

It was 10 o'clock in the morning on October 23, 1969 when Mahoning Valley residents got their first taste of public radio. A charter member of National Public Radio from the very first day, WYSU-FM offered a 12-hour broadcast day devoted exclusively to classical music and independent public news. It was the beginning of one of Youngstown State University's most successful and long-term community outreach projects.

Many things have changed in the 30 years WYSU-FM has been on the air, but the one thing that hasn't changed is the high quality of programs that are being broadcast seven days a week, 24 hours a day, according to associate director Gary Sexton. "Not only have we greatly expanded our listening audience and the physical area we serve, but we've also added more hours to our broadcast day, we've extended our jazz programs, and we bring a local perspective to news and information programs. And the plan is to continue that tradition for as long as possible," said Sexton. WYSU now serves over 40,000 listeners each week in northeastern Ohio and western Pennsylvania with a wide variety of music and news.

In this, our anniversary year, WYSU is planning many special celebrations, the most notable being the appearance of Nina Totenberg, National Public Radio correspondent, who will speak as part of the Skeggs Lecture Series on May 5.

Totenberg is NPR's award-winning legal affairs correspondent, and reports regularly for All Things Considered, Morning Edition, and Weekend Edition. She is also a frequent

NPR WINS THREE PEABODY AWARDS

National Public Radio was among the biggest winners of this year's George Foster Peabody Awards, claiming three of the four awards given to radio. The Peabody Awards are American broadcasting's most prestigious prize.

Peabodys were awarded to NPR for its daily classical music magazine Performance Today, its news coverage of Africa, and a documentary celebrating the life of Paul Robeson. NPR has now won 33 Peabody Awards in its 28 year history.

The awards committee singled out NPR's Performance Today, public radio's most listened-to classical music program, for "making serious music both contemporary and accessible."

Each day, the program features concert performances from around the world, along with in-depth news and commentary about classical music.

NPR and its Johannesburg-based correspondent Charlayne Hunter-Gault were cited for in-depth news coverage of Africa. These reports aired nationally on NPR's signature newsmagazines All Things Considered and Morning Edition. Hunter-Gault won a 1985 Peabody for her work on The MacNeil/Lehrer News Hour.

NPR also won a Peabody for "I Must Keep Fightin': The Art of Paul Robeson," a powerful portrait of the legendary performer and human rights activist. This one-hour special used rarely-heard archival recordings to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Robeson's birth. It was produced by NPR's Elizabeth Blair.

Totenberg made national headlines when she broke the story of University of Oklahoma Professor Anita Hill's sexual harassment allegations again Judge Clarence Thomas, who was then a candidate for the US Supreme Court. Her coverage of that and other prominent news stories has earned her widespread recognition and awards. In addition she has been honored six times by the American Bar Association for continued excellence in legal reporting. Totenberg will present a free lecture on Wednesday, May 5 at 7:30 pm in the Kilcawley Center Chestnut Room. She will also make herself available to high school students interested in a career in journalism, as part of YSU's "Press Day" on May 6.

Other WYSU 30th anniversary celebration activities will include a summer bus trip to Blossom and at least two concerts, one featuring a popular chamber music ensemble (details for the October concert coming soon) and the very popular annual "Folk Festival" Night Out which comes up on Friday evening, November 5.

Our first celebration, the fourth annual "Mad About the Arts" which was held at the McDonough Museum in March, was a great success, drawing over 400 people. "People in this area have been very supportive of our efforts to promote the arts in different ways," said Development Associate Catherine Cala.
