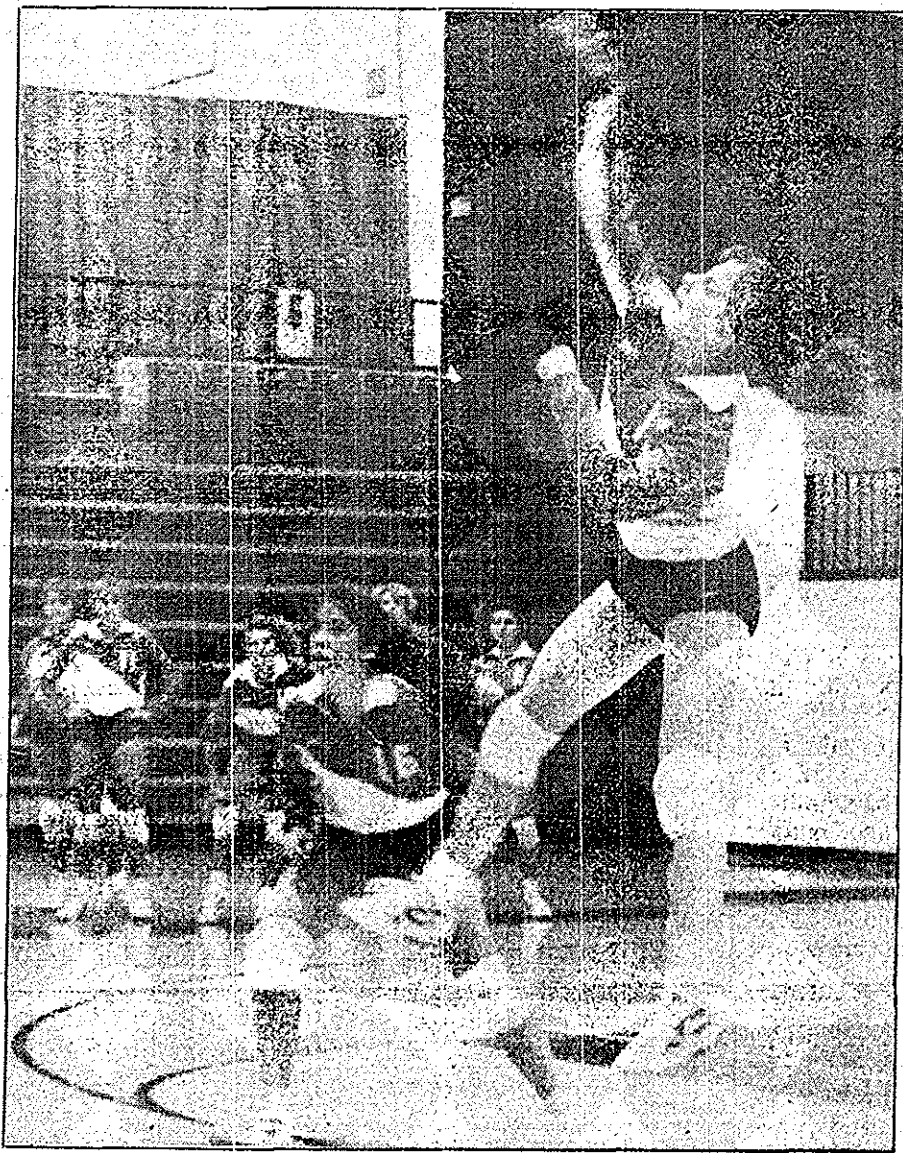

Lady Penguins still seek first MCC win

It was a long, long weekend for YSU sports. The football team and men's and women's cross country both had the weekend off, so it was up to YSU's volleyball team to provide the spark going into Homecoming week.

Unfortunately for the Lady Penguins, it turned out to be a bad weekend as they dropped two matches in two days on the road.

The first loss occurred in Dayton as YSU tried to gain its first volleyball win in the Mid-Continent Conference (MCC), at the hands of Wright State. The final score was 15-8, 15-12, 15-9. Wright State now moves its record to 9-13, and 4-7 in the MCC.

Despite the loss, YSU had some fine individual performances. Freshman Jill Raslevich, one of the leaders in digs in the MCC, turned in 19 of the team's 43 digs, while junior Jen Windau pitched in with eight digs. Junior Stephanie Bulicz wound up killing 43 percent of her attacks.

On Saturday, YSU traveled to Charleston, Illinois to face another MCC rival in Eastern Illinois. Again, the Lady Penguins fell in straight sets, 15-10, 15-4, 15-1. With the win, EIU solidifies itself at the top of the MCC with a 10-2 conference record. The Lady Panthers are 13-9 overall.

Again, Raslevich led the way for YSU with 18 digs and five kills. Sophomore Tina Gregory added 10 digs and 19 assists while freshman Cindy Neubauer led the team with eight kills.

Overall, the Lady Panthers dominated every phase of the game, including kills (45-31) and digs (59-57).

YSU, with its two losses over the weekend, has now dropped its last three matches to make its record 5-10. The Lady Penguins have yet to win a conference game

Finally, the rumors have been answered as Legend's Sports Club opened its doors at 1 p.m. last Monday afternoon.

Those involved with the bar hope that Legend's will be a pleasant alternative to the dance-oriented bars most commonly patronized by University students.

The bar has been divided into two separate rooms. The first room contains the bar itself, with its usual stools and booths. But this room also contains video games, pool tables, a Mini-hoops basketball game, a foosball table and a miniature golf hole. The walls in the first room are decorated with sports photos and memorabilia.

The bar also contains a large-screen television and six smaller sets scattered throughout. As expected, an array of sporting

events will be shown on these TVs, featuring Cleveland and Pittsburgh pro teams as well as YSU's various sports and ABC's *Monday Night Football*.

The second room of the facility contains more pool tables and the dance floor.

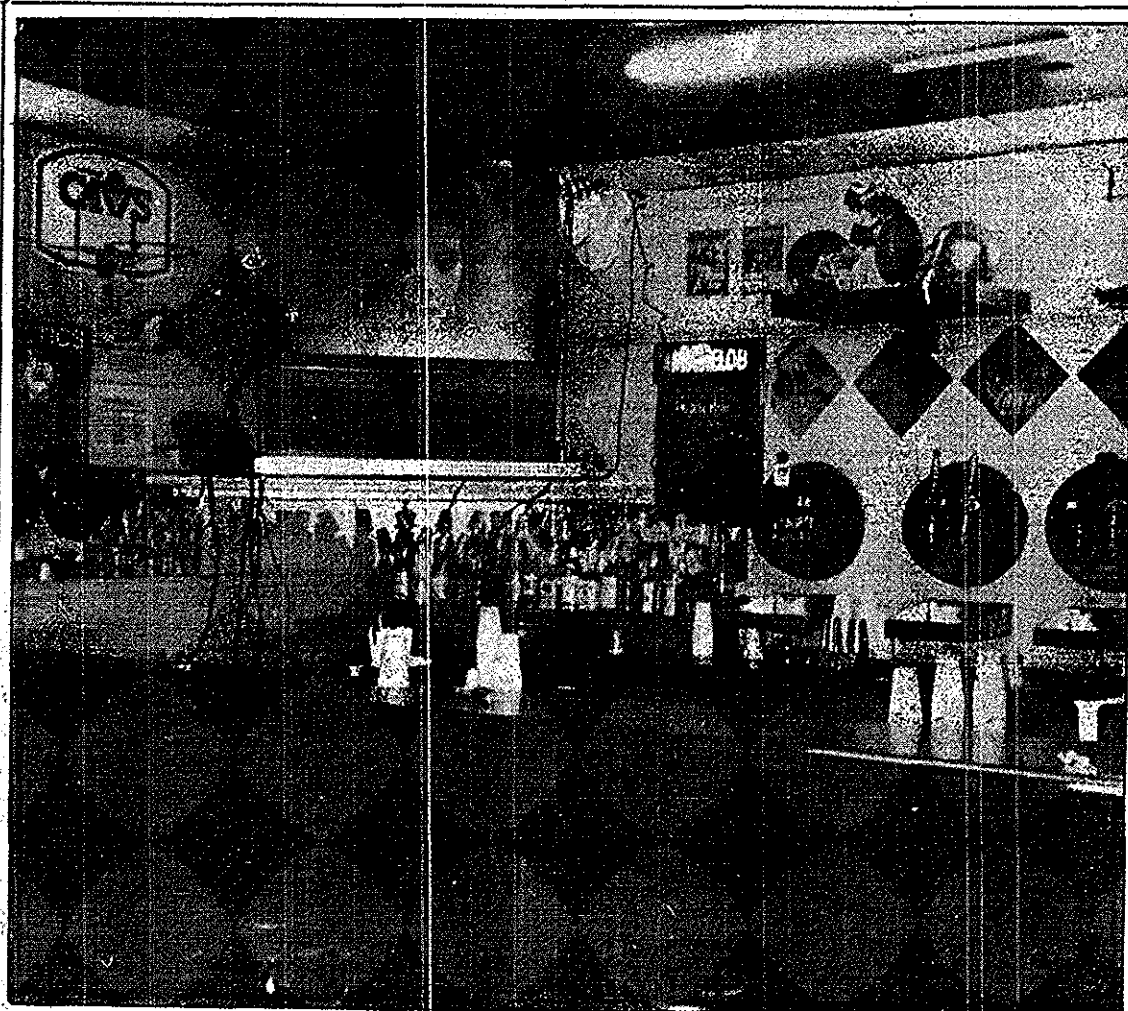
Plans for special sporting events are already in the works, and announcements will be made on those events.

In the hopes of drawing in YSU students, Legend's will be open to all YSU students who present a current I.D. The bar also hopes to be an active member of the YSU community.

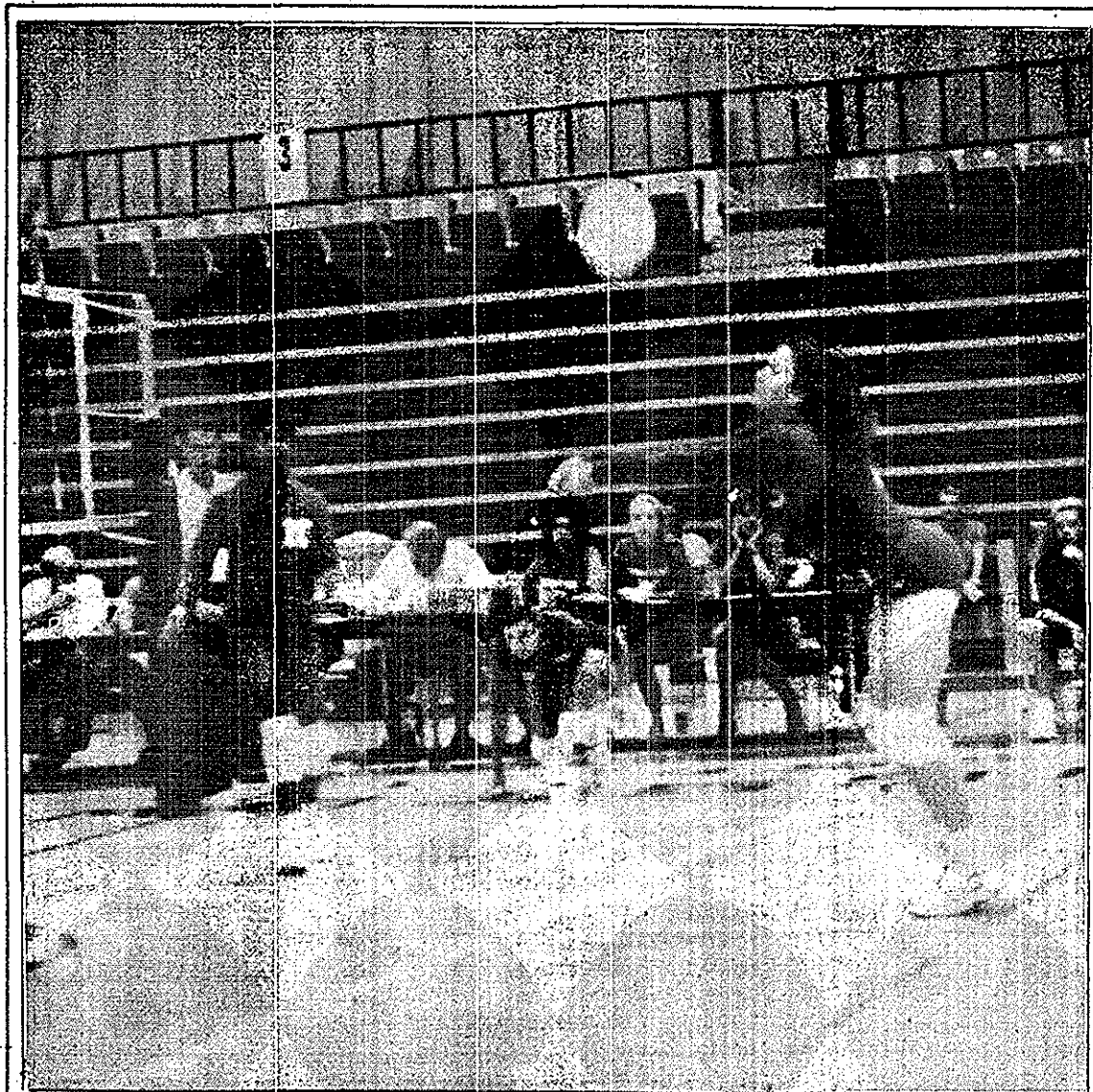
A variety of food will also be served, including New York-style pizza, hot and cold subs, calzones and salads. All are reasonably priced.

Then, just this past Friday, a similar situation happened to a friend of mine who does area high school football games. But instead of getting the personal greeting that I got, he got a scathing two-page letter that hammered at every little thing my friend said during a certain broadcast. He, too, has been hurt by that.

You may ask, "So what do I care if you guys get blasted? You do deserve it." Maybe that is true in some cases, but there's something else that lies beneath these critiques.

The main reason I wanted to enter this profession is because I consider sports to be fun. It's fun for me to watch, to analyze and to predict the events as they happen. Plus, sports can become a creative outlet for people in the media, much like entertainment.

However, there are those people within the sports community as well as those who follow sports who take themselves and sports a little too seriously.

Now, I'm not talking about the loyal fans who don their team's colors and act like idiots. Those are the ones who love the games but realize that it's just that — a game.

A native of Farrell, Pa., Jackson attended the University of Cincinnati and later Central Florida, earning All-State honors

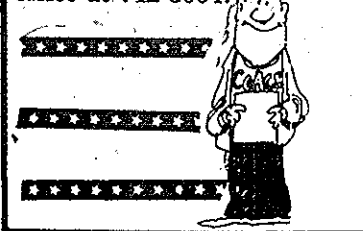
from each school. She was also a member of the Olympic volleyball team in 1979 and 1980.

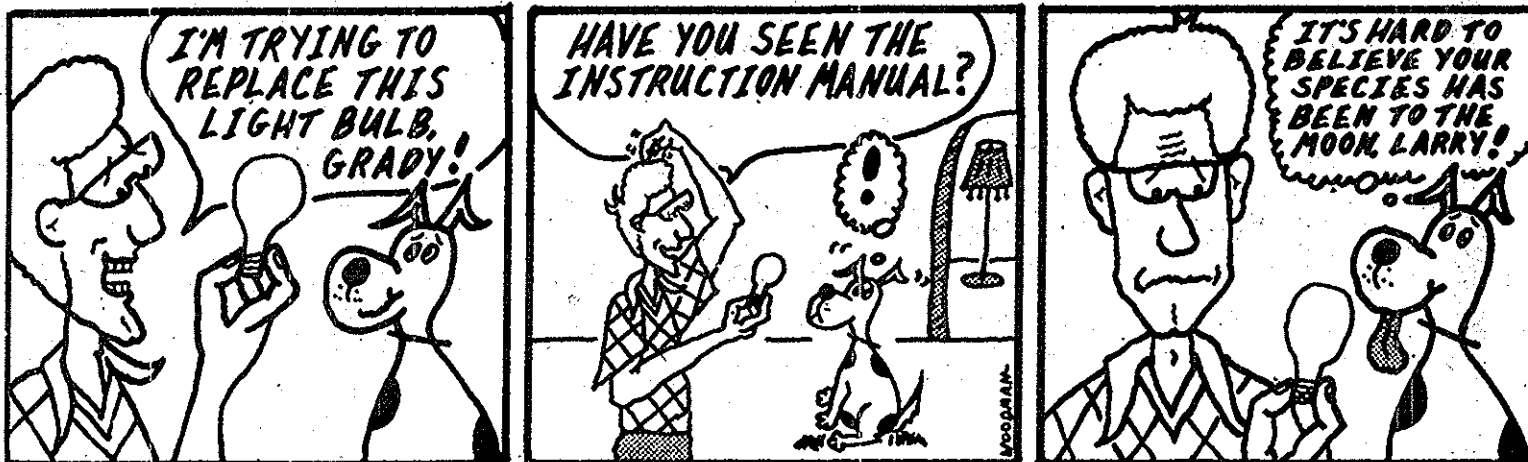
