





Panel Discusses Disposal of Waste

The combined Mahoning County Medical Society and Auxiliary meeting held at the Wick Pollock Inn on March 21, 1989 featured the program "Disposal of Medical Waste - Guidelines for Physicians." Panelists included: Dr. Ronald F. Fletcher, Director, Ohio Department of Health; Nancy Newman, Supervisory, Industrial Hygienists, Occupational Safety and Health Administration; Anthony Mantia, District Sales Manager, Waste Management Inc., Medical Services; and Karen Gierscher, District Sales Manager, Browning Ferris Industries, Medical Waste Systems, Inc. Dr. Chester A. Amedia Jr., chairman, Aids Awareness Committee served as moderator.

Discussion centered on Senate Bill 243, which regulates the disposal of infectious medical waste in Ohio. It was noted that Ohio's law established a separate set of standards for small generators of infectious waste (less than 50 pounds per month). Most physicians are considered "small generators" of infectious medical waste, since the only type of infectious medical waste, under Ohio's program, they have are "sharps" and "cultures." The small generator is required to contain sharps and to disinfect cultures prior to disposal.

The CME program was planned by the MCMS AIDS Awareness Committee in cooperation with MSAHEN.

the patient together with the ulcer...Do not temporize with hemorrhage or perforation."

TWENTY YEARS AGO MAY 1969



Physician's Advisory

A "service recovery" strategy for your office.

The best marketing strategy of all is good service so your patients will be "satisfied customers." If a patient has a complaint, this startegy calls for a "recovery" format to keep him or her satisfied.

"You can't please all of the people all of the time," they say. Yet patients evaluate your quality largely on satisfaction factors unrealted to your clinical skills. If your patient has a complaint about the service he or she received, good marketing strategy calls for working hard to satisfy that patient anyway.

The Art of Making Right

In the service sector, making things right in the face of compalints is called "recovery." It has several elements:

• <u>Detection</u>. Though some employees may want to stifle complaints, that's the wrong attitude. Complaints point out areas of discontent which you may have overlooked. Knowing about them gives you the opportunity to right a wrong.

• <u>Correction</u>. By righting the wrong, your practice presents itself more favorably to future patients. The recovery system thus

helps improve your service.

• Reselling. By attempting to solve the problem your patient complained about, you "resell" that person on your practice's values. The recovery process retains a patient's loyalty, and the recovered patient is more likely to praise you to others.

The importance of recovery may seem obvious. But how can you make the principle actually work in your office? Here are some ideas.

- 1. <u>Managerial Emphasis</u>. The physician(s) and their manager/administrator are basically responsible. They must make clear to all employees that complaints are welcome. A staff member who swallows her pride, admits she's wrong (or at least understands the patient's complaint) and tries to handle each complaint effectively helps the practice. Your job as physician or manager is to make sure the staff understands this.
- 2. <u>Complaint Report.</u> You'll never know what to correct nor how well you've fared in trying to correct it if you don't have a written record of the complaints. So develop a simple printed form and *require* that each patient complaint be reported on it. The form

should have a line entitled "Action Taken" so you can see how each complaint is handled. Make sure that each report is turned in to a designated person - perhaps the manager - to track the problems and their handling.

3. Reparations. Formalize a process by which each complaint receives some sort of special response. Whether it be 10% off the patient's bill, or a personal apology letter or phone call from the doctor or manager, the gesture helps save your patient's loyalty. Assign the reparations task to one person-probably your manager—so the gestures will actually occur.

Properly administered, service recovery strategies do more than just save face. Your patients feel more secure when they know your entire practice cares; their confidence and trust in you increases. And your staff benefits by having solid guidelines for concern, from which they feel pride in being part of a quality organization.



Legislative Update

WORKERS' COMPENSATION BILL UNDER CONSIDERTION

House Bill 222, authored by State Representative Ross Boggs, Jr. of Andover, is a bill negoti-

ated between business and the AFL-CIO to reorganize the administration of Ohio's workers' compensation system. The measure would add oversight and more clearly delineate that the duties of the Bureau of Workers' Compensation are administrative and the duties of the Industrial Commission are adjudicative. Though broad in nature, some provisions of this bill are of concern to the OSMA. Those provisions include:

- Deleting existing language which states that the Bureau's level of payments to health care providers must be substantially equivalent to prevailing schedules of private and government health care insurers. The replacement language gives the newly-created Medical Section of the Bureau authority to set "standard medical fees" which is undefined in the bill.
- The bill prohibits physicians who accept assignment from the Bureau of Workers' Compensation from balance billing a claimant-patient for an amount in excess of what the Bureau establishes as payment.

The bill passed the full House of Representatives on March 16, 1989, and is currently before the Ohio Senate Commerce and Labor Committee for review.

The OSMA has met with leaders and members of the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee in an effort to remove the objectionable language in House Bill 222, and will work toward a workers' compensation system which appropriately reimburses, allows patients free choice of medical providers, and controls the quality of patient care.

TEN YEARS AGO MAY 1979

The latest warning form the Public Health Service has to do with excessive exposure to radiation through diagnostic as well as therapeutic use of Roentgen Rays. This prompted both President Y.T. Chiu and Editor H.S. Wang to devote their editorials to the subject of radiation exposure. President Chiu wrote, "It is our duty to educate our patients to withhold all unnecessary x-ray examinations as much as possible..." Editor Wang wrote that Dr. E.C. Baker, one of the pioneers in x-ray technology in Youngstown, would be thrilled to witness the break-through brought about by the development of the CAT scanner with far less radiation exposure than in Dr. Baker's day.

And now we have the MRI, which has no radiation exposure at all, but uses magnetic resonance to provide pictures of remarkable clarity. One wonders what untoward reactions the Public Health Service will be telling us about this new

technique in the coming years.
