Guitarist Ana Vidovic What do those three names have in common? Well, they are all ingredients for an incredible night of music taking place on the campus of Youngstown State University on Tuesday, March 296 at 8 pm, and you're invited! Classical guitarist Ana Vidovic will perform in Bliss Hall that night, and Fred Child, whose voice can be heard each evening on NPR's Reformance Today, will be the host for the concert. WYSU-FM is proud to be one of sponsors for this exciting event.

Who is Ana Vidovic? Her name will soon be a familiar one to many. She is a rising international star in the world of classical music who comes from a small town near Zagreb, Croatia. She began playing the guitar at age five, and since then has wowed audiences around the world, including those in London, Paris, Vienna, Rome, Toronto, Baltimore, San Francisco, Houston, and St. Louis. At 13, Ana became the youngest applicant to attend the National Musical Academy in Zagreb, and from there went on to graduate from the Peabody Conservatory in 2003, where she was studied with the celebrated Cuban guitarist Manuel Barrueco. Since the start of her performing career, Ana has won a number of prestigious competitions, including The Albert Augustine International Competition in Bath, England; the Fernando Sor competition in Rome, Italy, and the Francisco Tarrega competition in Benicasim, Spain. Her compact disc recording for Naxos was released in 2000, and features works by Walton, Bach, and Tarrega.

Helping us to welcome Ana to our concert stage will be the host for NPR's Resformance Today. Fred Child. Fred has been enthusiastically sharing his knowledge of classical music through PT broadcasts on over 200 NPR stations nationwide, including ours, since 2001. He brings classical music alive not only for radio audiences, but in pre-concert talks for New York's Lincoln Center, the Baltimore Symphony, the National Cathedral, the Aspen Festival, and Summer-

WYSU-FM IS SPONSORING A CONCERT BY JAZZ PIANIST HAROLD DANKO

As part of our ongoing, yearlong 35th anniversary celebration of fine arts broadcasting in the community, WYSU-FM is proud to be sponsoring a number of concerts and programs in conjunction with the College of Fine and Performing Arts here at Youngstown State University. Among them will be an appearance by internationally known jazz pianist and composer Harold Danko, who returns to his native Youngstown as one of the featured guest artists for this year's Piano Week at the Dana School of Music, March 6-11.

Harold Danko has carved a formidable niche for himself in the field of jazz performance and composition, and is perhaps best known for his long-term association with an impressive list of jazz legends such as Chet Baker, Gerry Mulligan, Woody Herman, and the Thad Jones/Mel Lewis Orchestra. He has been a staple on the New York jazz scene for more than 25 years with many CDs and videos to his credit, and now chairs the department of Jazz and Contemporary Media at the Eastman School of Music.

He'll be giving a Master Class featuring students from the Dana School of Music of Friday, March 11 at 2 pm, and a concert later that evening at 8 pm in the Ford Theatre of Bliss Hall along with the Dana Faculty Jazz Easemble. The events are free and open to the public.

Former Animal Charity COO Takes New Position at WYSU-FM

Ed Goist of Cornersburg, the development underwriter at WYSU-FM, is excited about his new position for two reasons — one, he missed working for a cause, and two, he looks forwarding to building the station's underwriting program from the ground floor.

"We've needed to have someone concentrate on underwriting for a long time. Ed brings not only great sales experience to the job, but also enthusiasm, sophistication, and charm," said Gary Sexton, WYSU-FM station manager.

This position, which is brand new at the station, entails soliciting underwriting support for the station from corporations, businesses, and nonprofit organizations.

"I am glad to be back in the nonprofit arena. It's rewarding to work for a cause-oriented employer and WYSU is that — the station supports an ethic that promotes the fine arts," said Goist, who was chief operating officer at Animal Charity for seven years. He took up his duties at WYSU-FM in February.

Goist, who earned his bachelor of arts degree in philosophy from YSU in 1982, said one of his goals is to work on developing a prospect network, focusing on key target prospects that would benefit having their name associated with the University's fine arts radio station.

He also said he intends to build the presentation system for the underwriting department from the ground floor, establish internet interactive marketing resources through WYSU FM web site, as well as establish a viable network of prospects.

Goist, who said he loves public radio and thinks it is a necessary outlet through which people are exposed to nonbiased news coverage, as well as classical music, found out about the job while listening to WYSU.

"I've been a listener and a fan for years," he said.

In his position, he will work with Michele Grant, the station's development officer. Goist will be involved with some of the station's special event fund-raisers, such as Mad About the Arts and the two yearly on air pledge drives.

Prior to his position at WYSU, he was an account executive for Heidel-

burg Distributing. Before he worked at Animal Charity, he was a sales manager for Sprint Cellular.

Goist's wife, Lori, also works at the university, managing the Language Learning Resource Center in the foreign language department.



A masterpiece that's not heard nearly often enough, featuring some of the finest music in any of Mozart's operas. Played by what many consider the world's best orchestra, from the Great Festival Hall in the composer's hometown.

3/14 Britten: Midsummer Night's Dream. Central City Opera, Colorado; Hal France, conductor. Lysander loves Hermia, and Hermia loves Lysander. Helena loves Demetrius; Demetrius used to love Helena, but now loves Hermia. And then there's Puck. Got it? Benjamin Britten did. He succeeded where many have failed: turning a masterpiece of one genre into a masterpiece in another. It's a great cast, led by Sylvia McNair as Helena.
