Harry Bircher earned a bachelor's degree in geology from YSU in 1988. He also has a master's in geology from Wright State University and a master's in engineering from YSU. Bircher is a registered Professional Engineer in Ohio and has been a co-owner of Buckeye Civil Design LLC in North Lima for seven years. He has taught various geology and environmental studies classes at YSU on a part time basis for more than 10 years. He resides in Columbiana, Ohio, with his wife Lisa, who is also a YSU alumna.

Peyman Givi earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from YSU and a Ph.D. from Carnegie Mellon University. He is internationally recognized for his research in the fields of computational fluid dynamics, turbulence, combustion and propulsion. He has authored more than 200 publications and has presented more than 200 public seminars all over the world.

Currently, Givi is the James T. MacLeod Professor of Mechanical Engineering and also Professor of Petroleum Engineering at the University of Pittsburgh. Previously he held the position of University of Buffalo Distinguished Professor.





Connie Hathori

Connie Hathorn is superintendent of the Youngstown City School District. Prior to coming to Youngstown, Hathorn was executive director of Student Support for the Akron City School District. He earned a Ph.D. from Iowa State University. Hathorn said at a community forum prior to becoming superintendent that the Youngstown district made history by being the first in Ohio to fall under state control and that he wants to make history by helping it get out.

Medea opens in Ford Theater

University Theater presents the main stage performance of the Euripides tragedy *Medea* opening Thursday, Feb. 23.

Performances in Youngstown State University's Ford Theater are Feb. 23, 24, 25 and 26 and March 2, 3 and 4. Thursday through Saturday performances begin at 7:30 p.m., while the Sunday matinee is at 3 p.m. All seats are reserved. Patrons are encouraged to purchase their tickets early by calling 330-941-3105. Ticket prices are free for YSU students with ID; \$10 for adults; \$5 for senior citizens, YSU faculty and staff and high school and college students from other universities, Penguin Club members and YSU alumni. Parking is available in the Wick Avenue parking deck for a nominal fee.

There are many myths that tell the story of Medea. The history is that she saved her future husband while destroying her own family. Now, married to Jason, she finds that he has betrayed her love and abandoned their children. In a desperate and powerful act, she kills her own sons, justifying her barbaric acts with tragic poetry.

Director W. Rick Schilling said that *Medea* played to New York audiences in the late 1940s and became popular with 20th century audiences because Robinson Jeffers, by which this version is translated and adapted, abandoned the stylistic conventions of the repetitious episodic plot structure in favor of the contemporary two-act form. Furthermore, he created characters that speak dialogue rather than lengthy monologues

and the Greek chorus, typically 12 or more actors chanting in unison, was banished in favor of three Corinthian women who are presented in a more humanistic fashion.

Schilling, associate designer in the YSU Department of Theater and Dance, has created a concept that includes life-size wooden puppets, shadow puppets, iconic characters from pop culture, projections, computer imagery and a Rock and Roll sound score. The staging borrows concepts from the Japanese theatrical traditions of Bunraku and Kabuki. Schilling is assisted by associate professor and costume designer Jane Shanabarger; senior theater major and costume designer Masako Hayashi; Professor John Murphy, scenic and lighting designer; and freshman sound designer Britty Segal. The additional production expenses for the costumes and masks were funded in part by Roy A. Dray and Delores Sutula Dray of East Liverpool, long time donors to University Theater.

An Opening Night Dinner Buffet is set for 6 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 23, in the University Theater Box Office Lobby in Bliss Hall. A package price of \$20 includes dinner and a ticket for the performance. The dinner price for season ticket holders is \$15. Reservations and payment must be made with credit card via the University Theater Box Office, 330-941-3105. Only paid reservations will be accepted; no walk-ins can be accommodated. Reservations are limited to 80.

Pianist Roman Rudnytsky, a retired faculty member in Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music, performs in Bliss Recital Hall 3 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 26.

Rudnytsky will play selections from Beethoven, Debussy and Chopin, as well as a piece written by his late father, Antin Rudnytsky.

Born in New York City into a prominent Ukrainian musical family, Rudnytsky began the study of piano at age four and played his first recital at age seven. He is a graduate of the Juilliard School in New York, and has to date played concerts in 95 countries and conducted master classes in almost 40 countries. Rudnytsky is a prize-winner in 10 national and international piano competitions.

Between 1990 and 1993, he gave the British, Latin American, and Australian premiere performances of the then-newly-discovered Liszt *Concerto No.3 in E Flat.*

Rudnytsky served on the faculty of the Dana School of Music from 1972 until his retirement in spring 2011, when he was awarded the title of Professor Emeritus. He received a Distinguished Professor Award in 1990. He previously served on the piano faculty of the Indiana University School of Music in Bloomington and was Artist-in-Residence for a year at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory.
