
Aot of listeners and guests of Commentary Cafe ask, "How did the show get started?"

Almost four years ago, Bill Binning, a long-time Republican analyst and political science professor at Youngstown State University, ran into Democratic activist and political strategist Bob Fitzer on the campus of YSU. Binning knew of Fitzer from his writings in **Speed of Sound** magazine. They introduced themselves and talked about starting up a program, and the result was a locally-based political counterpoint radio show that has captured the ear of the community.

The goal of Commentary Cafe is to provide a forum for intelligent discussion on issues of local and regional concern. Fitzer and Binning recruit Valley news makers and opinion leaders as guests who appear "On the grill with Bob and Bill," in what are often frank and humorous conversations on the state of politics both in Youngstown and around the country.

Binning and Fitzer are pleased with the way the show has developed. Both have a common interest in downtown redevelopment and are concerned about the many costs of suburban sprawl, but they disagree about almost everything else. Still, the show does not reflect the rancor and bitterness that infuses some of today's politics. After making an appearance on the show, one guest wrote, "Given the often vicious partisanship of Washington, D.C., I wanted to let you know how much I appreciated your ability to keep it both light and friendly, even when you were mixing it up. If only our elected leaders...could follow your example...."

While local and regional politicians, office-holders, news reporters, and civic leaders comprise the majority of the more than 100 different guests who have appeared on Commentary Cafe, occasionally the hosts invite leaders from other aspects of life for a fresh perspective, such as Youngstown Symphony Orchestra conductor Isaiah Jackson, and poets Frank Polite, George Peffer, and the late E.G. Hallaman. Binning and Fitzer have also interviewed a number of nationally-known guests, including Pulitzer Prize-winning author Doris Kearns Godwin; Kent State University shooting victim Alan Canfora; syndicated columnists Molly Ivins and Marilyn Geewax, and Wall Street Journal reporters Tom Petzinger and Lisa Bannon.

When asked why Commentary Cafe is aired on WYSU-FM, primarily a classical music station, Fitzer replied, "In our opinion, WYSU-FM has the most intelligent listeners of any media outlet in this market."


