## Designer/artist featured at Skeggs Lecture on Friday

Vito Acconci, designer, landscape architect and artist, will speak 7:30 p.m. Friday, Oct. 14 in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center as a part of the Skeggs Lecture Series at Youngstown State University.

The lecture is free and open to the public. Seating is on a first-come, first-served basis. For more information, call 330-941-3497.

In addition, 10 projected animations created by the Acconci Studio are on display in the McDonough Museum of Art at YSU through Nov. 11. The museum is open 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays, with expanded hours until 7 p.m. on Oct. 14, the day of Acconci's lecture.

Acconci, who earned a bachelor's degree in literature from Holy Cross College and a Master of Fine Arts in literature and poetry from the University of Iowa, began his career as a poet in the late 1960s. He also was a performance and video artist, expanding his art into audio/visual

installations. More recently, he has focused on architecture that integrates public and private space. The

Acconci Studio is a design firm that mixes poetry and geometry, computer scripting and sentence structure, narrative and biology, chemistry and social science. His work has been widely shown internationally in museums and art galleries.

The lecture series was established in 1966 to honor the late Leonard T. Skeggs, Sr., who came to Youngstown in 1919 as educational secretary of the YMCA. In 1924, he became general secretary, a position he held until his death in 1933. He played a central role in establishing what would become Youngstown College, later Youngstown University and Youngstown State University.

## Dana welcomes Musicology Society, resumes speaker series

The Youngstown State University Dana School of Music's Musicology Series resumes on Friday, Oct. 14, followed the next day by a meeting of musicologists from around the region.

J. Peter Burkholder, distinguished professor of Music at Indiana University, is the featured speaker 4 p.m. Friday, Oct. 14 in the Musicological Series. Burkholder, whose presentation will be in the Bliss Recital Hall on the YSU campus, will talk about "Musical Borrowing or Curious Coincidence?: Testing the Evidence." The program is free and open to the public.

Burkholder is the author of numerous books and articles and has served as president, vice president and director-at-large of the American Musicological Society and on the board of the College Music Society. His writings have received awards from the American Musicological Society, Society for American Music and ASCAP.

The next day, on Saturday, Oct. 15, the Dana School of Music hosts the Fall 2011 meeting of the Allegheny Chapter of the American Musicological Society in Bliss Hall.

Regional chapters of the society usually conduct only one or two meetings a year as a forum for members to present research. It has been several years since the Allegheny Chapter held a meeting in Youngstown.

The meeting's program includes papers on monumental composers, such as Franz Schubert and Fryderyck Chopin (presented by YSU Professor Ewelina Boczkowska), but also studies of John Cage, Contemporary Christian Music, and Kinky Friedman and His Texas Jewboys.

Randall Goldberg, YSU instructor of music history and the local host and program chair for the event, said he is pleased with the breadth of scholarship that will be displayed at the meeting. "It is a great opportunity for our students to see what goes on in the academic side of music history and to meet scholars from Penn State, the Eastman School of Music, and other institutions in the area," he said.

#### **YSU hosts Association of American Geographers**

YSU's Department of Geography is hosting the 2011 annual meeting of the East Lakes Division of the Association of American Geographers on Oct. 14 and 15.

The meetings will be at the Holiday Inn in Boardman on Oct. 14 (5 to 7 p.m. registration and a meet and greet). On Oct. 15, the meetings are in YSU's Williamson Hall from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Oct. 15 agenda will include papers and presentations from 8 a.m. to noon, followed by a luncheon and business meeting. Papers and panel discussions will be held from 1:30 to 5 p.m.

The meeting is expected to attract 75 to 100 faculty and students from across the region, which includes geography departments at universities in Ohio and Michigan in the United States, and schools in Ontario in Canada. Currently, attendees are expected from Kent State University, the University of Akron, Michigan State University, YSU, Ohio Northern University, Western Michigan University, University of Toledo, Miami University, Bowling Green University, Grand Valley State University, Lakeland Community College, the University of Western Ontario. The national vice president of the Association of American Geographers will attend from the University of Minnesota, as will a representative of the national headquarters from Washington D.C.

The event is not open to the public.

## **New Music Society opens season**

The YSU Dana School of Music's New Music Society opens its 2011-12 season, "The Year of the Piano," on Wednesday, Oct. 12 with a noon concert in the Butler Institute of American Art's Beecher Court and a second longer show the same evening at 8 p.m. in Bliss Recital Hall.

Both concerts will feature guest artist Matthew McCright of Minneapolis, a specialist in performance of contemporary music.

McCright, a native of Western Pennsylvania, is a piano faculty member of Carleton College and maintains an active career as a soloist and chamber music performer throughout the United States, Europe, Asia and the South Pacific. He has premiered numerous works, working with many noted composers, some of

whom have written pieces especially for him. McCright has also appeared in concert in major music festivals, including Dublin's Printing

House Festival of New Music, Britain's Late Music Festival, downtown New York's Bang on a Can Festival, and Duquesne University's Summer Music Institute in Pittsburgh to name a few.

McCright earned a bachelor's degree in Piano Performance Magna Cum Laude from Westminster College in New Wilmington, Pa., and holds a master's degree in Piano from the College-Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati. McCright will perform *Blue Fantasy* by Dana faculty Robert Rollin, three movements from *It takes a long time to become a good composer* by Timothy Andres, and the four-movement *Sonata for Piano* by Polish composer Witold Lutoslawski. During his residency, McCright will also meet with student composers to read and critique their compositions.

The two concerts will also feature several world premieres by area composers. Senior Carol Ann Smolka's piano work *Helen at the Water Pump* will be performed by Robert Rollin, who, in addition, will accompany Smolka in her song *A Prelude for the Morning*. Local composer and New Music Guild Inc. member Richard Zacharias will hear both his *Second Romance* and *Consolation* (the latter a world premiere) played by graduate student Allyson Oyster. Oyster herself will hear the world premiere of her *Dialogue for Two Flutes*. Freshman Michael Lynch also will attend the premiere of his *Duet for Two Flutes*. A student flute quartet is featured in the premiere of Samantha Hogan's "Clowns," the first movement of her work-in-progress, *Hells Carnival*. Senior tenor Neil Meloro and graduate student Andrea Dreier will present the song, What You'd Call a Dream by Craig Carnelia. A Dana student brass quintet will perform an arrangement of Erskine Hawkins' *Tuxedo Junction*.
