Sir:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated Angust 10th, 1938, concerning the immigration case of Mr. Jacob Bierman, resident of Vienna, and to inform you as follows.

Intending immigrants whose evidence is found upon preliminary examination to be sufficient and satisfactory are notified to that effect by letter, and are invited for the personal axemination and to execute formal visa application as soon as their turns on the waiting list are reached and quota numbers for their use become available. On the other hand, immigrants whose evidence of support is found insufficient are advised in what respect the evidence is insufficient in order that they might take steps to obtain from their sponsors the required additional evidence. The demand that has been registered against certain quotas, including the quota for Germany, is so heavy that the likelihood of numbers being available in the cases of applicants with recent registrations on the waiting list is precluded for some time to come. An applicant for a quota immigration visa may not be issued a vise out of his proper turn with other registrants at the Consulate General, since the effect of such action would be to accord the applicant illegal preference.

Please assure the persons interested in the case of the prospective immigrants that everything possible is being done by this office to handle with the utmost expedition all cases, and that their application will be taken up for final consideration as soon as the turn on the waiting list is reached and a quote number becomes available.
