The University Ceremonial Mace

The ceremonial mace has its roots in ancient Rome. During the Middle Ages, the two types of maces—one a scepter and symbol of royal authority, the other a weapon—gradually evolved into a symbol of lawful power and regal authority. Beginning in fourteenthcentury Europe, the academic mace became part of the pomp and ceremony of university commencements, denoting the authority of the University to confer academic degrees.

The new Youngstown State University mace being carried today was designed and crafted by a collaborative team that included YSU faculty, students, alumni, and area K-12 art educators under the leadership of YSU professor Greg Moring.

Cast Silver Floral Forms Represents petals of the scarlet carnation, the state flower of Ohio. The carnation has the meaning of 'admiration,' 'love,' and 'gratitude.' Bronze Flames of Knowledge that heat the Forge of Learning Forging the learning environments of the future, forging learning communities. Designed and cast by area K-12 art educator.

- Polished Rosewood Upper Grip

Cast Silver Globus Represents the President's role as protector of the Core Values and leadership of the University community. Designed and cast by area K-12 art educator.

Polished Rosewood Lower Grip

Cast Bronze Finial Symbolizes the collective philosophical values of the University. Designed and cast by area K-12 art educator.

Commencement Speaker and recipient of the degree Honorary Doctor of Science

Today's commencement speaker, Dr. Janet E. Del Bene, is professor emeritus of chemistry at Youngstown State University and an internationally recognized theoretical chemist and expert in the field of hydrogen bonding. Since retiring from teaching in 1999, Dr. Del Bene has dramatically increased her research and writing, having recently marked the publication of her 215th scientific paper.

Originally from Girard, Ohio, Dr. Del Bene earned

a bachelor's degree in education in 1963 and a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1965, both summa cum laude from YSU. She earned a Ph.D. in chemistry in 1968 from the University of Cincinnati. Her first published paper was part of her Ph.D. research and appeared in *The Journal of Chemical Physics* in 1968. She was recognized by UC as a Distinguished Alumni in 1994.

Her 200th paper, published in *Magnetic Resonance in Chemistry* in 2007, explains how nuclear magnetic resonance experiments can be used to characterize hydrogen bonds. In addition, this paper also suggests new experiments that could provide new and important insights.



Janet E. Del Bene, Ph.D.

Dr. Del Bene worked on two occasions with Nobel Prize Laureate Dr. John A. Pople at Carnegie Mellon University. Since retiring she has been a visiting professor at the University of Sydney, Australia, held an adjunct professorship at the University of Florida, and was a BBVA Foundation Fellow at the University of Madrid.

In 2003, Dr. Del Bene received YSU's Heritage Award and the Dean's Lifetime Achievement Award for Externally Supported Research.

Iota Sigma Pi honored her with the National Honorary Member Award for an Outstanding Woman Chemist in 2002, and she received a Two-Year Extension for Special Creativity (a Director's Award) for her 2002 National Science Foundation grant. In 2008, Dr. Del Bene received the Morley Medal given by the Cleveland Section of the American Chemical Society. She is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

A 22–year member of the Clinical Research Committee of St. Elizabeth Hospital Medical Center, Dr. Del Bene has also served as a consultant to the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company and the National Institutes of Health and as an external examiner for the U.S. Department of Energy.

Robert J. Beebe, Ed.D.

Professor of Educational Foundations, Research, Technology, and Leadership

Robert J. Beebe received his bachelor's degree in government from Harvard University and his master's degree in instructional supervision, Certificate of Advanced Graduate Study, and Doctor of Education degree from the College of William and Mary. He is a professor and founding chair of the Department of Educational Foundations, Research, Technology, and Leadership at YSU.

Dr. Beebe developed and inaugurated the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) program in educational leadership, the first doctoral program at the University, and has directed 12 completed YSU doctoral dissertations. Dr. Beebe's scholarly activities include 20 national refereed articles or book chapters, 10 national refereed presentations, one international refereed presentation, and three major grants from the Ohio Department of Education totaling \$691,500. He has been honored with two Watson Merit Awards from YSU for performance as department chair in 1993 and 2004 and the YSU's Chairpersons' Leadership Award in 1996. In 1993, Dr. Beebe received the Mahoning County Association of Elementary School Principals Educator of the Year Award and was the featured speaker at the University Honors Convocation.

Academic Regalia and Ceremony

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of those worn in medieval times by students and professors. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, somber black garb became the norm, and it is primarily in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the



tion has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirement. The faculty leads the line of march followed by the candidates for degrees. Then follow the chief marshals, the president, speaker, trustees, deans, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform.

The hoods representing graduate degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; olive for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education.
