End Parking Woes

THE JAMBAR has no set news policy as such, but we have and always will make it our policy to crusade to improve the parking problem at Youngstown.

This problem is not limited to our campus; on the contrary, the same difficulty is also encountered at the University of Akron, the University of Cincinnati, Western Reserve and many other schools of the commuter type.

Yet, these schools have taken measures to eliminate parking confusion.

For example, one university acquired real estate near the school plant on which to build parking lots. Students are charged ten dollars per semester, but they are guaranteed a parking space when arriving maintain and it at school. This abolishes missing eight o'clock classes, double parking and tickets for parking overtime.

This solution would work at Y.U. but nothing is being done to start a program to purchase and develop such parking lots.

Another solution that might be employed to alleviate the parking problem would be to restrict driving to school to juniors, seniors and night school students. This would undoubtedly meet with vigorous student opposition. Their opposition would be justifiable, but it is a solution.

What is our administration doing to solve this problem? It is quite obvious they are not doing a thing.

What does the administration plan to do in five orten years from now, when the college enrollment is at its peak? With this high enrollment will come more students driving to school, increasing the seriousness of the problem.

We hope the administration will show some foresight in solving the parking problem at Y.U.



The Institute of International Education has announced 900 Fulbright scholarships for graduate study or pre-doctoral research will be


Also, scholarships for study in Latin America under the Inter-American Cultural Convention are being offered.



The final outcome may have been somewhat deceptive but any baseball team that pushes 13 runners around all four bases in six times at bat deserves a great deal of praise, and that is exactly what the Kent State baseball team, rated one of the finest in that schools history, did against the Youngstown University Penguins in their recent clash.

Kent tallied five runs in the opening frame with the aid of four hits, all solid, but nine of these hits would have been on the books if it hadn't been for two misplays prior to their origin. With the wind playing havoc with the high flies, even the best of the major leaguers would have indeed had a difficult time.

The Flash's triumph was their eighth in succession after losing three, twice to Ohio State, at the season's outset.

Youngstown's potent offense, following a four day layoff after whipping St. Vincent's, 15-9, failed to conceive any back to back slugging attacks. That was the entire story: Kent's attack attacked, Youngstown's held back.

More serious than the defeat itself was the possible loss of Tom Razum, The Penguins big stick, for the rest of the season. The heavy hitting left field ace re-injured his right ankle making an effort to beat out an infield grounder in the first inning. He was able to walk but couldn't put any pressure on the injured ankle.

Golf is having one of its finest hours at Youngstown University. The Penguins have fine men who consistently fire in the mid 70's.

Dick Schwartz, Ohio Amateur Champion, is the number one man on the team. Schwartz came in with a 78 against Akron followed by a 74 in the 19-1 rout of Alliance.

John Barto and Ed Antonelli, from last year's team, and John "Jabby" Barber make for a fearsome foursome. Add any two picking from Mike Mijic, Fred Quinn, Mike Antonelli or Mickey Pasco and the six man first team is complete. Barto, the Antonelli brothers, and Mijic all come to Youngstown via Warren G. Harding, which has a fine record for producing outstanding high school golf teams.

Further in the golf line, the N.A.I.A. meet at Ashland has been set for May 19 while the national meet will be staged June 17, 18 and 19 at Quincy, Illinois.

Also the N.A.I.A. state baseball playoff will be held in Youngstown at a date to be set later.


