2. Financial Statements

An estimate of a surplus for the fiscal school year which ends July 1st, 1933, is from \$9,000.00 to \$9500.00. The actual surplus on May 1st, 1933, was \$10784.90.

3. Scholarships

In order to increase their enrollment and to appeal to outstanding students and also to assist students financially most colleges give scholarships. These scholarships usually run from \$100 to \$300 each. Many colleges have funds which have been raised specifically for scholarship purposes while others raise scholarship money each year. In a number of schools where they do not have a sufficiently large amount of money for scholarships the Board of the college gives the executive head of the respective institution the right to award a limited amount of scholarship money from the general fund of the school, which really amounts to lowering the tuition rate for a limited number of outstanding students. Since Youngstown College has no scholarship money I would, therefore, like to recommend to the Board as Director of this School, that I be authorized to award scholarships which would aggregate no more than \$1000.00 and which in no specific instance would be more than \$50.00 per student. This would better enable us to compete with the surrounding colleges all of which are offering scholarships to outstanding prospective students and at the same time we would be making some recognition of scholastic attainment.

ZOUNGSTOWN COLLEGE SCHOLLARSHIE

There shall be twenty scholarships of fifty dollars (\$50.00) each.

These shall be divided into two general groups of ten each. One of these groups shall be apportioned to Youngstown students. The other to the territory contiguous to the city.

In awarding these scholarships the following general principles shall govern:

Five of each group of ten shall be assigned to grade "A" students. Within the range of such standing, character, personality, physique, need and leadership qualities shall be taken into serious consideration. The other five of each group shall be awarded to grade "B" students. Within the range of such standing, character, personality, need, physique and leadership qualities shall be taken into serious consideration.

These twenty scholarships shall be confined to freshmen students of the College.

The Director of the College and a Faculty Committee appointed by him shall have complete jurisdiction in making these scholarship awards.
