# ANNUAL MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE YOUNGSTOWN COLLEGE

Monday Noon, March 27, 1944

Immediately following the adjournment of the annual meeting of members of the Youngstown College held at Noon on Monday, March 27, 1944, the regular annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the College was held, the same persons being present who were present at the annual meeting of members.

Mr. Wick, chairman of the board, presided and asked for a report of the nominating committee as to the nominations of officers of the Youngstown College for the ensuing year.

Mr. Powers, chairman of the nominating committee, reported that the committee had met and wished to place the following candidates in nomination:

Vice Chairman - - W. E. Bliss

Vice Chairman - - J. C. Argetsinger / President - - Dr. Howard W. Jones

Treasurer -- Carl W. Ullman Secretary -- Hugh W. Manchester

At that point, Mr. Wick asked Mr. Lynn to take the chair.

Upon motion by Mr. Collins, seconded by Mr. Murray and duly care ed, the nominations were closed and the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the candidates nominated.

Mr. Wick also voiced the thanks and appreciation of the Board and its members to the group which has contributed to The Friends of the Youngstown College Library. He also expressed the appreciation of the board for the efforts and work done on behalf of the college by the Gridiron Club. Mr. Mauthe reported that the Gridiron Club was dormant for the time being but would become active as soon as athletics were resumed.

Mr. Wick reported that he had asked Mr. Purnell, Dr. Bunn and Mr. Strouss to serve with Mr. Maag, as chairman, on the building committee and that Mr. Purnell had accepted the appointment and that he hoped that Dr. Bunn and Mr. Strouss would likewise accept appointment to that committee.

Mr. Wick also expressed the gratitude and appreciation of the board to the trustees of the Rayen School, who include Mr. Maag, Mr. Bennett and Mr. McKay as well as others for their assurance that they would undertake the necessary steps, including court action, to secure a finding that the college could be included as a beneficiary under the terms of the Rayen will and could use the Rayen school building for a school of engineering.

He pointed out that the reduction in enrollment was due not only to the entrance of men into military services but was also due to the employment of many girls in various government activities and he stated that there was much uncertainty as to enrollment for the Fall Term.

Mr. Maag, chairman of The Friends of Youngstown College Library, reported that in excess of \$4,000.00 has been received in this year's campaign to date.

Dr. Jones reported a gift of an X-ray machine by Republic Steel Corporation to the college to be used in the engineering laboratories and a gift of about \$1200.00 worth of new electrical equipment to the college by The Westinghouse Electrical and Manufacturing Company. He commented upon the usefulness of this equipment and pointed out that should the college operate an institute for specialized training, it could be used in such work as well as in the regular engineering work of the college.

Dr. Jones reported that there had been paid into the Expansion Fund of the college, the sum of \$170,750.00, of which \$150,000.00 has been invested in 7/8% Government Bonds. Of the remainder, \$15,188.29 is to be paid or credited to the Young Mcn's Christian Association for the Thomas property. He also reported that additional contributions to the fund, which will amount to from \$20,000.00 to \$25,000.00, have been promised and will probably be paid during the year 1944.
