Call to Order: Senate Chairperson Sunil Ahuja called the meeting to order at 4:08 p.m.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting:

Report from President Sweet:

I would like to report on a few items before introducing the Chairperson of our Board of Trustees, John Pogue:

The Provost search committee is coming together. By the end of week, all members will be identified. Joe Edwards will chair this committee. John Pogue will mention the activities of the Northeast Ohio Universities Collaboration and Innovation Study Commission. Their work will likely be completed by end of this month. Planning continues for a Community College, in consultation with Chancellor; I have a meeting with him on December 20th. Alto, the Chancellor's master plan is beginning to emerge. A website is available, and comments and input are being solicited. The Board of Trustees will meet on December 12. One item will be allocation of funds resulting from increase in enrollment. The modified budget will include recommendations for increases including \$250,000 more for student wages, \$250,000 for the Provost for part of the Academic Strategic Plan implementation, and \$120,000 to support an academic space initiative. Thank you for a good semester, and best wishes for the holiday season. I would now like to introduce the Chairperson of our Board of Trustees, John Pogue.

Report from Trustees Chairperson John Pogue:

I am honored to be here today. I've come to appreciate that the success of the enterprise depends on the time and planning of all of us. Over the last 7 months, I've been a member of the Northeast Ohio Universities Collaboration and Innovation Study Commission. We've been looking at ways at the five universities can combine operations to work more efficiently. Their report should be out in a few weeks. Some of the ideas discussed have included collaborating with university data, purchasing, creating an online university, and possibly a common calendar. A good thing is the verification that our universities are operating efficiently. There have been a number of positive things to come out of this: By talking about collaboration, we have found ways to do so and to move toward collaboration. It verifies that we have had some success, and that we can be both effective and efficient. Two general consensus conclusions have emerged: (1) The concept of P-16 education, beginning in pre-school and continuing all the way through the university level. Stark county has already started in that direction; (2) We should have a Community College in Mahoning County, and I believe that will come to pass in some form. Chancellor Fingerhut is likely to be more aggressive than our report. We don't know what he can sell to the Legislature and the Governor. But I do believe there is a correlation between economic success and higher education. This seems to be a consensus even between a Republican Legislature and a Democratic Governor.

There are going to be changes. It is vital for you as faculty to participate in this. This report is not going to be one that sits on a shelf and gathers dust. What will be the role that YSU plays and that we play as individuals? I'm not sure, but I hope that in the coming months you will participate in the discussions and offer your opinions, because your ideas are very important.

Senate Executive Committee (SEC) / Report from the Chair: Sunil Ahuja, Chair of the Senate, reported:

There are two parts to my report: (1) a report from the Senate Executive Committee and (2) a report from the Ohio Faculty Council.

1. Report from the Senate Executive Committee: The Senate Executive Committee met last Wednesday, November 28. The committee spent about half the time discussing several campus and statewide

issues, issues that have been addressed in the Senate before: the work of the Northeast Ohio Commission, the Chancellor's 10-year Master Plan, and the community college. The committee discussed possible scenarios emerging from these initiatives and awaits details from the various groups making the recommendations. The other half of the committee's meeting was spent on proposed changes to the university's sexual harassment policy. These changes are being initiated by the Office of Equal Opportunity and Diversity, and Yulanda McCarty-Harris, the director of that office, was present to discuss these changes. The changes are aimed at further defining the scope of sexual harassment and refining the procedures to deal with sexual harassment issues. These changes, if approved, will be changes to a Board of Trustees policy, not a Senate policy. She sought the committee's input on a draft proposal, which the committee gave and will continue to give, and the document itself is still a work in progress.

2. Report from the Ohio Faculty Council: As I mentioned at the last Senate meeting, at my invitation, Bruce Johnson, the president of the IUC, spoke to the Ohio Faculty Council at its November meeting. He spoke of IUC's goals as they relate to the chancellor's pending 10-year Master Plan: affordability, accountability, and quality. As far as the IUC is concerned, the goals of the strategic plan should be twofold: valuing higher education and investing in higher education. He noted that the strategic process needs to be tied to the budget process. He spoke of mission differentiation and centers of excellence as the two likely outcomes of the chancellor's 10-year plan. On the issue of regional campuses vs. community colleges, he indicated that the chancellor's plan will probably call for all associate degrees to be offered at community colleges. Regional campuses may be asked to have more bachelors' degrees. On governance issues though (where community colleges ought to be and what ought to be done with regional campuses, etc.), he indicated that those matters will likely be dealt with on a one-on-one basis between the chancellor and individual universities. Finally, on SB 151, he noted that the current version is "dead." The Ohio Faculty Council will meet again next Friday, December 14, and Chancellor Fingerhut will probably be the guest speaker again.

New business:

1. Bege Bowers reported that the Ohio Board of Regents has been revising its program approval process. We are asking them for clarification on how this will affect our procedures. Material on this is available on the OBOR website. It looks as if we will have to get approval earlier from OBOR before proceeding with program proposals.

- 2. Mike Theall reported on a survey of faculty roles, skills, and work: What we do with this survey will be added to others across the country. We are hoping for a very large response. We hope to examine differences across institutional types and other demographics. Please take part and encourage your colleagues to do so as well.
- 3. Mark Vopat introduced the following resolution to refer to committee issues regarding electronic classrooms and moved that it be adopted:

RESOLUTION CONERNING THE FAIR USE AND PROTECTION OF ELECTRONIC CLASSROOMS

DECEMBER 5, 2007

WHEREAS, there is an increasing need for electronic classrooms, defined as those containing computers, interactive whiteboards, projection systems, instructor stations, or other electronic devices whose primary purpose is the support of in-class instruction in those rooms; and

WHEREAS, the burden for funding those classrooms is often placed on one or more academic departments; and

WHEREAS, the legitimate concerns of those departments for protecting the safety and integrity of the electronic systems contained therein often results in the under-utilization of those classrooms by other departments; and

WHEREAS, a fair and workable policy is needed for current and future classrooms of this type, so as to find a reasonable compromise between utilization and adequate protection and supervision;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the matters of creation, funding sources, fair use, scheduling, protection, and supervision of electronic classrooms be referred to an ad hoc committee or to one of the standing committees of the Academic Senate, as determined by the Chairperson of the Senate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the committee receiving these issues shall submit a report with findings and recommendations to the Academic Senate at the April 2008 Senate meeting.

Discussion: Vern Haynes: I speak in favor of the resolution. I've been involved in battles in the past over who will buy, maintain, and repair equipment for classrooms. Some of our classrooms were funded and then given to Youngstown Early College. We are wasting a lot of time inventing the wheel over and over again in many departments.

A vote was taken on the motion to adopt the resolution. Motion passed unanimously.
