A quorum having assembled, the meeting was called to order at 4: 05 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 1975, in Schwebel Auditorium by the re-elected Chairman of the Senate, Clyde Vanaman. Dr. Vanaman called for additions, corrections, or other changes in the minutes of the meeting held on Friday, May 16, 1975, The minutes were declared approved as distributed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Curriculum Committee: Chairman, Virginia Phillips, summarized the activities of the Committee for the year as follows: Courses, circulated 228; Courses Appended to Minutes, 175 (10 to be appended to June 6 minutes); Objections received, 55 (Some were duplicate objections); Courses Considered and Resolved in Committee, 7; Courses brought to Senate, 34; Courses Withdrawn, 5 Courses Awaiting Distribution, none; Courses Outstanding and Unresolved, 4.

Mrs. Phillips reported that the Committee had approved the follow-ing courses for adoption after resolution of objections: Sociology & Anthropology 729, Health & Physical Education 690, Health & Physical Education 565. The course description of Mathematics Computer Science 620 had been changed in Committee. The Committee had a split vote on approving Economics 809 with a majority voting for approval. Dr. Jones moved that all five courses by approved by Senate. The motion was seconded by Dr. Miner. Mr. Arnold read a letter of objection which he had written to the Curriculum Committee and moved that Economics 809 be resubmitted to the Committee for

further study; the motion was seconded by Mr. Deiderick. After spirited discussion a hand-count ballot was taken on the motion to resubmit. The vote was 36 for returning Economics 809 to committee and 29 against. The motion to approve the other four courses was passed unanimously.

<u>Elections and Balloting Committee</u>: Chairman, Howard Cox, reported that Dr. Clyde Vanaman had been re-elected as Chairperson of Senate.

In elections conducted for position on the Elections and Balloting Committee, the three persons receiving the most votes were: Dr. Frederick Blue, Dr. Daniel O'Neill, and Dr. Phillip Hahn. As Dr. O'Neill is already serving on one Senate chartered committee, there is a question as to whether or not he is eligible to serve also on the Elections and Balloting Committee. Dr. Cox indicated that he planned to refer the question to the Executive Committee for resolution (In the event that the Executive Committee determined that Dr. O'Neill could not serve, the person who had received the fourth greatest number of ballots would be asked to serve.).

Charter and Bylaws Committee: Chairman, Stephen Hanzely, moved that Senate approve the following addition to Bylaw 6, Section 2 (h) (1): "To receive, consider, and evaluate faculty research proposals encumbering university research funds and to recommend to the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research the degree of support of each such proposal." The motion was seconded by Mr. Feigenbaum. Dr. Hanzely read the "Rationale" which was contained in the May 28, 1975, letter to faculty to initiate the discussion, which was lengthy and technical.

- Dr. Jones moved to resubmit the proposed addition to Bylaw 6 to Committee. The motion was seconded by Dr. Cohen. There was additional discussion of the motion to resubmit. A hand-count ballot showed 34 opposed to resubmitting the Bylaw to the Committee and 28 for resubmission.
- Dr. Vanaman called for a hand ballot on the original motion to approve the Bylaw. When five persons voted Yea, he ruled that the Bylaw was not approved.
- Mrs. Dykema voted to extend the time of the Senate meeting sufficiently to allow the body to complete action on the full report of the Charter and Bylaws Committee; the motion was seconded and passed unanimously.
 - Dr. Hanzely moved Senate adoption of a proposed new Bylaw 8:

Removal from Office:

Whenever an elected Senate member, Senate officer, or member of an elected chartered committee is absent from more than half of the meetings of the appropriate body during any one-year interval beginning with the inception, or anniversary, of the member's term of office, such fact may be reported to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may choose to poll the members of the Senate to determine whether the elected position shall be declared vacant.

Whenever a **member** of an appointed chartered committee is absent from more than half of the meetings of the committee during any one-year interval beginning with the inception, or anniversary, of the time of appointment, the committee chairman shall ask the member to resign or seek valid reasons for the member's absences. In the event that the member refuses to resign, the committee shall recommend to the Executive Committee for final disposition whether the appointed position shall be declared vacant. "

The motion was seconded by Mrs. **Dykema**. There was a short discussion. On a voice vote, the Chairman ruled that the motion was defeated.

Having completed the business for which time was extended, the meeting adjourned at 5: 40 p.m.

SUBJECT ANNUAL REPORT OF ELECTIONS AND BALLOTING COMMITTEE

- 1. This committee was constituted during the Fall Quarter, 1974-75. The members are elected by their respective colleges or schools. They were Dr. Howard B. Cox, Business, Dr. Jack Devletian, Engineering, Miss Dorothy Kennedy, T & CC, Dr. George Schoenhard, Education and Dr. Robert Secrist, Arts & Sciences. Dr. Rebecca Herrold, Fine Arts, was elected in the Spring Quarter.
- 2. The Committee has successfully conducted elections for Chairman of the Senate and for three new members of the Charter and By-Laws Committee in the Fall Quarter and again in the Spring Quarter. In addition, each member of the committee has supervised the at-large and departmental elections of senators within his/her college/school during the past quarter. Despite a last minute change in election dates, all but one of the faculty seats were determined prior to the May 16, 1975 neeting, the first for the 1975-76 Senate.
- 3. One change of note which was instituted by the **committee** during the **past** year has been the concept of holding the Academic Senate elections in **two** stages. Basically, a nomination ballot is held in which the top candidates for an opening are determined. This is followed by an election ballot to determine the final winner. Or rationale for this method is that the winning candidates should be acceptable to a larger constituency than they were under the previous method. Successful candidates under our **system** have had positive majorities, in many cases, or, at least, **significant** vote totals in all elections. We believe this is a more **desirable** system than the **previous** one in **which** a small percentage of the total number of voters could elect a candidate on a single ballot.

A careful reading of the Charter and By-Laws indicated we could initiate this method without further approval. Consultation with the Chairmen of the Academic Senate, and the Senate Executive Committee, and the Charter and By-Laws Committee indicated that they could see no legal objection to the proposed methodology. Consequently this change was initiated for the 1975-76 elections held during this past quarter. To the beat of by knowledge, there have been no major complaints with the new method.

We sincerely hope that we have made a contribution towards democratic participation in University affairs by our efforts during the past year.

Dear Colleague:

At the June 6, 1975 meeting of the Academic Senate, the Charter and Bylaws Committee will propose two Bylaw amendments for Senate consideration. Since Bylaw changes become effective immediately upon Senate approval, you are urged to attend this meeting if you wish to speak to the proposed amendments.

Proposed Bylaw Change #1: Amend Bylaw 6, section 2 (h) (1), which describes the charge to the Senate Research Committee, by adding to the present charge (lower case) a new paragraph (capitals):

To recommend to the Senate new policies and changes in existing policies as related to sponsored research including both University and outside agency funded programs.

TO RECEIVE, CONSIDER, AND EVALUATE FACULTY RESEARCH PROPOSALS ENCUMBERING UNIVERSITY RESEARCH FUNDS AND TO RECOMMEND TO THE DEAN OF GRADUATE STUDIES AND RESEARCH THE DEGREE OF SUPPORT OF EACH SUCH PROPOSAL.

Rationale: As a result of the evolution of the new Academic Senate, two committees dealing with research matters came into being:

(1) the Senate Research Committee (SRC), an appointed chartered committee, charged with recommending research policy to the Senate and (2) the "new" University Research Council (URC), an administrative committee appointed by, and advisory to, the Dean of Graduate Studies and Research.

The question arose as to which of these two committees should be involved in the evaluation and funding of faculty research proposals. (In the past, these activities were performed by the "old" URC - a B-type committee under the predecessor Senate structure.) In view of the fact that the charge to the SRC and URC is sufficiently vague, the Charter and Bylaws Committee explored two alternatives. The first option, and which the Committee is recommending to the Senate, appears above in the form of a Bylaw amendment. The second option calls for the SRC to continue recommending policy to the Senate and the URC to evaluate research proposals and advise funding within the frame work of the research policy. Dean Rand has indicated to the Charter and Bylaws Committee that, subject to the

acceptance of this second option, he would appoint the SRC membership to the URC.

<u>Proposed Bylaw Change #2</u>: Addition of a new Bylaw 8 - Removal from Office:

Whenever an elected Senate member, Senate officer, or member of an elected chartered committee is absent from more than half of the meetings of the appropriate body during any one-year interval beginning with the inception, or anniversary, of the member's term of office, such fact may be reported to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall then ask the member to resign or seek valid reasons for the member's absences. In the event that the member refuses to resign, the Executive Committee may choose to poll the members of the Senate to determine whether the elected position shall be declared vacant.

Whenever a member of an appointed chartered committee is absent from more than half of the meetings of the committee during any one-year interval beginning with the inception, or anniversary, of the time of appointment, the committee chairman shall ask the member to resign or seek valid reasons for the member's absences. In the event that the member refuses to resign, the committee shall recommend to the Executive Committee for final disposition whether the appointed position shall be declared vacant.

Dear Dr. Largent and Mrs. Phillips:

I regret that I was unable to attend the University Curriculum Committee meeting on June 2, 1975, to present the thoughts of the Accounting and Finance Department regarding the proposed course, Economics 809, Current Problems In Money, Banking and Financial Markets.

I originally submitted a letter to your committee on May 8, 1975, indicating reservations about the propriety of this course being offered in the Economics Department. I realize that before the establishment of a separate major in finance, there was some merit to having finance related courses in the Economics Department. I am also aware that the line dividing finance and economics is rather elusive and tends to shift with one's point of view; but in this instance, I believe there is an established precedent that should be followed.

You will recall that my suggestion in the letter of May 8th was for your committee to put a temporary hold on the course to allow the two departments involved time to work out generalized ground rules regarding the kinds of courses that should be offered by each department. This concept was rejected by the Economics Department and they acted accordingly.

I realize a proper research effort should be in depth and include a broad representative population, but the action by your committee on June 2, 1975 has forced me to make a cursory examination of graduate school catalogs in order to establish my point. I tried to choose institutions from different geographic areas. My sample included Harvard University, Stanford University, Baruch College, The University of Miami, The University of Oklahoma, the University of Louisville, and New York University. Operating on the premise already presented to

me by the Chairperson of the Economics Department to wit: the Economics Department should teach all courses dealing with matters outside the firm (macro) and the Accounting and Finance Department should deal only with specific subjects that are within the firm (micro), such as capital management, financial analysis, etc., I proceeded to determine If this was a logical and generally accepted approach.

I examined the graduate finance course listings at the subject institutions and in each case, the curriculum included one or more courses in banking theory and practice and financial or money markets. Courses were also offered in international finance, financial policy, security analysis, and other subjects. It immediately became clear to me that to assign courses to a department on a macro/micro basis was not only impractical, but based on my brief sample, certainly not the generally accepted approach.

I would appreciate it if you would read this letter to the University Senate at the time you present Economics 809 for approval. I would also ask you to request the Senate to table this course proposal until an investigation can be performed in depth and used as a basis for assigning any future course proposals in the finance/economics area.

Thank you for your consideration in this matter.
