



From the Desk of the President

This communication should be entitled "What Price Attendance at Meetings?" For the past few years, attendance at our general meetings has been continually dropping, so that about a year and a half ago, the quorum requirement had to be dropped from 20% of the membership in attendance to 10%. This was approximately a drop from 64 members to 32 members necessary to be present in order to be able to transact business brought

before the Society's meetings.

At the present rate of annual dues running from about \$225 to \$250 per member, it would be worthwhile for each member to attend meetings if only to protect this investment. The cost of scheduling speakers for the Society's nine meetings a year may go as high as \$1500, while other expenses for these meetings may add another \$600. If no meetings were held at all, and the \$2100 savings divided among the members in the form of a dues reduction, then with about 335 members at present, it would amount to about \$6.25 per member. This would hardly be worthwhile savings for which to drop our speakers program and our meetings.

Abolishing our meetings and allowing our Council to transact the Society's business would not be advisable, as it would engender widespread discontent among the membership at this undemocratic procedure. The disbanding of medical societies like our own, because of the intense apathy of the members towards coming to meetings, would be a major calamity indeed. It would make the medical profession extremely vulnerable to invasion and subjugation by other agencies. Medical societies must exist for the self protection of physicians and for the protection of the ethical principals

governing medical practice.

The age-old charge that a clique or cliques control medical societies has been used as an excuse not to attend meetings. The charge is false, in my opinion. However, it could become true, for with the present rate of our attendance and our low quorum requirement of 32 members, any small, determined group, say of about 20 members attending meetings regularly,

could easily control the Society, if such were their intent.

We have seen in the past that important business matters and controversial issues have swelled attendance. We shall endeavor this year to bring important matters, including controversial ones, to each meeting, in order to quarantee the general membership that it has the final, deciding power in our Society.

In addition, we shall present a varied program of interesting, scientific and important speakers, more about which will be described in next month's

communication.

I am hopeful that this letter may stir up better attendance in the year before us. We shall carry on with enthusiasm, as we feel that we have an excellent program arranged and enough important as well as controversial business matters for discussion to satisfy even the most "chronic complainers" in our membership.

Editorial

NEW YEARS RESOLUTIONS

Once again we have said good-by to the old year and hello to the new. Many of us have made our New Year's Resolutions knowing full well that

we will make them again with good intentions.

What type of resolutions will our leaders make? We know that 1969 will be a year of changes. We have a new President of the United States and we are certain that he will have made many resolutions and changes. Whether medicine will benefit from these changes, we can only wait and see.

Secretary of State, William P. Rogers, can exert his influence on Medicine. The war in Viet Nam can cease and our troops including physicians may be returned home to their practice of medicine or to further specialty training. In this manner a portion of the physician shortage will be alleviated.

STAFF ELECTIONS AT ST. ELIZABETH



In Memoriam

LAWRENCE H. GETTY, M.D. 1893 - 1968

Youngstown lost another fine physician with the passing of Dr. Lawrence H. Getty. Although 75 years old, Dr. Getty was still practicing and could be seen regularly at his office and at the hospital.

Dr. Getty was born March 6, 1893, in Indiana, Penna., son of John L. and Viola Haney Getty. He went to the University of Pittsburgh and received

his medical degree from Temple University Medical School in 1919.

He came to Youngstown in 1921 and opened an office at 427 Bryson St. In 1949, he moved his office to 3718 Market St. where he remained for almost

20 years.

He was a member of First Presbyterian Church and St. Alban's Lodge F&AM, No. 677. He was active in the Mahoning County Medical Society and the Mahoning Academy of General Practice, being at one time treasurer of the Medical Society and a charter member of the Academy.

He will be missed not only because he was a fine physician and a part of the Youngstown medical scene for forty-seven years, but also because his services as a general practitioner are still sorely needed and there is no-one to step in and take his place. His passing leaves a void — and we are sorrowed.

usual was one the Happy Times for we Medical Assistants.


My last item on the agenda for this year 1968, is to wish all of you from all of us, a very Happy Holiday and a Healthy and Prosperous New Year.



THIRTY YEARS AGO — JANUARY 1939

President Skipp said the Society needed a central office with an Execu-

tive Secretary.

The A.M.A. was under indictment in Washington, D. C. accused of being a combination in restraint of trade. It caused a great stir in medical circles because it was a criminal action, tried in a criminal court. The details cannot be given in small space but the outcome was that the A.M.A. and the Medical Society of Washington were found guilty and some of the officers heavily fined. It was a case of the United States vs. the A.M.A. As the gambler said when he heard the indictment against him as "The State vs. Joe Blow," he thought a minute and said "not a chance at those odds".

The "Medical Crier" was bragging about the wonderful modern age of transcontinental air flights, radio, assembly lines, Diesel engines, pneumonia serum, spinal anesthesia, insulin, diathermy, fever therapy and sulfonamide.

He never heard of Television, Antibiotics, Rockets or Space Ships. There was no measles vaccine, polio vaccine, electroencephalograms, brain scans or open heart surgery. It makes one afraid to write about how modern we are. Thirty years later the reader may laugh.

There were 271 members: 211 active, 12 non-resident, 42 associate and

6 honorary.

TWENTY YEARS AGO - JANUARY 1949

Dr. John McCann took office as President. C. A. Gustafson was the Editor. Other officers and committees were not named. There were 230 active

members, 9 interne, 3 associate and 11 honorary.

A recovery room was instituted at the North Side Unit for patients after surgery. Dr. A. J. Fisher advised the doctors to tell the anxious relatives that there would be a delay of several hours before the patient was returned to his room but in the meantime he would be receiving the closest attention.

New members that month were R. J. Scheetz, E. A. Shorten, Ben Brown,

and D. M. Metcalf.

TEN YEARS AGO — JANUARY 1959

M. W. Neidus was President. He welcomed the new Executive Secretary, Howard Rempes and urged the Society to be more active politically.

Editor L. O. Gregg said that victory over polio was in sight.

C. A. Gustafson was Councilor for the sixth district and very diligent in his duties. He would drive to Columbus and back on Sunday through ice and snow when the rest of us would hate to go down to the hospital.

Dr. Golden died. He was a leading orthopedist and a man of kindness

and compassion. We miss him.

New members that month were: William Hall Bunn, Jr., Marie J. Colucci, Jordan Dentscheff, Fredrick W. Dunlea, Arthur T. Laird, Charles Waltner, Joseph Constantini, William D. Loeser, Richard Roland and Albert Starr. They were welcome members.

S. Q. LAYPIUS OBSERVES:

The passing of the Tod Hotel brings back many memories. For years before World War II, I was the hotel physician. My good friend Joe Bond was manager. It was a busy and important place, second only to the Ohio Hotel under the same management.

As hotel physician I handled many emergencies and met many interesting people: actors, musicians, drunks and dope addicts. My first operation for ectopic pregnancy was done on a waitress who collapsed dramatically in the dining room.

They used to have an ice cutter down there which regularly lacerated

the employees hands and provided me with considerable income.

I found out during Prohibition that a man could get blotto on near beer (3.2%) if he drank enough of it. Why he would call the doctor for help

after he had achieved his goal, I could never understand.

The Medical-Dental Bureau was organized by a group of us doctors who met on Thursdays for lunch in the Rip Tavern. We had help from a man named McGee who was manager of the Bureau in Akron. He would come over here on Thursday to help us. There was a great deal of objection by influential members of the Society to involvement in business affairs. McGee said "Just ignore them. Start your Bureau. Limit the membership to members of the Medical Society and the Corydon-Palmer Dental Society but manage it yourselves. It doesn't need to be part of the Medical Society."

So we did. We all put in \$20.00 and that made \$600.00 to start. Soon we had 150 members, an office and telephone exchange and the Bureau has been growing and serving us ever since. McGee was a great help. All

he got in return was a lot of free highballs.

In the Depression days of the early thirties the Rip Tavern was our Club. It was the place to go after the show or the dance. The 30 foot painting of old Rip Van Winkle's adventures, rescued from the basement and restored by Joe Bond graced the wall back of the bar. The decor was early Colonial. The food was fine and the drink superb. There was entertainment too, music but no dancing. When Elena was there with her violin we never left before 1:00 A.M. When the crowd thinned and her accompanist became tired I often played the piano while she gave out with Victor Herbert or Rudof Friml compositions. Elena was only nineteen then and Joe gave her a start. She became one of the most prominent dinner club entertainers. We have enjoyed her in New York and Nassau.

I was not here in the old days when the Tod House was new. I have read about it but do not remember who rode his horse up those steps into the lobby. I do not remember Governor Tod from Youngstown for whom the hotel was named. It was a great place in its day and I am sorry it must

go. My memories of it are most pleasant.

The following application was presented by the censors:

Bills were read. The motion was made, seconded and duly passed that

each bill be paid.

The Medical Dental Bureau "any doctor call" report was passed around

for every member to see.

The executive secretary reported on disposition of business accruing from

the previous council meeting.

Dr. Tandatnick reported on a meeting between several members of the Mahoning County Medical Society and officials of the Community Chest in regard to the foot clinic, which was recently added to the Chest agencies. The motion was made by Dr. Wegner, properly seconded, that council accept the report and the recommendation that we drop the matter. An amendment was proposed by Dr. Pichette, and properly seconded that we restudy our position in relationship to the Community Chest. The amendment was passed. The original motion was passed.

A letter of explanation regarding reregistration of physicians was read from the Ohio State Medical Association. The letter is attached to the minutes. It was noted that the letter is also being printed in the December

Bulletin.

A letter was read from the Medical Assistants Society of Mahoning County noting that their president, Mrs. Matilda McConnell, was retiring due to illness and that the new president would be Mrs. Alice Larson.

A letter was read from the Medical Assistants Society asking approval to solicit patron advertising for their program for the 1969 meeting in Youngs-

town. Approval was granted.

A letter was read from Mr. G. V. Thomas, Asst. Secy. of The General Fireproofing Co. asking if there was a committee to which unusual insurance cases could be brought for mediation. Dr. Tandatnick will answer the letter stating that the patient has access to the Medical Society grievance committee.

A plan for photographing members was submitted by Allen Corp. of Detroit. Council agreed that if ever the service were needed, local photographers could do the job.

A policy was read from the Ohio State Medical Association concerning

bank credit cards. The policy is attached to the minutes and will be printed in the Bulletin at some future date.

A letter was read from a Welfare Rights Organization. No action was taken.

Dr. Wegner introduced forms to be used to improve communication between psychologists and physicians, and which would allow the psychologist to refer patients to a physician. The motion was made by Dr. Holden, and properly seconded, that the forms be approved.

Dr. Bloomberg made the motion, properly seconded, that the Medical Society make the hospital medical directors permanent ex officio members of council. An amendment was proposed to state, "provided it is constitutionally possible." The amendment was passed. The original motion was rassed.

Dr. Pichette introduced discussion concerning a Drug Abuse Committee. and general community envolvement of the Medical Society in many areas Following discussion, the motion was made by Dr. Pichette, and properly seconded, that a Drug Abuse Committee be formed. Motion was passed.

Mr. Rempes noted that a year ago, Government 90-day Bills had been purchased by the Medical Society and asked instructions. Motion was passed

that 90-day Bills be again purchased.

Discussion ensued concerning Non-resident dues. It was agreed that the \$5.00 per year charged to non-resident members no longer covered the cost of services. The motion was made, seconded and duly passed that nonresident dues be changed to \$10.00 for 1969.

Meeting was adjourned.




