Founded in 1908, Youngstown State University originally served 160 students with about a dozen faculty members and provided expanded educational opportunity for all people—store clerks and factory managers, steel industry workers, newly arrived immigrants, women and men, and both part-time and full-time learners.

RECIPIENT OF THE DEGREE HONORARY DOCTOR OF THE UNIVERSITY

Eleanor Beecher Flad is a lifelong resident of the Mahoning Valley and active participant in the area's civic life. A descendent of pioneer families, she is the daughter of Ward and Florence Beecher and granddaughter of Walter Beecher. The grandfather owned a

number of businesses in the area, was one of the founders of Commercial Shearing, and was President of Mahoning National Bank during the 1929 stock market crash. Her great-grandfather, German Lanterman, built what is now known as the "Old Mill" in Mill Creek Park.

As a young girl, Mrs. Flad attended Yale School, a private school on Youngstown's north side. She graduated from Chaney High School, attended Smith College, and received her degree from the University of Georgia. During her summer breaks, she completed coursework at Youngstown College. During World War II, she worked for the American Red Cross and later at

Youngstown's Woodside Receiving Hospital as a psychiatric social worker.

Mrs. Flad was a member of the Junior League of Youngstown and served on the boards of the Child Guidance Center, Fresh Air Camp, Mahoning

County 648 Mental Health Board, Friends of American Art, Mahoning Valley Historical Society, and the Mill Creek Children's Center. She has also served as a director of Mahoning National Bank.





Academic Regalia and Ceremony

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of those worn in medieval times by students and professors. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, somber black garb became the norm, and it is primarily in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the

medieval academic pageantry is retained.

The hoods representing graduate degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; olive for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education.

There are different opinions about the origin of the caps worn in academic ceremonies. One view is that the "mortar board" is in actuality adapted from the wooden square used by masons. Another is that it stems from the ecclesiastical or clerical head covering of the medieval period.

There is something of the same adherence to tradition in commencement processions that exists in academic garb, although each institu-



tion has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirement. The faculty leads the line of march followed by the candidates for degrees. Then follow the chief marshals, the president, speaker, trustees, deans, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform.

Recipients of University Honors receive golden honor cords placed around the shoul-

ders. University Scholars wear a specially minted medallion on a red ribbon to denote their academic achievement.

The Presidential Medallion

President Sweet wears a one-of-a-kind medallion that bears an embossment of the Youngstown State University seal on each of the small elements and on the large central piece. On the back of the central medallion are engraved the names of the University's five past presidents and Dr. Sweet.

The presidential medallion was designed and created out of sterling and bronze by Wendell August Forge of Grove City, Pennsylvania. Dr. Sweet is the first president to wear this medallion.

The Youngstown State University Seal

The University's official seal was adopted in 1936. Designed by a student, the seal includes a torch, quills, wings, a globe, and the Latin words animus liberatus. In simple terms, those words summarize the transformation—or liberation—that occurs on this campus countless times each day. In English, they are translated *The Mind Freed*, or *The Spirit Freed*.
