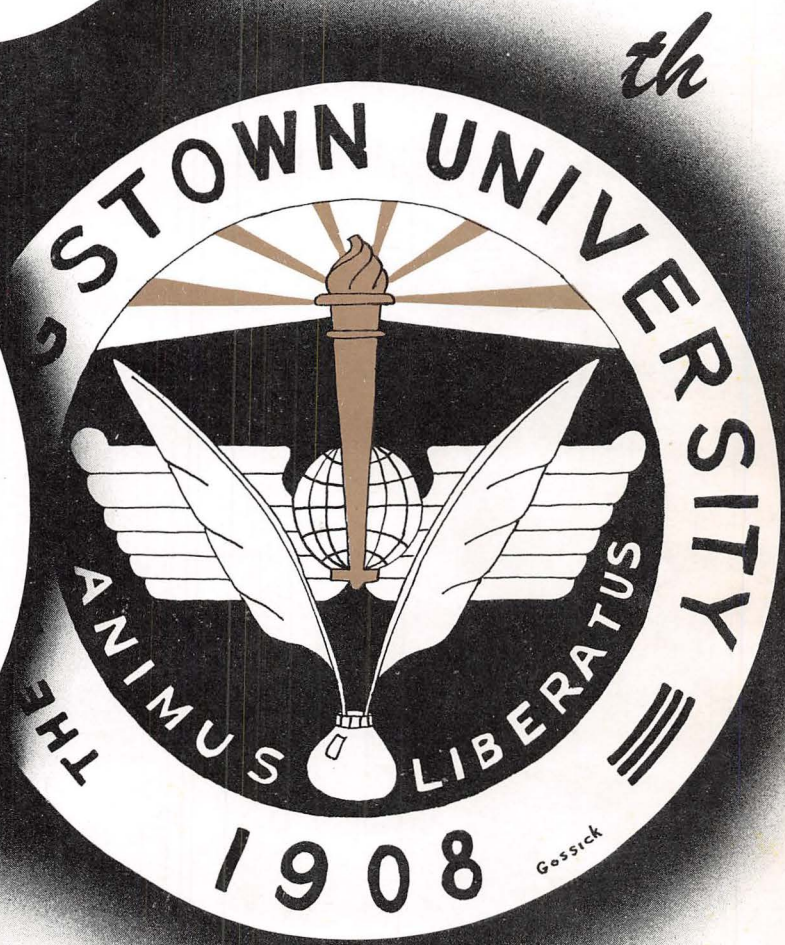

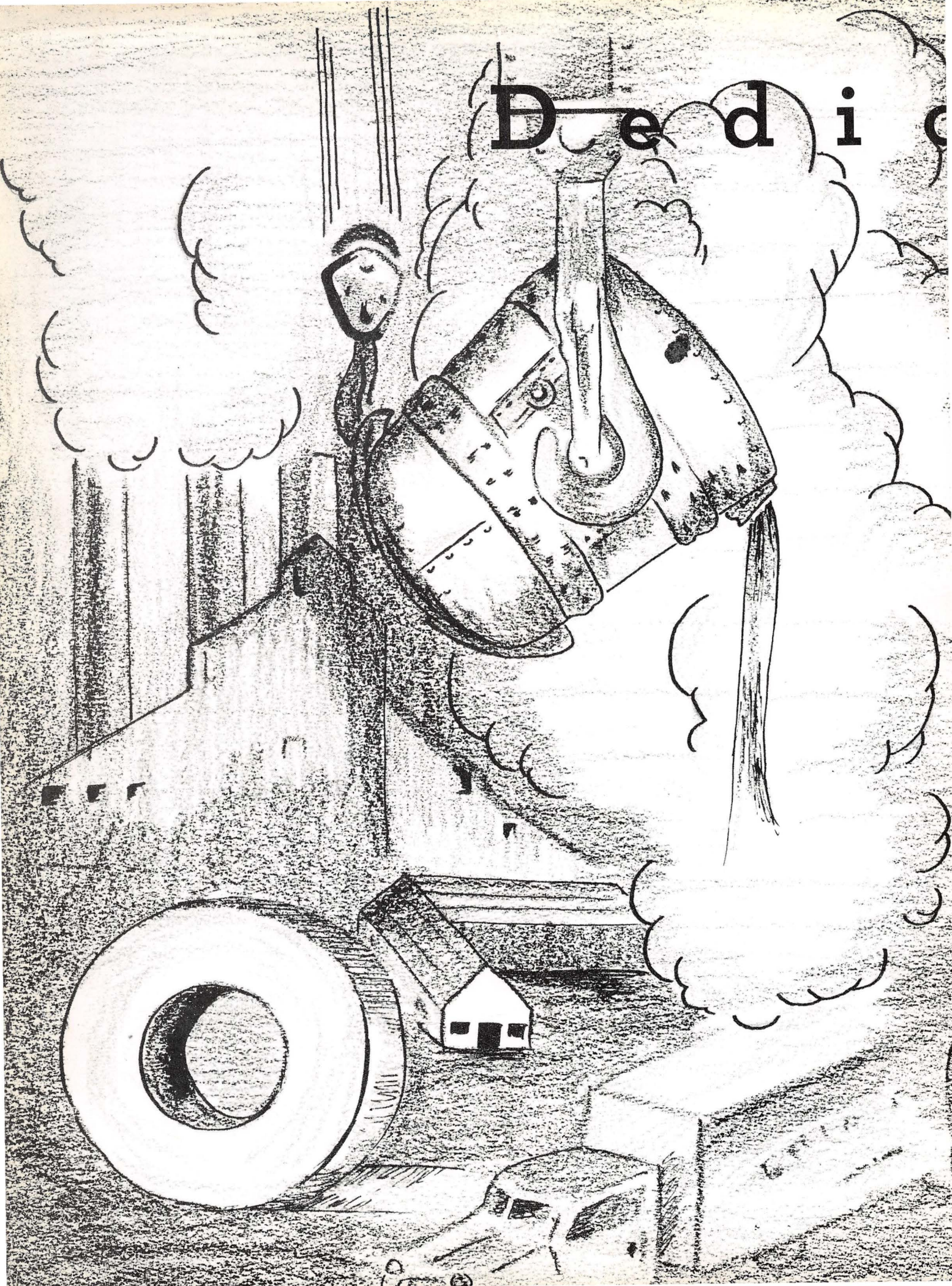

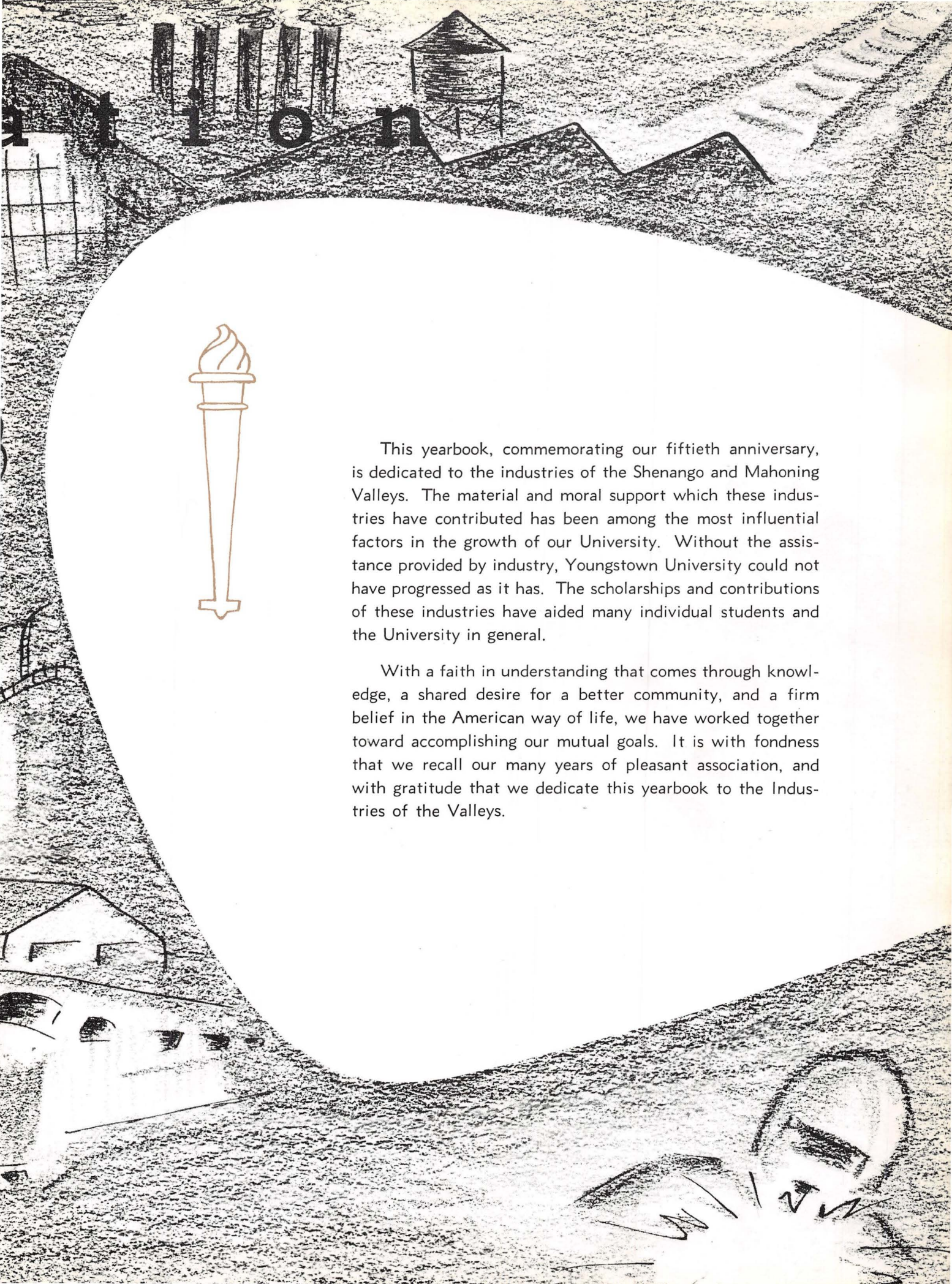


Attention

President



HOWARD W. JONES

President Howard Jones has been the leader of Youngstown University during twenty-six of the fifty years of its existence. For more than half of its life President Jones has worked tirelessly and effectively to guide the school to a more substantial position in the community.

It would be impossible to list the multitude of things which President Jones has achieved for the University in these twenty-six years. Most important is the increase in its academic stature, only partly indicated by the University's acceptance by national organizations: the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary schools, the Department of Education of the State of Ohio, the American Medical Association, the A.A.U.W., etc. He was also responsible for bringing the R.O.T.C. into the University, and intercollegiate football was added to the sports program early in his administration.

President Jones has been largely responsible for these achievements through his driving energy and administrative skill, and through it all he has never veered from his purpose of giving Youngstown a finer university.

President Jones deserves the highest praise and gratitude on this fiftieth anniversary year and the twenty-sixth year of his guidance of the institution.

Dean of the University



DEAN JOSEPH E. SMITH

Dr. Joseph E. Smith came to Youngstown University as a part-time instructor in 1921. He was later appointed head of the Social Science Department and Dean of Men. In 1949 he assumed his present role as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and Dean of the University.

The duties of the Dean are time-consuming and varied. For instance, the recruitment and supervision of faculty personnel takes a large part of his time. But he has always been understanding and friendly in spite of the difficulty of his tasks.

Dr. Smith distinguished himself as an undergraduate. He was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University in London. He received his B.A. degree from Oxford, his A.M. from Nebraska University and his Ph.D. from Wallas College, London, England.

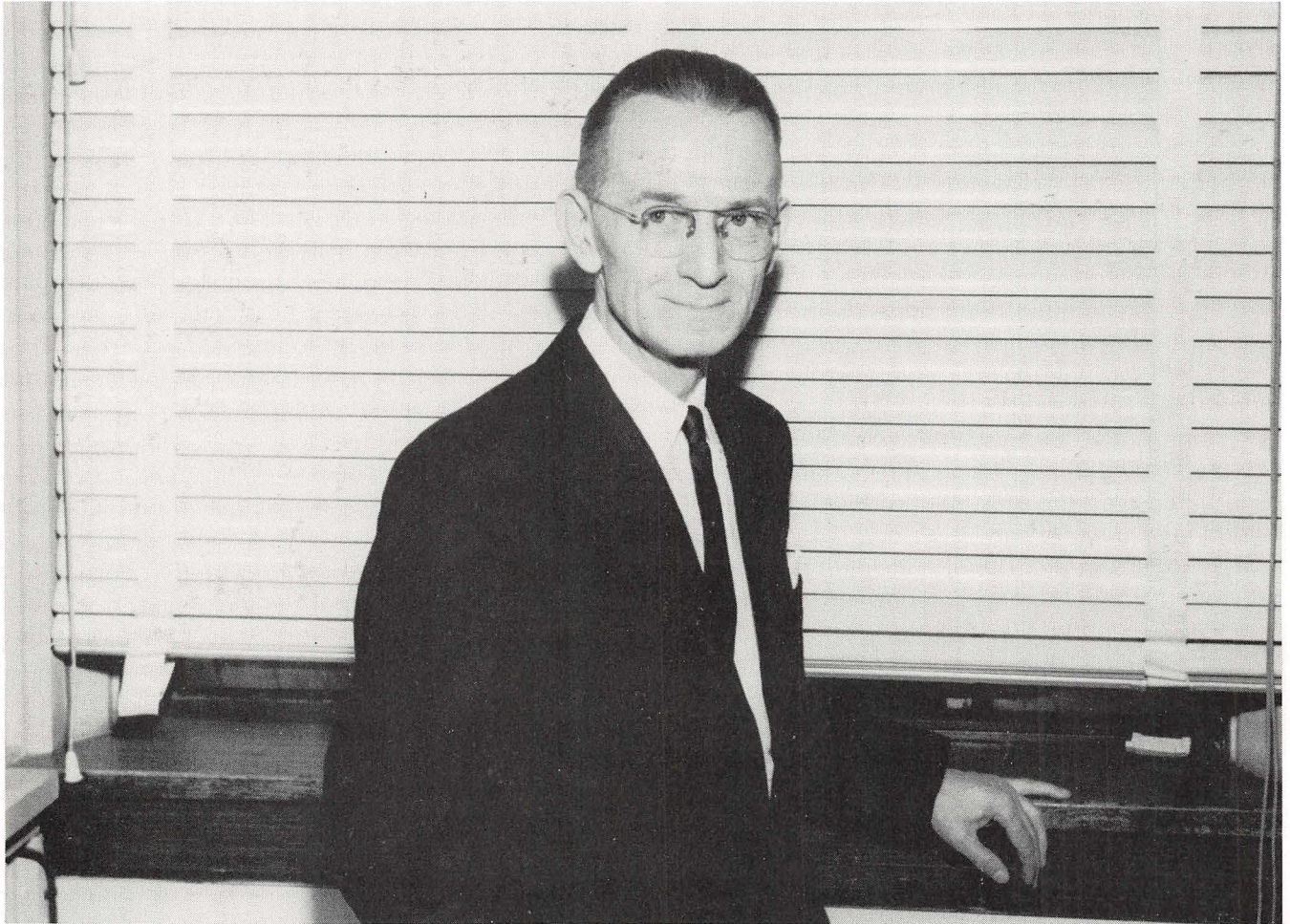
Registrar

Olive Pope McCarty graduated from Youngstown University with a B.S. in Education. She received her M.Ed. degree from Boston University and has done additional graduate work at Ohio State University. Dean McCarty's experience is varied as she has a background which includes personnel work in business, industry and the U. S. Marine Corps, as well as teaching in high school. Before coming to Youngstown University, she served as Assistant Dean of Women at Ohio Wesleyan University.

Dean McCarty has been responsible for the University's program for student nurses and has cooperated with the Youngstown Hospital Association in developing a fine educational program for the student nurses. She also counsels women students, serves on faculty and administration committees and coordinates student activities. She has also assumed the position of advisor to Pan-Hellenic Council.

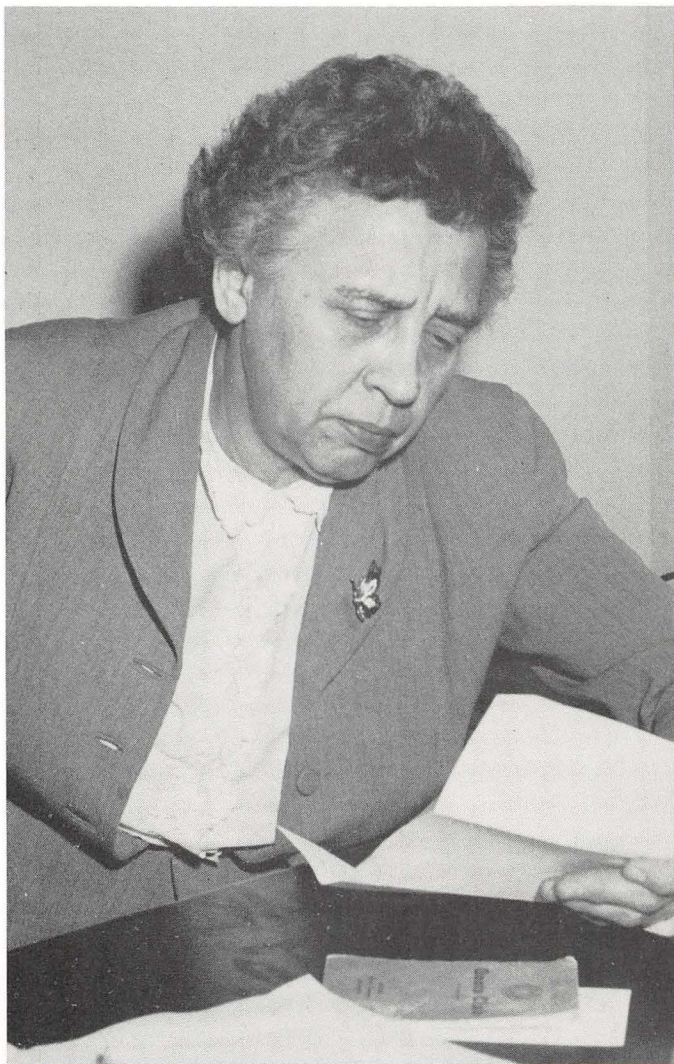
KATHLEEN ELENZ

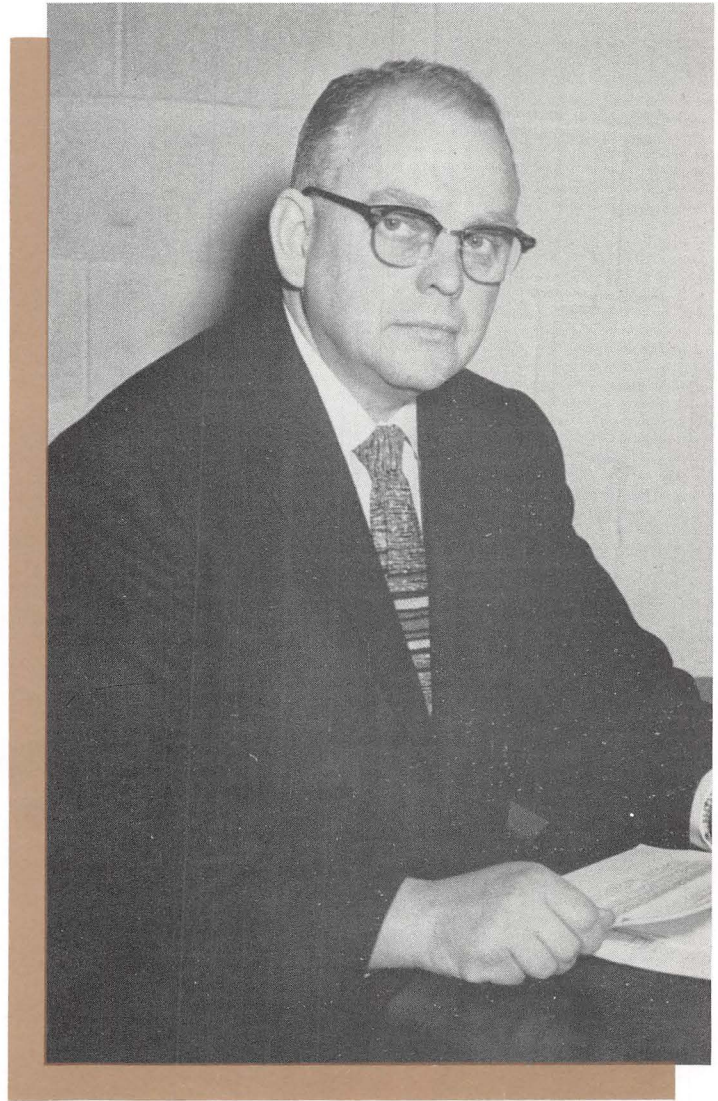

Protestant Chaplain



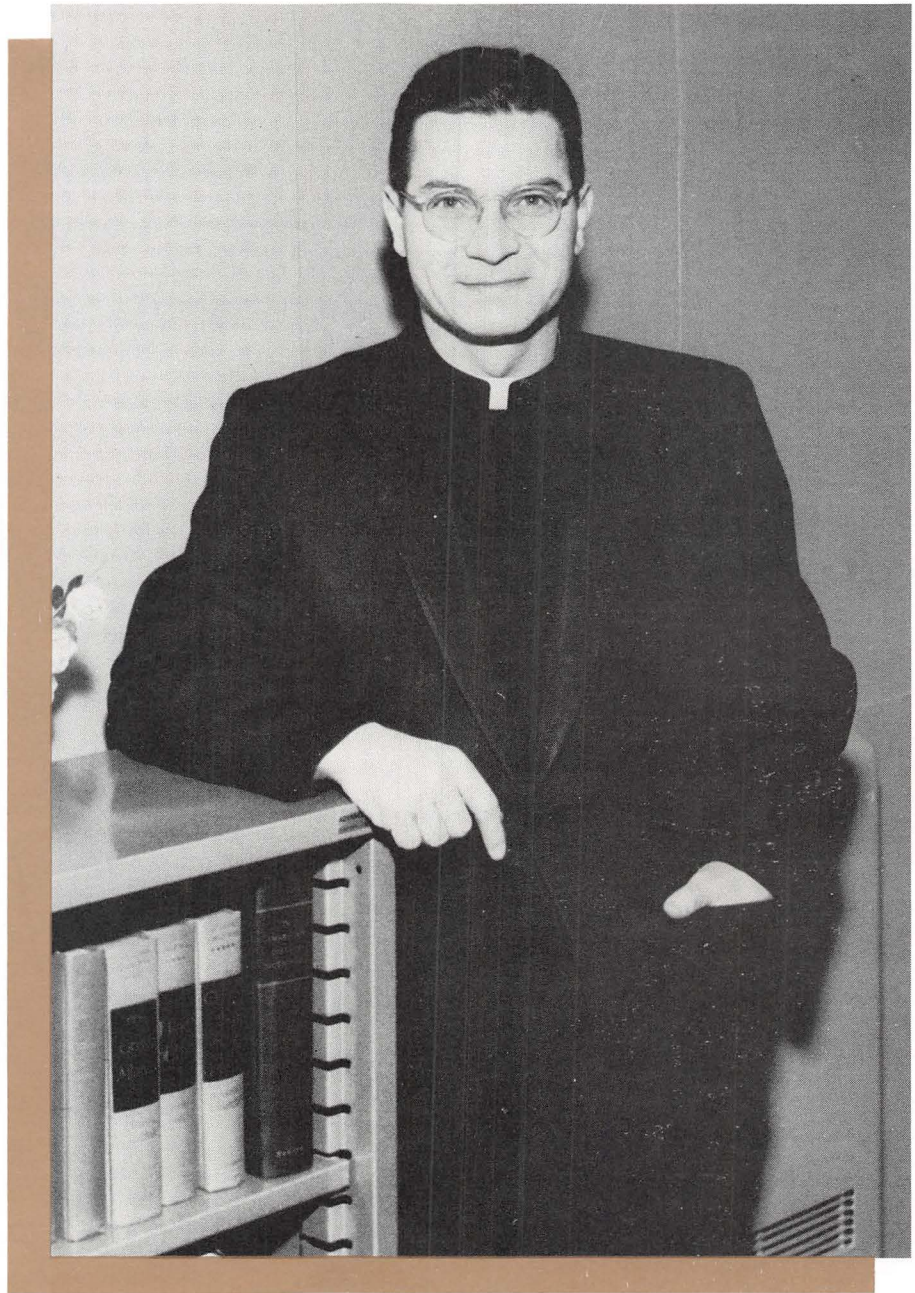
REV. ALBERT L. LINDER

FATHER PAUL M. PETRIC

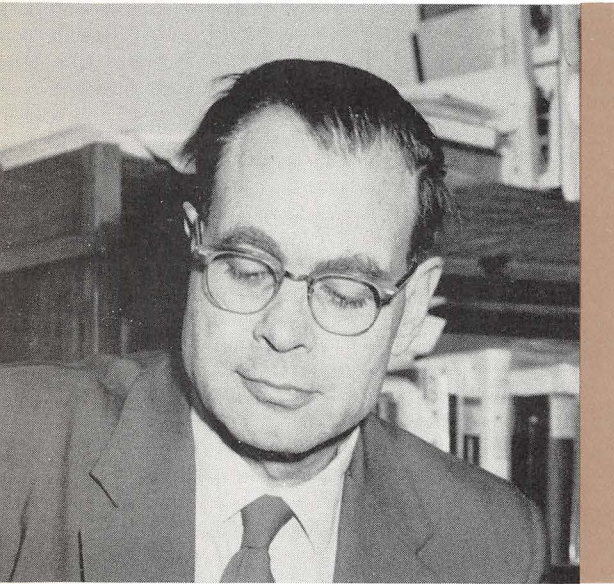

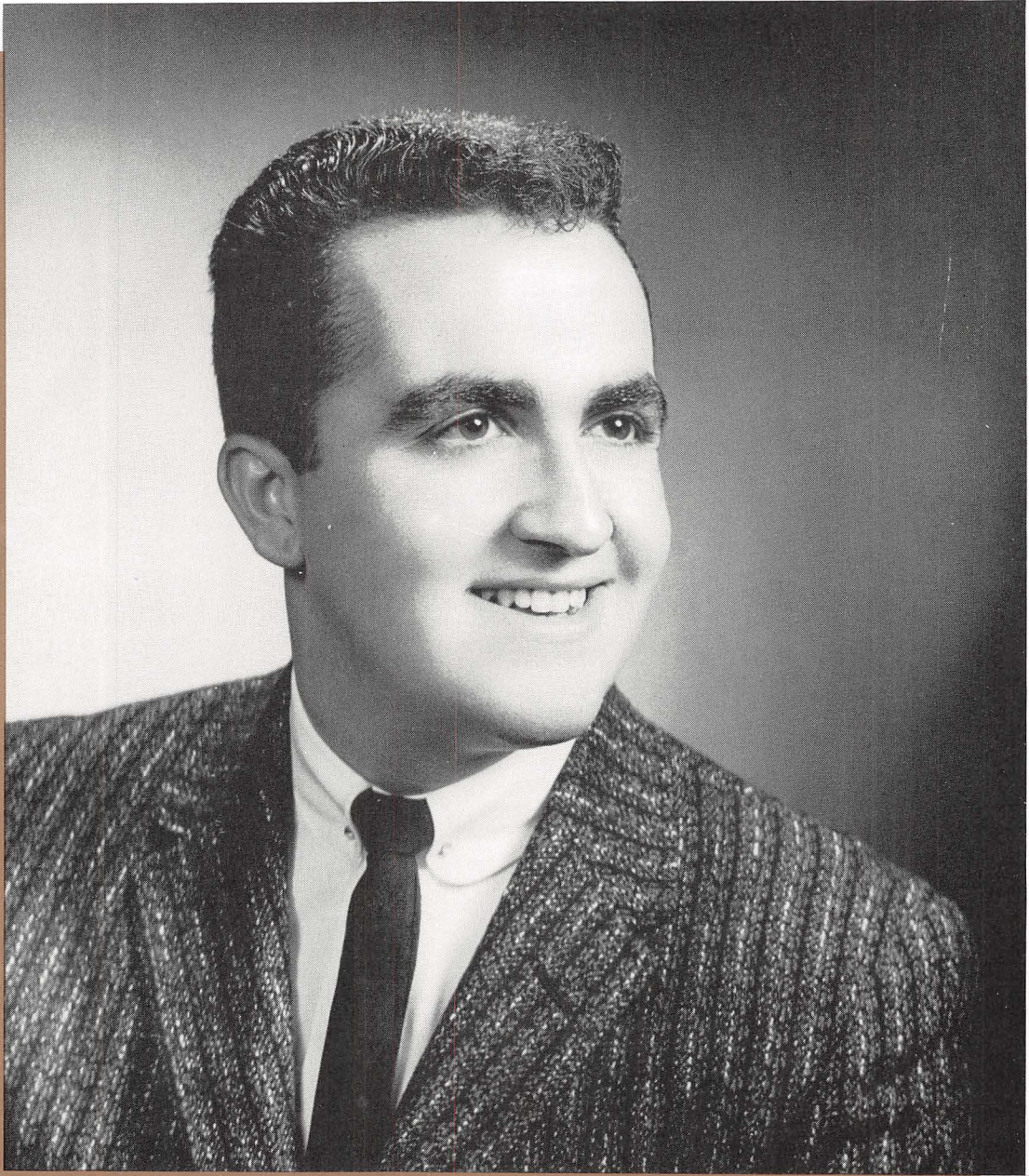

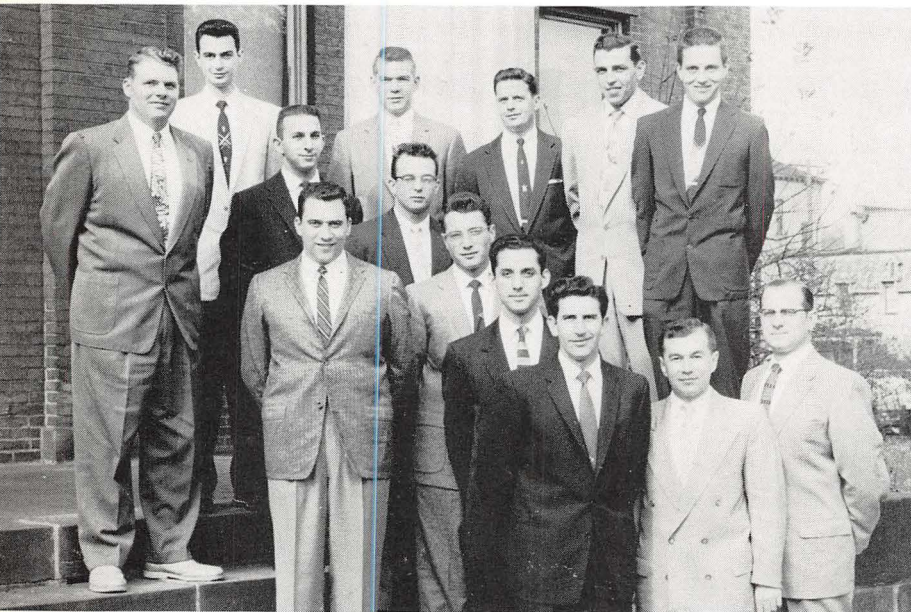
American Institute of Electrical Engineers

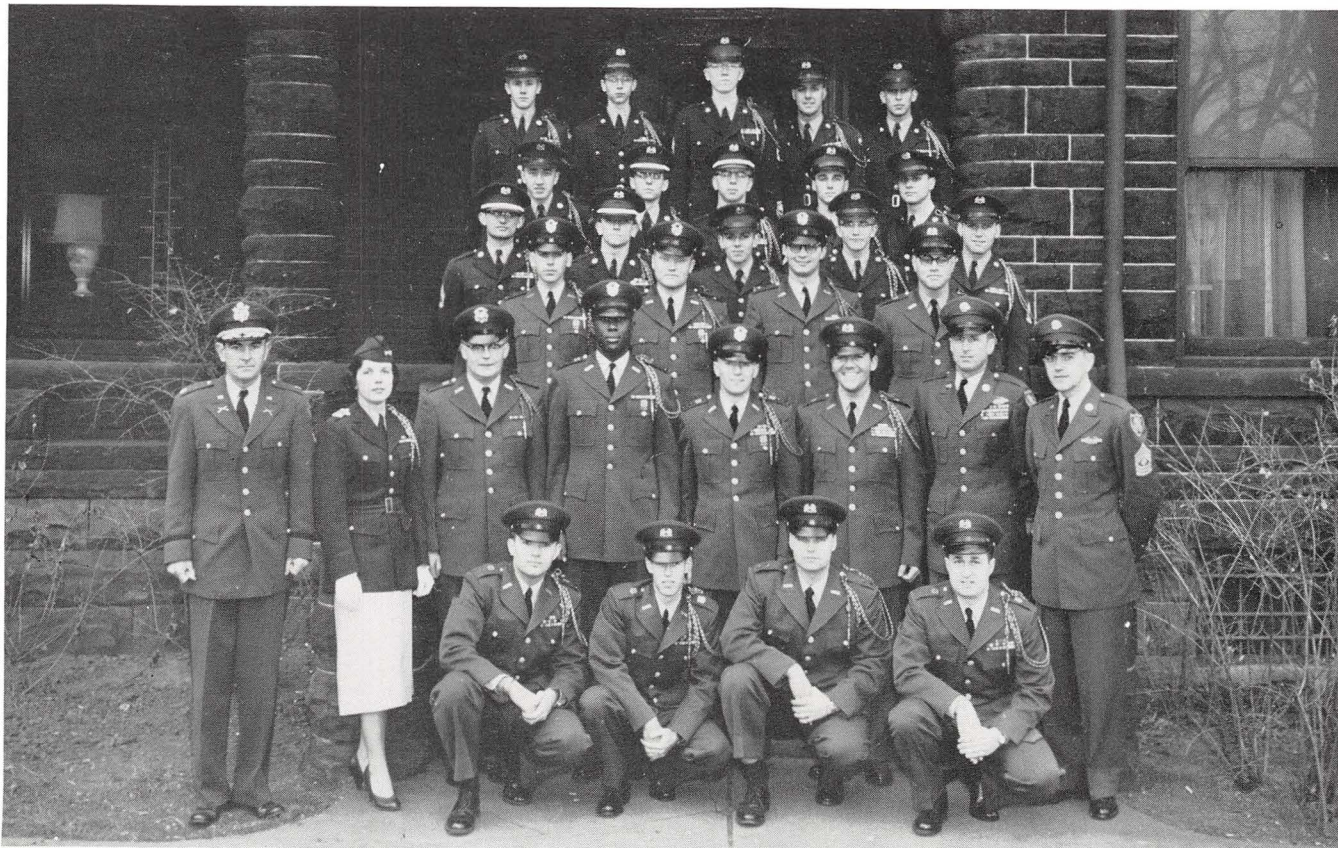
Alpha Iota is an international honorary business sorority. Alpha Eta is the active chapter at Youngstown University. The purposes of the sorority are both professional and social.

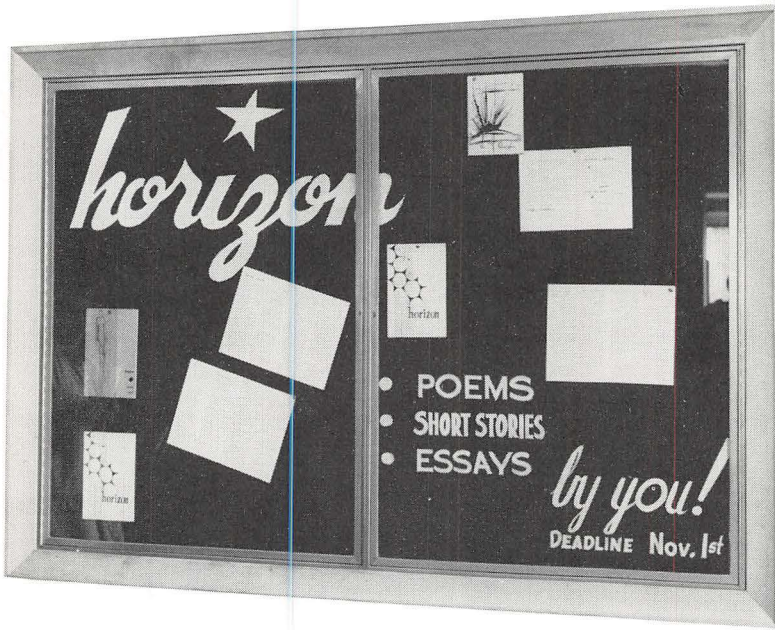
The 1956-57 school year was one of the most successful years for the Pershing Rifles unit on Youngstown University's campus. 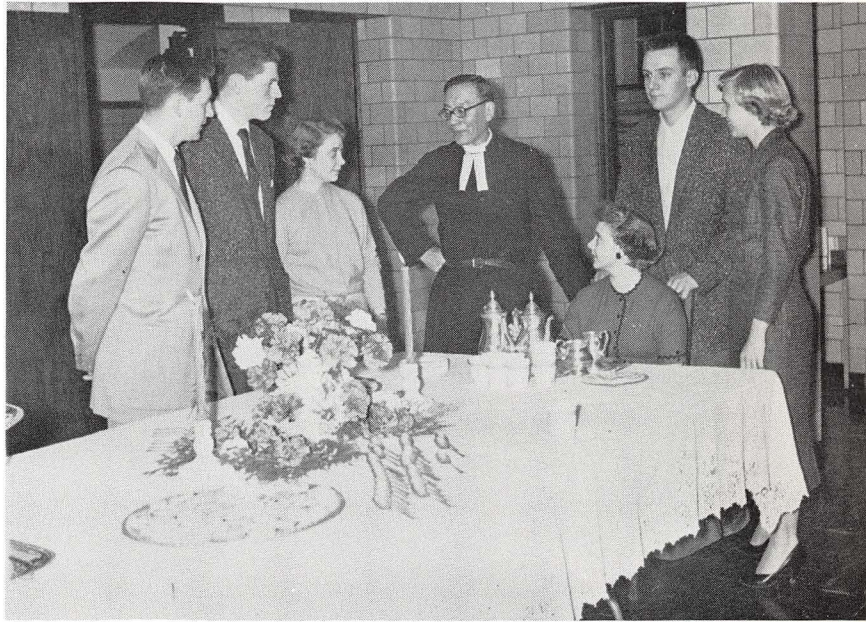
Religion-In-Life

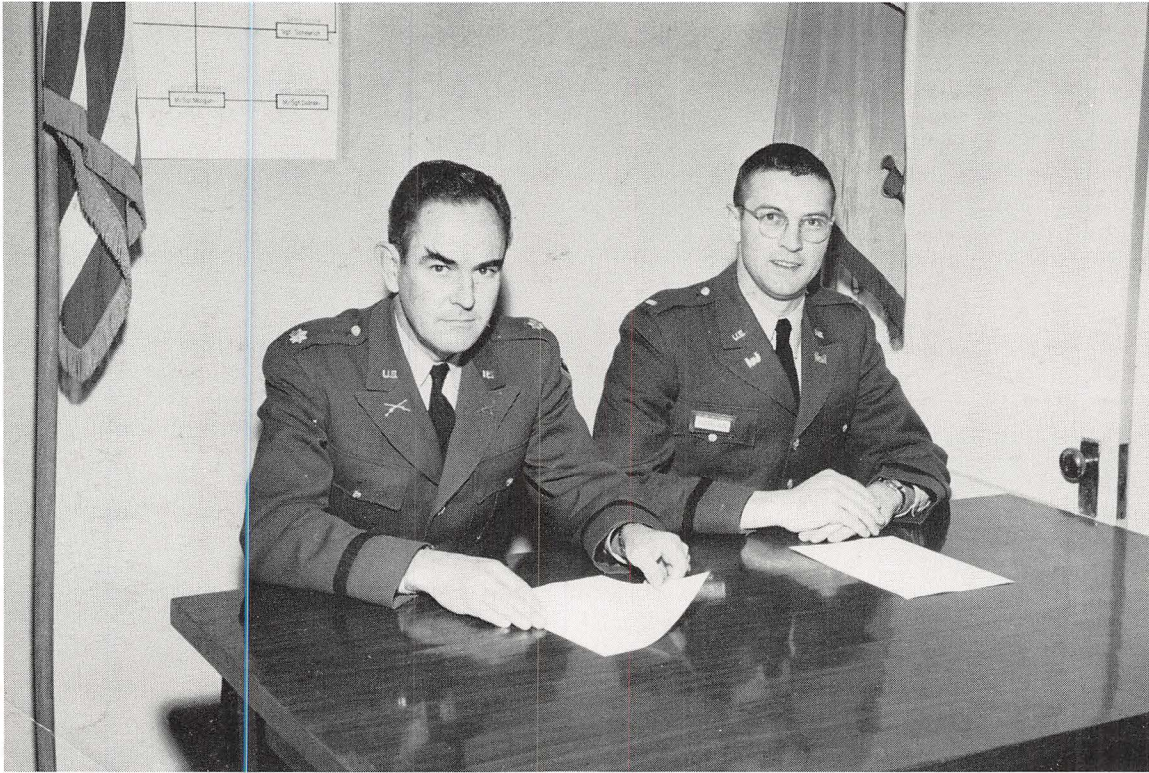

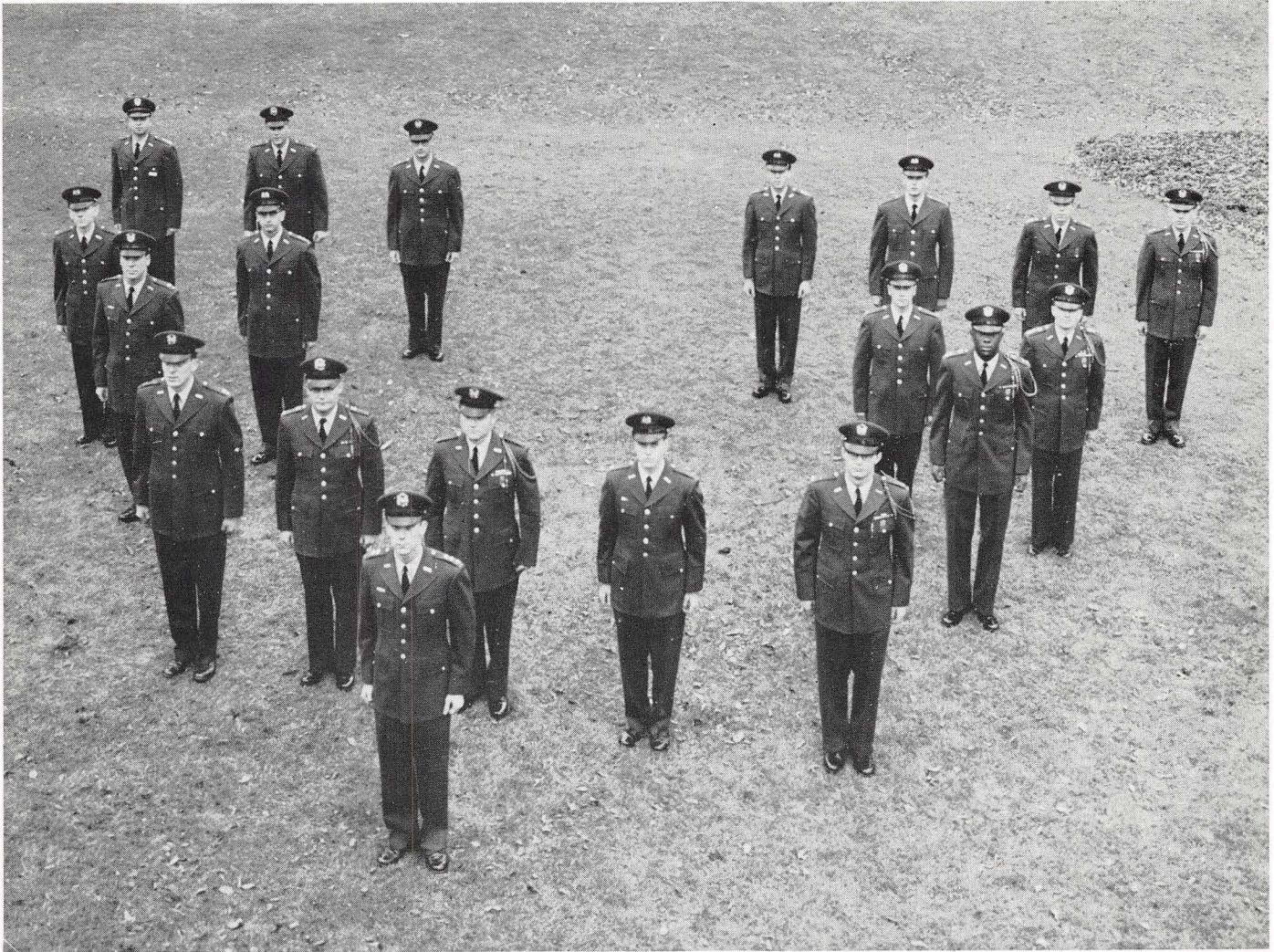

September 1957 found the Reserve Officer's Training Corps of The Youngstown University making its second major change in its eight year history. In September 1956, the General Military Science program replaced the Antiaircraft Artillery program.

In September 1957 the cadets were organized into The Youngstown University ROTC Battle Group. This organization carries out the new concept of the Army under the principles of The Reorganization of the Current Infantry Division (ROCID). Under this concept the Battle Group has more fire power with less men than the old Infantry Regiment.

The present seniors spent six weeks at Summer Camp at Fort Campbell, Kentucky learning these new principles. After this summer camp and under the capable leadership of Cadet Col. Thomas F. Jones, the Battle Group Commander, and his staff, the ROTC developed into an outstanding unit. Highlights of the year included the fine review held at The Youngstown University—Gustavus Adolphus Football Game, the annual Military Ball held at Stambaugh Auditorium, and the excellent performance of the Corps on the annual General and Formal Military Inspection held in May 1958. Included in the final review of the Corps by Dr. Jones, President of the University, was the presentation of awards to the outstanding cadets of the Corps, who had shown the highest qualities of leadership, high academic standards, and superior military bearing. This final review was held in honor of the graduating Seniors, who would receive their commissions as 2d Lts. in the U.S. Army Reserve and would soon be serving their country in most areas where the U.S. maintains its military forces.

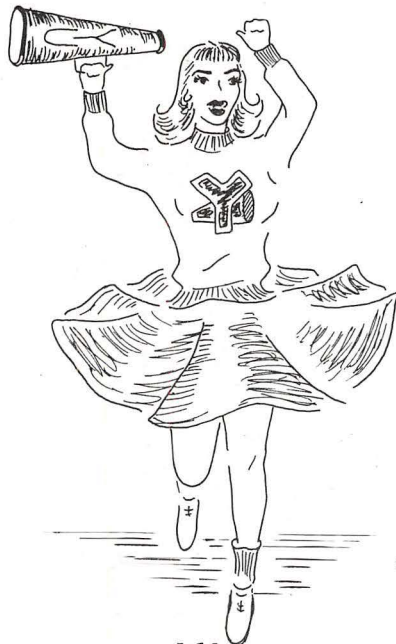

The Phi Mu club rooms are in the Women's City Club Building, 505 Wick Avenue.

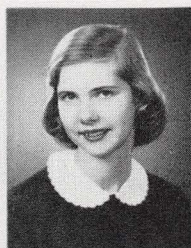

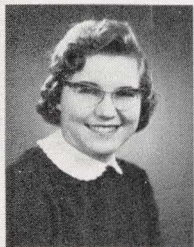

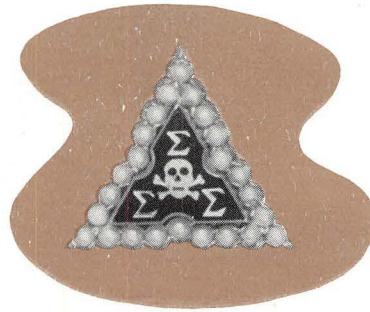

The sorority expresses its gratitude to officers and committee members and a special appreciation to the advisor, Mrs. Mary B. Smith and the Alumnae Advisory Board.

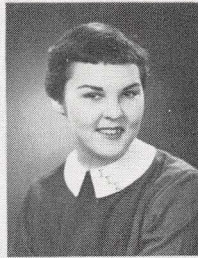




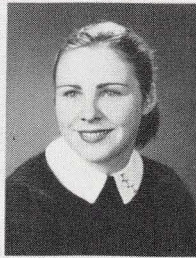

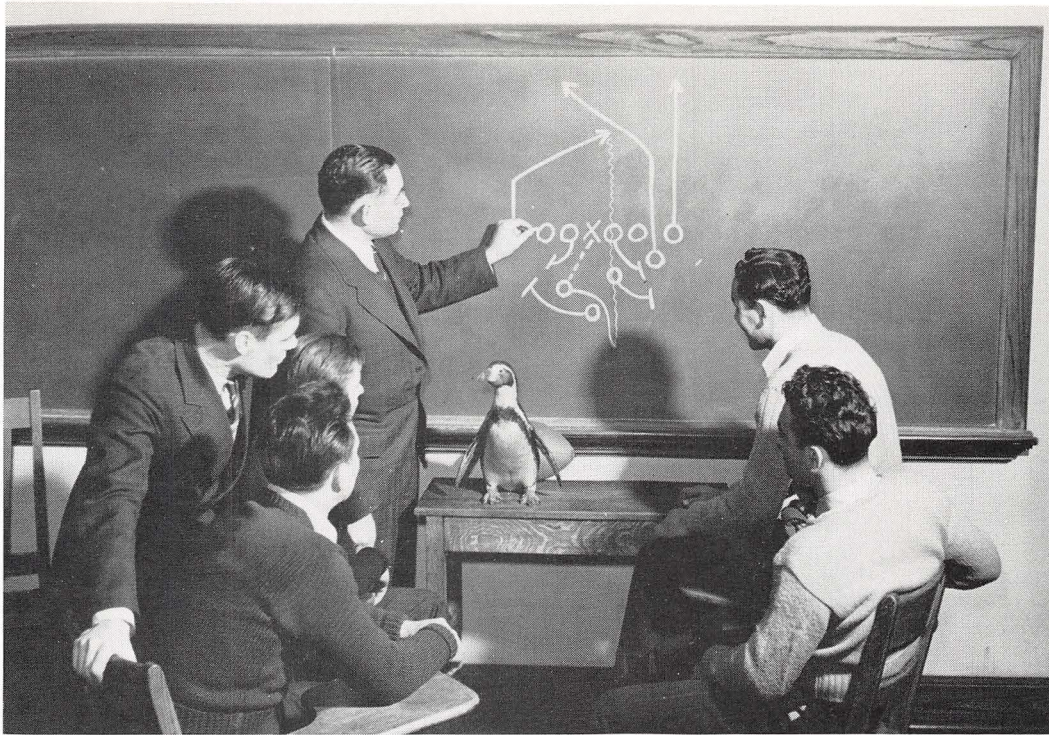

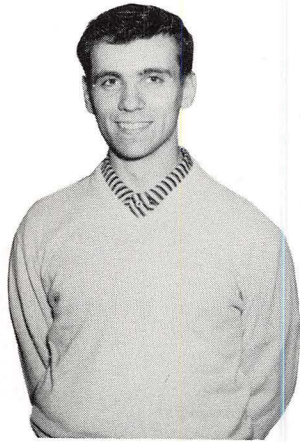
Golf Team

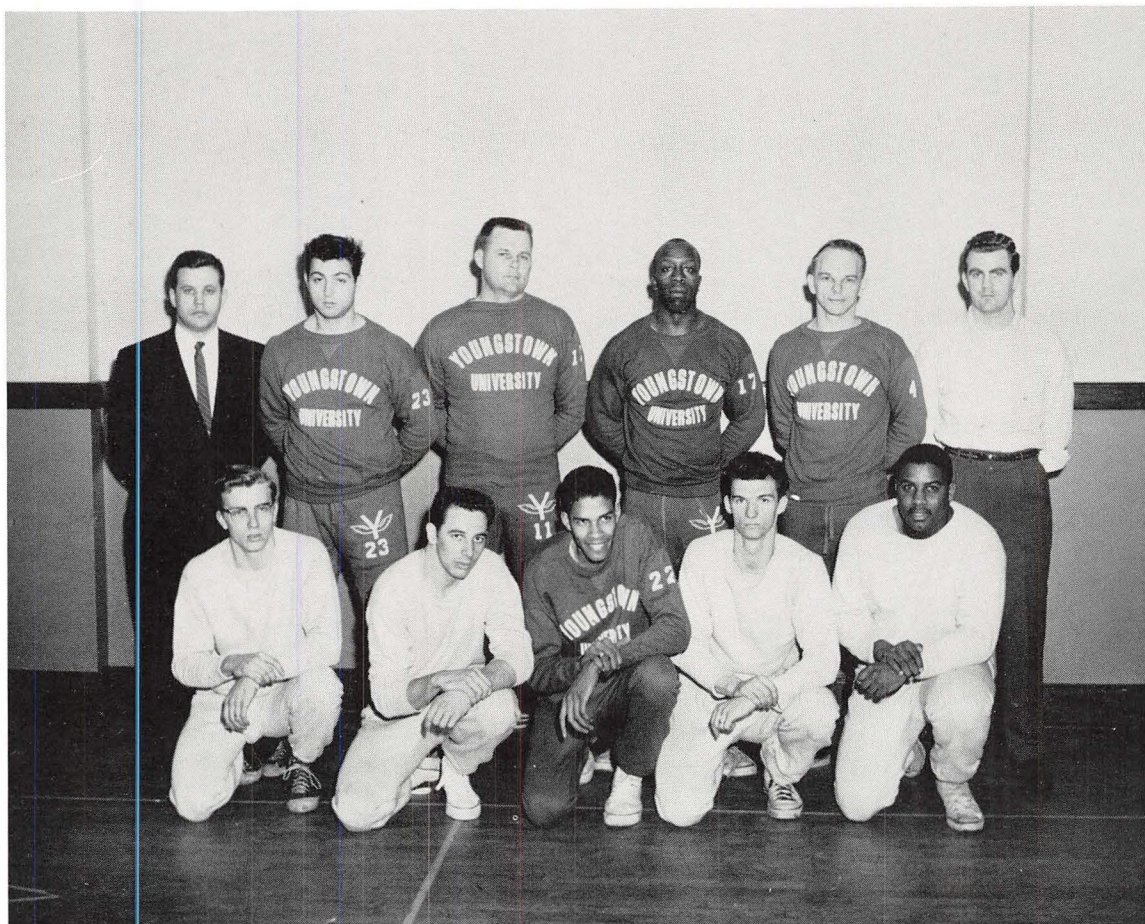

Coach Carl Christiansen rounded into shape a squad that finished with a .600 percentage, copping top honors in three of five meets.

In the locals' most impressive showing, they downed Bethany College $74 \frac{2}{3}$ to $52 \frac{1}{2}$. 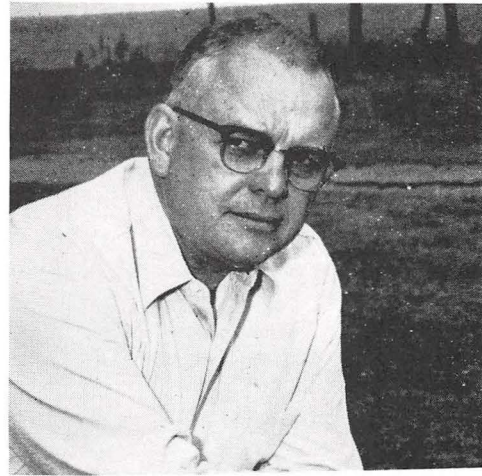

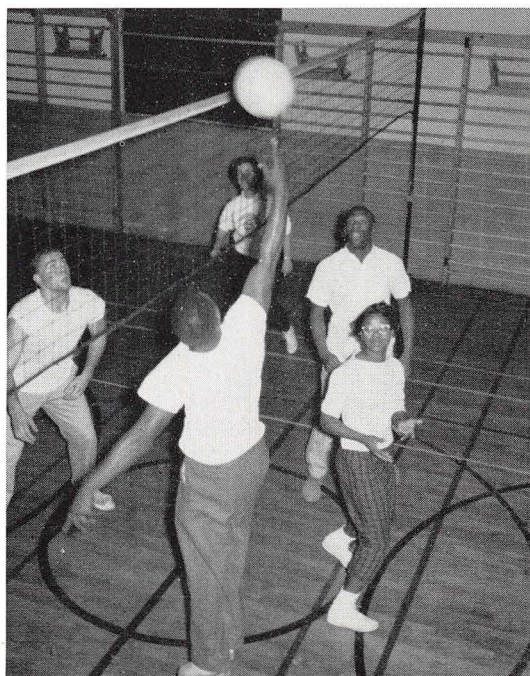
