Queen To Be Crowned On Pollock House Lawn

Youngstown University's annual May Day celebration will be held on Friday, May 9. The two major events scheduled for the day are the crowning of the May Queen and the dance, at which Noody Herman's orchestra will play.

At 10 a.m. on Pollock Lawn, President Jones will give the welcoming address. His speech will be followed by a precessional consisting of the Pershing Rifle Honor Guard and a 90 ft. floral chain carried by girls representing all the women's organizations on campus.

The May Queen will be crowned by Student Council President Jim Crowe and attended by I.F.C. officers. The Queen will be chosen by the student body at elections to be held on April 30 and May 1. Vieing for the honor are Dorothy Daley, Fran Doyle, Joan Kristin, Sonia Lyninsky, and Charlotte Van Den Handel.

Queen to be Serenaded

After the Queen is crowned she will be serenaded by the Greek Sing winners accompanied by the Dana School of Music representatives. There will be a May Pole Dance followed by a tea for the Queen, her court, and their families at Pollock

The dance will be held from 9 to 1 at Idora Park Ballroom. Dress is semi-formal and admission will be by activity book. Members of the faculty are cordially invited.

During intermission the May Queen and the chairman of this year's May Day, Ron Pisani and Brian Donnelly, will be introduced. Gifts will be presented to the Queen and her court, and a trophy to the Queen.

The dance will feature the music of Woody Herman and his nationally known dance band.




effective.

using this pre-registration process. The upper-classmen are guaranteed the classes they need to graduate because they have first choice.



Prof. Yozwiak Is Recipient of Science Faculty Fellowship

Prof. Bernard J. Yozwiak, a member of the mathematics faculty of Youngstown University, has been awarded a Science Faculty fellowship by the National Science Foundation for this summer and next. He will work toward his doctor's degree in mathematics

at the University of Pittsburgh.

Science Faculty fellowships are awarded for the purpose of providing individuals with an opportunity for improving their competence as college or university teachers of science, mathematics or engineering. The ability sought through the program is both potential and demonstrated ability in teaching, principally at the undergraduate level.

Selection is based on letters of recommendation, academic records, and other appropriate evidences of professional activity and competence. To be eligible for a fellowship the teacher must have had not less than three years' experience in teaching science as a full-time staff member as instructor or higher rank, teaching undergraduate students mainly, at the collegiate level.

Holds Several Degrees

Prof. Yozwiak received the degrees of Bachelor of Arts from Marietta College in 1940 and Master of Science from the University of Pittsburgh in 1951. He studied at Case Institute of Technology on a General Electric Fellowship in 1947. In addition to teaching mathematics in the College of Arts and Sciences at Youngstown University, he has taught industrial classes in the Technical School of the university.

Prom 1942 to 1944 Prof. Yozwiak was civilian instructor in radio engineering in the U.S. Army Air Forces Radio School at Scott Field, Tomah, Wis. and Truax Field, Madison, Wis. Before entering the service he taught mathematics and science at Fowler High School and upon returning he served as

principal of the high school and teacher of mathematics and science until he joined the Youngstown University faculty.

Prof. Yozwiak is a member of the Society of Sigma Xi, national honorary research society, the Mathematical Association of America and the American Association of University Professors.

Veterans Can Obtain Commission Taking Advanced Courses

The attention of all veterans interested in obtaining a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army Reserve is again invited to a recent ruling published by Department of Army which exempts veterans from the prescribed active duty following receipt of their commissions through participation in the ROTC Program.

Prior to publication of this directive all graduates of the ROTC Program were required to serve either a period of two years active duty or a period of six months active duty for training.

Only Advanced Course Neces-

If otherwise qualified, veterans need only to complete the Advanced Course consisting of two years participation in the ROTC Program in their Junior and Senior years to become eligible for com-

missioning.

Any veteran presently enrolled as a sophomore in The Youngstown University who is interested in obtaining a commission as Lieutenant in the U.S. Army is invited to visit the office of the Professor of Military Science and Tactics, Lieutenant Colonel O.R. Hummel, who will explain this new feature of the ROTC Program. Colonel Hummel's office is located in Pollock House on the third floor.


It would seem that congratulations are also in order for the Theta-Chi bowling team for winning the 57-58 bowling championship.




English Society Establishes Scholarship





Netters Undefeated In Three Matches





DiOrio stated last week, "Coleman is an excellent sprinter, a good high jumper, and his broad jump of 23'-1" is a school standard. Davey



POOR FACILITIES HERE

Let's face the facts. The University of Youngstown, for a school with such high athletic prestige, has just about the poorest facilities for intercollegiate sports competition in the state.

The football team draws an average of 8000 for a home game while the basketball team attendance shattered all existing records. With a top notch rifle team and an outstanding array of fine spring teams in golf, tennis, baseball, and track, we should have an athletic plant of the same calibre.

Competition with outstanding teams from all over the country should have as adverse effect on the rest of the sports on campus as it has had on football. With such calibre of gridders as the school has possessed during the past few years, we should have turned out teams with two losses at the most each season. It's not hard!

OPERATE DIFFERENTLY

We have been playing rough schools around the country who don't outdo us in manpower. However, with our medieval athletic setup, we cannot possibly hope to beat such teams as North Texas State on our football schedule. They operate much differently than we. With poor practice facilities available, not only in football but basketball, tennis, track, and rifling, the outlook is not very encouraging.

It looks now as if track fans may never see a home meet. And think a little about this. For the next five years, the fans of Y.U. football have the wonderful opportunity of looking forward to three home games a year, at the most. Rayen and South fields are booked solid except for a very early September date, a mid-October date, and a frigid late November-date.

Unless teams consent to undesirable Thursday night games, we may have quite a dearth of fall sports activity at Youngstown. A football stadium could remedy practice, regular season contest, and scheduling difficulties for football, track, and possibly baseball.

ORPHAN ATHLETES

Our orphan national championship calibre basketball team, in the past, has had to resort to scrounging around the area for a local high school gym in which to hold practice. To analogize, that's like Jayne Mansfield riding around in a Stanley Steamer. A fieldhouse with a rifle range beneath could be very practical and beneficial. Last August he was honored by the Football writers of America as national "small college coach of the year". There have been years when the Penguins won 7 or 8 games, and years in which they've won only two or three. The players have come and gone the coach hasn't changed. Think that one out pretty thoroughly. As is the case with every one of the other coaches in the athletic department, he, outside of manpower, has had little to work with.

Manpower and its quality here is rapidly declining, as is not to hard to understand, with other schools offering so much more in every way. Let's not be a "last choice" school, but let's definitely not get into anything like that which encompassed Auburn, Seattle, and S.M.U. Those instances should be beneficial to future athletic policies at the respective schools.

However, we certainly should offer more than peanuts to those who show some interest in Y.U. We need it to retain the fine reputation of a clean, hard-fighting, ralented crew of athletes. Our representatives on the field of play have done much for the prestige of the school and can continue to do so if some changes are made or some things added.
