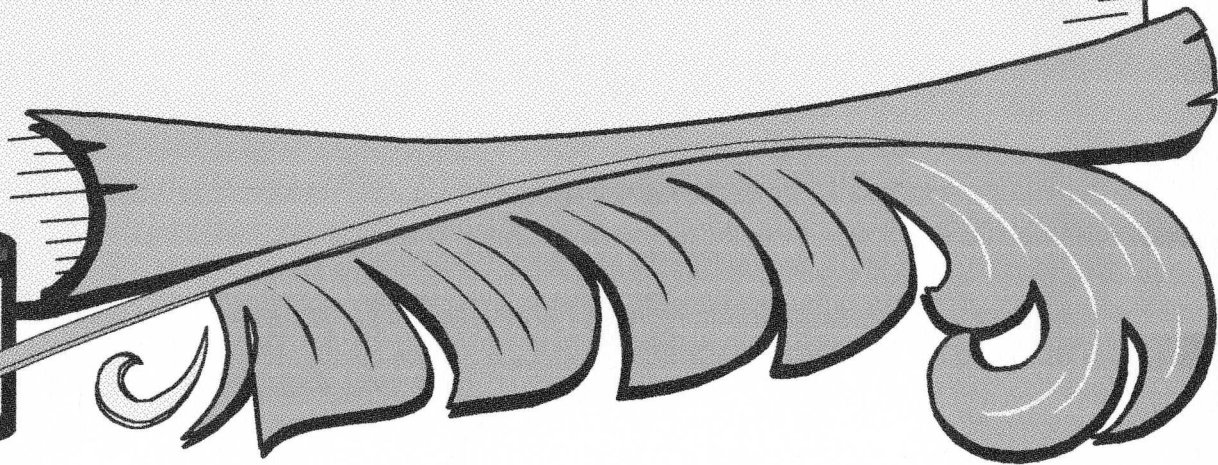

Kedves Jánoskám!

It was good to talk to you while you were visiting Vancouver this spring. I would have liked to see you celebrated at Kalamazoo and later in Budapest on the occasion of your 70th birthday. Your colleagues at CEU, Balázs and Marcell, did a fine job of editing the massive Festschrift in your honor. You certainly deserve all the recognition you receive for your valuable contributions to our profession. Once more I send you sincere congratulations and wish you many more years of active, scholarly production.

Please thank Varga Kati for sending me a copy of the second edition of The Laws. I hope I did not inconvenience her because of my urgent request. The reason for the need for quick action is as follows: I was nominated for the honor of "Distinguished Professor" for the academic year of 1998-1999 and needed a complete description, plus supporting materials, of my activities. Happy to report that at the Honors Day Convocation in May, I did receive the Distinguished Professor designation for the sixth (and probably last) time. Only one person among the faculty of 420 has received this honor more than I did. She was Distinguished Professor seven times.

As I told you in our conversation in April, I have had a series of medical problems, the most serious of which is the beginning of congestive heart failure, and increasing diabetes. As the result of these negative developments my teaching load has been reduced somewhat in order to minimize stress. I have also begun to seriously explore the possibilities of taking partial retirement in June of 2001, i.e. after 37 years of teaching. I am obligated to teach the 1999-2000 academic year because of my sabbatical in 1997-1998, furthermore there are major retirement improvements, which will go into effect in 2000-2001, which obviously would effect my subsequent monthly income. Unless I brake down completely I will wait until spring of 2001 to leave. If at that time I am still relatively healthy, I can opt to teach one semester a year, at 1/3 reduction of courses for five years at a very handsome level of compensation. I envision teaching for 4 months a year and being free for 8 months, actually earning more than ever before. Will have to measure all the pros and cons of these options.

Jánoskám, how is the Laws project progressing? Would it help if I sent you some funds to facilitate completion, at least the Tripartitum volume. Between September 15th and December


31, I could send you a check for \$500.00, either in one sum or two installments. Naturally I would again offer my proofreading and other skills as I did with the second edition of Vol. I.

Unless I "collapse" completely physically and mentally, I do plan to finish my Matthias Corvinus monograph. Once that is done, I will also have to think about selling most of my library, simply because I do not want to move 3,000 volumes once I retire and we move out of the large house in Canfield. Do you have any ideas how one does this? The ideal would be if some university library would buy the whole collection, which contains some real valuable materials, as you saw on that cold visit to our house a few years ago.

Excuse the long letter, but some time has passed since we last communicated. If you write, please address your correspondence to my home address. Eva and I are leaving for our vacation on July 23rd but a friend will periodically forward all our mail to us in Florida.

Hope you are well and the academic burdens upon your shoulders will be less than last year.

It seems that in the twilight of his life Asztrik has made this project, namely to gain some recognition from the MTA for me, a priority. I am most grateful to him, but it is something I do not seek for myself.

Sometime during the Academic year 1999-2000, I will visit Budapest and would love to see you in person. Once I have a definite date, I will write, and if your schedule allows, it would be delightful to meet once more.

Because of certain developments I feel compelled to write to you, although it would have been far more appropriate to discuss these matters in person. Unfortunately I will not be in Budapest in the near future.

My dear "Doktor Vater" and friend Gábrriel Asztrik has requested me to send him a collection of reprints, book titles, etc...which he intends to forward for you. His intention is motivated by kindness and inflated views of my accomplishments. He is turning to you in order to obtain some recognition of my work by the Academy. I tried, unsuccessfully, to dissuade Asztrik from doing this, but he is persistent.

⇒ Ferikém, I do not seek any recognition from any source. Furthermore, I fully understand the high level of scholarship requirements that are a prerequisite for membership in the MTA. I fully realize that I do not meet these formidable requirements.

In all probability, I could have been a much more productive scholar, but a heavy teaching load as well as problems of health have prevented me from living up to the expectations I had originally imposed upon myself. As I am contemplating my retirement in June of 2001, I feel that my life has been blessed and happy. For the past thirty-five years I have taught thousands of students, many of them have reached important positions in their professions. What these young people know about Hungarians and Hungary will be largely based upon the lectures they heard in my classes. As a form of recognition of my teaching and research activities, I have received the title of "Distinguished Professor" six times in my career, a university record.

In 1990, she was selected YWCA's woman of the year in the cultural arts profession.

She was a member of YSU Chapter of the Ohio Education Association and the National Education Association. She was also a member of the YSU Committee for Women, YSU Women's Club, Altrusa Club and a charter member of the St. Valley Art Teachers Association.

She leaves her husband Robert P., whom she married in 1982, and a sister, Mrs. Dee H. man of Wisconsin.

A few years ago I read a notice in the American Association for the Study of Hungarian History that you were interested in purchasing books in Hungarian History for your university library. Your name and address was provided by Dr. Susan Glanz, Secretary General of AASHH.

Are you still looking for a collection or is my information outdated?

As I am approaching retirement, I am contemplating the reduction of my library and plan to sell all those books in my collection which do not have direct bearing on the Age of Matthias Corvinus, which is the primary area of my research. My Hungarian books comprise about 1,400 volumes, of which I would like to keep about 400, and sell roughly 1,000 tomes.

The collection is primarily Medieval-Early Modern: history, literary studies, art, and culture. It contains books published quite recently, as well as 18th century editions.

Thank you for your kind letter of October 25. It is unfortunate that we did not meet at the METEM dinner in Toronto last spring ~~in~~. It would have been nice to see a familiar face in the audience.

Your kind invitation to a conference in September of 2000 sounds wonderful but unfortunately I have to decline. Since last spring I have been on a reduced teaching load due to health problems: heart, diabetes, asthma, glaucoma, etc. . . My physician has indicated that I should avoid all form of stress producing circumstances in order to stabilize my condition. It has worked well but as the result of these circumstances, I have cut back on professional activities, have not accepted invitations to give lectures. I hope you understand my situation.

It is unfortunate that we have met so infrequently. I consider you an excellent historian and a fine human being. Years ago when Ranki Gyuri was at Indiana, we got to see each other as well as member of the profession more or less regularly. Since the death of Ranki, IU is no longer the meeting place of historians from America and Hungary. Gyuri's successors seems to be more interested in promoting their own careers than in being the intellectual "clearing house" as well as contact point between us and our counterparts in Europe. You might not agree, but I find it ironic that the "cosmopolitan" Ránki György did more to promote Hungarian history than any of his "non-cosmopolitan" successors.

It is my fervent hope that we will meet again, somewhere, sometime and will have the chance to discuss matters of mutual interest.

I am not happy to hear about the health problems, but hope that all will work out OK. I can see that some kind of early retirement may be very advantageous, I know that with sufficient number of years of service many people made deals that proved to be more lucrative than ever in their lives before. (I had only 25 years at UBC, hence couldn't make a “big killing” by leaving early . . .)

DRMH. The vol. 1 is hexed, there is no doubt. Having approved a last proof (by SVKati!), the print was allowed to run—100 copies, to begin with. (For that we had money from MTA.) When I returned from sabbatical and Kalamzoo etc., I mailed out to all those about whom we knew that they had purchased the old vol. 1 a new copy, saying that “all mistakes are now corrected, please exchange the old... etc.” Having done so, I took a copy with me for some travel, maybe it was bus or train. The first mistake I found was on p. viii (line 8) “one” for “are”. From there it went downhill. The encl. ERRATA contains that part of them which may disturb the reader—serious enough as is. There are dozens more of missing or additional spaces, misplaced punctuation marks, etc. To say nothing of a number of translation-corrections I had recommended at the very end (after your reading), originally proposed (many years ago) by Susan Reynolds. (E.g.: manslaughter for homicide—good!)


Presently a second printing of this revised edition is underway. And all the people who were told that “this is the good one”, will get such an ERRATA list as the enclosed one, with apologies. Besides, Kner Nyomda (however famous it may have been in olden times) proved to be total duds, it was a mistake to work with them, but this one I still entrusted to them, don't really know, why . . . out of habit or laziness. You'll get one of these good-good copies in September.

Tripartitum is moving slowly but steadily. I have 1001 other things to do, but both Paul Hervey Jr. at Pann State and Martyn Rady at SSEES, London are promising to read and comment. In first draft the whole translation is done, no notes, no nothing, and Pars II and III is really first draft, with many translation problems unsolved—as yet. I am aware that my essay contains few earth-shaking new discoveries, and that most Hungarian readers do know the basic facts behind the story. Yet I do not know of anyone who has dealt with these events in a systematic fashion, or has explained the problem of the Hunyadi Dynasty from all angles. Actually it would have been more effective if I had submitted an English version of the essay to you. It is far more important that the non-Hungarian scholarly world should know the history of these events. Well it is too late now!

Kedves István, I do not know when I will be in Hungary again, but I do hope that we will meet again, somewhere, sometimes.

A. The reworking of Chapters I - III is nearing completion. I had written this portion of the book almost 20 years ago and much has been written on the subject since. This means a major update in bibliography as well as addition of information in the text.

Completion date: September 15, 1998

Hope that all is well with you and the family. Are your daughters married? Write!!

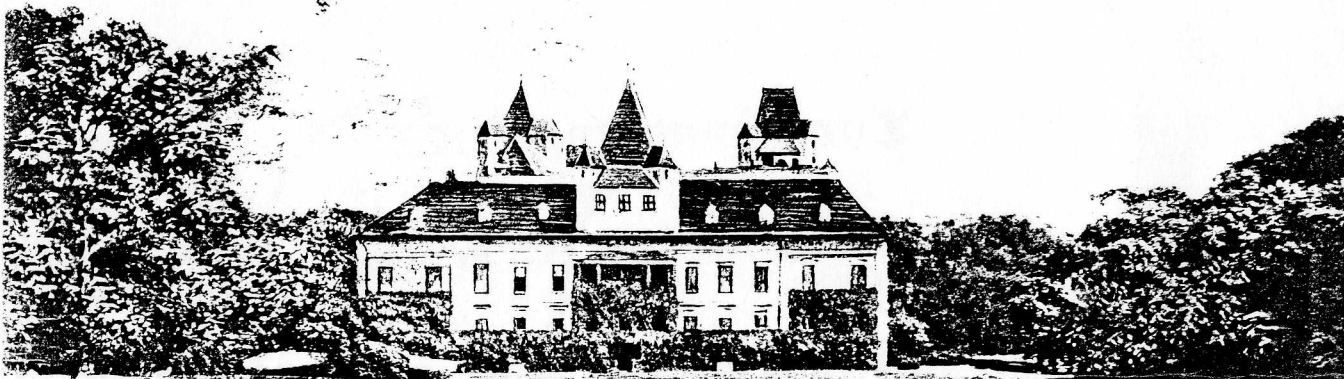



Dear Colleague,

Please excuse the fact that I am writing to you in English but I do not have secretarial help with Hungarian language or typing skills.

It is at the recommendation of Dr. Tibor Horváth, S.J. that I am contacting you in connection with the possible publication of the text of an address I made at the METEM meeting in Toronto on March 6, 1999. Tibor Atya was most enthusiastic about the content of my presentation and feels that it would be appropriate to publish it in the Vázlatok. When he and I last spoke (March 31), he indicated that he was sending the text of the lecture to you immediately, thus you should receive it shortly.

Naturally I would be most pleased if the article would be published in one of the forthcoming issues of the highly regarded Vázlatok. There are, however, some concerns which we have to resolve.

→ 1. Upon receipt of the article from Dr. Horváth, please read it and determine if you do want to publish it in the Vázlatok. If not, believe me I would not feel offended or slighted. Editors often have to make decisions based upon a number of factors, most of them unknown to authors.

2. If, on the other hand, you feel that the study falls within the "profile" of the Végtalok, there are a number of questions to which I need answers.

a. Because of the nature of the study, I would like to have the article published with footnotes ~~endnotes~~, in other words, transform an after dinner speech into a scholarly article. Based upon my own copies of the Végtalok, I see no problem with this, but do need your advice and consent.

b. In the text of the lecture you will receive from Tibor Atya there are brackets [...] in several parts of the text. These denote material that was not presented orally, mainly because of time limitation during the address in Toronto. Please let me know what, if any, of the bracketed material you want to keep. This obviously will influence the number of footnotes that the final product will have.

c. What Tibor Atya has probably not told you is that I left Hungary in 1945 as a 7 year old child, have not attended Hungarian schools.

Although my dear wife, who left Hungary at age 4, (b has a much better command of proper sentence construction and orthography than I have) has tried to correct my most obvious errors while typing the manuscript, I would, however, welcome any linguistic corrections which you might recommend.

d. What is your publication schedule for this article? Because I need time to provide the required footnotes, please let me know the date by which you would need the complete study.

e. Would it expedite matters for you if the article would be forwarded ^{to Szeged} on a disk. I have done this with several of my ~~articles~~ ^{studies} in recent years and it makes the work of the editor easier. If you would opt for this alternative, please provide the name of the program, that would be compatible with your equipment.

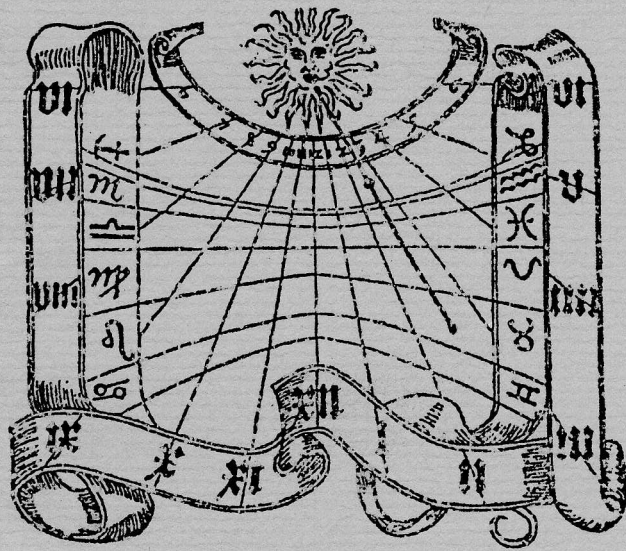
The woodcut shows the title page of the German version of Sebastian Münster's *Horolographia*, printed in Basel by Heinrich Petri in 1537. The Latin original, published in 1531, had already found wide distribution. Sebastian Münster, who is referred to as citizen of Basel and professor at the university there, must be counted among the most accomplished scholars of his age. His fields of competence, in which he produced greatly admired publications, ranged from Hebrew to mathematics. The *Horolographia* is concerned with the design of sophisticated sundials and other instruments of calculation. The book, containing sixty-five mathematical woodcuts, is dedicated to 'all devotees of the art of calculating time'.

There were many later adaptations of the *Horolographia*. The most influential one of these announced that it was published 'for the benefit of all watchmakers, painters, painters on glass, sculptors and goldsmiths, men of great and little learning. [D.A.M.]

I know that exceptions have been made in the past, but nowadays Rome does not like to make exceptions in these matters. In other words, I suggest that we should wait a few more weeks before making a gentle inquiry about the response.

I have laid the order out so that it can be seen. A few comments are in order. Some priests have been nominated by a bishop for a papal honor bringing with it the title of ***Monsignor***. There are three classes of the *monsignori*: Protonotaries Apostolic, Prelates of Honor of His Holiness, and Chaplains of His Holiness (in descending order of precedence). Those diocesan priests who are Protonotaries Apostolic are known as "Supranumerary," distinct from the seven monsignors of the Roman Curia known as Protonotaries Apostolic de Numero.

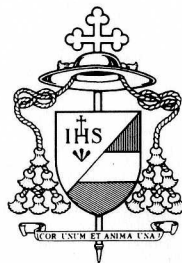
Most diocesan monsignors are Prelates of Honor.

Among ecclesiastics the title Monsignor implies simply a distinction bestowed by the highest ecclesiastical authority, either in conjunction with an office or merely titular. In any case it bears with it a certain prescribed dress. Technically, the pope does not bestow the title Monsignor, but a distinction of some sort to which this title is attached.

In short, while the desire to honor the Abbot on the occasion of his 90th Birthday is laudable, naming him Protonotary Apostolic does not appear to be an additional honor.

Recently I received a response from Bishop John D'Arcy of Fort Wayne-South Bend, in which he informs me that he knows Abbot Gabriel very well and regards him highly, but he is somewhat skeptical that he would be able to receive the title of Apostolic Protonotary since he is a religious. Nevertheless he will make appropriate inquiries.

Meanwhile Abbot Gabriel also wrote to me and send the attached title-page of a book, which seems to indicate that in 1802 a Premonstratensian religious had the title. In my mind, however, this does not prove the case, because during the last two centuries rules have changed and the tendency nowadays is to reduce such titles.

I think we should wait until Bisho D'Arcy makes his inquiries and comes to some conclusion.


Dear Dr. Domonkos,



HUNGARICA COLLECTIONS IN PRIVATE LIBRARIES in the United States

Executive Summary

We have witnessed one of history's greatest transfer of talent, the migration of scholars and scientists from Europe to America in the wake of wars and internal domestic strife. Over the last fifty years Hungarian scholars brought to American academe a breath of learning and a humanistic tradition of scholarly inquiry that have enriched and enlarged the intellectual horizons of their colleagues as well as their students. The majority of these colleagues have assembled private library collections of real merit and are searching for an appropriate home where to deposit them for posterity. These collections represent immense potentials, a real challenge and opportunity to design a sustained program in the years ahead.

Hungarians immigrated to the United States in two waves after the conclusion of the Second World War. First, the so-called Displaced Persons (or DPs), and those who arrived here after the 1956 Hungarian Revolution.

The building up of private or home collections was important to a significant number of the DPs, who, by and large, have not mastered English to the literary or intellectual level. They remained more at home and nurtured interest in the Hungarian cultural and intellectual experience. Because of their upbringing and education in Hungary, language maintenance remained an important part of daily life. Reading and the purchase of books and other publications was a matter of personal pride, and resulted in modest or even considerable personal collections. This generation of Hungarians are now in retirement and in their senior years try to live in some comfort with a sense of dignity. Many of them moved from the former private dwelling into a smaller apartment with reduced space for personal belongings, including books. The dilemma to pass along the accumulated private collection is naturally present. One should also add to the mid-century DPs those scholars who arrived here during the 1940s and early 1950s. The scholarship and contributions they made to American academic and intellectual life is beyond calculation. Because many of them received academic training during the 1930s both in and outside Hungary, they were multi lingual and developed a private and scholarly collection of real significance, in several languages.

The other group of Hungarians, the post-1956 wave arrived with marketable skills. Several hundred continued their studies at American universities and earned one or several academic degrees. Many of these remained in academic circles and built up considerable scholarly reputation over the years. These academicians, scientists, successful professionals and creative artists have also accumulated very significant private collections in their chosen field. One should be able to identify a very high number of productive, publishing scholars in the humanities and social sciences, and in other fields of endeavor, who developed significant and even unique collections over an extensive period. These collections are primarily in English and Hungarian, with some German publications present.

What is important to note is this. The contribution of creative and educated Hungarians, who arrived in the United States during the last fifty years have brought acclaim to their country of birth, and published hundreds of scholarly monographs and articles, and lectured on many continents on their specialty, including about Hungary.

For this communication we should also note that there are some very significant Hungarica related and scientific collections in private hands among those who arrived here from historic Hungary. Many of these owners are either in retirement or about to retire from academic life in the near future, and ready to deposit their collection, either in part or in toto, with an appropriate institution.

There is interest in academic circles in Hungary about transferring these collections to existing or emerging academic institutions. There is particular demand for those publications (both monographs and periodicals) that - for reasons of ideology - were excluded from Hungarian libraries during the post-1945 period, and those publications which Hungarian libraries could not purchase due to lack of funds. Also, during the past ten years reading and working proficiency in English improved considerably and will attain an even higher level in the coming years. Therefore, there is increasing demand for English language publications at most educational institutions beginning with the gimnazium level.

There is an unparalleled opportunity to transfer the best and most pertinent part of these dormant collections from private Hungarian hands to institutions in Hungary, and other locations as appropriate. A procedure is required and logistic mechanism should be in place for:

- identifying and contacting current owners;
- evaluating these collections;
- matching the incoming gifts to the existing collections in Hungary and to the academic/research needs of the receiving institution;
- arrange for the shipping of the collection to the target site in Hungary.

The **keys** to the success of this project are:

- appropriate professional leadership in the United States;
- commitment of the requisite funds to initiate and maintain the program for at least five years.

The intent of writing this statement is to encourage a dialogue on this vital issue and invite potential donors to participate in the project.

APPRAISAL OF PERSONAL LIBRARY COLLECTIONS
Summary of IRS Guidelines

Gifts-in-kind may be subject to the Tax Reform Act of 1984 (PL 98-369).

IRS identifies that "Fair Market Value" is the price that property would sell for on the open market. It is the price that would be agreed on between a willing buyer and a willing seller.

A. Gifts under \$ 500.00 do not require an appraisal statement but Form 8283 must be completed and attached to the tax return.

B. Gifts between \$ 500.00 and \$ 5,000.00, do not require an appraisal statement but Form 8283 must be completed and attached to the tax return.

C. If a donor claims the value of property given in any one year to all institutions to be in access of \$ 5,000.00, the donor must obtain a qualified appraisal statement on all property contributed and append all pertinent appraisal statements to the income tax form, Form 8283. In this case the donee organization/s must also sign Form 8283 indicating the date of receipt of the property.

In any of the three cases the donor: a. must indicate the date of the acknowledgement received from donee; b. the date/year when the gifts were purchased; c. and indicate original purchase price, and attach receipt if necessary.

Qualified appraiser: An individual who holds himself or herself out to the public as an appraiser or performs appraisal on a regular basis;

If qualified to make appraisals of this type of property being valued because of his or her qualifications described in the appraisal.

Excluded are, donor or donee of the property, employed or related to the donor or donee, or one who is party to the transaction.

The appraiser's fee is tax deductible.

The IRS is responsible for reviewing appraisals, it does not accept appraisals without question. Nor does the IRS recognize any particular appraiser or organization of appraisers. The IRS does not issue advance rulings approving or disapproving appraisals. It reserves the right to designate its own appraiser/s to review the "fair market value" of any or all donated property at any time within two (2) years of filing Form 8283.





MINUTES

Minutes of the statutory meeting held in Seminar Room 3124 of the Arts Building, Trinity College, Dublin, 6 November 1999 from 5.30 p.m. to 7.00 p.m. on the occasion of the CIHU conference held in Dublin. The theme of the conference was: The University and Heresy/Dissent from the Middle Ages to the Present, 5 - 6 November 1999.

Present were: The President, Hilde de Ridder-Symoens (Belgium), in the chair, the General Secretary, H. Robinson-Hammerstein (Ireland), R. Anderson (UK), L. Brockliss (UK), M. Feingold (USA), W. Höflechner (Austria), S. Rothblatt (USA), J.-P. Pittion (France), D. Tamm (Denmark), F. Thue (Norway), J. Verger (France).

Apologies were received from the following: P. Denley (UK), W. Frijhoff (the Netherlands), N. Hammerstein (Germany), S. Langholm (Norway), L.A. De Oliveira Ramos (Portugal), R. Schwinges (Switzerland), S. Sörlin (Sweden).

1. The President welcomed the members of the Commission, in particular those who attended for the first time, M. Feingold, J.-P. Pittion, S. Rothblatt.

A minute's silence was observed to remember with thanks the long-serving members who had died since the previous meeting: Aleksander Gieysztor, former vice-president, Jacques Monfrin, directeur de l'école nationale des chartes, vice-president of the CIHU, one of the founder members of the Commission, Msgr. L.E. Boyle (Librarian of the Vatican, who had died suddenly a few days before the Dublin conference).

2. The Minutes of the Prague meeting had been pre-circulated; they were tabled again and signed by the President as a correct record of the proceedings, the word 'annual' having been deleted in paragraph 4.2 in reference to 'the next annual general meeting'.

2.1 There were no matters arising which were not covered in subsequent points on the agenda.

3.1 The Financial Reports for 1998 and 1999 were tabled and approved. The General Secretary in her capacity as Treasurer commented on the slack membership subscriptions for 1998 and 1999, although the situation had slightly improved on the previous years.

3.2. The General Secretary had proposed that a three-year membership fee should be considered. In the ensuing discussion, some members recommended a five-year fee in line with the period of their election as members, but this was generally considered too stringent. The President drew the attention of the meeting to the fact that Art. 7 of the Statutes made it clear that non-payment should be interpreted as lack of interest in the work of the Commission and the membership should therefore lapse. It was agreed that the three-year payment should, in the first instance, be operated as an encouragement of members; it was also agreed that the General Secretary should stress the relevance of Art. 7 of the Statutes when writing to individual members prior to the Oslo meeting. She should also point out that payment in Swiss Francs was inconvenient and that

the dues were a personal matter (not related to any national organisation); she was also instructed that the reminder should contain various options of the most direct manner of payment, avoiding wasteful transactions.

Arising out of the discussion of item 3.2 of the agenda there was general agreement that the Statutes, which at present exist officially in a French version only, should be made available in English as well. This document should be pre-circulated and ratified, after due legal approval, at the Oslo meeting. The General Secretary agreed to have the unofficial English translation in her possession checked by legal experts; the document should then be sent out to members in advance of the Oslo meeting. (See also under item 8 below).

4. The question of active membership of the Commission and the need for new members was raised. The General Secretary announced that she already held the CV and list of publications of a potential member for Hungary recommended by R. Schwinges (Switzerland) and N. Hammerstein (Germany). She was asked to circulate these documents together with the Minutes of the Dublin meeting. W. Höflechner agreed to explore the situation with regard to new members for Poland; R. Anderson (UK) volunteered to look into the potential membership of a Bulgarian scholar. Members were encouraged to make further proposals in the interim. The Commission was also contemplating the admission of affiliated members in due course to ensure that a sufficient number of full members could be guaranteed in the future. The affiliated members were to have certain privileges, notably *reduced* subscription fees for the yearbook, History of Universities (see under items 6 and 8).

5.1 The forthcoming events were reviewed as follows: F. Thue reported that there had been an overwhelming number of papers proposed by candidates from a wider range of countries than normally reached by the Commission. The President and the General Secretary had scheduled a meeting on Sunday (7 November) with the Norwegian member to assess the applications and to arrange for parallel groups. The Oslo Forum would then take another look at their proposals and let the participants know their decisions by the end of January 2000.

5.2 The programme of activities 2001 to 2005 is filling up. But apart from the conference at Glasgow on Celebration and Ceremony, 21-24 June 2001 (see call for papers previously circulated), the other events are still at the planning stage: Halle/Wittenberg (cf. < <http://www.500jahre.uni-halle.de>>); a meeting in Austria/Hungary is under active discussion.

In connection with forthcoming conferences the General Secretary was asked to elicit the views on self-financing of participants at such conferences. The present arrangements (accommodation and all meals provided by the organising university) may be difficult to continue in future. The General Secretary should invite members and their friends to submit alternatives they might like to suggest. It would be of special interest to learn what financial support could be obtained from home universities when invitation to read a paper or to act as coordinating chair-person can be verified.

6. The President presented a progress report in the negotiations between CIHU and the Oxford University Press concerning the Commission's responsibility for the yearbook, 'History of Universities'. An agreement has been

signed in outline. The Commission welcomed enthusiastically the consent of M. Feingold to become the new editor of the yearbook. P. Denley had indicated his wish to be relieved of the task, because of pressure of work in his university post. Details of all the necessary further arrangements were to be submitted to the Oslo meeting.

7. The President reported about the FASTI project and its first meeting which was held in Leuven in May 1999. The members of CIHU wished to be informed about further developments; in particular they volunteered to provide further information as required. There were two aspects of special value to FASTI in which members of the Commission wished to be involved: 1) W. Höflechner who has extensive experience in organising university archives promised to send fuller considerations to the FASTI committee. 2) Members were also encouraged to report on commemorative publications of their own universities. In this context the members should like to see an English translation of the one-volume summary of the twelve volume history of Copenhagen. Members hoped that the university of Copenhagen would be able to sponsor such a summary. The Vice-Provost for Quatercentenary Affairs in Trinity College, Dublin had also indicated in writing that he was willing to send copies of the TCD jubilee publication, HERMATHENA, to interested members; such members should signal their interest to the General Secretary. (A copy of the list of content will be included with further documentation to be sent to members in advance of the Oslo meeting.)

8. As required by the Statutes all standing members and all officers need to be elected or re-elected every five years. This will be undertaken at the Oslo meeting. The General Secretary is to write to all members individually to ask for a statement before mid-July. A list of all eligible members who are also willing to stand for re-election will then be sent out to all members before the Oslo meeting in August.

In this connection an English translation of the Statutes will be sent to members prior to discussion and approval (two-thirds majority of membership required) at the Oslo meeting. Suggestions for emendations are invited and will be included with the Agenda of the Oslo meeting (again, two-thirds majority will be required). It was also envisaged that the modus of electing affiliated members should also be discussed and resolved at that point. The General Secretary was asked to collect proposals in relation to all aspects of the Statutes in advance of the meeting.

9. Under any other business it was agreed that copies of STUDIUM (e-mail address: <Marc.Nelissen@bib.kuleuven.ac.be>) should be made available to all new members.

Members were encouraged to let the General Secretary know their e-mail addresses, since this was likely to make communication a great deal more efficient as well as cheaper.

The President announced that the Montreal papers of the CIHU meeting (1995) had been published; members were invited to order copies for themselves and their libraries. (A copy of the table of contents is to be included with further documentation to be sent out before the Oslo meeting).

It was agreed that members should be made aware of two national publications of journals of great interest to their activities: 1) *Annali di Storia delle Universita*





Az ember fél sem fogja, mi történt. Csak áll tehetetlenül, morzsolja a könnyeit, aggódva félti szeretteit. Néhány hete még közöttünk volt, dolgozott, terveket szőtt, segített, biztatott, tanácsot adott, csendesesen harcolt a betegségével. A harcot elvesztette, és ma fájón hiányzik mindenkinék, aki ismerte, szerette őt: családjának, barátainak, munkatársainak, tanítványainak. Dr. Méray Lászlót, a Veszprémi Egyetem rektorhelyettesét, tanszékvezetőjét, a Tempus Közalapítvány elnökét ma temetik.

Kiváló fizikus volt, széles körű matematikai ismeretekkel rendelkezett, gyorsan átlátott mindent, emlékeznek kollégái. A József Attila Tudományegyetem matematika-fizika szakán végzett, a Veszprémi Egyetem radiokémia tanszékére 1973-ban került tanársegédnek. Az 1981–82-es tanévben a durhami

és cambridge-i egyetem ösztöndíjas kutatója, 1983-tól a Veszprémi Egyetem radiokémia és fizika tanszékének adjunktusa, majd docense. 1990, a fizika tanszék megalakulása óta tanszékvezető. Tanszékén három kutatási témában (nukleáris és röntgen spektrometria, biofizika és statisztikus fizika) értek el jelentős eredményeket, kialakította és támogatta a kutatási csoportokat. Ő maga több angol nyelvű cikket, négy egyetemi jegyzetet, multimédia tananyagot jelentetett meg. Aktív közéleti emberként számtalan bizottságnak volt tagja, tavaly óta a Tempus Közalapítvány elnöke. 1989–95 között, majd 1999-től rektorhelyettes, közte integrációs rektori megbízott. Jelentős szerepet vállalt a sikeres integráció létrehozásában, az intézményfejlesztési terv kidolgozásában.

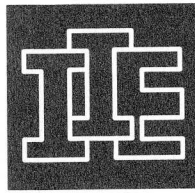

Thank you for your letter and your concern.

I very much enjoyed working with you on the Fulbright selection committee last year as well. In fact, when I examined that list of participants for the many committees that I work with, I looked for familiar names of faculty that I had worked with the year before and was disappointed to see that your name was not on my list for the East and Central European MA/Ph.D Selection Committee.

You see, I am responsible for administering the Fulbright program in Europe. With approximately half of the world wide grantees, and more that half of the applicants under my responsibility, other colleagues in our division assemble our selection committees.

When I received your letter this morning, I was very surprised that a misunderstanding had taken place. When I investigated the situation, I discovered that you had been an alternate last year on our committee. I also discovered that we had not sent you a letter requesting your assistance for a three-year term. However, you were again listed as the first alternate we would contact in case one of the committee members was not able to fulfill their duties either for the MA/Ph.D committee here in New York, or the B.A. committee which met in Chicago. My colleagues, unaware of our previous conversation would not have been aware of the need to send a letter. I, unaware that you had come to the committee as an alternate, erroneously assumed when we spoke in August that you had been invited to serve a three-year term.

I do hope that our relationship has not come to an abrupt conclusion, as I greatly enjoyed working with you last year. Thank you for the e-mail response to my letter of two weeks ago. It seems that we have had a series of miscommunications on the subject of my METEM lecture in Toronto last year. This is probably due to the fact that we correspond in two languages, thus leaving ourselves open to misunderstanding.

Based upon your letter of 16 June 1999 (see attachment I), I was under the assumption that you wanted the Hungarian text, in the form in which I had sent it to you.

In my response of 17 June 1999 (see attachment II), I indicated that your suggestion of publishing the essay, as it was delivered in Toronto, would be most welcome. I conveyed a sense of relief that you did not want to include footnotes in this Hungarian version, since I was facing severe time restraints in July-August of last year.

Having sent you a corrected version of the essay, I believed that the matter was closed.

It is true that in the same letter of 17 June I mentioned that it would be preferable to publish the article in English, with critical apparatus, so that a non-Magyar speaking audience could gain some insight into the tragic fate of Hungary after 1490. Since I was under the impression that you decided to print the Hungarian text of the oral presentation, I took no further steps.

I do not remember receiving any mail from you which indicated that you wanted the English version, with notes, from me.

All this is in the past and has little importance for our future collaboration.

Let me pose a simple but fundamental two-part question, which should end all possible misunderstandings.

1. Do you want to print the Hungarian text I sent to you last summer,

Or

2. Do you prefer an English version of the above, with critical apparatus.

If you opt for the English version (2.), I need to know your decision as soon as possible in order to prepare the footnotes for the article, and have it ready by the end of March, as you requested.

Kedves István, I really must sincerely regret that we miscommunicated in the past. I hope that this letter will clear up all matters. It is with anticipation that I look forward to your answer, and will gladly abide by your valued editorial opinion.
