Competition with outstanding teams from all over the country

as it has had on football. With such calibre of gridders as the school has possessed during the past few years, we should have
turned out teams with two losses at the most each season. It's turned hard!

## OPERATE DIFFERENTLY

We have been playing rough schools around the country who don't outdo us in manpower. However, with our medieval athletic setup, e cannot possibly hope to beat such teams as North Texas stabe With poor practice facilities available, not only in football but basketball,
