

#### Is Originality Gone?

It has often been said that during a students four years in college he develops a great sense of creativeness. This can turn into a very debatable question. If they do develop creativeness where is it to be found?

The editor of the Colorado State University student newspaper recently printed a editorial which was written by a reader who is worried about the lack of ingenuity and originality on his campus. If you notice at every basketball game or football game you hear the same old "Two bits, four bits, --- stand up and holler" cheer,

or the same old per songs. This lack of ingenuity and originality exists all over our campus. The argument that it is also found on other campuses does not solve the problem, but instead makes it an even more serious one.

In Hungary students created an unknown freedom that lasted for only five days. In our country we are given that same freedom at birth and don't ever care enough about it to protect it. We trade out freedom of free enterprize for government subsidies. For the right to feather our own nest, we beg for Social Security. These freedoms were created for us by men who risked their necks to sign the Declaration of Independence,

Where is this lack of creativeness and originality going to lead us? Will it lead us to a bright future where everyone is truly satisfied because no one has the desire or freedom to think originally? A civilization in which traditions will never be upset? Will it instead lead us to degradation and downfall of our civilization that will result in another middle ages?

These are problems that students on this campus apparently don't know exist. They are questions we should all be considering.



### Study In Italy **Available To Grads**

The Italian Government and four Italian academic institutions will offer fellowships to American graduate students for the 1957-58 academic year. Closing date for the Italian competitions is April 1, 1957.

Six fellowships for advanced study or research are offered by the Italian Government through the Cultural Relations Office of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Men and women candidates may apply in any field. The minimum period of study is six months, but a grantee may extend the duration of study if he has sufficient funds.

Each grant includes a stipend of 600,000 lire. Free tuition is given by the host institution. Candidates in the field of music will be given an extra 50,000 lire for private lessons.

A grant of 10,000 lire will also be provided for travel in Italy. Grantees should have funds to pay their own trans-Atlantic travel and incidental expenses. They may, if eligible, apply for Fulbright travel grants.

The University of Padua will offer two tuition and maintenance fellowships. The competition is open to both men and women under 35 years of

The Collegio Ghislieri and the Colegio Borromeo, residential colleges in Pavia, are offering one tuition and maintenance fellowship each to a male graduate student under thirty years

In addition to the courses in letters and science offered at the Collegios, students may attend lectures in the various departments at the University of Pavia. Tuition is free.

The Scuola Normale in Pisa offers one tuition and maintenance award for study at the University of Pisa. Candidates must be men under thirty, preferably those planning to teach.

Eligibility requirements for the Italian awards are: U.S. citizenship; demonstrated academic ability and capacity for independent study; some knowledge of the Italian language: good moral character, personality and adaptability; and good health.

Candidates for the Italian Government awards must have a master's degree or its equivalent in advanced work, such as recognition as an artist, scholar, or a scientist. They must present a project, outlined in detail, for advanced study or research.

Candidates for the Italian university awards must have a bachelor's degree at the time the award is taken

Applications may be secured from the Institute of International Education in New York City or its regional offices in Chicago, Denver, Houston, San Francisco or Washington,

Our purpose is to create interest in the football and basketball games. It has been especially gratifying this past season to see the active participation on the part of the students.


For one thing, we had exceptionally good teams; and as students, we backed them.

A program for American union members to study labor problems in Great Britain has been announced by the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York City, and the Transatlantic Foundation in

Closing date for application is April 1, 1957.


Four full scholarships for the coming academic year (October 1957 -June 1958) are available; three at Ruskin College of Oxford University and one at Coleg Harlech in Wales.

The awards cover maintenance, tuition and incidentals at Ruskin College; maintenance and tuition at Harlech. Recipients must provide their own transportation and approximately \$400 for miscellaneous

### To Activate Members

The awards are offered to active union members by the Committee on Labor Scholarships in the United Kingdom through the Transatlantic Foundation. The program is administered by the Institute of International Education.

Unmarried candidates between 20 and 35 years of age are preferred. They should be actively participating in some phase of the labor movement and be able to carry on college-level

### Offer Study In Scandinavia

Fellowships for study in Denmark and Sweden have been offered to American graduate students for the 1957-58 academic year by the two Scandinavian governments.

Closing date for both competitions s April 1, 1957.

Three fellowships have been offered by the Danish Government through the Ministry of Education. These include funds (3990 kroner) for a year of study at an institution of higher education and a short orientation course.

Grantees should have funds to pay their own travel and incidental expenses. They may, if eligible, apply for Fulbright Travel Grants.



Although he was held to his five game tourney low mark in scoring by the Penguins tight defense, Spivey's teammates were hot as ever at the charity stripe, where they made up their lack of field goals.

The Penguins were down eight notches at the half, but, all fired up, came storming back to knot the count in five minutes, 33-33. It was a rough second half, the Oklahomans gaining a six-point advantage, 53-47, when Lake fouled out with almost six minutes remaining.

### Back In Contention

Atterholt and Yugovich brought the Penguins back into contention, 54-51 and the Ohioans just missed knotting the count several times in the last few minutes, but Oklahoma staved off the threat to eke out a 69-65 victory, and the next evening gained a berth in the finals.

In the scoring column, Spivey's 31 tallies paced the Oklahomans, and Lake had 18 markers for Penguin honors. Rosselli's cagers thus lost their first game in 14 consecutive starts but still finished the school's most terrific basketball season ever with a 23-4 record against some of the nation's finest quintets.
