

town University. The Ohio attorney-general has approved the allocation of the money to YU as proper within the intent of the bill. The University took special steps last year to satisfy the statute's definition as a public university. City mayor Anthony B. Flask and County Commissioner John Palermo were named as ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees to solve a major problem.

The bill allows the Ohio Board of Regents to accept land, construct buildings and lease them to public colleges and universities. The measure which now goes to the Senate, would permit the state to help with the expansion of nonprofit educational institutions.

YU has been allocated \$5,000,000 from a state bond issue approved by voters in 1963. It has been promised another \$5,000,000 from a bond issue the Rhoades administration hopes to submit to Ohio

### **Actions Speak**

Student Council elections were held last week in Strouss Auditorium. Candidates campaigned vigorously for the duration but less than one-fifth of the eligible students decided experience should prove to be of benefit to the new Council, to make use of their right to vote. But, none the less, twelve Council members were elected and will now attempt to represent the student body and pass legislation affecting them.

This is not a new situation and this editorial is not written to discuss this problem. What the Jambar is concerned a majority of what they promised. The following are the Council member. promises of the newly elected candidates.

In representative-at-large, Paul Gregory and Vic Rubenstein were elected. Both worked closely together in their campaigns and it seems that this will continue. Both seem to be sincere in their promises. Rubenstein dwelled extensively on the worn-out cry of apathy and Greek-Independent cooperation. Like most candidates, he favors more open elections. But, unlike most candidates, he intends to enforce this. Let's hope that he succeeds. Gregory intends to reduce parking congestion; this is like reducing the national debt and the odds are against him. What he can do, however, is to work for the realization of the long proposed University TV show. He promises to do this and we think he will succeed.

In education Mary Jane Cunningham and Martha Galacia were elected. Miss Galacia promises to represent the school to the best of her ability. To us, this doesn't mean much, but judging from past performance in her sorority, she may make a good Council member. A point of her program is that of increasing athletic spirit by fostering a closer relationship between students and the athletic teams. This is a large order. Miss Cunningham believes that Council should represent the whole student body and not single groups. If this is followed through it will be a rather revolutionary idea on Council. The major point of her platform is that of increasing school spirit, possibly beginning in the freshman year, by "teaching school songs and cheers and stressing enthusiasm." Miss Cunningham has a point here, but perhaps better means than "songs and cheers" can be employed to increase school spirit.

In Liberal Arts, Ruth Yozwiak, Maggie McKissick, and Joe Tomocik were elected. Miss Yozwiak, who served as Council Secretary and helped to organize Spring Weekend, is probably the most qualified of all candidates elected. She has shown her ability before and she will continue to do so. Miss Yozwiak expresses her opinions openly and represents the best interests of the University and the student body.

Miss McKissick said that she wants better Greek-Independent relations on campus. This subject is like the weather; all Council candidates talk about it but few do anything about it. In fact, we wonder if this is a real issue at all. Miss Mc-Kissick also proposes to revise the activity point system at the University. This, too, is a subject that is only talked about. However, Miss McKissick seems sincere enough that she may take action on her promises.

Joe Tomocik has suggested that Council uses voting machines in its elections. Possibly this would work but the excess cost would make the venture unprofitable. Tomocik also presents the work-worn cry of "ID cards with pictures" but possibly he will discard this idea when he is confronted with miles of "red tape" involved in this change.

In the Engineering school, Luis Suarez downed Council Discipline Chairman Wally Matlock. Matlock proved to be a very worthy Council member and Suarez has a "big shoe to fill." It's regrettable that both these students couldn't have been elected. Suarez, however, has demonstrated his leadership qualities very well in the past; he was chairman of the mock Republican convention last year and is president of the active social science club. He is dedicated and what he promises is usually realized.

In the Business race, Don Constantini, Howard Johnson, Gary Ross and Scott Thomas won seats. Constantini appears to be concerned with little more than increasing advertisment of Council functions and "how to announce campus queens." This isn't an impressive platform and we hope his performance proves to be the opposite.

Howard Johnson, current Council Vice President, has generally proved to be an average Council member. He says little on Council but indications are that he may do a great deal behind the scenes. As a vice president, Johnson has performed all that is required of him and a member of his

The University Theater's "Becket" goes into its final weekend with performances at 8:30 p.m. today and Saturday and a special high school matinee at 2 p.m. Saturday.

A cast of 36, detailed costumes and setting by Joe Flauto, and lighting by Ken Carano and Don Recklies combine to make the production an evening of entertain-

The set is a multi-level platform which accommodates over 25 scenes. The cathedral at Canterbury, the palace council room, the dining hall, the courts of France and Rome are all realized simply by the use of spot lighting and several bench arrangements. Various colors are used on the black velvet backdrop to create or emphasize the many moods of the play. More than 30 different lighting setups are required for the

Joe Flauto has been successful in bringing to "Becket" the most glorious costumes ever seen on the University stage. Every costume designed by Flauto is given the utmost attention and care, with great stress on details. He believes in suiting the costumes to the character or mood of the play rather than to the period.

#### Performances Outstanding

Howard Weinstein, a native New Yorker and a newcomer to the University theater, brings to the role of the King: the heat and vivacity that makes his performance memorable.
