President Jones presided. He called on Mr. Dykema who brought to the attention of the group the statement on Professional Ethics as revised and adopted by the Academic Standards Committee:

PROFESSIONAL ETHICS

Upon accepting an appointment to the faculty of Youngstown University, a faculty member assumes certain obligations to the University, the faculty, and the students. His canons of professional ethics should be as follows:

- (1) To support the objectives of the University.
- (2) To exercise his academic freedom with discretion, judgment, and responsibility, both in and out of the classroom.
- (3) To conduct himself at all times with the dignity expected of a member of a learned profession, remembering that his words and actions may be identified with the University.
- (4) To respect the professional integrity and dedication of his colleagues.
- (5) To provide instruction of high standard based on the stated objectives of his courses.
- (6) To foster an atmosphere in the classroom that is conducive to learning and honest academic conduct.
- (7) To maintain his scholarship, both in the immediate sense of being prepared for class meetings, and in the wider sense of keeping abreast of new knowledge in his discipline.
- (8) To acquaint himself with, and be guided by, all University publications concerning academic policies and procedures.
- (9) To participate with his colleagues in striving for improvement of instruction, facilities and academic policies and procedures.
- (10) To provide informed and conscientious academic and general counseling for his students.
- (11) To recognize that the extra-curricular activities of the University are important to a well-rounded education.

Mr. Dykema then moved, seconded by Mr. D'Isa, that the statement be accepted. Mr. Ives moved, seconded by Mrs. Botty, to amend Part 11 to read: "To recognize that the extra-curricular activities of the University can contribute to a well-rounded education." The motion to amend the report was defeated. The main motion to accept the report was then passed. Mr. Behen, chairman of the sub-committee which rewrote the statement, thanked those members of the faculty who offered suggestions and comments.

Dean Smith reported on the work of the Curriculum Committee. 1) A major in Geology was approved. 2) Two courses in Pre-Forestry, which are taken as a part of the Forestry program conducted in cooperation with Duke University, were approved. 3) A new 3-hr. course was approved--Orientation 101--to be taken by a special group of freshmen who are being admitted from the lower third of their high school classes. This course will not count as credit toward any degree--only on the Associate program.

Dean Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Dykema, that the report of the Curriculum Committee be accepted. Motion passed.

Ballots will be sent out to all full-service faculty in the near future for purposes of electing Senate members for next year. The same number will be elected from each department as last year. Mr. Behen will act as teller with assistants.

President Jones announced that Baccalaureate will be at 7:30 p.m. on May 29 and Commencement on May 31. He asked that all full-time faculty attend both functions.

Mr. Hahn discussed enrollment forecasts for the future.

President Jones expressed his pleasure in the selection of Dr. Pugsley as his successor. He emphasized that there will be no changes in personnel as a result of the change in the presidency of the university.

Mrs. Smith reported that this being the last day for advance registration it is anticipated that about 8000 will have registered. She also reported on a meeting regarding Selective Service. All advisors were asked to advise male students to stay in school full time and to urge them to take the Selective Service exam.

Mrs. Smith made the following motion which passed unanimously: Since Major John Ozaki is on the way to Viet Nam and Major Maynard Hilton will be transferred to Hawaii after summer camp, it seems fitting that we, the faculty who have worked closely with these men, should take proper note of their departure. It seems therefore appropriate that the Secretary of the Senate be instructed to write a letter of commendation and gratitude to these men for their work done at our institution and that a copy of this letter be filed in their military jackets.

Mr. Nelson announced that students will be entering this summer for the first time under a new G.I. Bill. It is expected that monthly report forms will have to be used.

President Jones announced that the new Science Building is progressing on schedule.

Dean Smith then read the following statement:

To become the president of an infant college, to nurture its growing needs, to provide its students and faculty with the imaginative leadership needed to establish its ability to obtain leadership among its peers was the challenge and achievement of Howard W. Jones, President of Youngstown University since 1931, retiring in 1966.

It is entirely appropriate that the Senate, which represents the faculty, express to him their recognition of that leadership at its last regularly called meeting of the academic year.

Be it resolved, therefore, that the Senate of Youngstown University go on record expressing to their retiring President:

1. Their most sincere congratulations upon a life of dedicated service to education;
2. Their deepest gratitude for those worthy qualities he has manifested in his office, especially
 - a) The vitality and stamina with which he met the unremitting stresses and strains of his office,
 - b) The devotion to that office which made no personal sacrifice too great,
 - c) The courage and willingness to take risks and be perpetually venturesome in advancing the University as a service to the larger community, and
 - d) The successes he brought us with our academic peers in the multiple tasks of accreditation,
3. Above all is this faculty thankful to him for the faith and confidence he placed in them, stimulating in them the ability in some small measure to match his own vision, his spirit, and devotion--qualities which his example will inspire them to preserve in themselves and in the University.

(Some slight stylistic changes have been made in the above.)

Dr. Swartz moved, seconded by Mr. Dykema that this resolution be adopted. It was approved unanimously.

A MOTION TO THE FACULTY SENATE:

In last Wednesday's editorial comment on the retirement of our president we read,

"Dr. Jones has been as much a part of Youngstown University as the Main Building itself. Actually he came to Youngstown College ----, in July 1931, two months before the Main Building in Wick Avenue was dedicated."

This unanticipated recognition of a real coincidence in our history -- ~~that~~ ^{the} structure that became the cornerstone of our physical university appearing at the same time ~~that~~ ^{as} the man who has shaped it into adulthood -- has led us to move that this body appoint a committee to meet with the Trustees for the purpose of changing the name of our main building to that of JONES HALL in honor of the man who gave to that building and this university its essence.

I so move.

Senate Members:

A subcommittee of the Academic Standards Committee, after careful consideration of all the suggestions, drew up a statement on professional ethics which was then submitted to the full committee. At its meeting on 27 April 1966 the full committee made a few revisions of the subcommittee's statement and then voted unanimously to submit the revised version to the Senate for approval.

The following statement is therefore being sent to you to reach you at least three days before the next Senate meeting, which will presumably be on Friday, 6 May 1966. According to our Constitution, Bylaw VI, Section 3, as amended 1 April 1966, such a procedure is necessary if the report of a committee is to be voted on at a meeting of the Senate. At the next meeting of the Senate, then, a motion will be made that this statement on professional ethics be approved by the Senate.

ASSOCIATE IN ARTS TITLE

The Associate in Arts Title description is a supplement to the Youngstown University Bulletin 1966-67. It is a carefully planned program of general education and guidance administered by the College of Arts and Sciences, and is a part of the organization and program of this College.

In keeping with its stated objectives, Youngstown University aims to make higher education available to all qualified high school graduates; those with less satisfactory high school records but acceptable scores on established college entrance examinations are admitted to carry a reduced academic schedule and initially only as candidates for the Associate in Arts title. If the performance in the Associate in Arts curriculum warrants it, the student may be admitted to candidacy for one of the baccalaureate degrees.

The maximum load for an Associate in Arts candidate is twelve semester hours for the first two semesters, twelve or thirteen hours for the following three semesters; his curriculum is prescribed and limited; and some of his courses carry credit only toward the Associate in Arts title.

This Associate in Arts curriculum is designed for the increasing number of high school graduates who wish to pursue a college education but whose scholastic records indicate that they have more than average difficulty in mastering academic work. The maximum load in this curriculum is therefore twelve to thirteen hours as compared to the usual fifteen to sixteen hours in the baccalaureate curriculums, and for the first two semesters the Associate in Arts candidate must take a three semester hour course in College Study Aids, Orientation 101-102, which will give credit only toward the Associate in Arts title; and the choice of courses will be sharply limited. In the following semesters all the student's courses will be regular baccalaureate courses, and he will have a considerably wider selection. But so long as he remains a candidate for the Associate in Arts title, his academic load may not exceed thirteen hours. It will therefore require five semesters or four semesters and two summer sessions (three hours each five-week session) for the student to earn the Associate in Arts title; in fact, it is desirable that the program be completed in four semesters and two summer sessions.
