This year, as in those gone by, children are sitting on the laps of would-be Saint Nicks telling them their Christmas wishes in hushed tones. With all of these well meaning Kris Kringles scattered about, many of the younger set begin to wonder if there really is such a gentleman as Santa.

Now, this problem is not a new one. Ever since Santa departed on his first sleigh ride there have been children asking the question, "Is there really a Santa Claus?"

One notable example occured in 1897 when Francis Church, an editorial writer for the New York Sun received a letter from a little lassie, Virginia, who was confused as to whether Saint Nick was a reality. The little tot's epistle went like this: "Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says if you see it in the Sun it's so. Please tell me the truth -- is there a Santa Claus?"

Church was touched by Virginia's sincere and humble query and in order to dispel her doubts he wrote her a reply in the form of an editorial, printing it in the Sun.

More than 60 years have passed since Virginia's classic letter and today children find themselves still asking the age old question, "Is Santa Claus real?" In the following paragraphs --- so the skeptics of this generation too may enjoy a clearer interpretation of Kris Kringle --- is Church's immortal editorial, "Yes, Virginia,

there is a Santa Claus." Virginia: Your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible to their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, 🖁 an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy.

Alas, how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no Viviginias. There would be no child-like faith then, no Viviginias. poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existance. The term of the period to the per extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus? You might as well not believe in fairies. You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even then if they did not see Santa Claus coming down what would that prove? Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders \ there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

You may tear apart a baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest of all the strongest men that ever lived could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real?



## NEWLAND

### ON INTERNATIONAL COURT



The International Court of Justice acts as the principal judicial organ of the United Nations.

#### Purpose

Jurisdiction of the Court includes all cases which U.N. members submit to it and matters especially provided for inthe charter or in treaties. The Court also gives advisory opinions and renders judgements on pertinent issues.

The Court's decisions, which are final, are only binding between the parties concerned and only in respect of a particular dispute. If one of the parties involved in the dispute fails to abide by the decision of the Court the matter is turned over to the Security

#### Judges

The Court consists of 15 members elected for nine year terms by the General Assembly and the Security Council. There can not be more than one judge from each member state.

#### Origin

The concept of entrusting the settlement of international disputes to an impartial authority is an old one. Ancient Greece gives us examples of this, but the modern development of international arbitration dates from the Jay Treaty of 1794 during a dispute between Great Britain and the United States. The Jay Treaty provided for the establishment of mixed commissions for the settlement of the disputes between the two countries.

#### The Permanent Court of Arbitration

Further Progress was made in the development of the judicial settlement of international disputes with the formation of the First Hague Conference in 1899.

The Permanent Court of Arbitration, which was maintained by the Second Hague Conference of 1907, is still in existence today and from 1899 to the present time it has decided about twenty cases.

The basic difficulty with this judicial body is the fact that two states, when parties to a dispute, must indicate a sincere desire to arrive at a settlement. Also, they must decide upon the arbitrators to be appointed and the formulation of the questions to be submitted to them. It is obvious this form of negotiation would prove to be long and difficult.

#### The International Court of Justice

Our contemporary Court actually evolved from the Permanent Court of International Court of Justice which was formed in 1920 under the jurisdiction of the League of Nations. This Court was dissolved in 1946 along with the League of Nations.

In 1945 the International Court of Justice was born under the Charter of the United Nations.

Except for a few minor changes this Court is identical with its predecessor. To further the smooth operation of the work accomplished by the Permanent Court of International Justice all of its work has been entrusted to the present day International Court of Justice.

#### The Court

The Court is located at The Hague, the Netherlands. A special agreement concluded between the United Nations and the Carnegie. Foundation governs the terms on which the Court meets at the Peace Palace. The official languages of the Court are French and English.







Holding down the first place position for the individual game scoring is Jim Assion of the Y.U. Strikers with his 279 game.


Second place honors go to Russ Ricker who rolled a 245 game for the R.O.T.C. combo.


In the third place s lot is Ed "Punchy" Bodnar who rolled a 244 game for the Sigma Tau Gamma aggregation.







# Mistletoe

Ancient Druid priests were among the first to expound its "virtues." They especially sought mistletoe on oak trees. When found -- on the "sixth night of the moon" -- they'd cut it with a golden scythe and catch it in their flowing robes.

Two white bulls were sacrificed on the spot while prayers were offered the gods in appreciation of their "gift".

The famous Golden Bough which legendary AEneas plucked to insure safe conduct on his perilous journey to the nether-world-was mistletoe. And ancient Greek marriage rites which used mistletoe -- are said to be the fore-runners of today's usage as a "kissing plant."

While most Americans favor that interpretation, there are others who cling to Old World customs. Folks in Louisiana Bayou country see it as a power to "ward off conjurers." Tiny figurines of mistletoe berries are hung above their fireplaces for protection.

Elsewhere in the South, legend has it that a decoction of mistletoe will dry up mother's milk.

But for stranger legends, we have to globe-hop. Tyrolean treasure-seekers think they've reached their goal wherever mistletoe is found growing on hazel.

In Cambodia, a mistletoe brew renders a person "invulnerable to mortal harm." And Welsh farmers consider it lucky to present a bunch of mistletoe to the first cow that calves in the New Year.

There are Celts and Scandinavians who still pluck it ceremoniously on Midsummer Eve -- a vestige of the old Druid rite!

This simple plant has produced all sorts of expectations; relieved sundry anxieties. Some come by it through field excursions; others purchase it in stores. Just as the varied superstitions and meanings of mistletoe have been changed by some peoples and expanded by others through the centuries, today's distribution of the plant has a similar international falvor.

'The world's largest producer --Orchids of Hawaii, Inc. in New York has mistletoe picked, packaged and distributed from sprigs that grow in Texas. Bear in mind that the "kissing custom" originated in Europe and you can trace a merry route to your neighborhood store.

There you see the finished product -- provocative packets labeled "Kiss and Tell" and "Kissing License." It's a modern, mechanized addition to the many strange and awesome directions legendary mistletoe has taken through the ages.






