and CANDIDATE FOR THE DEGREE HONORARY DOCTOR OF LAWS

Today's commencement speaker, Ray Travaglini, is a noted entrepreneur and civic leader in the Mahoning Valley. His contributions to the area were celebrated this year by the Youngstown State University Alumni Association, which named him its Distinguished Citizen for 1993.

Born in Greenville, Pennsylvania, Mr. Travaglini graduated from Penn High School, where he lettered in football and basketball. He began his working life at Greenville Steel Car Company as a steel fabricator, then moved to the Pennsylvania Power Company. He subsequently took a job with Kroger Company, working his way from the stock room to the store manager's desk.

After establishing his own water conditioning business, Mr. Travaglini joined forces with Sandy B. Petruso in 1964 to found the Imperial Development Corporation, which built numerous apartment complexes, office buildings, gas stations and car washes. In 1968, the partnership, now known as Sanray Corp., built its first Perkins Restaurant. Sanray has grown to thirty-two Perkins restaurants employing over 2,500 people, prompting the president of Perkins Franchising to present a special award to the corporation. Another of Mr. Travaglini's enterprises, Sandalini's Bistro in Meadville, Pennsylvania, has won acclaim as one of the nation's finest restaurants. Built in 1977, it was expanded to double its original

size in 1991. Mr. Travaglini also owns three radio stations: 1331 AM, WZKC; 1470 AM, WRQQ; and 95.5 FM, WHTX.

Mr. Travaglini has given generously of his time and resources to many charitable and civic organizations. Boys' Towns and Girls' Towns voted him an Honorary Citizen. In 1979, Boys' Towns honored him as Man of the Year for his dedication to their cause in raising over \$300,000 for the organization. A past president of the Italian Scholarship League, he was named that organization's Man of the Year in 1984 and has raised over \$400,000 in scholarship funds for deserving students. Mr. Travaglini's other fund-raising efforts have benefited numerous other charitable groups as well, including the Boy Scouts of America, the American Heart Association, Easter Seal Society and the City of Hope.

Perhaps best known for his ardent support of all sports, Mr. Travaglini annually produces the Sandalini's Sports Banquet in conjunction with his partner, Sandy Petruso. Now in its fourteenth year, the banquet raises funds for scholarships given to Youngstown State University students and brings to the area some of the great sports celebrities of our era.

The father of a son and four daughters, Mr. Travaglini enjoys big game hunting and sports in his leisure time.

ACADEMIC REGALIA AND CEREMONY

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of clothing worn in medieval times by students and professors. In the early universities — Bologna, Paris, Oxford - the undergraduate students had no prescribed academic dress but wore their usual clerical or ecclesiastical habits. The professors wore more colorful academic regalia than their modern-day descendants. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where the lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, there is a change to somber black and it is only in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the warmth and color of medieval academic pageantry is retained.

The hoods representing degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; drab for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education.

Since 1895, in the United States, the colors and types of caps and gowns have been largely standardized; in 1932 the code was revised to some extent, and in 1960 it was revised once more. A few American universities have adopted gowns other than black in color, and in European universities there is more diversity in cut and in the cap than prevails in the United States. Trustees and administrators of American colleges and universities, too, may wear regalia which is different from that commonly worn. The trustees of Youngstown

State University wear a specially designed cardinal gown.

The bachelor's gown is worn closed; the master's gown is worn open or closed, depending partly on its tailoring; and the wearer of the doctor's gown has the privilege of wearing it open or closed. The sleeves of the three types of gowns are of different lengths and cuts, and in addition the sleeves of the doctor's gown have three horizontal velvet stripes. The doctor's gown also has a vertical facing of velvet in front. The stripes and facing may be either black or in the color representing the field in which the wearer has received the doctorate.

There are different opinions about the origin of the caps worn in academic ceremonies. One view is that the "mortar board" is in actuality adapted from the wooden square used by masons. Another is that it stems from the ecclesiastical or clerical head covering of the medieval period. The tassels worn on the caps may or may not be of the same types. In some institutions all masters' and bachelors' tassels are black; in others the tassels, which are the same as the colors of the facings of the hoods, reflect the degree received. The tassels worn by doctors may be black or gold thread.

There is something of the same adherence to tradition in commencement processions that exists in academic garb, although each institution has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirements. The chief marshals lead the line of march, followed by the president, the speaker, trustees, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform. Then follow the faculty and the candidates for degrees. The recessional at the end of the ceremony follows the same order.

Recipients of University Honors will receive special insignia, consisting of golden honor cords placed around the shoulders.
