## ACADEMIC SENATE MINUTES

JUNE 1, 1988

## CALL TO ORDER

Dr. Rost, chairman called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MAY 4,1988

The Minutes of the May 4, 1988, meeting were approved as distributed.

It was noted that some faculty received the minutes of the May Senate meeting within 24 hours after the meeting and it was suggested that Senators might like to receive them 24 hours in advance of the meetings.

## REPORT OF SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Dr. Rost reported.
The process of appointing faculty members to Senate Committees and making recommendations for Administrative Committees has been completed. A list of appointments is appended as Exhibit A. Add Greg Claypool as the appointment from Williamson School of Business to the Curriculum Division.

The next Senate meeting will be October 5, 1988, at 4:00 p.m. in DeBartolo Hall. Agenda items are due Monday noon, September 26, 1988.

Copies of Toward the Year 2000: Strategic Agenda for Higher Education, Volumes II and III have been made available to the Academic Planning Committee and the Executive Committee by Dr. Khawaja. See members of those committees if you wish to see a copy.

Dr. Khawaja, Vice Chairman of the Senate and our representative on the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor is in New York at a special conference and has asked me to give his report of their last meeting.

Report of the Faculty Advisory Committee to the Chancellor
I. Khawaja is a member of the Nominating Committee for 1988-89.

A special meeting to study Access/Success report is planned for Fall, 1988. A special orientation session will also be held.

There was discussion of the Master Plan with several observations made (See Appendix $C$ for details).

Dr. Khawaja has also asked me to make the following announcement:

I would like to commend the department/individuals who have chosen to participate in the EESA/OBOR program this year. In 1986 we (YSU) sent one proposal to this program and again in 1987 we only had one entry. This year we have five - from Chemistry, Math/Elementary Education, Geology/Biology, and two from B.E.T. Let us hope that we are able to get all of them funded and continue to participate fully in this program.

## REPORT OF ELECTIONS AND BALLOTING COMMITTEE

B. Gartland reported.

The list of newly elected senators is on the table in the back of the auditorium. (See Appendix $D$ for the list.)

New procedures this year indicated a reluctance of faculty members to place their names on the ballot. It was difficult to get two faculty members to place names on some department ballots.

Chair--In determining the number of at-large Senators from each School, there was a tie between two schools. It was determined that both schools would have that number of Senators. Consequently, there will be 101 Senators for the 1988-89 Academic year.

## REPORT OF ACADEMIC PROGRAMS AND CURRICULUM COMMITTEE, PROGRAMS DIVISION

REPORT OF ACADEMIC RESEARCH COMMITTEE
H. Mettee reported.

Chairman Jalali is conducting a tour.

Please see Agenda Item 878-16 on page 8.
An important task completed this year was approval to provide faculty/staff Research and Consulting profiles for distribution to area businesses and public agencies.

Motion to Recommend to Board of Trustees a Revision of Patent Policy
H. Mettee moved that "The YSU Faculty Senate make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees that the Board consider revising the present patent policy of YSU to incorporate an inventor's share of $50 \%$ of the realized benefits."

Motion seconded by B. Brothers.
This will result in financial remuneration, a stimulation of the local economy, and stimulation of research.
T. Shipka--There are two corrections--Dr. Psenicka's name is misspelled and "Faculty Senate" in the motion should be "Academic Senate."

On substantiate matters, this is an inappropriate Senate action-it violates the Labor Agreement, Article 13.22 which reads: All proceeds which result from faculty research for marketable computer software programs belong to the faculty members unless the research is subsidized by YSU or by an external agency.... Research is considered to be subsidized by YSU only if the faculty members receives a reduction in teaching load, a research professorship, a faculty improvement leave, or a university research council grant for the purpose of conducting research. Under no circumstances shall YSU's share exceed 25\% of the proceeds after the recovery by YSU of the subsidies specified in the contract....

Since this matter is already spoken to in the collective Bargaining Agreement, action should not be taken. We should command the Academic Research Committee for the intent of the motion.
H. Mettee--The Collective Bargaining Agreement is inconsistent with the Board policy most recently promulgated. It was the impression of the committee that this was an appropriate topic for Bargaining during the next round of contract negotiations. Some statements did not distinguish between copyrights and patents.
T. Shipka--The Agreement states that any practice or policies which are in disagreement with the Agreement are superceded. This motion treats faculty members less favorably.

Chair--Do you wish to withdraw the motion?
H. Mettee--It is a Committee motion.

Motion to Table
S. Roberts moved to table the motion. Motion seconded by G. Sutton. Motion Tabled.

## REPORT OF ACADEMIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

R. Krishnan reported.

For years we have been trying to determine what the work of this committee is.

Motion to Discontinue Academic Planning Committee
R. Krishnan moved "That the Academic Planning Committee, as presently constituted, be discontinued." Motion seconded by G. Sutton.

Chair--Approval of this motion would require a ByLaw change. We would have to direct the Charter and ByLaws Committee to bring forth a recommended change in the Charter and ByLaws.

Question--There are two deans and an Academic Provost on this Committee. Could they not make suggestions?

Motion Defeated.
T. Shipka--It might be appropriate to appoint a committee to study the charge of this committee.
T. Alderman--It should be planned carefully in advance.
F. Barger--We should take into account that planning is a five-year process. A three-year committee member is never a part of the planning process. This committee should be an ad hoc committee.

## REPORT OF COMPUTER SERVICES COMMITTEE

A. Messuri reported for L. Slivinske.

Motion to Approve Recommendations Found on Page 13 of the Agenda
D. Messuri moved to recommend the recommendations listed on Page 13 of the Agenda. Motion seconded by B. Campbell. Motion Carried.

## REPORT OF HONORS AND INDIVIDUALIZED CURRICULUM SUBCOMMITTEE

Through June of this year, the program has graduated 44 students. There are 34 new ICPs this year. There are 72 active ICPs:

## HONORS REPORT

Four students signed up for contract honors this year. Fifty students are tentatively enrolled for Fall Honors Seminars; forty-two were enrolled Fall, 1987.

A 700-level Honors seminar has been approved for Spring, 1989. The topic is "Alternatives to Violence."

We need more faculty and department involvement, especially in the 700-level seminars.

We are examining and reexamining what demands are being made on students in Honors programs--enrichment, breadth, depth, rigor, challenges.

This year we met with students in the Honors Program for feedback on the program. The feedback suggests that Honors really needs to be a University program--FUNDED! This means a director with a budget who would have time to effectively recruit, coordinate, and develop Honors activities on this campus. At present the program is boot-legged out of Dean Sutton's time and the Engineering School budget.

Is the University committed to an Honors Program?

## REPORT OF CONTINUING EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE

W. Eichenberger reported.

A survey form was developed and distributed to Chairman to assess departmental attitudes, determine the needs of departments, and examine methods for improving delivery of programs. The surveys were helpful. There was an expressed need
and willingness to work with Continuing Education. There is a concern with the funding method used. It makes many programs cost prohibitive. (See Appendix $E$ for complete report.)

M. DeLost reported.

## REPORT OF ACADEMIC STANDARDS AND EVENTS COMMITTEE

W. Jenkins reported.

I had no idea that plagiarism and cheating were such important issues at YSU. We have to thank Gary Hart and Bill Biden for bringing both to national attention. The Committee has spent six months studying the issue. There are a number of problems with the old procedure:

1. There is a lack of due process
2. The contract mandates a syllabus
3. The contract mandates that only full-time faculty can change a grade but it does not speak to other faculty groups
4. Not much historical data are available

The Committee is making five recommendations--A through E. Each will be made as a separate motion.

Recommendation $A$ deals with due process. We have consulted with YSU's attorney, Jim McCullom. He is here to speak to this issue.

## Statement by Jim McCullom

I promised to give a brief brief.
There is a fine line between the faculty's interest in the right to academic freedom and a student's right to due process. We must achieve a delicate balance between both areas. A student's right is a protectable interest covered by the U. S. Constitution and Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Ohio. The present process at YSU is arbitrary, capricious, and unconscionable. Students are denied the right to due process. The process has to provide a remedy to exonerate the individual.

The Committee also issued a statement relative to the. syllabus. The syllabus is an implied contract which gives students rights.
W. Jenkins--The proposal found on Page 29 of the Agenda was highlighted.

It is more appropriate to handle academic matters through the Student Academic Grievances Subcommittee. This body should develop experience in handling cases of this type. Presently, it is possible that a case may be going through two difference bodies at the same time--the Student Academic Grievances Subcommittee and the Student Discipline Board.

The area of due process is fairly complicated. We need to establish principles. This proposal will leave it up to the Vice President of Student Services to develop procedures. The proposal does provide the power to use sanctions and to provide a remedy.

Motion to Approve Proposal A Found on Page 29 of the Agenda
W. Jenkins moved "To approve Proposal A found on Page 29 on the Agenda." Motion seconded by D. Byo.

Chair--If this motion is approved, it will be understood that the Charter and ByLaws Committee will be instructed to make recommendations to change the Charter and ByLaws.
R. Tabak--I wish to offer an amendment.

## Motion to Amend Proposal A

R. Tabak moved to amend Item 4, Page 29 to read: "In cases involving academic dishonesty, the Student Academic Grievance Subcommittee will hold a due process hearing and consult with the affected department. By a simple majority vote, this committee may change any grade assigned on the basis of the faculty member's presumption of academic dishonesty to a W. By a $2 / 3$ majority vote, this committee may send the student's case back to the faculty members's home department for a final determination of either a grade of $C R$ (credit) or an $\underline{A}, \underline{B}, \underline{C}, \underline{D}$, or $I$. If this occurs, a three-person subcommittee will be chosen by lot from all full-service faculty members of that department, including the chair but excluding the involved faculty member. They will render a final decision within one week. If the S.A.G.S. disagrees with the department's decision, they may change the grade either to a $W$, or a CR; however, they may not assign a letter grade." Motion seconded by M. Loud.

The rationale for this amendment is that the committee may not collectively have the academic background necessary to pass the course and yet the proposal allows them to recommend a grade change.
T. Shipka--In securing a remedy, we should have clarity and simplicity. The proposed amendment will involve a lengthy process. Until the proposed process is found to be inadequate, we should use it.
G. Sutton--Drawing by lot from a large department would not be much better than an at-large committee.
T. Alderman--I want to speak against the amendment. It may lead to an exhaustive effort to contribute information and judgments.
D. Robinson--What does "presumption of the faculty member" mean? "Presumption" has a rather clear meaning in judicatory terminology.
-------The amendment does not make it easier to deal with this issue; it will make the committee more inefficient.
G. Leck--A change of grade should be recommended by knowledgeable faculty.
T. Shipka--The majority of this body (the Senate) are faculty. If the grade change policy is abused, it is a simple matter to amend it.
B. Brothers--The proposal is specific to a grade change in the area of academic dishonesty.

Motion to Amend Failed.
D. Hovey--The previous discussion highlights the confusion between dishonesty issues and grievance issues. We need two separate bodies.
W. Jenkins--That is the problem. There could be two venues.
D. Hovey--Will the Student Discipline Board continue to hear matters involving discipline.

Answer--The Student Discipline Board will continue to hear cases involving fighting, theft, etc.--everything but academic dishonesty.
S. Roberts--What, if any, constraints are in Item 4? Are you making a distinction between a paper and a course?
W. Jenkins--It only deals with areas of academic dishonesty. You could change either or both.
F. Barger--The proposal states the committee shall mandate a change. To mandate a change can mean to mandate an order to change the grade. There is no need to indicate the person. The committee has the power to mandate the grade change.
W. Jenkins--We are establishing a policy.
F. Barger--The committee is empowered to change a grade.
W. Jenkins--Yes, due process requires it.
H. Earnhart--This committee is getting a lot of attention. How will members be selected?

Chair--There is no proposed change in the way members are selected. There are six faculty members, six student members, and one exofficio administrative member.
W. Jenkins--This question should be raised under Proposal C.
S. Roberts--Could you enlighten us as to why you chose to assign the task of developing procedures of the area of the Vice President of Student Services.

Answer--Under the present Code, it is the Vice President of Student Services who recommends updates regarding this area. Under Proposal C, it is recommended that the Vice President of Student Services chair the committee.
D. Hovey--I wonder about academic dishonesty instances that do not result in a grade change. What about the student who takes an exam for another student? Which committee will process this student? What about people who sell papers?
W. Jenkins--Students are covered by this procedure. Nonstudents are not covered by this policy.
D. Robinson--I have a request for clarification. Am I correct in inferring that transfer of authority will take place only after Item 2 takes place?

Answer--Yes.
Question--What about the matter of exonerating a student? In most cases the student is found "not guilty" because of insufficient evidence. If a student is not convicted because of insufficient evidence, this will preclude the inclusion of previous charges.
W. Jenkins--I do not think this precludes the Vice President from keeping a log of activities.
P. Baldino--The facts in a case should determine guilt; guilt should not be determined by past performance.
V. Richley--The proposal separates discipline and academics.

Motion Carried.
Motion to Approve Proposal B Found on Page 30 of the Agenda
W. Jenkins moved "Approval of Proposal B as found on Page 30 of the Agenda."

In writing this proposal, the committee recognized the fact that circumstances may warrant changes in the syllabus; e.g., a book does not arrive at the book store. It was thought the committee could take these circumstances into consideration. The intent of the proposal is that the spirit of the syllabus must be followed. The grade change applies only to the changes made in the grading scale and grade weight distribution.
G. Sutton--The Agreement states that a faculty member shall return a significant graded item before the drop date. Presently, most students assume that in the absence of a graded returned item, this means a "C" for the course. There should be a statement regarding this issue in the motion.
T. Alderman--I disagree with the Dean. This should be a separate procedure and a separate item.

## Motion Carried.

Motion to Approve Proposal C Found on Page 31 of the Agenda
W. Jenkins moved "Approval of Proposal C found on Page 31 of the Agenda." M. Robinson seconded the motion.

The Vice President of Student Services will be designated chairperson of the committee. That individual will maintain records. (Presently few records exist.)

The procedures provides for a substitute for the instructor if necessary and it limits the grievance time period.

There is an absence of a process to change the committee structure. No change is recommended because the survey shows that the majority who returned it favor the present structure and it was decided to see if the procedure works before a change is recommended.
R. Tabak--I want to offer an amendment to the motion that will modify the structure of the committee.

Motion to Amend to Modify the Committee Structure
"Sections presently labeled 1,2,3 and 4 will be relabeled 2, 3, 4, and 5, respectively. Section 1 will then read:
1.(a) There will be one full-service faculty member elected from each school/college by the faculty of his/her school/college. Their terms of office will be two years, starting September 25. To insure continuity, for the first election the Elections and Balloting Committee will determine by lot which of the three school/college representatives will have one-year terms. If a faculty member resigned, he/she will be replaced by the first runner-up in the last election, etc. If no replacements are available, a new election will be held to fill the position.
(b) Two student members will be appointed by Student Council for terms of one year, beginning September 15.
(c) The ninth member of the S.A.G.S. will be the vice President of Student Services of his/her designee."

## Amendment died because of lack of a second.

G. Leck--Student Services is usually an advocate for students. Why is the Vice President of Student Services chairing this committee? An explanation was given, but the Code does not cover academic matters.
W. Jenkins--This point was not discussed.
T. Alderman--I urge support for this motion. The Vice President for Student Services votes only in the case of a tie. It makes sense based on what Dr. Jenkins has said. We will also be watching this closely.
G. Leck--Which Vice President keeps records?

Answer--Beginning July 1, records will be under Vice President of Student Services.
B. Brothers--I am concerned about representation.
W. Jenkins--The survey listed two choices. Majority favored present distribution.
H. Earnhart--People elected to this committee should have a genuine interest. This committee is important.

Chair--The Senate Executive Committee is responsible for selecting members. Chairmen of committees are polled to determine who is participating. Members can be removed.
J. Conser--Does this modify the 12-day rule?

Answer--It modifies the $12-d a y$ rule.
Comment--A faculty member may be represented at this meeting by a person of his/her designation. The administrative person is concerned with student rights; the faculty concern relates to guaranteeing rights to faculty.
D. Robinson--An amendment may not be necessary. We are lumping two trials into the same court. Set the same procedures. There is a procedure in place for trying teachers which involves representation.
W. Jenkins--We are assuming faculty rights and students rights would be covered in Item 2 of Proposal A.
B. Brothers--Isn't this a right?
S. Roberts--Where is it written?
T. Alderman--I believe it is there.
T. Shipka--I support Dr. Alderman's statement.

Motion to amend carried.
D. Robinson--A procedure for trying teachers will run into trouble with the Bargaining Unit.
M. Loud--Under Item 3, why can a person refuse to defend herself/himself? If a person chooses to refuse to defend themselves, it is a tacit admission of wrong doing. Appointing colleagues may cause a problem.

## Motion to Amend

M. Loud moved to add "If a person refuses to participate in the process, the committee should find for the student. If the faculty member cannot participate, then the department should provide a representative."

There was no second.
B. Campbell--In Item 4, is it not a problem for a student to file a grievance when the faculty member may have destroyed records.
W. Jenkins--Faculty members must keep records 60 days.

Motion Carried.

## ADJOURNMENT

D. Hovey--Point of Order. Is there a quorum?

Chair checked for a quorum. There were 39 present. Meeting adjourned.

Report of FAC's Meeting on May 25, 1988

Morning Session:
1988/89 Nominations: Nominating Committee consisting of I. Khawaja, (Chairman), I. Rakowsky, and R. Rolwing was appointed. Nominations for the officers are to be submitted in July.

Special Meeting: A special meeting to study the Access/Success report is planned for fall 88.

Master Plan: Several observations made were: 1) Plan is rather narrow in its focus (Ohio) internationalization is somewhat neglected, 2) Science seems to be treated only as a part of technology and is not very well integrated into liberal arts, 3) Undergraduate education has to be given greater attention - desirability of having at least a certain percentage of classes taught by full-time faculty (vs. graduate students, etc.), 4) Findings of student access and success report should be woven more clearly into the plan.

Orientation: It was agreed that a special 9:30 a.m. meeting will be held for Orientation purposes.

Afternoon Session:
Master Plan: Chancellor indicated that he did not lave any specific items for discussion and would like to spend the time on the Master Plan. In addition to the observations made during the morning session discussion of the Master Plan included the question: Should there be a system of outcomes measurement? Chancellor noted his opposition to any system of centralized measurement. He stated that in order to improve quality the present system of incentives (excellence programs) is better than a system of greater regulations based upon testing, etc.

The meetings of the Subcommittee on Continuing Education have been spent on the project of developing a master plan for continuing education, began by the 1986-87 Committee. This academic year was devoted primarily to the development of a survey instrument, subsequently distributed to department chairpersons. The intent of this survey was to:
o assess departmental attitudes toward continuing education

- identify areas of interest and need among academic departments for the services of continuing education
- entertain recommendations for improving the delivery of continuing education service to the departments

The Committee wishes to thank the department chairpersons for participating in this survey and for the very useful comments that they made.

Based upon preliminary analysis of the survey data one broad conclusion may be drawn:

While many department chairpersons indicated a need and a willingness to work with Continuing Education in courses, conferences or seminars, there was also a concern that the method of funding Continuing Education programs in many instances made the costs prohibitive.

This is one of several questions that should be studied by next years subcommittee.
