THE UNIVERSITY CEREMONIAL MACE

The ceremonial mace has its roots in ancient Rome. During the Middle Ages, the two types of maces—one a scepter and symbol of royal authority, the other a weapon—gradually evolved into a symbol of lawful power and regal authority. Beginning in fourteenth-century Europe, the academic mace became part of the pomp and ceremony of university commencements, denoting the authority of the University to confer academic degrees.

The Youngstown State University mace was designed and crafted by a collaborative team that included YSU faculty, students, alumni, and area K-12 art educators under the leadership of YSU professor Greg Moring.



Cynthia E. Anderson

Cynthia E. Anderson, in her third year as president of her alma mater, retires June 30 after a diverse, successful career spanning nearly 40 years.

Anderson is the first Mahoning Valley resident, the first YSU graduate and the first woman to lead the university, and she served in a succession of faculty and administrative positions at the university for 31 years before moving into the president's office in July 2010.

As president, Anderson has charted an aggressive course that emphasizes academic excellence and student success, including the development and implementation of *YSU* 2020: The Strategic Plan of Youngstown State University. The plan, which reflects the input of hundreds of individuals on campus and in the community, is helping align YSU's priorities, investments and initiatives over the course of the next decade.

Anderson earned a bachelor's degree in business education from YSU in 1973, a master's in business education from Ohio State University in 1976 and an EdD in education administration (higher education) and student personnel services from the University of Akron in 1990.

After five years of teaching business education at Westerville South High School, she joined the YSU faculty in 1979 as an instructor of business education and technology. She was named assistant professor in 1985, associate professor in 1990, associate professor of marketing and public relations in 1994, and was promoted to professor of marketing and public relations in 2000, a post that she currently retains. She was assistant provost for academic planning from 1993 to 1995 and was named vice president for student affairs in 1995.

As vice president, she provided leadership for the development of the Enrollment Management and Student Recruitment plans, the first formal New Student Orientation program known as SOAR, the first New Student Convocation program, the Office of Veterans Affairs, the Center for Student Progress, the Office of the Student Ombudsman, the Office of Campus Recreation and Intramural Sports, the Presidential Mentors Program, the Emerging Leaders Program and campus safety programs such as the Student Threat Assessment Team and the YSU Alert emergency notification system.

Anderson's scholarly activities include dozens of journal articles, conference proceedings and presentations. She has been active in the community, serving on the board of directors for the Neil Kennedy Recovery Clinic, Leadership Mahoning Valley, the Rich Center for Autism and the United Methodist Community Center, among others. In 2004, she received the ATHENA Award, presented annually by the Youngstown-Warren Regional Chamber and The Vindicator to a woman who exhibits professional excellence, community service, and career support for other women. Other honors include the 2005-06 Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Diversity Award for Distinguished Service and the 2004 Outstanding Community Involvement Award from Leadership Mahoning Valley.

Academic Regalia and Ceremony

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of those worn in medieval times by students and professors. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, somber black garb became the norm, and it is primarily in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the

today that the medieval academic pageantry is retained.

The hoods representing graduate degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; olive for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education.

There are different opinions about the origin of the caps worn in academic ceremonies. One view is that the "mortar board" is in actuality adapted from the wooden square used by masons. Another is that it stems from the ecclesiastical or clerical head covering of the medieval period.

There is something of the same adherence to tradition in commencement processions that



exists in academic garb, although each institution has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirement. The faculty leads the line of march followed by the candidates for degrees. Then follow the chief marshals, the president, speaker, trustees, deans, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform.

Recipients of University Honors

receive golden honor cords placed around the shoulders. University Scholars wear a specially minted medallion on a red ribbon to denote their academic achievement.

The Presidential Medallion

President Anderson wears a one-of-a-kind medallion that bears an embossment of the Youngstown State University seal on each of the small elements and on the large central piece. On the back of the central medallion are engraved the names of the University's six past presidents.

The presidential medallion was designed and created out of sterling and bronze by Wendell August Forge of Grove City, Pennsylvania.

The Youngstown State University Seal

The University's official seal was adopted in 1936. Designed by a student, the seal includes a torch, quills, wings, a globe, and the Latin words animus liberatus. In simple terms, those words summarize the transformation—or liberation—that occurs on this campus countless times each day. In English, they are translated *The Mind Freed*, or *The Spirit Freed*.

ounded in 1908, Youngstown State University originally served 160 students with about a dozen faculty members and provided expanded educational opportunity for all people—store clerks and factory managers, steel industry workers, newly arrived immigrants, women and men, and both part-time and full-time learners.

This progressive spirit guided the development of the institution as it evolved from a YMCA technical institute, later as Youngstown College (1928), then as Youngstown University (1955) and, in 1967, as Youngstown State University, a member of the Ohio public higher education system.

Today, Youngstown State University is a leading comprehensive university, serving more than 12,900 full- and part-time students with 118 undergraduate programs, 44 master's degree programs, one specialist program, and three doctoral degree programs. There are more

than 450 full-time faculty and 800 professional and support staff members in seven colleges, schools and administrative departments.

In partnership with schools and the corporate and non-profit communities, Youngstown State University promotes diversity and excellence in teaching, research, and service to increase the educational attainment and economic and environmental vitality of the region.

Throughout its history, Youngstown State University has been cited as an innovative educational leader. It has also been recognized through numerous awards—both in academics and athletics—as one of the best urban, public, comprehensive universities in the United States.

Each graduate we celebrate today is a YSU Success Story. They join more than 94,000 outstanding alumni members across the nation and around the world.
