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WYSU SHARPENS FOCUS ON COMMUNITY

"Walk in the Sun" is the name of the theme song for WYSU's local weekly public affairs program, Focus, and host Dale Harrison thinks that symbolizes what the program is all about: "Shining the light on a topic or guest and illuminating the issues behind them."

Harrison, a YSU English professor and Journalism, is the host of Focus, but the program itself has been around for about 30 years, says WYSU-FM's associate director Gary Sexton. The show was originally hosted by Dick Stevens, and most recently by Dr. Milt Greenberg, who produced the show until his death last year. Dr. Harrison did his first show for the series last November as a guest host, and then in early spring began to produce programs on a regular basis.

"One of the most compelling things about the program is that it covers such a wide range of topics," says Dr. Harrison. "We have talked to Tony Mauro of USA Today about his coverage of the Supreme Court, and we have delved into the sublime world of dreams with YSU's Dr. Julie Thomas." Harrison points out that the program has been an excellent forum for visiting scholars and lecturers who come to YSU from around the world, and it's also provided YSU faculty members with an opportunity to discuss their own research.

Though Harrison has worked in radio before, he's never done a program quite like this one. "It's an opportunity for me to continue to be involved in journalism while I'm teaching, and to provide an important service for the

YSU community and surrounding area," he says.

Beginning in November, Focus will move from its long-time Saturday afternoon time slot to one immediately following the network news program All Things Considered, on Tuesday evenings at 7:00. Sexton says he's pleased that Focus will provide an expanded outlet for YSU faculty to share their work, as well as a way for the station to continue its committment to the community for high-quality public affairs programs. Live Folk Concert on Friday the 13th

Folk fans are in for a treat! On Friday, November 13 at 8:00 pm, WYSU-FM will present its fourth-annual Evening of Live Folk Music at the new Peaberry's of YSU (formerly The Pub) in Youngstown State University's Kilcawley Center. Featured performers are bluegrass band One Way Rider, and folk artist Tim Wallace, both making their first appearances at YSU. Charles Darling, host of WYSU's Folk Festival, will host the event. Guests are encouraged to use the M-8 parking lot off University Plaza (formerly Spring Street). There will be a \$3.00 parking fee. The concert is free.

Headlining the evening is One Way Rider, a family bluegrass band delivering beautiful harmonies and fast-paced instrumentals. The Mayfield family of
Diamond, Ohio includes "the dad," David Lee; "the mom," Valerie Fay; and "the
son," David Ray (also known as "Bass Boy"). All three perform on lead and
harmony vocals, guitar, bass, and mandolin. The band has performed in
Indiana, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia, as well as Ohio. Their
CDs include Slimey River Bottom and Live from Cleveland, Ohio, both released in
1998.

Also performing is singer/songwriter Tim Wallace, who will warm the crowd with his special brand of humor along with some fine vocals and guitar playing. A Cleveland native and a veteran of the coffeehouse era of the mid'60s, Wallace has played all over northeast Ohio. He has been a regular at the Kent State Folk Festival since its inception, and has opened for a number of national and international acts.
