Report to the President of the College

Subject:

1. Organization of honorary scholarship society for Youngstown College students.

The committee voted to accept the modified constitution of the proposed society. Mr. Doll, committee member in charge of the preparation of the constitution, was requested to put it into its final form and present a copy to the President of the College.

2. The scheme proposed by the College Administrative for systematic student counseling and centralization of counseling records. This was regarded favorably by the committee.

3. Mr. Dykema proposed a system of faculty adviserships. The committee favored having the College Orientation instructors apportion the incoming freshmen among the instructors in the departments in which the freshmen have particular interest. These instructors should make themselves available to the students for whom they are responsible but should not, at the present stage of development, require their students to confer with them. (Mr. Pickard later made a suggestion to the chairman of the committee that appealed as being practicable, namely, that the Registrar assign advisers, so many students to an adviser, and require the students to see those advisers before registration. Later, when a student has chosen a major field, he may be assigned to a member of the department in that field. Would it be advisable to discuss this matter further at this time?)

4. A study of the loads of incoming freshmen with low high school records. It was felt by the committee that the staff of the College Registrar should systematically check the records of all prospective new students and, following a fixed system, balance appropriately, the curricula of the students who have poor high school records. One of the committee members stated that this was successfully done in a certain college that had as many as six-hundred freshmen.

5. Recommendation to the College Coordination Committee:

That College organizations be required to confer with their faculty advisers before setting dates for their meetings.
