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**Call to Order:** Senate Chairperson Chet Cooper called the meeting to order at 4:06 p.m.

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**Minutes of the Previous Meeting:**

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**Report from President Sweet:**

We are on a course to respond in late November regarding mission and focus as part of the Chancellor's plan.

There is a meeting tomorrow of the Governance Committee. Chancellor Fingerhut and Roy Church will be unveiling their plan for implementing a community college by Fall 2009. There are 3 sections in the ORC dealing with community colleges. One on community colleges, one on technical colleges, and one on state community colleges. Most of the ones we currently have are state community colleges. The proposal will be to organize the new community college under 3354. The basis for the concept to be announced tomorrow is to ask the legislature to expand the area of Jefferson Community College to three other counties to form an area community college. The counties will include Jefferson, Columbiana, Mahoning, and Trumbull.

As for governance, it appears that they will propose a 13-member board, including representation from all four counties.

There is plenty of space at the Southwoods complex to use for a community college. We would be eager to work with Roy Church to establish that as a center. The initial focus will be on associate degree programs not found elsewhere locally and that satisfy an area need.

This is not "our" proposal. It is emerging from the interactions and productive discussions of the planning committee, the Chancellor, and others.

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**Senate Executive Committee (SEC) / Report from the Chair: Chet Cooper, Chair of the Senate, reported:**

As is the usual custom, I will combine the reports of the Chair and that of the Senate Executive Committee.

The various committees of the Academic Senate are very busy at present and today we will receive reports from a few. A number of committees are hard at work addressing the charges placed upon them by the Senate Executive Committee.

The Academic Standards Committee has been working on the following:

- a) a re-evaluation of the "C or better" standard for courses in a major, a policy that was passed during the last academic year;
- b) the promotion of greater campus involvement and commitment to internships, service learning, and civic engagement; and
- c) examination of proposals for English requirements of foreign applicants.

The Charters and Bylaws committee is currently considering actions to:

- a) update the Senate Charter and Bylaws; and
- b) examine possible committee changes to include combining or dissolving some committees as well as adding a committee on assessment and professional development.

The University Curriculum committee is considering the feasibility to move course proposals and changes from a paper system to an on-line system. They will work with other committees as necessary to move forward on this project.

In addition, I have communicated with chair of the Academic Events committee the desire of the University Events Management office that the Academic Senate and University faculty take a more pro-active role in the various graduation ceremonies. The goal is for the University faculty to take ownership of these very important events.

Although most of the Senate's committees have met, several apparently have not yet come together or have yet to notify Secretary Hogue and myself of their elected chairs. These committees include Academic Planning, Integrated Technologies, Library, and University Outreach. It would be greatly appreciated by the Senate Executive Committee if these four groups would meet, select their chair, and report their activities to Secretary Hogue before the next meeting of the Senate.

There have been several events of note that have transpired since the last meeting of the Academic Senate. First, as most of you are aware, Chancellor Fingerhut visited the campus nearly three weeks ago and met with various campus groups, including faculty. A brief report of that meeting is included in today's agenda and will be summarized in a few minutes by Dr. Tammy King. On Monday of this week, Dr. King and I attended a briefing session held by President Sweet to update our local state legislators. Without going too much into detail, I can confidently say that our University is held in great esteem by our government representatives who pledged their continuing support for the academic and fiscal well being of this institution. Finally, this past Friday, the Senate held the year's first "Civility Hour". It was well attended as well as enjoyed by all. In fact, I met one of YSU's non-traditional students who attended her first "Civility Hour". She came to "see what we (faculty, staff, and students) were all about". She had a great many questions and concerns, but by meeting and chatting with me, Dr. Sweet, Student Government President Michael McGiffin, and others, it was my impression that she came away with very positive feelings towards the University and its promise to keep students first and foremost in its mission. In my opinion, this single series of conversations with one concerned individual validates not only the importance of "Civility Hour", but also its success. Another "Civility Hour" event will take place soon with the date and time to be announced. We hope to have a new name for it as well, and we are still taking suggestions which can be sent to me. Nonetheless, watch for the email announcement of the next "Civility Hour".

As a reminder, I wish to note that the next Senate meeting will be on Wednesday, November 12th, NOT November 5th.

Finally, to conclude my report, I wish to announce the formation of an Ad Hoc Committee on Academic Engagement in Sustainability Issues.

Global environmental changes hold the potential for significant adverse sociological, economical, and ecological effects. These effects are not limited to the world outside academia. Therefore, it is incumbent upon colleges and universities to responsibly exercise leadership to address the imminent environmental challenges to our communities. In particular, institutions of higher education must meet headlong issues pertaining to sustainability, that is, fulfilling the requirements of the present without compromising the needs of future generations.

YSU has made significant strides towards addressing local environmental and sustainability issues, but additional efforts must be taken to be an even more effective community leader. The latter is a growing concern among many students, faculty, and staff. Because it is important for YSU's academic enterprise to influence these issues, I am forming an ad hoc committee with the following charges:

1. Examine current YSU practices and policies related to sustainability;
2. Assess how the academic community can integrate topics related to sustainability into the curriculum;  
and
3. Propose reasonable and effective modifications or additions to current practices and policies that will promote YSU's leadership in sustainability.

I am in the process of appointing members to this committee that will be chaired by Dr. Martin Abraham, Dean of the STEM college. Other individuals who have accepted my invitation to serve on this committee include Dr. Felicia Armstrong, Ms. Jean Engle, Mr. Gary Davenport, and Mr. John Hyden. I anticipate appointing approximately 10 persons to this committee.

I am asking that the committee make their initial report to the Academic Senate no later than the December

3rd meeting.

This concludes my report to the Senate.

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**Ohio Faculty Council Report:** **Tammy King** reported. The minutes of the latest meeting are contained in [Attachment 1](#).

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**Report on Voluntary System of Accountability:** **Tom Maraffa** reported. One of the important words today in higher education is *accountability*. Funding will now be based more on course completions and graduation than student counts. Universities are being mandated to take part in the Voluntary System of Accountability. We will have a “college portrait” posted on the VSA website. We have no control over the appearance of that portrait. But what is desired is to have a consistent frame of reference for these portraits.

A part of the VSA is testing of students. We are required to give tests to incoming and graduating students to gauge what they have learned. Also on November 30, we have to report how YSU will contribute to the VSA effort. A committee is already studying that.

Finally, this is an institutional effort combining the work of a number of divisions within the University. It will require cooperation from across campus.

**Julia Gergits:** The NSSA and CLA are two tests that we will be doing. We will need input on how best to manage this. We can’t opt out of doing this. NSSA is given a lot of credit nationally. It covers such items as satisfaction, amount of group work, co-curricular activities, etc. It’s a 20-minute test and is fairly easy to give.

However, the CLA is a longer test that examines writing and critical thinking. It takes 90 minutes and involves students reading various pieces and reacting analytically to them. Freshmen are tested in the Fall and Seniors in Spring.

**Sharon Stringer:** We are here to open the discussion, and not just for today. We will need ideas on methods and locations for giving these tests.

**Gary Salvner:** How large of a sample will be used? **Sharon Stringer:** The minimum is 100, and we must use a random sample. Some universities are doing a lot more, but of course there are other costs associated with that.

**Report from Gary Salvner on policy for the Composition Placement Test: Nate Ritchey and I came to the Senate last Spring to report the new placement guidelines established by the Board of Regents. The Senate already passed new guidelines for the Mathematics placement test, and we are here today to present our proposal for new guidelines for the Composition Placement Test. The full text of the new guidelines is contained in [Attachment 4](#).**

**Shearle Furnish moved that the Senate approve the proposed policy as contained in Attachment 2 for incoming students beginning with the Spring 2009 term. Seconded by Vern Haynes. After discussion and a question-and-answer session, a vote was taken on the motion. Motion passed.**

**August 8, 2008**

- I. Minutes were reviewed and approved from the June 13, 2008, meeting.
  
- II. New Business
  - \$ The Counsel discussed the fact that the OFC is not an “officially” recognized body via administrative mandate nor in the Ohio Administrative Code. The group decided to bring this issue to the Chancellor’s attention. According to Chairperson Cuppoletti, the OFC was created by OBOR, but not in an official capacity.
  - \$ A member of the OFC reported on the activities of the Senior to Sophomore Advisory Group. The group’s primary goal is to increase the number of Ohio students who have one semester of college credits before entering college from 5% to 20%. They also discussed tuition issues concerning these course and the location where the college courses would be taught and by whom.
  - \$ Chairperson Cuppoletti then reported that a bill on textbook costs had passed the U.S. House this week and was going to the Senate. *(Note: details concerning the bill will be presented at the next Academic Senate meeting)*

**Chancellor Fingerhut spoke with the Committee. Below is a summary of that meeting:**

- \$ The Chancellor announced that the “Choose Ohio First” Scholarship Program had awarded \$50 million in the first year with the goal of increasing the number of STEM graduates. These awards were based on the university’s quality of their STEM programs. The Chancellor commented that many universities did not have adequate input from the faculty and he wanted this to change in year two proposals submitted.
- \$ The Chancellor’s office is developing a budget for the next biennium starting in 2009. They were looking at changes in the funding formulas in an effort to assure that the budget is inline with the university state system’s strategic plan.
- \$ The Chancellor discussed his three initiatives to help reduce/contain the costs of textbooks:

1. An agreement was made with a digital textbook company for a 10% reduction in textbook costs if materials are purchased from the same company.
2. Grant monies totally \$250,000 (five projects at \$50,000 each) will be awarded to professor to develop course materials in heavily enrolled course. The state would buy the royalties and intellectual property rights so the material would be in the public domain. The state would put the package together and give students electronic copies or sell hard copies at printing costs. *(Note: please see attached e-mail from Chancellor Fingerhut and RFP to apply for these funds)*
3. Faculty innovator awards will be given in the amount of \$10,000 (ten projects at \$1,000 each) to faculty who have already found ways to reduce textbook costs while maintaining quality.

\$ The discussion continued concerning the cost of textbooks. The Chancellor wants to encourage all professors / universities to order early. He also discussed the possibility of using public broadcasting to deliver some types of educational programing.

\$ Chancellor Fingerhut discussed his effort to appoint Board of Trustee members who are committed to the higher education strategic plan.

\$ He announced that his office had hired a new Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Barbara Gellman-Danley. Her many responsibilities will include, but not limited to:

- authority over TAGs
- new programs and other curriculum issues
- meet regularly with the OFC

\$ The OFC website will be maintained by an OBOR staff person in the future - being moved from YSU.

\$ The Chancellor was informed that the OFC had no official standing in the state. He assured the OFC that they would be provided some administrative support and that he would make a directive organizing the OFC officially.

\$ He ended his discussion by focusing on the cost of higher education in the state.

III. Campus reports were given. The following is a summary of information provided:

\$ Ohio U

Considering moving from quarters to semesters. A resolution calling for collective bargaining was introduced in their Faculty Senate in May. It would be reintroduced in September and vote on in October.

\$ Ohio State

Considering moving from quarters to semesters.

\$ Wright

Faculty and administration have reached an agreement on a new contract. They have a new Vice President for development. Considering moving from quarters to semester. They are currently reviewing policies on free speech

\$ Cleveland

Searching for a new President.

\$ Akron

The city is considering leasing their sewer system to a private company and using the profits earned to help fund education.

\$ Youngstown

Three of four unions have reached contract agreements with the YSU administration. Two summer programs, Festival of the Arts, and an honors program featuring STEM programming for highschool students was held this summer. Both were very successful. Dr. A. Bennett, head of NSF, spent a day at YSU opening its new instrumentation laboratory. YSU had been accepted into the NCA accreditation academy.

\$ Bowling Green

They are focusing on the issue of shared governance in the Academic Senate.

\$ Cincinnati

The faculty union and the administration have agreed to take faculty clinicians out of the bargaining unit. It is unclear at this time what will happen to these individuals.
