
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

DiGregorio, Shipka receive Heritage Awards

Former head women's basketball coach Ed DiGregorio and former Philosophy and Religious Studies department chair Tom Shipka will receive the prestigious YSU Heritage

Award during the annual Faculty and Staff Awards Dinner May 1 in Kilcawley Center.

The Heritage Award was established in 1980 to recognize former faculty and staff whose contributions to the university have had a major impact on its development.

The Awards Dinner also honors retirees, Distinguished Service Award recipients and employees who have completed milestone years of service.

DiGregorio's storied 20-year career

as head coach of the Penguin women's basketball team included five consecutive Mid-Continent Conference regular season championships. His teams also won Mid-Continent Tournament Titles and appeared in the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament in 1996, 1998 and 2000. In 1998, he led YSU to its first NCAA Tournament win with a 91-80 upset over Memphis.

New site puts theses online

Since 1996, Frederick Stricker's thesis, "Faith in the Law," has gathered dust on the Archives and Special Collections shelf at YSU's Maag Library. Only YSU students and faculty interested in the topic were likely to access the document.

Today, however, the thesis is available to students, faculty and any other interested persons all over the world.

Adopting a worldwide library community trend, Maag Library is creating an Electronic Theses and Dissertations (ETD) collection online, which will make every YSU graduate thesis and dissertation completed since 1968 available through Maag Library's D-Space and OhioLINK's ETD Center.

"There's an awful lot of buzz out there, and there are national conferences about ETDs," said Kevin Whitfield, catalog librarian and Maag Library ETD project leader. "Many institutions individually maintain their own collection of ETDs."

YSU, however, submits its theses and dissertations to the OhioLINK ETD Center, which also houses the documents of 25 participating institutions across the state at www.ohiolink.edu/etd.

Although the collection began in 2001 with 118 scanned submissions, YSU's ETD project, with the help of Barb Jones, coordinator of Graduate Administrative Affairs, hit its stride in 2007 when all theses and dissertations were required to be submitted in PDF format for upload to the ETD Center. For the older documents that were submitted on paper, Maag archivist Salvador Barragan and several archival staff are scanning the documents and uploading them to D-Space. So far, 800 theses and dissertations have been

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Instructor's photo book aids childhood cancer research

Photography and childhood cancer research have little in common, but a recently published book project led by YSU multimedia instructor Mark Roberts has brought the two together.

The book, titled *Pentax-Discuss Mail List (PDML) Photo Annual*, is comprised of photographs submitted by 59 photographers across the globe, with all of the profits from the book's sales going to the world's largest childhood cancer research organization, the National Childhood Cancer Foundation. NCCF works to identify cancer causes and to pioneer new treatments and cures.

Roberts' interest in childhood cancer research is linked with his partner, Lisa Teot, a pediatric pathologist at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center and a member of the Children's Oncology Group, which is supported by the NCCF.

The idea for the photo book originated last year on the Pentax e-mail list, which includes photographers who use Pentax equipment. This year, Roberts committed himself to seeing the project through, employing his talents as well as those of other photographers on the list.

"I was familiar with the good work [NCCF does], and knowing that the whole effort is going to benefit a good cause makes all the participants more willing to do their

best for it," said Roberts, a full-time instructor at YSU since 2006 who has published photos in national magazines such as *Runner's World*.

"I was astonished at the general quality of the photos we received. I don't think we'd have had such a tremendous response if we'd just been doing a book for its own sake."

In December 2008, members of the PDML from 15 countries, including Norway, Serbia and Hungary, began submitting their top photographs via Roberts' Web site. Photos depicted a wide variety of subjects, ranging from serene landscapes to fast-paced fashion shows. Roberts edited and assembled the book electronically, and his knowledge of Photoshop allowed him to avoid printing a large number of proofs. As of Feb. 17, the 120-page book was complete and available for purchase online for \$32.95.


Although this was the first PDML Photo Annual, Roberts plans to have a hand in future photo compilation books by the mailing list's photographers. With his newly gained knowledge and experience in book construction, Roberts, who earned a master's degree in multimedia from Duquesne University, is already looking forward to further publications.

"After getting the first one done, I think we've learned enough to make the production of future editions go even more smoothly," he said.

The *PDML Photo Annual* is available at www.blurb.com. It has earned a "Staff Pick" label and has been featured on the self-publishing Web site's "Best Sellers" section. Additionally, Blurb has requested permission to use the PDML Photo Annual as a sample to show prospective clients.

"That's a pretty good testament to how impressed they are at least," Roberts said. ■

Poetry book celebrates 'others'

Mindy Kirchner wanted to give a voice to society's underrepresented members. She hoped to write poetry for the everyman, in a conversational tone and free of "abstractions and pretentiousness that are

sometimes associated with contemporary poetry."

So, she penned her 18-poem chapbook, "Song of the Rest of Us," which recognizes people who Kirchner, a YSU limited-service faculty member in the English Department, calls society's "others."

"['Song of the Rest of Us'] addresses the 'other' in society, including the working class, the non-academic, and anyone who, for whatever reason, is overlooked or ignored by the mainstream," she said.

Winner of the 2007 Wick Poetry Chapbook Competition, Kirchner's collection of poems was recently published by Kent State University Press. The 2007 Northeast Ohio Master of Fine Arts graduate is excited about the career opportunities that publishing her work may bring.

"I feel extremely lucky to have this chapbook published," Kirchner said. "Not only does this mean my work will be read more widely, but that I will also become more marketable as a professor of poetry."

Although "Song of the Rest of Us" was Kirchner's first published collection of poetry, she has published poems in numerous journals and her poem, "In Medias Res," won the 2008 Whiskey Island Poetry Prize, a national contest. Three poems from Kirchner's chapbook are featured in "The Next of Us is About to Be Born," Wick Poetry Center's 25th anniversary anthology.

Kirchner, who earned her bachelor's degree from Penn State University and resides in Liberty, said she is sending out full-length book manuscripts and continuing to work on new poems when she is not teaching. "Song of the Rest of Us" can be purchased online at http://upress.kent.edu/books.

scanned, although the online availability of these older projects is sporadic for now, Whitfield said.

"Some of the older theses and dissertations have yet to be uploaded and made searchable," he said, noting the daunting, time-consuming task that is forming an ETD collection. "Scanning of retrospective theses and dissertations is finite, but this aspect of the project is not due to end any time soon."

When fully uploaded, the ETDs at YSU will be in PDF format and searchable by author's name, title, subject and keyword. Files can be downloaded from the Web, and OhioLINK keeps track of IP addresses and blocks those that suspiciously access large numbers of files.

Currently there are 202 files in YSU's OhioLINK ETD collection, and Whitfield said the online availability of these documents is invaluable for the university.

"This project provides people access to knowledge produced by the YSU community on a global level, and a number of these theses or dissertations on OhioLINK even show up in an open Web search," he said. "In February 2009 alone, there were 985 hits and downloads on the ETD Center site."
