Call to Order: Senate Chairperson Chet Cooper called the meeting to order at 4:07 p.m.

Nominations for Chair of the Academic Senate: Annette Burden, Elections & Balloting Committee, accepted nominations from the floor for the office of Chair of the Academic Senate, the term for which begins in January 2010. Chet Cooper and Kathylynn Feld were nominated. Ballots will be forthcoming.

<u>Nominations for the Charter and Bylaws Committee:</u> Dr. Burden reported that there are three vacancies on the Charter and Bylaws Committee and asked for nominations. Those nominated were Brian Kiser, Terri Volsko, and Francois Fowler.

<u>Confirmation of Senate Secretary and Senate Parliamentarian:</u> Dr. Cooper reported that the Executive Committee has concurred with the appointment of Bob Hogue as Secretary and Kathylynn Feld as Parliamentarian, subject to the approval of the Senate. The appointments were then approved by the Senate without objection.

#### **Report from President Sweet:**

Thank you, Dr. Cooper. I am pleased to share a few moments with you and bring you up to date on several matters. We have had a significant enrollment increase this year. We also have significant challenges ahead as the University System of Ohio takes shape.

My thanks to faculty, staff, and students for getting us off to a good start with a 6.6% enrollment increase over last year. This reflects a collective effort on the part of many people. The Western Pennsylvania tuition has resulted in a 21% increase in students from Pennsylvania. Minority enrollment is up by 17% over last year.

Now our attention needs to shift from enrollment to retention and graduation, since these are part of the new funding formula. As we look to the decade ahead, these will be extremely important factors in the evaluation of the University.

The new Eastern Gateway Community College is underway. We are trying to ensure that our support of the community college and our aims of becoming an urban research university do not collide. The Governor will be here on September 14 to announce the opening of the "Valley Center" for the community college. A Board of Trustees will be appointed in mid-October.

Yesterday's meeting of the Inter-University Council was sobering. There are now four court cases that have a potential impact of \$4 billion on the state budget. Also, in the last biennium, we had an SSI of about \$3.5 billion throughout the state. The current level is \$3.9 billion, but within that is \$3.9 million of one-time federal stimulus money.

I want to thank Dr. Anderson for chairing the United Way campaign. You will be contacted soon with a request for your support.

Tomorrow and Tuesday we will have our quarterly round of Board Committee meetings.

Thank you again for your work, and we will keep you updated on developments.

#### Senate Executive Committee (SEC) / Report from the Chair: Chet Cooper, Chair of the Senate, reported:

Again, I would like to welcome you to a new academic year and thank you for your service to the Academic Senate.

My report for this first meeting will be relatively brief.

First, with regard to the Ohio Faculty Council, it meets this Friday and I will be in attendance. Also, the Chancellor is expected to address the Council. Should you have any reasonable questions to ask of him, please let me know and I will do my best to get present them if I am given the opportunity.

Second, due to the crush of events at the end of the summer and the beginning of the new semester, I have yet to had time to call together a meeting of the Executive Committee. However, we will meet prior to the next meeting of the Senate at which time I will apprise you of the committee's actions.

Third, for several reasons, there will be no Academic Senate meeting next month. Rather, we expect to have

a full agenda when we next meet on November 4th. This will give the various Senate committees ample opportunity to meet and chart out their directions for this academic year.

Fourth, as for the Senate Committees, Bob Hogue and I are finishing the process of filling vacancies. I will be contacting a current senior member of each committee to call for its initial meeting and election of a chair. Bob and I would appreciate your prompt response to this matter.

Fifth, based upon recommendations and actions taken last year, I am forming an ad hoc committee on Teaching and Learning, and will seek to have this committee incorporated into the Senate Committee structure. I am asking Dr. Sherry Linkon to initially chair this committee. This committee will be responsible for i) advising the University on how to address the professional development needs of faculty and staff related to teaching and learning; ii) promoting conversations among faculty and staff about students' needs and effective practices for responding to those needs; and iii) research and promote polices and practices to enhance students' learning. The committee membership will be comprised of Dr. Linkon, the Director of Assessment (Dr. Stringer), the Director of General Education (Dr. Gergits), Director of Distance Learning (Dr. Burden), a faculty representative from each college, seven representatives from student learning support programs, and two student representatives. The latter appointments will be made in the near future.

Finally, I would like to comment on the progress of the Presidential Search Advisory Committee and the Director of Human Resources Search Committee. I am a member of both committees. While I am not a liberty to serve as spokesperson for these two important committees, I can say significant progress is being made. First, last week, two full days of forums were held by Presidential search committee which sought input from all campus and community constituencies. I attended virtually every public session and was gratified by the sincere comments as well as the vision of the qualities that all felt our next president should possess. If you did not participate in any of these forums, please try to participate in any future opportunities. Secondly, the search for the Director of Human Resources is further along. Again, I am not in a position to provide specifics, I can say that in excess of 500 applications were received from across the country and from people from a variety of experiences. You should soon receive additional information from Dr. McCloud regarding the progress of this committee. When the time is appropriate, I most strongly encourage all of you, faculty, staff, and students, as well as members of the larger Youngstown community, to actively participate in the interview process of the candidates we bring to campus. Obviously, the Director of Human Resources will play an important role in campus affairs. More importantly, however, as the Chancellor has noted to the Presidential Search Advisory Committee, the selection of the 7th president of Youngstown State University will be the most important decision for this institution for the foreseeable decade, if not longer. Again, I urge you to participate in the future of YSU.

Ohio Faculty Council Report: Because Tammy King is now and Associate Dean, and the members of the Ohio Faculty Council must be full-time faculty members, she will need to be replaced on the Council. A call for nominations will be sent out shortly.

<u>Academic Programs Committee:</u> Tammy King thanked the committee members for working over part of the summer to complete the committee's work. A list of approved program changes is contained in <u>Attachment 1</u>.

<u>Undergraduate Curriculum Committee:</u> An informational report on approved courses is contained in <u>Attachment 2</u>.
