Theory, Operation and Problems of Labor Organizations.
Contemporary economic theory and operation of labor organizations in maintaining and expanding the economic rights and benefits of the American workers in a dynamic economy. Prerequisite: Econ. 831 or Econ. 833 or Econ. 835 or Mgmt. 750. 4 q.h.

Economics 849 (Addition) 79-258

Seminar/Workshop in Labor Relations. An analysis of selected issues such as union interests in the investment of funds accumulated through private and public pension plans; the effect of multi-national corporations on traditional union tactics and strategies; the effect of wage-price guidelines and controls. Prerequisite: Econ. 831 or Econ. 833 or Econ. 835 or Mgmt. 750. 4 q.h.

Labor Studies 501 (Change) 79-264

Introduction to Organized Labor. An overview of the Labor Studies Program designed to introduce the student to the many facets of the labor movement. 4 q.h.

Labor Studies 502 (Addition) 79-265

History of the Labor Movement. Historical review of the labor movement. Origin of crafts and guilds, rise of industrial unionism, struggle for political effectiveness and labor's civic responsibilities. Crosslisted and identical with History 502. 4 q.h.
