## Class of 1937



A biographical update published by the Youngstown State University Alumni Association in commemoration of the 50 year reunion of the Class of 1937.

Theodore B. Bender served as Student Body president and president of Student Council while at YoCo. He taught in Youngstown public schools for 36 years and is now living in Sarasota, Florida, where he is a Kiwanis member.

After graduating from Youngstown, Ethel Bower Bright taught for several years in Ohio. On July 12, 1941, she married Charles Bright and moved to State College, Pennsylvania. From 1941 until 1952, she worked in the Penn State library.

After an interval of several years as mother and homemaker, she returned to the working world as a school librarian, retiring in 1978.

Since her husband's death in 1985, she writes, "I keep busy doing volunteer work in the public library, attending musicals and dramatics at the University, taking bus trips and creating afghans and other crafts."

She has one daughter and one granddaughter.

A history and English major at YoCo, Howard N. Brooks began teaching in the Youngstown Public School system after graduation. From April 1943 until April 1946 he served in the Army in the Far East. He and Ellen Chambersin were married in February of 1944.

After receiving a graduate degree in school administration from the University of Pittsburgh, he was principal of the Sheridan School from 1951 to 1960. He moved to the principalship of Mary Haddow School in 1961, a position he held until 1971.

At the time of graduation from Youngstown, Margaret Hill Bunn was teaching at Jackson School in Youngstown, and continued there until her marriage.

For 15 years after her marriage, she taught in the Hubbard Schools, then for a number of years at Struthers High School.

After her retirement, she and her husband spent several years traveling in the U.S., Mexico and Canada. She continued to live in Struthers after his death until 1983, when she entered the Park Vista Retirement Community.

Mary Jane Agey Carney married Michael $P$. Carney in March 1943. She was a homemaker for 19 years, rearing three children--Michael, Jr., John P. and Mary Jane Carney Julian.

Mrs. Carney retired eleven years ago from Neal Middle School in Fowler, where she had taught for 14 years. Her husband, who is also retired, had been employed at the McDonald 18 Mill all his working life. He was general supervisor of the strip mill at the time he retired.

Her daughter lives in Howland with her husband and a daughter and son. Mrs. Carney's son Michael lives in California and her son John in Cortland, Ohio.

Esther V. Zachman Clymer married Rev. John C. Clymer on June 13, 1937. She has since spent 32 years as a school teacher in Ashtabula and Trumbull counties. Throughout the years since graduation, she has taught piano--she still has 25 pupils--and helped her husband in his ministerial duties as Sunday school teacher, pianist and choir director.

She writes that "John and I are in good health, and we are enjoying our busy retirement years together."

Mayme Tucciarone Dear married Eugene D. Dear and moved to California in 1946. She taught in the Los Angeles City school system for 25 years.

In her retirement, she has traveled to South America, Mexico, China, Japan and other countries in the Far East.

She has one daughter and three sons, the oldest of whom is mayor of Gardena, California.

Ralph Dillon gives Youngstown College much of the credit for his current position as executive vice president and treasurer of Standard Slag Company. He writes: "I am deeply indebted to that institution and its faculty . . . of very capable and dedicated men."

Although he was, as a night student, unable to be invoved in campus life, Mr. Dillon was an active member of the Sigma Kappa Phi fraternity, composed of evening class students majoring in business administration. "My membership," he writes,"is something I will always treasure. It provided social activities with those who had the same goals and aspirations as I. Over the years, my appreciation of the college and the fraternity has grown, realizing the contribution both made to my success and happiness."

Lois Hart Evans notes that she and her husband have attended the anniversaries of their respective seats of learning and now look forward to their 50th anniversary next July.

After the holidays with their grandchildren, they plan a trip to Mexico "in search of a location for a winter home."

Dallas Hoover began working for General Electric Company in 1937, interrupting his work during the WW II to serve in the Army Air Corps. He returned to GE following his separation from the Army as a captain, moving to Washington in 1947 to work on the Hanford Nuclear Reservation. During his 32-year career, he was a nationally-known authority on packaging and transporting of radioactive materials and served on Senate subcommmittees in this capacity.

Mr. Hoover died on November 30, 1986. He is survived by his wife Vera; two sons, Dallas, Jr. and Clifton; and five grandchildren. His brother Harold lives in Youngstown.

Following graduation from YoCo, Wayne F. Hower went to work for the Koppers company in Youngstown. He received his master's degree in chemistry from Indiana University and worked for Sherwin-Williams as a research chemist for four years. In 1943, he went to sea as an electronics officer on a submarine in the Pacific.

In 1946, he began a long association with Halliburton Services in Oklahoma, serving as group leader, section leader and research associate in the research and development arm of the chemical lab. Mr. Hower has given many technical presentations in the U.S., Canada and northern Europe and holds U.S. and foreign patents. 1980 marked both his retirement and his being named Oklahoma Chemist of the year. In 1984 he was elected president of the Clay Minerals Society.

Married in 1948, he has two daughters and two granddaughters. He was widowed in August of this year.

In his retirement, he plays golf and does "many of the things I had wanted to do for years."

William Lackey, president of the class of 1937, was, from graduation until 1966, president of Standard Tire Company in Youngstown. Since 1966, he has served as agent and district manager of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the U.S. and was inducted into the Equitable Hall of Fame in 1976. He qualified for membership in the Million Dollar Round Table for seven years.

Mr. Lackey and Dorothy Freidman were married in August of 1940 and have two children, Robert and Susan.

Active in the Youngstown community, he served as president of the Youngstown College Alumni Association. He is a member of the national, state and local chapter of the Association of Life Underwriters and is active in the Rodef Shalom Temple.

Always an enthusiastic basketball player, he was a captain of the YoCo team in 1937 and twice played on teams that won the Ohio State Jewish Championship. In 1985, Mr. Lackey was inducted into the Curbstone Coaches' Hall of Fame.

Ruth Wright Leighninger retired three years ago after working 14 years as a librarian at Washington University. Her husband, Bob, retired a year ago after more than 20 years as executive director of the St. Louis Society for the Blind.
"Retirement," she writes, "has not been at all dull." She and her husband travel some and spend time with their three sons, three daughters-in-law and four grandchildren, "all terrific."

In 1941, Rocco Lucarell went to work as a clerk in the Youngstown post office. He interrupted his postal work to serve in the U.S. Army's 6th Special Service Company, spending $2 \frac{1}{2}$ years in the Pacific theatre. He returned to the Youngstown post office and retired as supervisor of the finance department in 1973.

He writes that in 1937, "the whole college mingled freely and most everyone knew everyone else. They were all a great bunch of 'guys and dolls'--profs included. I wouldn't trade those happy days with any college in the U.S.A."

After graduating from YoCo, J. Robert Ray was employed by the Ohio Conservation Division. He then served in Malaria Control Research during the war, from 1942 to 1946.

He taught biology at Girard High School from 1946 until 1973, and worked during the summers from 1975 to 1978 as a botanist with the Mahoning County Cooperative Extension Service.

His hobbies include travel, photography and actvities in various retirement groups.

George Schuller writes that he's "still in pretty good health, and that's a plus." He worked at the Ohio Bureau of Employment Services "through a lot of industrial changes."

He's enjoying his retirement, playing golf, attending various shows and events in the area, visiting friends and relatives, and traveling now and then.

He has three children--two of them living out of town--and five grandchildren, of whom he says, "Always a joy to see 'em."

Laura Graneto Wondisford married Floyd Wondisford, a mechanical engineer who works for Aluminum Color Industries in Lowellville, Ohio.

She has four children:
Floyd, Jr. is married with three children, lives in Milwaukee and works for Honeywell.

Beverly is a district manager for Nationwide Insurance in Columbia, Georgia. She is married and has one daughter.

Diane directs the Lenox Arts Center in New York City.

Fredric is a doctor working at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland.
