BT 510 (Change) 79-177 Real Estate Frinciples and Practices. Introduction to real estate as a profession, stressing basic principles and practices essential to approaching real est te problems. Particular emphasis is given to Chic License Law, and a general overview of the elementary legal, physical, and economic characteristics of real estate; provides foundation for further study and for licensure. 3 c.h. BT 511 (Addition) 79-178 Real Estate Problems. A study of the transactions encountered in the profession of real est te. Topics will include proration of taxes, area and volume appraising, mortgage amortization, and closing statements. Prereq.: Mathematics 531. 3 c.h. BT 512 (Addition) 79-179 Concepts of Real Estite Listing. Concepts underlying listing and selling approach. ajor emphasis will be on a customer-oriented, problem-colving, need-satisfaction theory of selling and listing. Two-hour lect roand three hours labor tory work per week. Prerec.: BT 510. 3 c.h. BT 603 (Change) 77-180 Real Estate Brokerage. A survey of the rinciples underlying management functions of planning, organizing, staffing, training and retention of salespersonnel, directing and controlling a brokerage office. Reading, discussion and research topics comprise student activities. Prerec.: BT 510. 3 q.h. **BT 620 (Change)** 79-181 Special Topics in Real Estate. A seminar-type course as a "capstone" to review, coordinate and synthesize the subject matter of all the prescribed real estate courses, and/or to expand certain areas not given sufficient depth. The student is required to demonstrate his/her knowledge of real est te by preparing a term paper presentation on a particular researched topic. Prerec.: BT 603. 3 q.h. Art 612 (Change) 79-191 Silk Screen. Printmaking experiments using various silk ocreen techniques. Eight hours laboratory. Prerec .: Art out or 602. 4 c.h. Art 721 (Change) 79-192 Lithography. Concentrated printmaking techniques from a flat stone or metal plate. Eight hours laboratory. Prerer .: Art 601 or 602. 4 g.h. Art 722 (Change) 79-193 Photo Silk Screen. Concentrated experiments in various photo silk screen methods of printmaking. Ten hours laboratory. Prerec .: Art 612. 5 g.h. Art 821 (Change) 79-194 Intaglio. Concentrated experiments with metal printmaking techniques. Eight hours laboratory. Prereq.: Art 611 4 g.h. Art 820 (Addition) 79-195 Advanced Printmaking. Advanced methods in a selected printmaking discipline. Eight hours laboratory. May be repeated for a maximum of 12 q.h. Prereq.: 611 or 612 or 720 or 721. 4 q.h.

Music 511 (Addition) 79-196

Introduction to Music Education. An orientation for prospective music teachers. Through classroom observations and seminars the student will study the place of music in the curriculum and the function of the music teacher at all levels of instruction. Eight 2 hr. music class observations with written reports. Two nour long seminars. Prereq.: Ed. 501. 1 q.h.

Music 715 (Addition) 79-197

Fundamentals of Conducting. A study of conducting techniques and rehearsal procedures applicable to instrumental and choral ensembles. Emphasis is on discovering the implications of the score and enlarging the student's expressive resources. Students in the class provide an ensemble for practice in conducting. Prereq.: Music 612 or junior standing. 3 q.h.

Music 716 (Addition) 79-198 Instrumental Conducting Practicum. A practical course in conducting with total concentration on instrumental easemble problems and solutions. Students are assigned to one of the instrumental ensembles for actual conducting experience. Prer q.: Music 715. 1 q.h.

# Music 717 (Addition) 79-199

Vocal Conducting Practicum. A practical course in conducting with total concentration on vocal ensemble problems and solutions. Students are assigned to one of the vocal ensembles for actual conducting experience. Prereq.: Music 715. 1 q.h.

#### Music 738 (Deletion) 79-200

Vocal Conducting Methods Ensemble. Vocal conducting tech ics and ensemble methods as they apply to choral group; rehearsal practices; special choral problems. Effort is made to enlarge the student's expressive resources as a conductor and to develop ability to discover the implications of the score. Students sing in class, providing a chorus for practice in conducting. Each student conducts the University Chorus during the last day of the quarter. Prereq.: Music 611 with a grade of B or better, or Music 612. 3 q.h.

#### Music 823 (Change) 79-201

Music Teaching in the Elementary School. A study of the role of music in the life of the child. An examination of principles, repertoire, and techniques of teaching. Includes 2 hrs. field experience per week. Fre eq.: Admission to the School of Education. 4 q.h.

#### Music 813 (Addition) 79-202

Non-Performance Music. An investigation of current developments in general music, theory, history and humanities related to the middle and secondary school curriculum. A study of courses, content, scheduling and innovative practices. Prereq.: Admission to the School of Education. 2 q.h.

# Music 812 (Addition) 79-203

New Directions in Eleme tary Music Education. Emphasis on contemportry philosophies, materials, and methods in music education including Orff, Kodály and Dalcroze. Prereq.: Music 823. 2 q.h.

Music 811 (Addition) 79-204

Vocal Music Education. Methods of cryenizin, administering, and conductin, vocal music in the schools. A study of the literature, instructional methods, library organization, festival participation, scheduling, and other problems facing the vocal music teacher. Includes 2 hrs. of field experience per week. Prereq.: Music 717 and Admission to the School of Education. 4 q.h.

Music 810 (Addition) 79-205

Instrumental Music Education. Methods of organizing, administering and conducting instrumental music in the schools. A study of the literature, instructional methods, library organization, festical participation, scheduling, and other problems facing the instrumental music teacher. Includes 2 hrs. of field experience per week. Prereq. Admission to the School of Education and Music 716. 4 q.h.

Music 814 (Addition) 79-206

Selected Topics in Music Education. Bulletin will list course title each quarter. Prereq.: Senior standing or permission of instructor. 2 q.h.

Music 824 (Deletion) 79-207

Music Teaching in the Middle School. Music, materials and methods of instruction in middle schools and junior high schools with emphasis on the general music class and the acolescent voice. Prereq.: Admission to the School of Education. 3 q.h.

Music 825 (Deletion) 79-208

Music Teaching in the Secondary School. Methods of orcanizing and conducting instrumental and vocal classes, bands, orchestras, and choruses in the public schools. Special areas and devices unique to music teaching are surveyed in detail. Prereq.: Admission to the School of Education. 3 q.h.

Music 739 (Deletion) 79-209

Instrumental Conducting Methods Ensemble. Instrumental conducting technics and ensemble methods as they apply to bands, orchestras and chamber ensembles; rehearsal practices; special instrumental problems. Effort is made to enlarge the student's expressive re ources as a conductor and to develop ability to discover the implications of the score. Four classes per week. Students perform on major and/or ginor instruments providing an ensemble for practice in conducting. Students also conduct one of the bands at the conclusion of the quarter. Prereq.: Music 611 with a grade of B or better, or Music 612. 3 q.h.

Music 866, 867, 868 (Addition) 79-210

Advanced Jazz Improvisation. A laboratory experience in advanced jazz techniques with emphasis on analysis of harmonic progressions, form, style and performance requirements of the jazz idicm. 1+1+1 q.h. Prereq.: Music 750.

Music 783, 784, 785 (Addition) 79-211 Jazz Keyboard I,II,III. For Keyboard majors. Class instruction and keyboard experience in melodic, harmonic and rhytoric devices resulting in advanced improvisation. Preseq.: Keyboard 606. 2+2+2 q.h. Music 780,781, 782 (Addition) 79-212 Jazz Keyboard I,II,III. For non-keyboard majors. Class instruction and keyboard experience in jazz melodic, harmonic and raytamic improvisation. 2+2+2 q.h. Freneq.: Music 612

Music 712, 713, 714 (Addition) 79-213 Jazz Arranging I,II,III. Scoring in the Jazz idiom with emphasis on instrume tal techniques and effects. Harmony, forms and styles will be covered, and student arrangements will e performed. Preseq.: Theory 612 or consent of instructor. 2+2+2 g.h.

Music 666,667,668 (Addition) 79-214 Jazz Improvisation. A laboratory experience in jazz techniques with empression analysis of harmonic procressions, form, style, and performance requirements of the jazz idiom. 1+1+1 q.h.

Music 625 (Addition) 79-215 Music in Mass Media. Survey of music for a variety of media (Filmstrips, television) used for commercial, dramatic, artistic, and educational communicat on. Re ording, synchronization, timing and editing techniques will be applied to student projects. 3 q.h.

Music 510 (Addition) 79-216 Survey of Jazz. A study of performers, compositions, origins, influences, and stylistic features from its roots to the present. 3 q.h.

Allied Health RT 501L (Addition) 79-217 <u>Introduction to Respiratory Therapy Laboratory</u>. Initial exposure to fundamental equipment used, basic patient care techniques, and departmental design. Hospital visits are included. Must be taken concurrently with RT 501. 3 hours laboratory. 1 q.h.

Allied Health RT 501 (Change) 79-218 <u>Introduction to Respiratory Therapy</u>. The scope of the respiratory therapy field as a whole, the duties and responsibilities will be included. A discussion of important calculations for respiratory therapy with emphasis on specific applications current in medical practice. 3 q.h.

Allied Health D.H. 501L (Change) 79-219 <u>Clinical Dental Hygiene I.</u> A detailed study of planning patient care, patient preparation and positioning in the dental chair, patient instruction in cral physiotherapy, princ ples of dental instrumentation and instrument sharpening. One nour discussion and six hours laboratory per week. Prereq.: Permission of Coordinator. 3 q.h.

Allied Health D.H. 502 (Change) 79-220 <u>Dental Hysiene II.</u> Discussion of Clinical procedures and records. Particular emphasis on the priniciples and skills needed for effective patient education. Prereq.: D.H. 501 3 g.h.

Allied Health D.H. 503 (Change) 79-221 <u>Dental Hygiene III.</u> Discussions of modified dental hygiene procedures for special patients and the concomitant dental hygiene care. Prereq.: D.H. 502 3 q.h.

- Allied Health D.H. 601 (Change) 79-222 <u>Dental Hypiene IV.</u> Introduction to the principles of ultrasonic <u>scaling.</u> Application of practical knowledge of nutritional science to patient education. Prereq.: D.H. 503 209.h.
- Allied Health D.H. 602 (Change) 79-223 Dental Hygiene V. Introduction to the dental specialty of oral surgery and related subjects pain control and hospital dentistry. Prereq.: D.H. 601 2 q.h.
- Allied Health D.H. 603 (Change) 79-224 <u>Dental Hygiene VI</u>. Individual review of current literature on a selected topic in the field of Dentistry. Prereq.: D.H. 602 1 q.h.
- Allied Health D.H. 611L (Change) 79-225 <u>Dental Materials Laboratory.</u> Selected dental materials are manipulated in laboratory procedures so that the student will be able to assist the dentist at the chair, as well as perform certain laboratory ro edures and specified clinical duties. Six cours laboratory per week. Prereq.: Second year standing in DHT. program. 2 q.h.

Allied Health D.H. 640 (Deletion) 79-226 Dental Specialties. An introduction to the practice, principles and armamentarium in the following dental specialties: anesthesia, endodontics, operative dentistry, oral diagnosis, oral survery, orthodontics, pedodontics, peridontics and prosthodontics. Dental research and dental assisting to widen the spectrum of the knowledge of the dental hygienist. 3 q.h.

Nursing 501 (Deletion) 79-730

Introduction to Nursing I. In this course, a student is introduced to nursing as a health service, and to the role of the nurse in the promotion of human needs and their significance for nursing care. 501 must be taken concurrently with 501 laboratory. Prereq.: Permission of chairman. 3 q.h.

# Nursing 501L (Deletion) 79-231

Introduction to Nursing Laboratory. Clinical laboratory provides the principles and application of basic nursing skills. Satisfactory achievement of clinical objectives is requisite for passing 501L. 501L must be taken concurrently with 501. Six hours of laboratory per week. Prereq.: Permission of chairman. 2 q.h.

#### Nursing 510 (Addition) 79-232

Nursing Process I. Introduction to the nursing process. Identification of nursing within the health care system exploring man's needs during mild degrees of stress and adaptation. Concurrent with Nursing 510L and Biology 551. Prereq.: Permission of chairman. 3 q.h.

#### Nursing 510L (Addition) 79-233

Nursing Process I Laboratory. Selected clinical experience provides cpportunity for beginning application of the nursing process to clients<sup>4</sup> needs during mild degrees of stress and adaptation. Nine hours of laboratory per week. Concurrent with Nursing 510. 3 q.h.

#### Nursing 511 (Addition) 79-234

Nursing Process II. Nursing process and nursing within the health care system continued. Promotion of adaptation to the needs of holistic man during mild to moderate degrees of stress. Concurrent with Nursing 511L and Biology 552. Prereq.: Nursing 510 and 510L. 4 q.h.

#### Nursing 511L (Addition) 79-235

Nursing Process II Laboratory. Selected clinical experience provides opportunity for further application of the nursing process to clients' needs during mild to moderate degrees of stress and adaptation. Nine hours of laboratory per week. Concurrent with Nursing 511. 3 q.h.

#### Nursing 512 (Addition) 79-236

Nursing Process III. Application of nursing process to the needs of holistic man during moderate to severe decrees of stress and adaptation. Concurrent with Nursing 512L and Psychology 755. Prereq.: Nursing 511 and 511L, Psych. 560 6 q.h.

#### Nursing 512L (Addition) 79-237

Nursing Process III Laboratory. Selected clinical experience provides opportunity for application of the nursing process to clients' needs during oderate to severe degrees of stress and adaptation. Portions of clinical experience in mental health settings. Nine hours of laboratory per week. Concurrent with Nursing 512. 3 q.h.

# Nursing 620 (Addition) 79-238

Nursing I. Application of nursing process to the needs of holistic man while experiencing varying degrees of stress and adaptation with emphasis on the maternal/child nealth cycle. Concurrent with Nursing 620L. Prerect: Nursing 512 and 512L; Biol. 560; Home Ec. 551. 6 q.h. Nursing 620L (Addition) 79-239
 Nursing I Laboratory: Selected clinical experience provides opportunity for applying nursing process to-clients' needs during varying degrees of stress and adaptation including maternity clients, infants and children. Twelve hours of laboratory per week. Concurrent with Nursing 620. 4 q.h.

Economics 520 (Change) 79-245

Principles of Economics I. Basic principles of economics with emphasis on macro-economics. Introduction to demand and supply analysis. Emphasis on employment theory, and fiscal and monetary policy. 4 q.h.

Economics 622 (Change) 79-246

Principles of Economics III. Economic problems in labor, agriculture, competition andmonopoly, social welfare, up an environment, growth, international trade and linance underdeveloped countries, poverty, and comparative economic systems. Prereq.: 621 3 q.h.
