# Test shows Beeghly mold not airborne

Tests for airborne black mold at Beeghly Center have come up negative, but university officials said there is no rush to resume classes there.

Officials announced the results in a news release Tuesday. Classes have been closed at Beeghly Center since Sept. 13, when it was revealed

YSU took 58 samples from classrooms Sept. 13 and compared them to samples taken during the original Aug. 29

"The purpose of the Sept. 13 test was to determine if this mold was airborne in these rooms and whether or not the

The results from the test showed the black mold had not reached outside the contaminated drywall and ceiling tiles in rooms 104b, 106, 206 and the hallway outside room 106.

Len Perry, director of the problem existed throughout Office of Environmental and

Safety, said he was satisfied for the rest of the semester. with the results.

"Based on this data I feel there is no significant mold related to indoor air quality problem beyond the localized contamination in the rooms tested on Aug. 29," Perry said.

Although YSU officials said the black mold was contained, students who were relocated to other classrooms

Perry said the university would use this time to pull out the infected drywall and ceiling tiles.

"There is not any push to get the students back into the classrooms," John Hyden, director of Facilities, said. "The students have already been relocated."

Perry said YSU would be

"We will pull the drywall down and use a HEPA (High Efficiency Particulate Air) vacuum and barricade the area," he said.

Perry said it would be important to barricade classrooms to keep the black mold from going airborne. He said

# Faculty support surprises governor

A spokesman for Gov. Bob Taft said he was surprised Wednesday to learn the YSU faculty union had endorsed Taft's opponent for the November election.

Orest Holubec, press secretary for Taft, said the YSU-Ohio Education Association's decision to endorse Tim Hagan for governor contradicts an earlier statement by the state OEA.

"About two months ago, they said they weren't endorsing neither Hagan nor Taft," Holubec said. "The most important thing is the votes on

Nov. 5." Hagan, a Youngstown native, was at YSU on Tuesday to accept the YSU-OEA endorsement. John Russo, union president, said the support was a result of evaluating Hagan's plan and looking at what Taft has done while in

"Since the early 1990s, there has been a systematic decrease in higher education funding. Money was taken from higher education and put into prisons," Russo said.

He also said the burden of paying for college was pushed to the students. The current Republican administration doesn't support higher education, Russo said.

"[Taft] has decimated higher education," he said.

Hagan spokesman Austin Jenkins said Hagan was pleased to receive the endorse-

"It says a lot when the faculty of a major state university endorses Tim Hagan for governor," Jenkins said.

Holubec said the YSU-OEA endorsement would not affect Taft's campaign in the Youngstown area.

"The governor will be in the Mahoning Valley several more times before the elec-

# Officials address teacher's conviction

University officials said they have taken action involving a YSU professor convicted last

Thomas Maraffa, special

assistant to the president and director of faculty relations, said a meeting was held Oct. 3 to address the legal problems of Gary Fry, who has taught anthropology at YSU since 1970.

"My option is to respect his privacy," Maraffa said, when asked to explain the outcome of the meeting. "I guess you're entitled to information, but personally, I'm not going to tell you."

Maraffa said the action taken was in the best interest of everyone involved, including the students.

"No action was taken that would affect [Fry's] job status," Maraffa said

Fry was found guilty Sept. 25 after pleading no contest to charges of unauthorized use of a vehicle and using a weapon while intoxicated.

Fry, as he has since his arrests, declined to talk a Jambar reporter Tuesday.

John White, chair of Anthropology and Sociology, said he was in a delicate situation as head of the depart-

"I don't want to talk about anything I don't have the right to talk about," White said.

Fry's past and current students expressed mixed emotions on the professor's trou-

Junior Pamela Zembower was enrolled in Fry's Cultures of the Old World course this semester. She said she dropped last week for reasons

unrelated to his arrests. Zembower said the professor has received what he deserves and what he does reflects on YSU.



# YSU sets partnership with community group

A partnership between YSU and community leaders will bring rap stars and actors to campus for a celebrity basketball game.

KEYS (Keep Educating Youth All Seasons) 4.0 is a citywide youth development program that aims to promote straight "A's" for all Youngstown middle school students. The Community Partners for a Violence Free Youngstown group will help promote the event.

In a news conference Monday morning, Bob Faulkner of the Youngstown-Warren Regional Chamber announced the partnership, which has taken in \$82,000 through donations.

"The endorsement of the university really makes this a strong empowerment opportunity for the youth of Youngstown," said Faulkner, who also is a member of the Warren City Schools Board of Education.

Walt Ulbricht, executive director of Marketing and Communications, attended the news conference, which was held in the Jones Room at Kilcawley Center. Ulbricht said the program is a positive step for YSU but added that many other local organizations and sponsors are involved.

"We came into this at the latter stages," he

The program, which has roots in Chicago and has also been used in Los Angeles, Pittsburgh and Savannah, Ga., uses professional entertainers to encourage middle-school students to achieve a grade point average of 2.5 or higher. Eventually, Faulkner said, the goal is for students to have a perfect 4.0.

Faulkner joked that he could join rappers Coolio and Chris "Play" Martin in song at the celebrity basketball game, scheduled for

### Penguin Football Heacock says game is critical

If the first five games are any indication, the fate of this year's YSU football team may ultimately come down to how well they fair in the turnover department in their final six regular season games.

In the Penguins' first three contests, they committed a total of eight turnovers while forcing only two. The team had a turnover margin of negative-six and their record stood at

1-2. the past two against Missouri Southwest State and Indiana State, the Penguins forced 10 turnovers and only turned the ball over twice. They compiled a plus-eight turnover margin over that span and more importantly a 2-0

record. Head coach Jon Heacock said he believes that winning the turnover margin is the most important factor for his football team to continue their suc-

"Every decision we make is based on not turning the football over," Heacock said at his Tuesday press conference. "If that means running the football and passing for 15 yards then we will do that."

# SG voice missing from raise debate

Student Government has shown some signs of life in the weeks since it received several challenges from The Jambar.

The Web site, which last month offered little information about SG and its representatives, now features updated information and contacts for the student leaders.

The Web site also includes the minutes of previous SG meetings and announcements about upcoming events. At a glance, it appears SG is taking all the right steps to reconnect with the stu-

Aside from the Web site, SG also has proposed the intriguing idea of student forums. While we are a bit skeptical of the student participation in these forums, we think they could provide a great deal of insight for students.

And, at Monday's SG meeting, representatives tackled the subject of domestic partners, a hot topic on campus since faculty contract negotiations over the summer. We applaud SG for addressing such a timely topic.

We hope representatives send a sharp message of maturity to the university trustees who had such a "moral" problem with domestic partner benefits.

SG President Jeff Parks also is a nonvoting member of the Board of Trustees. Having his support in an effort to convince Sweet and administrators of their illogical ways would be huge.

Tony Spano, an SG Cabinet member and director of Student Programming, also has shown the energy to get things done on

We hope to hear more from these leaders in the next few days. We hope they can help the students help themselves.

If you are a woman between the ages of 20 to 39, make sure you perform a monthly breast self-exam and have a clinical breast examination by your health care professional every three years.

Being a woman is the greatest risk factor for breast cancer. Yes, increasing in age and family history are other risk factors. But, breast cancer can and does touch women of all races and ages.

I am lucky and fortunate to be a breast cancer survivor. Many women refuse to take a proactive role against breast cancer and ignore the situation completely.

By the end of this year, about 203,500 women throughout the United States are expected to be diagnosed with breast cancer. Also, by the end of 2002, about 39,600 women in this country will die from this

Numbers can be confusing, and many women think they won't ever become a statistic. Unfortunately, I wish that was true, but it's not.

Remember: Early detection can save your life or the life of someone you love.


