REPORT
ON THE PARTICIPATION OF
PROFESSOR ASTRIK L. GABRIEL
IN THE
XVth INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF HISTORICAL SCIENCES
HELD IN BUCHAREST, RUMANIA
ON AUGUST 9 - 17, 1980

Aided by a partial travel grant from the American Council of Learned Societies (hereafter ACLS), Professor A. L. Gabriel departed from the University of Notre Dame with Trans World Airlines on August 6 through New York City for Frankfurt-am-Main, and thereafter to Bucharest. He registered in the Intercontinental Hotel, a subsidiary of Pan American Airways, where most of the luncheon-entertainments were hosted by the Presidents of the various Commissions and National Delegations.

I. Meeting of the General Assembly (Bureau)

On August 9, Professor Gabriel attended the full-day session of the General Assembly, which consisted of the representative members of each participating nation and of the presidents of the Affiliated Commissions, such as the International Commission for the History of Universities, which is presided by Professor A. L. Gabriel. After the presentation of credentials the meeting was opened in the "Jorga Theater," named for the Rumanian historian Jorga, who was known by the Grantee during his student years in Paris (1932-1936) at the Bibliothèque Nationale.

After hearing the report of the Secretary General Michel Francois and his recommendation for the admittance of the People's Republic of China into the International Committee of Historical Sciences (hereafter ICHS), the most important items on the Agenda were:

- a) Election of the New Officers;
- b) Selection of the Site of the 1985 Meeting.

a) Elections

The balloting was expertly marked by Gordon Craig (USA), first Vice President, wearing a cowboy tie and looking unmistakably if not from Stanford than definitely from the West.

Maintaining the present trend, Helene Ahrweiler, a Byzantinist scholar and President of the University of Paris I (headquartered in the old Pantheon Building of the Faculty of Law of the University of Paris) was elected to the very outstanding office of the Secretary General.

For President the majority of the votes were cast for a Polish scholar, Aleksander Gieysztor, of the University of Warsaw, a real wandering scholar who has traveled from Poland to France to Italy to England to the United States and to the Soviet Union. No inhabited territory of the globe is unknown to him. The present Grantee of the ACLS is a long-time friend of the new President with whom, as recently as 1977, he organized a Congress in Poland on "The Universities of Enlightenment." Here Dr. Leslie Domonkos (USA), a former student of Professor Gabriel, spoke on the "American Universities and the Enlightenment."

b) Site of the Next Meeting

The decision as to the site for the 1985 meeting was not made without a stormy discussion. The Federal Republic of Germany and Venezuela (South America) both extended invitations to hold the Congress in their respective land. Thanks to the diplomatic maneuvering of the

outgoing president, Karl Dietrich Erdmann (FRG), arguing eloquently in German, French and English, the invitation of the Federal Republic of Germany was subsequently accepted. Depending on the financial offers of prospective cities, the next meeting could be either in Hamburg (heaven for maritime and economic historians) or in München (delightful city for codicologists and constitutional historians).

c) Recognition of the Outgoing
Secretary General

The 77-year-old Michel Francois, who served the International Committee of Historical Sciences for more than 25 years in his capacity as Secretary General, was honored in a closed meeting in which he did not participate. The General Assembly unanimously elected him Counselor (Conseiller) to Madame Ahrweiler. Some witty, sarcastic French members expressed doubt concerning the "counseling" of the newly elected Secretary General, known as Femina Virilis, a scholar with a strong will and firm determination. The outgoing Michel Francois will be largely compensated for the lack of opportunity of "counseling" by his election as President of the French Academy des Inscriptions et Belle Lettres for the 1981-82 period.

II. The Opening Ceremony for the Congress

The Opening Ceremony took place on Sunday, August 10, in the afternoon. As in Moscow in 1970, it took place in the Great Congress Hall of the Communist Party. After the opening speeches, a pleasing potpourri program was presented, consisting of singing, ballet to please the Soviets, and folk dances. No efforts were made to identify important

Dear Les:

First some business; then some news of the Knoll family.

A paper I proposed to the program committee of the British national committee of the Commission internationale d'histoire ecclésiastique comparée has been accepted. I will give it sometime during the week of 2-9 September in Durham, England. Since my university feels a little weak in the pocket book, however, I am seeking outside help for travel monies. Hence the application to the ACLS's grant program. If you would be willing to provide an evaluation to them of my proposed topic and of the others matters they ask about I would be most grateful. Although it does not say so anywhere in the material I have provided you by way of background, I have attended previous meetings of the organization (CIHEC): in Uppsala in 1977, Warsaw in 1978, and Bucharest in 1980 (while I was there for the universities session). Thus I have gotten fairly well involved in the working of the organization and am not just simply seeking a nice foreign conference to attend. (I'm not at all unhappy that it will be meeting in a part of England I've never been to, however, and if everything goes well Sue and the children will come with me. This will probably be our last chance for a family trip abroad before the children graduate and go off to college. Can we be getting so old?)

Last fall semester was a discouraging one for me. I got little done on the book and my teaching was not very rewarding. This semester is much better. With a good class of 45 Freshmen/Sophomores in a medieval history survey and about 30 Juniors/Seniors in a class in the Renaissance, things are looking up. In addition, I have been able to begin writing again and it looks as if I will be able to keep the rather hopeful deadline I list in the short list of publications I have included in this package. Sue spent a very frustrating spring working as a glorified secretary for the Red Cross, then left that at the end of summer to begin something entirely new. After years in teaching and related work, she is now a bookkeeper! She works for three lumber yards in Culver City and is enjoying it immensely. She is working, not

entirely for the fun of it, but because we can't make it on a single academic salary any longer. But that is not a story I need to tell you I am sure.

Beth is a Junior in high school this year. She is doing reasonably well in her academic work--though not as well as her parents wish she would, so we have the normal family tensions over that. But she has become very involved in the last months in modern dance production, has tried out for the school musical which will be presented this spring, and has been accepted into the cast. She is really happy. In addition, she has the first real boyfriend she has ever had and that lends a dimension to her life. Another new thing, which I'm not sure I've quite adjusted to, is that she has gotten her driver's licence and takes the car to orthodontist appointments, to meet friends for pizza, to attend evening games at school and the like. It is all a new world. She took the SAT exam this fall (a year early to qualify for an honors program at UCLA if she should go there). We were very pleased with the results. She scored 690 on her verbal section and in the mid-500's for the quantitative areas.

David is a Sophomore, and doing a little worse academically than Beth. He is getting more flack from his parents as a result. But he is a good kid and has lots of interesting aspects to him. He loves French and is doing well there, for example. His enthusiasm for serious music, particularly Baroque, Classical, and Romantic, is unusual for a boy his age. What is even better, however, is that he is discriminating and knowledgeable about that music. Apart from mountain climbing--which he has done in the Pacific Northwest for the past three summers--his real love is astronomy. He is a member of the Los Angeles Astronomical Society--almost all adults--goes to all the meetings, and reads widely. He spends his money on astronomical equipment (handbooks, atlases, and the like), and with three of his friends in the neighborhood has bought a real, deep-sky telescope. It has a 13.1 inch mirror, a newtonian focus, and is mounted on a Dobsonian mount (i. e., like a tank gun turret). That last part is the weakest aspect of the scope, for one can't track stars and photograph with that kind of mounting. But at the present, he is into looking, not photographing, and the Dobsonian mount is the cheapest kind and enabled them to get such a large mirror.

I do not expect to be traveling to the mid-west this spring at all. I wish I could ~~you~~ see you, Eva, and the children again. Is there any change that you will be coming to the AHA meeting in L. A. next Christmas, Les? If there is, let us know, and you can plan to stay with us if you wish. Please drop me a line when you are able, fill me in on your family, and tell me how the health of everybody is.

Title: Neo Platonism in 15th Century Hungary

Starting Date of Project and Estimated Ending Date: July 22-July 25, 1981

Description: During the past ten years I have been working on a book about the Renaissance in Hungary and have written a number of articles in the area. One aspect of Eastern European Renaissance which has received little attention is the problem of Neo-Platonic philosophic penetration from Florence to Buda, the Hungarian Capital. An active correspondence developed between Marcilio Ficino, the leader of the Platonic Academy in Florence, and a number of his admirers at the Hungarian court. My aim is to examine the extent of the Neo-Platonic influence upon Hungarian intellectuals in the 15th century and to evaluate the long range consequences of these Italian-Hungarian cultural ties. The project, if carried out, will result in three contributions to scholarship. 1. The material will be incorporated into the book on which I am working. 2. I will deliver a paper on which I am working (see attached sheet)



STUDENT ORGANIZATION ADVISOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A). As one means of promoting positive student-faculty extra class interaction, all registered organizations are required to have a full-time faculty or staff member as an advisor.*
- B). Appointed annually by the President of the University, the advisor agrees to maintain contact with the organization and to be familiar with its programs and personnel.
- C). The University expects an advisor to:
- 1.) act in an advisory as opposed to a directive relationship in their organization. The following educational functions are cited as examples:
 - a) providing the officers with the elements of good organizational and administrative practice,
 - b) teaching the techniques and responsibilities of leadership and following,
 - c) teaching the principles of effective group operations,
 - d) developing procedures and plans for action,
 - e) keeping the group focused on its goals,
 - f) developing self-discipline and responsibility in the group, and
 - g) stimulating and initiating activity;
 - 2.) be available to the officers and members in order to share ideas about organization affairs;
 - 3.) meet with the officers as a group at least quarterly to discuss the progress and direction of the group;
 - 4.) attend as many meetings and functions as possible;
 - 5.) advise and consult with the organization and its officers in its financial affairs to see the proper budgets are formulated as well as proper distribution of, and accounting for funds of the organization are maintained;
 - 6.) accept responsibility for transmitting communication between any University office and the organization's officers;
 - 7.) grant approval for any off-campus activities in which students represent the organization such as meetings, convention, etc.;
 - 8.) sign or cosign appropriate University forms such as those for the organization's request for use of campus facilities, purchase orders, travel requests, or the registration of visiting speakers or lectures; and
 - 9.) serve until a successor is appointed, if for any reason it is impossible to continue as advisor to the organization.

*Limited service faculty or staff may serve as advisor upon approval of the Coordinator of Student Activities.

It was so good to talk with you the other night and to anticipate your stay with us. For the record, let me recapitulate what I told you on the phone. My Chairman has authorized an honorarium of \$100 for your visit and talk; he has indicated that once he knows something about Fall semester enrollments (after 1 September) it may be possible to pay your air fare from Los Angeles to Monterray, but I really don't know what the possibilities are for that. In any case, the \$100 is there for you. (If you could send me your Social Security number by the end of August, I'll arrange to have the check ready for you while you are here.)

If your travel schedule will allow it, plan to fly to L.A. on Wednesday 16 September. We live about 10 minutes from the air port and it will be easy for me to pick you up. I have tentatively scheduled your talk on the Renaissance in Hungary for Thursday afternoon at 2:30. We will have two captive audiences: my undergraduate class in Medieval East Central Europe and my graduate reading class in The Renaissance. Both will be small. We will advertize the talk widely, but one never knows how large a turn-out there will be. If you don't mind we'll have an informal lunch with members of the department before, then a small wine and cheese reception after the talk. Friday and Saturday will be a chance to see a little of the Los Angeles area.

I have not yet made plans for a flight to Asilomar, but when I do I'll ask about tickets for the both of us. As I indicated on the phone, if a ticket is included on passage originating out of state, it will be more expensive. I believe that there is a one-way fare, booked seven days in advance, for about \$40 from L.A. to Monterray. I'll let you know by letter or phone what I find out.

Sunday if all goes well (i.e., the paper for Durham is complete, syllabuses are written, and the house painted) the children and I will leave by car for

the Northwest. My mother still lives in Spokane and Sue's mother is in Oregon City, just outside of Portland. Sue will fly to meet us on Saturday 15 August, and after some time with the families, we will drive south to Ashland, Oregon for five days of the Shakespear festival there. Then back to L.A., so I can leave on Sir Freddie Laker for England on Monday 31 August.

No. 2

I wish all of the members of our Association and their families a Merry Christmas and a Happy and fruitful New Year.

I received several responses to the first letter. While general responses to the various propositions were very favorable, a few recommendations necessitate the circulation of this second letter.

1. Professor Stephen Borsody informed me that while he was indeed a candidate for Chairmanship of our Association, because of his various other obligations, had to decline the nomination. Since he was never Chairman of the Association, naturally if Resolution No. 4 would be adopted, Professor Borsody would not become a member of the Executive Committee. Please omit his name from Draft Resolution 7 (p. 7).

2. Professor Thomas Sakmyster, on the other hand, reminded me about the omission of the names of two past Chairmen:

Professor Thomas Sakmyster and
Professor John Rath

These two names therefore should be added to the list of past Chairmen in Draft Resolution No. 7 (p. 7).

I apologize to these two colleagues for the unintended omission.

3. Draft Resolution No. 5 used the term "Book Awards". Professor István Deak reminded me that the application of this term might be misunderstood. The correct title of the committee in question is "Prize Committee". Professor Deak also informed me that no nomination was submitted yet in 1981 for the Prize. I therefore herewith quote the last announcement as regards our Prize:

"PRIZE PAPERS COMPETITION

All members are reminded of the invitation to submit papers on Hungarian history for consideration by the Prize Committee. The papers submitted should have appeared as an article in English in 1978, 1979, 1980, or 1981, and the author should not be a tenured professor, or someone of similar status or achievement; papers may be submitted by the author, a colleague, or an editor to any AASHH officer, though most logically perhaps to our Chairman or Vice Chairman."

The last Newsletter once more invited submission of articles to be considered for the Prize. Alas no paper was yet received.

In the meantime, I received a letter from Professor Ranki, which deserves being communicated to you in full. I therefore attach a Xerox copy of that letter for your information. The generous grant by the Hungarian Chair thus increases the Prize from \$100 to \$400. I submit therefore a new draft resolution, which all the members are asked to vote on by returning the attached ballot to the Secretary Treasurer. If you already sent in your ballot on the first seven draft resolutions, please send in this resolution also as soon as possible. If you did not send in your vote on the first seven draft resolutions yet, send them also promptly.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 8 (DRAFT)

"Prize Papers Competition"

Resolved: the Association accepts with thanks the generous offer of the Hungarian Chair at Indiana University to contribute \$300 to the amount of the Association's Prize.

The Hungarian Chair Professor at Indiana University shall be an ex officio member of the committee the President (Chairman) selects from among the members of the Executive Committee.

Rationale: Professor György Ranki's letter is self-explanatory. His recommendations are within the rules and practices of selecting the candidate for the Prize. The ex officio membership of the occupant of the Hungarian Chair at Indiana University is a proper way to use the occupant's input into the selection processes.

4. Professor Thomas Sakmyster and Professor Nandor Dreisziger will be the participants of a panel on "Who Bombed Kassa?" we proposed for the AAASS convention of 1982. The panel was proposed to the coordinator of "Soviet and East European Military Forces and Policy" panelist, Professor Stephen Kime, 5100 Concordia St., Fairfax, VA 22030.

5. Finally Professor Stephen B. Vardy, the incoming Chairman (President) generously proposed that the new two year term for the Chairman (President) if adopted, should start with the extension of the tenure of the present Chairman. I did not object to his kind proposition. In the meantime, however, it became obvious that the year 1982 will be the busiest one in my six year plan on "War and Society in East Central Europe". The organization of two conferences and several symposia during 1982 and the more than a half dozen books I am responsible for producing gives me too much work to be

able to devote the necessary time to the administration of the Association. I therefore wish to express my most sincere thanks to Professor Várdy, but I must decline to be considered to continue to serve another year as Chairman (President) of the Association.





Je dois signaler avant tout les publications: notre série "Humanisme et Réforme" s'est enrichie de deux nouveaux volumes: Csaba Csapodi, A Janus Pannonius-szöveghagyomány (La tradition des textes de J.P.) et István Mészáros, XVI. századi városi iskoláink és a "Studia Humanitatis" (Les écoles municipales en Hongrie au XVI^e siècle et les "Studia Humanitatis"). Le 10^e volume de Régi Magyar Költők Tára (Collection des anciens poètes hongrois) vient de paraître par les soins de M. Imre Varga; M. György Bónis a publié son livre sur Péter Révay, important écrivain politique hongrois de la renaissance tardive. Mais la nouveauté la plus intéressante est la volumineuse édition du texte de la Pécsi disputa (travail collectif de M. Róbert Dán et de Mlle Katalin S. Németh) qui contient les actes et la description de la controverse religieuse déroulée en 1588 entre réformés et unitariens dans la ville de Pécs, occupée par les Turcs. Le manuscrit hongrois, jusque là inédit et à peine accessible, fut l'oeuvre du participant unitarien de la discussion, György Válaszuti, prédicateur à Pécs; sa publication met à notre disposition un des documents particulièrement importants de l'histoire religieuse du XVI^e siècle.

Un événement marquant dans la vie de notre Centre a été la visite en Hongrie du 1 au 10 juin de Dame Frances Yates. Ses conférences et les consultations que nous avons pu poursuivre avec elle ont profondément impressionné et stimulé tous les chercheurs hongrois de la renaissance. Aussi avons-nous accueilli avec une douleur particulière, quelques mois plus tard, la nouvelle de la mort de ce grand savant.

Vers le milieu de l'année, un changement est intervenu dans la direction du Centre, car mon excellent collègue et ami, M. Béla Varjas, ayant accompli sa 70^e année, a pris officiellement sa retraite, me laissant le soin de la direction de notre Centre que nous avons partagé jusque là. M. Varjas n'a cessé cependant que ses fonctions administratives; il continue naturellement à participer régulièrement à nos entreprises scientifiques.

En vous remerciant de l'attention amicale dont vous avez bien voulu suivre notre travail en cette année aussi, permettez-moi, cher et éminent Collègue, de vous adresser, à l'occasion du Nouvel An, nos meilleurs voeux de bonheur et de réussite.



Dear János:

I have had a long and pleasurable discussion with Laci Domonkos, and finally agreed upon changing the recommendations for the volume on Hungary in the Late Middle Ages.

First of all, we want to shorten the time-period which would not only reduce the number of pages (an important consideration in publishing the volume) but also speed up our work.

Secondly, this would also eliminate the need for three contributors. Since Laci and I are moving in similar directions, there would be little friction between us, and we would be able to tailor our work more closely than if we had Bárd as a contributor. Another reason to withdraw our invitation to Bárd is that, although he must be a good scholar, (and this has nothing to do with our decision) he is geographically too far; if we want to have a conference, I could certainly not pay for two trips from the Western Coast and beyond, and justify the expenditure to my College.

Thirdly, we both feel that we must reduce the time of preparation; even if the manuscript were completed by 1984 as originally planned, it would still take two more years to have the book come out. This we feel is too long, and we want to set our deadlines accordingly. The final version of the book will, therefore, look like this:

3. Hungary and the Third Reich





I would like to bring to your attention that a group of Professor Béla K. Király's friends are planning a Festschrift in his honor on the occasion of his forthcoming retirement from university teaching, and that I have been asked to serve as the volume's editor. While surveying the field, we also thought of you as a possible contributor.

For the sake of information, let me add that we hope to surprise Professor Király with the published Festschrift at the December 1982 national convention of the American Historical Association in Washington, D.C. In order to achieve this goal, however, we have to meet certain deadlines. Thus, individual contributions will have to be in my hand by May 1, 1982, and the revised version of these studies will have to go to press in August of that year. Without meeting these deadlines, it would simply be impossible to put out the volume in time.

The Király-Festschrift will be published by Professor Stephen Fischer-Galati as one of the volumes of his "East European Monographs" series distributed by Columbia University Press, and it is being partially subsidized by the Committee for Danubian Research, Inc., of Washington, D.C.

In light of the above may I ask you as to whether or not you wish to participate in this venture. Our only condition is that your contribution should be an unpublished scholarly study of about 20 to 25 typed pages (elite letters, double spaced, 26 lines to a page). Depending on the number of contributors and the size of the financial subsidy, we may expand or constrict the size of each of the contributed studies.

In light of the brevity of time, please respond to my letter as soon as possible. Moreover, if your response is affirmative, please also indicate the approximate title of your proposed study and enclose a brief summary of the same. Your resumé will enable me to place your study into the appropriate topical section of the proposed volume, and will also aid me in determining guidelines for other prospective contributors.

I hope to receive your responses by the end of November of this year, at which time I will again be in touch with you.

I write in English as I don't have my Hungarian typing element here and the accents are irritating.

Our letters have crossed each other: in the meantime I received yours at Kiraly's together with the beautiful cards: you were very kind to do them all, some, of course, were already done a propos other articles, such as the kings etc. But all of it was great help. You can throw away my cards, I have a master list.

All text corrections have been taken care of, I did some last minute editing elsewhere, too, but all in your spirit. The Hunyadi-Rakoczi vol. is now as good as ready, the copy-editor has to go through Ráczó's piece (poor Gyuszi is in hospital for over half a year, I practically wrote the article instead of him, based on two papers of his ...), I have to complete my notes and it can go to the printers. Probably to Szeged of all places, as Kultura made a very tempting offer to Kiraly, based on Szegedi Nyomda calculations.

Thanks for reassuring me in matters Bietenholz or whatever his name.

I'm glad you like the idea of Church and Society in Med. Hung. I've talked to Erik about it and he is interested, Held Józka maintains that he'd be able to find a good publisher for it, if we bring it together. But as a piece de resistance I have a promise from Kiraly that Brooklyn College or whatever they're now called, would take it. So maybe it is time to ask you, who can you think of in the West to be asked for collaboration. I guess, good Zoltán Kosztolnyik, however "learned", is out - but maybe we should try your old master himself... And in Europe? In Hungary we won't have too many live people; Mezey, I'm afraid, does not fit under the roof of Fügedi, but maybe if it's international, he'll cooperate. Bónis already volunteered with some eccles. jurisdiction/can. law topic, Deo propitiente. He's not in too good shape, but still working. I thought to ask Mátyusz' permission to translate something out of his Egyházi társadalom. We might try Imre Bard to do a critical piece on Patronatsrecht - if he's able to. Think about it. I plan to start seriously solliciting articles etc. some time later this year, say in Fall.

Held mentioned to me your talk about a joint book on late med. Hungary, with him doing society and economy, me politics and the like, you the művelődés. I like the idea, although fear that if we want to have a coordinated book, i.e. not independent articles, but a text to which we all three agree, we'd have lots of quarrel with Józka, who tends to be a bit sloppy... But I'm game.

The Bud-apest sejour was enviating but not useless; not too fruitful in terms of actual archival or library work, but rather in keeping contacts and making a few new ones. Reading can be done at home as well... I'll be now here for two months, leaving for Germany (Freiburg i. B.) in early April.
