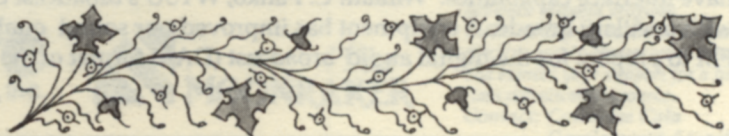

I'D ALWAYS FELT SORRY FOR MORNING PEOPLE

Four years ago I was sent to clean the apartment of a retired dentist, an energetic woman who decorated the walls of her bedroom with posters devoted to themes of Christian love and gum disease. A self-described "morning person," she rose each day at 5 o'clock in order to stand on her rooftop and practice her *tai chi*.

By the time I showed up she had been awake long enough to balance her checkbook, strip the paint off a door frame, and bake a tray of sugarless muffins, which she referred to as "hooters." I arrived at 9:00 am and asked her where I should begin...because people often have ideas about that.

I started on the refrigerator and while I worked she stood beside the radio listening to **Morning Edition**, a program I had never heard before. I'd been listening to **All Things Considered** for 15 years, but my definition of a good life means being asleep during the hours when **Morning Edition** airs.

Now I am a **Morning Edition** commentator, and, while I am grateful for the opportunity to speak on radio, I cannot bear the sound of my own voice. It destroys me. It makes no sense at all, my own voice on the radio. Radio people have sonorous voices; mine has been described as "whiny," "high-pitched," "nasal," and, my favorite, "sickly sweet." Every now and then, I'll catch myself on the answering machine and understand why telephone solicitors address me as "Mrs. Sedaris," and room service operators promise, "We'll have that to you in 15 minutes, ma'am." I rationalize, telling myself that the answering machine is set upon the window ledge and most likely the sun has warped the tape. I record my **Morning Edition** pieces at NPR's New York Bureau on Second Avenue

where, if I am lucky, Manoli Wetherell is the engineer. Manoli offers precise word changes and joins me for a cigarette after the recording. Ira Glass directs me from his office in Chicago. We giggle and improvise. I can't picture anyone listening but the two of them, and that is fine by me.

It was interesting then, to go on my recent book tour, where I met hundreds of morning people who--like the retired dentist--are awake and lively at daybreak. These people groom dogs, defend criminals, teach the blind to write checks, and counsel pregnant widows. Their eyes pop open at 5:00 am and by 9:00 pm--once I finish the average book tour reading--they begin to droop.

Still though, they were kind enough to wait in line and approach me saying things like, "I remember the time you did that story about hitch-hiking with that crippled girl...I was bathing a standard poodle..." or "...I was driving to work and watching as a tractor trailer jack-knifed..." or "...I was shaving the hair off someone's chest, prepping them for surgery..." or "...I was watching my two-year-old swallow a pair of dice...."

I never knew. I'd always felt sorry for morning people, but here they were: unashamed and vocal. And they could recall every word I wished I'd never said on the radio.

WYSU MAKES TECHNICAL IMPROVEMENTS

September was a busy month for WYSU's on-air and technical staff. Two new broadcast systems were installed in the station's Cushwa Hall studios--without any interruption in airtime. The two systems, *DigiLink* and *TrakStar*, enhance WYSU's broadcast and production capabilities. *DigiLink* is a digital audio work station that enables WYSU-FM to run unattended operation during its overnight broadcasts. This system allows satellite programs to be broadcast along with inserts, such as local weather information, station ID, and underwriting credits. If any part of the system malfunctions during automated operation, *DigiLink* responds by notifying the appropriate personnel. Corrective action may be made by telephone. *TrakStar* enables staff to produce CD-quality recordings for immediate or delayed broadcast. Manufactured by Arrakis Systems, Inc. of Ft. Collins, Colorado, both systems are compatible and have interface capabilities. William C. Panko, WYSU's broadcast engineer, said, "Incorporating these new systems with ancillary broadcast equipment has improved our sound quality and production capabilities and allows WYSU-FM to prepare for the digital audio broadcast (DAB) format of the 21st century."
