



From the Desk of the Iresident

In the letter for this month I shall give α brief review of the program that has been arranged for the meetings for the coming year. While this review will detail chiefly the speakers and events that are contemplated, it should be realized that in addition to these, the business portion of each of the meetings will grapple with an attempt to arrive at solutions to some of

our major and minor problems.

For the meeting on Tuesday, February 18th, soon after you receive this Bulletin, our quest speaker will be Dr. Alexander P. Runciman, a member of the Reproductive Biology Research Foundation of St. Louis. This group, it will be recalled, is headed by William H. Masters, M.D. and Virginia E. Johnson, Ph.D., authors of the famous recent book "Human Sexual Response", which was a scientific study of human sexual intercourse. Dr. Runciman will speak on the "Treatment of Human Sexual Inadequacy". At this writing he is expected to bring moving pictures to illustrate his talk. The St. Louis group is associated with the Washington University School of Medicine, and their studies, now about in the tenth year, represent probably the first thorough scientific investigation of human sexual intercourse, starting with the normal and proceeding with normal variations.

The March 18th meeting will be the Annual Medical-Legal Banquet. Since this year the Mahoning County Bar Association will be the host, they have selected the speaker, who will discuss a topic of mutual interest and im-

portance to physicians and lawyers.

The meeting in April, which takes place on April 15th, a "rather fateful day" for taxpayers, will be addressed by James C. Herndon, a tax attorney from Akron. Mr. Herndon is a former Internal Revenue Service agent and has earned quite a reputation as an attorney dealing chiefly with tax matters, having many clients in this area and representing many prominent firms, such as Goodyear Tires and others on tax matters. His talk will deal with tax problems as they confront physicians. This will indeed be a welcome consultation, and at a most propitious time!

In May, the scientific portion of the meeting will be devoted to plastic surgery of the face and female breast. The speaker will be Dr. Herbert Conway, Professor and Head of the Department of Plastic Surgery of Cornell University Medical College and New York Hospital. Dr. Conway is one of the leading plastic surgeons in New York City, having trained many men in this speciality, a large number of his pupils now heading Departments of

Plastic Surgery in many medical schools throughout the country.

Our Society takes a "vacation" during the summer months as far as general meetings are concerned, so that none will be held in June, July or

Editorial

USUAL, CUSTOMARY, REASONABLE

In this day and age when because of varying influences and events, we have found our vocabulary to be constantly in a state of flux. No field or profession has remained immune from the changes occurring. Even in the field of medicine, changes are seen and with these changes, confusion has followed.

Recently how many times has each of us picked up a newspaper or newsletter and seen the words usual, customary and reasonable? How many times have we discussed the significance of these words and become confused? To add even more confusion to the picture, the term, prevailing then made its appearance in the news media.

Before we can communicate with another, one must have a common denominator, that of language and terminology. Only then can an intelligent discussion ensue.

Usual, Customary, Reasonable do not seem like words that should cause

any confusion. What do they mean?

1. Usual is a term constantly used. It occurs in the ordinary course of events or in ordinary practice. The synonyms are common, Customary, every day, familiar, frequent, general, habitual, normal, ordinary, prevailing, prevalent, regular, and wonted.

2. Customary is conforming to custom or usage. That which is established

by custom, is conventional, usual, habitual or common.

3. Reasonable is to conform to general opinion. It is characterized by mod-

eration, especially in price.

 Prevailing is that which is most widely extended, commonly accepted or current. Synomins include such words as predominant or prevalent over others.

Thus we see, from Webster's definition of these words, that usual means customary and prevailing. Reasonable means moderation, especially in price.

When we see these terms, usual, customary and reasonable, do we mean that which is customary and in moderation or do we mean that which is prevalent and predominant? Perhaps all parties concerned should learn the art of communication with each other and agree to a definition and significance of all vocabulary used. This is far superior than seeing the words usual, customary and reasonable and not knowing what it means.

Coalburg Lake. Since this was very successful and many of our members liked the idea so much that they thought the picnic should be an annual event, it will be continued this year. The picnic this year is scheduled to be held on Thursday, September 11th, again at Coalburg Lake, with the Medical Society being the host.

The program and/or speakers for the October and November meetings have not yet been set, but we have a choice of two prominent endocrinologists, a business consultant to speak on some aspect of financial problems facing physicians, and the possibility of a seminar type of discussion

on the abuse of drugs in our own and other communities.

It has not been the custom of our Society to have a speaker at our December meeting, when elections take place, so that we will follow this

custom and not schedule a talk for this session.

At the Annual Installation of Officers Banquet in January 1970, which is held in lieu of a regular meeting, we have invited Dr. Edward Annis, former President of the AMA, to speak on "Medicare—Plus 4", not only to alert us as to how we, as a profession, stand at that time, but also to give us an idea of what the Federal Government has in mind for us for the future.

Judging from these programs, we should have a rousing good time at our meetings. We, our Program Chairman, Dr. Henry Shorr, and I, have decided that the members of the Women's Auxiliary will be invited to all cf our general meetings this year, since our speakers' topics, our events, and many of our discussions on business matters will be of as great interest to them as to their husbands! So, we shall expect to have the Ladies join us at our meetings.

MEDICAL SCHOOL STUDY UNDER WAY

The successful conclusion of a \$30,000 fund-raising drive to provide a feasibility study for a medical school in Youngstown was announced by Dr. Leonard P. Caccamo, chairman of the Medical School Committee, at a

gathering of civic leaders on January 18.

Official signing of the contract with Booz, Allen and Hamilton took place at a special meeting at the Mural Room. Dr. Caccamo and Dr. Tandatnick, president, signed for the Medical Society. Dr. Charles C. Edwards, scheduled to sign for the consulting firm, was unable to attend the meeting due to weather conditions which cancelled plane flights at both the Chicago and Youngstown airports.

The ceremony was witnessed by thirty guests including Mayor Anthony B. Flask and a number of city councilmen; County Commissioners, Tom Barrett and George Bindas; Sen. Charles J. Carney and Rep. Walter H. Paulo; Al Shipka, president of the Greater Youngstown AFL-CIO Council and Al De Vico, president of the Youngstown Building Trades Council; Paul Mossman, Exec. Dir. of the Youngstown Area Chamber of Commerce; Mrs. J. L. Fisher, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University and William Coffield, vice president of Academic Affairs and John Coffelt, vice president of Administration; members of the medical school committee; and Mr. John Parimucha, Jr., who was a special guest and who gave a great deal of his time to work on the drive.

Signing of the contract was the climax of a three-month fund-raising campaign and a two-year study by a committee of the Medical Society ap-

pointed for that purpose.

Those in attendance, in a number of speeches, expressed appreciation to the Mahoning County Medical Society for taking the lead and necessary first step toward the establishment of a medical school here. Sen. Carney was credited with having the dream of a medical school and for bringing

it to the attention of the Medical Society and the public.

It was noted that Youngstown will be in contention with three other areas. Akron State, Cleveland State, and Kent State Universities have already completed some form of feasibility study and have shown strong interest in acquiring the school. The Youngstown study, which will take approximately three months, will be ready in time to place Youngstown in a position for consideration by the Ohio Board of Regents, who will make the final decision as to the placement of a fifth medical school in Ohio.

Dr. Caccamo expressed deep appreciation to those who contributed money towards the study and pointed out that the large number of donors

showed wide community interest in the project.


"DRUG ABUSE" BILLBOARD ON DISPLAY

SEX RESEARCH PROJECT IN FEBRUARY

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. The minutes of the meet-

ings of December 9 and December 17th were read and approved.

Mrs. Polk also interviewed 235 persons; this includes clinic patients and patients of private physicians.

132 home visits were made with the assistance of other Visiting Nurses;

54 were not at home or not found.

Educational films from the U. S. Public Health Service, entitled, "A QUARTER MILLION TEENAGERS" and "INNOCENT PARTY", also slides about Venereal Disease were shown by Mrs. Polk to various High Schools, Parent Teachers and church groups in Youngstown and surrounding localities. Altogether 6179 persons viewed these films from January 1, 1968 to December 31, 1968.

In Ohio the law forbids physicians to treat juveniles infected with Venereal Disease without the consent of their parents. This law is obsolete and does not help control Venereal Disease among the young people. It should be repealed.

This is my last report. From now on Dr. Herman Zeve takes over. I wish to thank the Board of Health, Mr. Roy Mellon and Dr. Sam Goldberg in particular, the Visiting Nurse Association and Mahoning County Medical Society for their fine cooperation.

THIRTY YEARS AGO — FEBRUARY 1939
