### <u>Supporting Statements for:</u> Motion on Academic Deficiencies

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- 1] The current practice at YSU is to, in essence, not count credit hours earned by students to satisfy deficiencies from their high school years. The fact that we add hours to a student's graduation requirements seems punitive; and unnecessarily so. The Academic Standards Committee believes this practice to be unfair. Fundamentally, the Committee believes that if a students is in a university course, they should receive university credit.
- The Academic Standards Committee believes that the experiences in the courses designed for unconditional admission to YSU are the important issue. The Committee believes students should take courses not taken in high school to have the "required" experiences.
- The Academic Standards Committee recognizes that in many classes there are students who are receiving university credit, some students who are not receiving university credit, and high school students who receive both high school and university credit. This treats students in different ways who are taking the same course.
- 4] English and Mathematics requirements are currently addressed.
  English through the placement test and Mathematics through the recent policy adopted by the Academic Senate.
- 5] The dean is the appropriate academic officer to make determinations about placement of the academic hours taken to meet high school deficiencies.

- 1] In order to facilitate the admission of students from nonchartered schools, the Academic Standards Committee believes establishing a minimum score on the ACT test for unconditional admission to be an appropriate guideline for the Admissions Office.
- The Academic Standards Committee also believes it appropriate to have the appropriate chair or dean review a student's academic record <u>if they score less than 20 on the ACT</u> prior to admission to the university. These decisions are best placed in the academic sector of the university.
- 3] These guidelines will facilitate enrollment for students from nonchartered schools -- whether their admission is conditional or unconditional.

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# <u>Supporting Statements for:</u> Motion on Student Credit Hour Enrollment

- 1] In order to facilitate appropriate students' academic loads, the university already has a method of restricting the number of hours a student may take before needing permission of someone in addition to an advisor. Currently this limit is 26 quarter hours (6 1/2 full classes). The Academic Standards Committee believes the limit of 26 hours to be too high.
- 2] As a result we are recommending dropping this limit to restricting a student to 20 hours or more. Students would then need the approval of the appropriate department chair and appropriate dean.
- 3] Adding the chair's signature to this process is appropriate because that person has responsibility for attesting to the academic record of students as they prepare to graduate.

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# <u>Supporting Statements for:</u> <u>Motion on Experiential Learning</u>

- 1] As a result of the recommendations forwarded by the ad hoc committee on experiential learning and discussions of the various types of credit that is and/or can be gained by students, the Academic Standards Committee believes it important to secure initial Academic Senate support for the idea of awarding credit through experiential learning. This initial support is important due to the amount of research and effort required to design an appropriate program tailored to Youngstown State.
- 2] No specific approach to awarding this kind of credit has been decided upon. Some alternatives have been discussed briefly.
- 3] Initial discussions centered on the kinds of academic credit already awarded by YSU. These include:
  - credit by exam

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- advanced placement
- technical credits in medical-related fields (credit by award, not test)
- 4} YSU does not currently accept experiential learning. We do accept transfer credits earned through CLEP; although our students cannot earn those same credits here.

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# <u>Supporting Statements for:</u> <u>Informational Report on Plus/ Minus Grading</u>

- 1] There is some support for converting the current grading system at YSU to a plus/minus system. There is also some opposition to this conversion. These conclusions come from the results of the faculty survey. Faculty pointed out advantages and disadvantages of both approaches to grading.
- 2] There is not consensus on the Academic Standards Committee regarding a favorable or unfavorable recommendation about plus/minus grading system.
- 3] The Committee agreed to do additional fact-finding about the plus/minus grading system. For example, what is the impact on grade distributions of a plus/minus grading system? Data will be collected from colleges and universities currently using the plus/minus system.
- 4] Conversion to a plus/minus grading system could be handled fairly easily by the computer center; with only a small change in the current grade scan sheet.
- 5] The Academic Standards Committee will report to the full Senate during the 1995-1996 year on their findings regarding plus/minus grading.
