

PRESIDENT'S HOME IN WINTER

President Howard

President Howard W. Jones can truly be called a part of the "Ohio Story," having been born in Palmyra, Ohio on September 27, 1895 of Welsh parents who were Evan L. and Mary Ann Jones.

He received his early education in Newton Falls and participated in various boyhood activities including fishing, camping and baseball.

Like many fellows of today President Jones had his college life interrupted at Hiram College in 1917 to become a member of the armed forces during World War I. He was attached to a submarine chaser patrol in the English Channel Area.

Upon his discharge from active duty he returned to Hiram where he received his A.B. degree in 1920, and was presented the Albert Teachout prize for being the best all-around student in his class.

On June 23, 1921 Howard Jones married Lucile Hurd of Southington, Ohio. Two daughters resulted from the union.

Between 1920 and 1922 President Jones was a teacher and athletic coach in Cleveland Y. M. C. A. Preparatory School. In 1922 he was put in charge of the school. An incident at the school proved his prowess as a boxer. He fought and knocked out the school bully thus ending a discipline problem that had existed for quite sometime.

COLLEGE BUSINESS MANAGER



The YMCA and YWCA are doing a great deal to further opportunities



DEAN'S OFFICE


The Dean's Office has both educational and administrative duties, ranging from assigning room numbers of classes to the responsibility for the progress of the educational policies of the college.

In a special pre-school assembly on September 16, President Howard Jones officially welcomed the incoming Freshman students to Youngstown College. In his welcoming address, President Jones expressed a sincere hope that the new students had enrolled in heart and spirit in addition to signing an enrollment contract. A slight but significant change in enrollment was evidenced by this assemblage: there were more co-eds, fewer GI's and fewer Freshmen than in 1948. Numerically, the ratio of men to women had dropped from 5-1 to 4-1 in a total enrollment of 4590.

Following the assembly, a reception dance was held in the auditorium, with Student Council members acting as hosts and hostesses. Highlight of the evening was a gathering of faculty members at the home of President and Mrs. Jones, who entertained them.




Homecoming activities, which took the spotlight on Wednesday, October 26. remained foremost on the agenda until the climactic finale Friday night in the game, coronation and dance.

The Crisp Air of Late Autumn





YoCo'ites enjoyed an unusually long holiday vacation, from Dec. 15 to Jan. 3, during which time dances, parties and dinners were held by various groups.



Some fifty years ago in response to an urgent need, the Y.M.C.A. offered educational opportunities in evening classes for employed men and boys. It was a very modest beginning and the enterprise was then known as the Youngstown Association School. At that time the Y's facilities were quite adequate for the curriculum which was entirely vocational. In 1908, however, the school of law was organized with a beginning class of nine students. Commerce and finance classes were also initiated. In 1920 the law course was expanded and for the first time, the school was authorized to grant a degree-bachelor of laws. All the while, interest was growing in the project and professors from nearby colleges were brought in to teach new subjects several nights a week. The response was immediate and, after several years, enrollment had increased to such a degree that the Y.M.C.A. could no longer handle the load. Out of necessity, the Bonnell mansion on Wick Avenue was leased and classes moved to the new location. The course now included law, liberal arts, business administration, and engineering.

In 1926 the John Wick mansion, 410 Wick Avenue, site of the present main building, was purchased and classes were again moved. Five years later, the Board of Directors of Youngstown College was organized and in the same year of 1931, the new building was completed. The history of the college has been one of constant growth and expansion. The Dana School of Music added in 1941 took up residence at 616 Wick Avenue, just one block north of the main building. In 1946 the Wm. Rayen School of Engineering moved into the old Rayen High School Building and outlayed over \$100,000 for improvements and equipment. At present the college is still thinking of expansion and in all likelihood, the next addition will be a new library, goal of over ten years of fund raising and planning.

Like every other recognized school in the country, Youngstown College experienced a terrific increase in enrollment under the influx of war veterans training under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Naturally the facilities of the college were taxed to the utmost and an immediate need for space was created. Time did not permit an expansion and building materials were scarce — the costs prohibitive. As a solution, the three temporary structures known as the College Annex were constructed in the rear of the main building. Spacious but hardly of permanent construction, they were a quick solution to the sudden requirements of an increased student body.

Now that the enrollment has tapered off slightly from the peak of September 1948, a pertinent question in the minds of everyone today is—what does the future hold for Youngstown College? The answer to that, of course, remains for time alone to tell. However, there are several good signs pointing to a rosy future for the school. First, there seems to be an increasing number of students transferring here from other schools. Some of these readily admit that they thought Youngstown College curriculum sub-standard. Secondly, more and more ambitious people from this vast industrial world about us are beginning to see in Youngstown College a means whereby they might enhance their own opportunities for advancement within their organizations. Most of these had no previous inclination nor desire for a college education. It is no secret, however, that personnel interviewers are examining more than ever before the educational backgrounds of new applicants now that jobs do not come for the asking. All of this adds up to a signpost towards a successful future for Youngstown College.



May belongs to the graduating senior. The social calendar this month is brimming with traditional events from which the last and deepest memories are woven into the final chapter of college life.



Banquets, dinners, baccalaureate and the commencement service marked the end of another event-packed school year.




The achievements of the Junior Class, however, do not stop there. If one delves into other types of activities, one will find that a Junior will be at least partially responsible for their success.



The 1950 Neon is the largest and most elaborate year book ever to reach the students and graduates of Youngstown College in its history.

First published in 1926, it was established as the official college year book in 1935 under the name "The Neon." The name was suggested by Mildred Bothwell (Mrs. Howard Hitchcock) in a contest sponsored by Student Council and the Jambar. The name is interpreted as "A shining mass, lighting the way to memories of the graduating seniors." Previous to 1935 the annuals were devoted almost entirely to senior pictures, poetry and serious prose. However, more and more the year-book was given over to the recording of the activities, athletic events, and social accounts of the school year in photos and stories.

The first Neon staff was headed by Helen Morris, Editor; Herbert Kenaston, Freda Mc-Knight, Ass't. Editors; and John Raupple, Business Manager.

At the beginning of the fall semester the college was worried about an institution of this size not having a yearbook. Then George Snyder stepped in assuming full responsibility and efficiently organized a working staff. For the first time a university size yearbook with color photos and other than black ink, has emerged, comparable to any in the country.



pate. Music, community singing and a period of fellowship usually conclude these monthly forums.

Consistent with the idea of a Student World Council of Churches program emphasis, the Monthly Sunday Evening Student Forums featured addresses by religious leaders on the historical background, programs and activities of the various churches and denominations of Youngstown and their contribution to the religious life of the community. The purpose behind the Religion In Life program for the year is to help students to appreciate the various religious points of view and the religious emphases which a number of churches have in common, and to formulate a united program of religious living and action among students. Reinforcing the program emphasis was a series of weekly Round Table Discussions sponsored in the fall and spring dealing with more intimate discussions of modern trends in the church and society.

THE RELIGION IN LIFE CARAVAN

The purpose of the Religion In Life Caravan is to acquaint churches and youth groups in Youngstown and vicinity with the opportunities for education and personal growth which are made available at Youngstown College,

and to interest young people in religious leadership. From time to time students who are talented musically and others who like to speak in public are given opportunity to help render a deputation service as members of the Religion In Life Caravan.

THE SOCIAL PROGRAM Religion In Life Club swims were so popular last year that they became OF RELIGION IN LIFE monthly events for club members and their friends. Plans for this year include monthly swims at the Y.M.C.A. on the second Tuesday evening of each month at 8:45 p.m. The first swim is scheduled for October. Occasional roller skating parties on the club social calendar provide fun for students who like rhythm and active recreation. The social committee of Religion In Life is kept busy with plans for four other major social events an "Indian Summer Party" in early November, the Christmas and Spring Parties ,and the Annual Commencement. Other timely receptions and parties add to a well-rounded social program for the Religion In Life Club.

The string and woodwind quartets have played several times over the various college radio shows and won general acclaim.


The orchestra also played during the May Day Activities, and for the variety show, Yocohooey.


Lasting for fifteen minutes the show reports the weekly news events from the college, the sports highlights, a few favorite records chosen by the college students, and a feature story of the week.

The Delta Eta Chapter, a National Professional and Honorary music fraternity for the men students of Youngstown College was first established as the Delta lota Music Fraternity of Youngstown College on September 17, 1946. Early in October, 1946 the Student Council of Youngstown College recognized and chartered the constitution presented by Delta lota.

The Delta lota Fraternity was very active during its first year. The members presented public recitals and joined with the Sigma Alpha lota Music Fraternity for women in presenting an All-American Recital. The fraternity also became a patron for the Virgil Fox organ recital.







Rush season brought in a swell group of pledges, who after surviving hell week were formally installed. Joint parties were held with all the social sororities as well as a number of smokers with other frats.





Since then, "Penguin" football teams have risen in stature, and today they are highly regarded throughout the East. Graduating from small-time football, Youngstown College now plays such teams as Muhlenberg, Canisius, and Dayton.

It is a tribute to "Dike" Beede that he has given Youngstown College football a name. In doing this, he has also earned a name for himself.

He is truly the "Mr. Football" of Youngstown, Ohio.

COACHING STAFF



PAUL CUBA

A graduate of Pitt U., Paul Cuba came to Youngstown with a fine reputation as a coach. He had previously been line coach at New Castle High and head coach at Ursuline High here in Youngstown. At Ursuline, his team was co-champion of the city and gained state-wide recognition. His coaching ability has aided the cause of better football teams tremendously.

A graduate of Geneva College, Willard Webster took over the job of trainer for YoCo athletes in 1938. Nursing sprained ankles and bruised backs was his sole task until 1946, when he was appointed the Director of Athletics. Although he is now Director of Athletics, he still "doctors" Youngstown College teams, keeping them in tip-top shape.



WILLARD WEBST

"Dom" Rosselli made a name for himself at Geneva College, where he captained both the football and basketball teams, and was a stand-out athlete in all sports. Since his arrival at Youngstown College, he has continued his success as an assistant football coach and head basketball coach. In addition to these duties, he also coaches the baseball team every spring, making him one of the few "Full Time" coaches in college athletics.

He is the only member of the sports administration that graduated from Youngstown College.

SPORTS IN REVIEW

The midway mark of the twentieth Century finds the name of Youngstown College listed in the columns of great collegiate team. The growth of sports at Youngstown College has been swift. However, the speed at which it climbed has not lessened one scintilla its caliber. Opponents of Youngstown College's varsity teams will testify to the truth of that statement. If the record of varsity sports of YOCO is any indication of what we may expect in the future we can look forward to great things.

Let's join minds and stroll down memory lane to catch a glimpse of the growth of our college in the athletic field. Varsity basketball saw the light of day in 1934 at Youngstown College. Jack McPhee, now a famous Big Ten Football Conference official, fathered the new babe. It managed to break even that season, 10 wins and 10 losses. Those who played big roles in establishing that record were McFarland, Green, Williams, Contrello and Jaffee. The 1935-36 season found Ray Sweeney at the helm of the quintet which went on to win eight and loose seven tilts. Tony Vivo, Tommy Robinson, Pugh, Nagy and Simko wrote part of this cage season history.

The seasons ending in 1938 and 1939 saw such basketball greats as Carl Corletzi, Cushon, Vivo, Prezioso, Bergman, Meyers, Sherock and Patterson perform in the uniform of YoCo.

Diminutive Dom Rosselli, present coach, took over the reins of the basketball department from Sweeney in 1941. The record for that season was 14 victories against eight losses. That chapter in YoCo basketball history was authored by Leo Mogus, Ed Enterline, Rowlan, Chuey, Kroll, Heber and others. Mogus was the big gun which fired Rosselli's cagers to many wins during that season, as well as 1942 and 43. The Army Air Corps claimed the services of Coach Rosselli in 1942 and Joe Morbito, former E. Liverpool High mentor, was selected to temporarily direct the destinies of the basketball team. His first year saw YoCo win 11 and drop five. Mogus garnered a season's total of 354 points in this, his final year. The average was 19 points per game.

Things were rather quiet through the years when a goodly number of Youngstown College men were away serving their nation. However, 1946 saw sports zoom skyward with jet-like speed. Ray Kroll captained the Penguins to a record of 10 wins and 12 losses. Members of the squad included Joe Zemba, Howie Johnson, Red Christein, Ray Wise, Bobby Gibson, and Charley Bush.

Bush was the leading scorer the following year when the cagers dropped 14 contests and won 10. Most of the losses were by narrow margins. It was also in 1947 that a varsity baseball team was organized under the direction of Rosselli. Athletic Director Willard Webster handled the activities of the tennis team that year and the netters had an encouraging season.

The bone-rattling game of football began on a varsity level in 1938 with Dike Beede stepping in as head coach. Beede came to Youngstown College with a wealth football experience. A graduate of South High School, Beede went on to make an outstanding name for himself as a fullback at Carnegie Tech when the Pittsburgh school was at the height of it's football glory. Beede coached at Westminster College, at Geneva College and had entered the insurance business when he accepted the local coaching spot.

One hundred ten eager young men reported to Beede for the first practice at the South High Stadium. Among those who stuck around to aide the Penguins to victories were Leeson, Sontag, Heber, Perantoni, Burns, Hardie, Chianese, Gill, Julius, Kramer, Greene and many more.

Youngstown's first intercollegiate game was against Geneva College, who whipped the locals, 12-6, thanks mainly to Geneva's clever quarterback who answered to the name of Dom Rosselli. Wins for the season totalled four against five defeats.

Additions were made in 1940 to the coaching staff in the persons of Ralph Wolfe, former Ohio State All-American center, and Dom Rosselli. Willard Webster was appointed trainer, a position which he still holds along with that of athletic director.

Sloko Gill was captain of the 1941 grid team and in this, their fourth season of intercollegiate football, was the only undefeated team in Ohio. Among some of the teams met were Akron U., Tennessee Tech, Oklahoma and Ohio U. Tony "Bull" Rosselli, who is ranked as one of the all time football greats of Youngstown, was picked for the Little All-American team in 1941.


Morbito joined the football coaching staff in place of Army-bound Rosselli in 1942. That season brought six wins and three losses, one of which was against the heavier Fort Knox team, 7-0. Because of the shortage of manpower football was suspended at the college for three seasons.

With the end of hostilities football prospects at YoCo began to point up. Competition was resumed in 1946 with Pete Lanzi, former All City from East, serving as captain. This was the first season of collegiate play for such stars as Bob Gibson, Frank Davanzo, Mike Durina, Al and Tom Campana. All of these gridders terminated their collegiate careers with the 1949 season.

A very good season was experienced by the Penguins in 1947 against some of the top teams of the nation. One of the greatest triumphs was against the touted Oklahoma City team, 19-13.

The 1948 Penguin squad played the toughest schedule in its gridiron history and wound up with three wins and three ties. A Highlight of the season was a trip via airlines to Oklahoma City to meet the powerful Indians. Our boys came out on the short end of a 26—13 score.

The Penguins of Youngstown College opened its 1949 grid season against the touted Canisius Griffins at Rayen Stadium before a capacity crowd. The visitors, eager to avenge the stinging 32-20 defeat at the hands of the Youngstown team a year before, sternly pointed toward victory.

There were momentarily stunned, however, when Dick Hannis, YoCo fullback, drew first blood. Canisius tied the count at 7-7 shortly afterwards and it remained knotted until Mike Durina's accurate rifle throw to Pittman brought another score to the column of Youngstown. The extra point attempt failed.

The visiting eleven bounced into the lead with a touchdown and successful conversion. Tony Tabachino's touchdown, followed by the snagging of another touchdown pass by Pittman, sent the Beede gridders to the fore by a count of 26-14.

The second half saw a revitalized band of Griffins launch an assault against the locals which sent them ahead, 28-26. The Yo-Coans were held scoreless during this period and thus came out on the short end of the encounter, 26-28.



Two more scores were added in the final half during which time the Penguins scored on a Gibson-Pittman aerial.




GRADUATING SENIORS






THE 1950 HARDWOOD SEASON



PENGUINS VICTIMS OF UNPREDICTABLE CAGE SEASON

The 1949-50 basketball season was almost devoid of bright spots. The Youngstown College cagers experienced a few breaks and plenty of tough luck. They played a murderous schedule, and continually lost games by the slim margin of one or two points.

After dropping two games in a row, the Penguins measured Gustavus-Adolphus at the Field House for their first victory. Again they started losing games, with tough teams like Marietta and Xavier as their conquorers.

During the holidays, Youngstown entered the annual Round Robin Tournament a decided underdog. Then they proceeded to knock off favored Kent State 75-74. After this stunning upset, they lost out by two points the next night to Mount Union.

Several days later Youngstown College journeyed to Huntington, W. Va., and there upset a highly-regarded Marshall College. Previously, Marshall had coasted to an easy eight point victory at the Field House, but at Huntington the Penguins were superb and walked off with the win.

With three victories to their credit, the Penguins bogged down again. They dropped a heart-breaking contest to John Carroll and a few nights later lost an 83-82 thriller at Marietta. Muskingum rolled over them, and they returned home with a dismal 3-12 win-loss record.



In the "Big Game" of the season, the Penguins faced unbeaten Duquesne before 3,300 fans at the Field House. The Dukes, rated second in the nation were looking for an easy win, but instead ran a foul of a fighting mad Penguins quintet. For almost three quarters the Youngstowners scared the pants off the Dukes. Never very far behind, the Penguins seemed ready to accomplish the biggest upset of the season when the flood gates opened and the Dukes roared far ahead to win, 69-49.

After dropping games to St. Francis and Baldwin-Wallace, Youngstown dumped a highly rated Second Army quintet, and set the win-loss record at 4-15.

Even though there was a decided lack of victories, the Penguin basketball team and Coach Rosselli deserve the highest praise for their courage and willingness to win. They never quit scrapping.

BASBBALL

Inagurating the 1949 practice season with an overflow crowd of candidates, coach Dom Rosselli pared the team down to a stream-lined squad of 16 for the opening game against Fenn College. Measuring Fenn 4-3 in a very close game YoCo got in the winning habit and went on to post a seasons record of 8 wins and 5 losses. Halfway through the season Jim Woods turned in a no hitter against Kent State Canton. At the seasons end Jim signed a professional contract with the Athletics.

An odd feature of the pitching staff was the fact there were no southpaws on the team. Of course with portsiders like Mike Magula (5-2), Paul Andrish (2-0) and Jim Woods (1-0) to hold up the team their absence was not too deeply felt.

The squad also had several power hitters as evidenced by their averages. Mike Magula, who played first base when not pitching, ended up with the top batting average of the team—a rousing 433. Following in close fashion were Tony Tabachino with a 371, Frank Homsey 359 and Nick Sostaric 344.

Chuch Perazich did an excellent job all season as the team manager.

With over half of the lettermen returning for the 1950 season, the prospects for an outstanding season are good.

SWIMMING TEAM



HOMECOMING QUEEN ...

HISTORY OF HOMECOMING

Youngstown College's first Homecoming Queen made her debut in November of 1938 when Marie Barrett (now Mrs. John Marsh) was crowned. A ceremonious all-day affair commenced at noon with a parade from the public square to South High Stadium. Gayly decorated floats carrying the queen and her court followed the new scollege band. At a strictly one-sided game YoCo drubbed Clarion State Teachers' College, 46-0. Half-time celebrated the coronation of Miss Barrett, attended by the Misses Peg Wylie and Rachel Brown. Post-game festivities were set off at an alumni dinner honoring the victorious varsity. Following the dinner Miss Barrett reigned at cur first Homecoming dance, the inauguration of a new YoCo tradition.

Margaret Ann Lovell (now Mrs. Wm. J. Smith) took the spotlight in the second Homecoming. Competing for laurels that year was the newly arrived Artic native, Pete Penguin, official mascot of his Youngstown namestakes. Miss Lovell reigned under an enlarged election system which we still follow. She was chosen by a committee of judges from five elected candidates instead of three according to the first year's policy. The other four electees attended the queen. Again there was a colorful parade from the campus to Rayen Stadium and a dinner following the game. And again YoCo trampled the opponent, Westminster, 46-0.

Gridiron royalty of 1940, Adalaide Finnegan, (now Mrs. John Denmeade) took the lead role in Homecoming merrymaking the night before the game. Verstitile Miss Finnegan, captain of cheerleaders that season, led the student body in a pep rally at the Palace Theater. YoCo downed Tennessee Tech, 28-13, in the third annual Homecoming. That was the year Dominic Rosselli joined Coach Beede's staff. The traditional pre-game parade and half-time coronation were followed by the dance in the evening with Miss Finnegan in the role of honor.

When 1941 rolled around signs of the war had entered the campus. Pilot training was available to the students. Miss Barrett, first Homecoming Queen, became the college's first female pilot. That same year saw the debut of majorettes to add to the splendor of the band. Jean Belleville (ncw Mrs. Wm. Kelley) was crowned fourth annual Homecoming Queen. The royal parade to the stadium was accompanied by a corps of soldier students. The team emerged with a 19-0 victory over Akron U. in its first undefeated season in four years of pigskin competition.

In 1942 Mary Dolwick (now Mrs. Paul Leonhart) won the Homecoming election in the fifth and last football season until post-war days. Miss Dolwick shared half-time attention with a humorous student pageant. A "Sadie Hawkins' Day" husband chase was enacted by a group of co-eds in typical Dogpatch attire. The varsity celebrated another Homecoming at the expense of Illinois Wesleyan with a score of 35-6.

Four years of war transposed Youngstown College into practically a manless, and certainly a football-less institution. By 1946 the population had reverted from subnormal to abnormal. With GI's pouring into school by the hundreds the mighty Penguins were ready to take off an another victorious season. Wanda Porembski was chosen first post-war Homecoming Queen. Festivities began with a rally at the Palace Theater the night before the game. The Penguins succeeded in chalking up another Homecoming victory over Scranton, 33-14.

Martha Altman (now Mr. Wayne Ridinger) was crowned queen during the half-time ceremony at the game in 1947. YoCo defeated Central Michigan 13-7, adding another victory to the unmarred list of Hcmecoming Triumphs. The queen and her attendants were again introduced at the Homecoming at Stambaugh Auditorium following the game.

In 1948 Martha Altman presented the crown of Homecoming Queen to her successor, Peggy Biga, at the Mississippi game. President Howard W. Jones welcomed alumni and homecoming fans, and former queens were introduced at half-time. A dance was held in the evening at Stambaugh Auditorium.

1949 Homecoming activities began on Wednesday, October 26, with a rally to acquaint freshmen with Homecoming traditions. At an outdoor rally for upperclassmen on Thursday noon, floats submitted for the parade by campus organizations were judged. Joyce Webb, the campus choice, rode in Nu Sigma Rho's winning float during half-time ceremonies. A parade from the downtown area to the college, Thursday evening, was followed by a bonfire rally, where the queen and her attendants were informally introduced. After the coronation ceremony at half-time, the queen and her court, Bette Savage, Mary Jo Davin, Betty Dimenno, and Phyllis Galose, were escorted around the stadium in a gala parade of floats. Following the game the traditional dance was held at Stambaugh Auditorium, bringing to a close another eventful homecoming celebration.

HISTORY OF MARDI-GRAS

The Newman Club brought a bit of the spirit of pre-Lenten New Orleans to the campus when they sponsored YoCo's first Mardi-Gras Dance in March, 1946. Phyllis Grein, elected by Newmanites as first Mardi-Gras queen, was awarded the crown by orchestra leader Buddy Rich at the dance in Stambaugh Auditorium.

Baron Elliot and his orchestra provided the music for the second Mardi-Gras at Stambaugh Auditorium in February, 1947. Reigning over the festivities was Newman Club choice Rosemary Quinn. This year the club voted to make the Mardi-Gras an annual affair.

In 1948 a new touch was added with a king as well as a queen chosen. Mardi-Gras queen Patricia Lynch (now Mrs. Leo Casey) was accompanied to the throne and crowned by the king, Richard Organ, at Stambaugh Auditorium.

Mardi-Gras royalty Rose Marie Malone wore the crown in 1949, when Newmanites and other students danced to the music of Emmy Williams and his orchestra at the Tri-Lan Ballroom.

This year's queen, lovely Sally McCreery, a sophomore, was crowned by Rose Marie Malone, queen of last year's dance. The queen's attendants—Dolores Barko, Ginny Krispinsky, Kathleen Long, Irene Pavlov and Marge Palatas—accompanied Miss McCreery to the throne. The dance was held at the Tri-Lan Ballroom, with music by Emmy Williams and his orchestra.

Each winter YoCo's Greek letter social organizations, sponsored by the Pan Hellenic Council, hold a dance—the biggest all-Greek affair of the year.

Susan Edwards was chosen first Interfraternity Sweetheart by fraternity men of the college.

In 1942 Phyllis Jones (now Mrs. Phil Tear), a member of Gamma Sigma sorority, reigned over the dance at the Pick-Ohio Ballroom.

Helen De Cicco, Phi Lambda Delta, won the title Interfraternity Sweetheart for the Greek dance in 1943 at Stambaugh Auditorium.

In 1946 the Greek Letter Ball became the Pan-Hellenic Dance, and Theodora (Lola) Raptou, a member of Phi Lambda Delta sorority, was chosen the first Pan-Hellenic queen.

Ruth Sweeney succeeded her sorority sister Miss Raptou as Pan-Hellenic queen in 1947, and was crowned at the dance in Stambaugh Auditorium.

The Elms Ballroom was the scene of the Pan-Hellenic Dance in 1948, when Eleanor Lehn, Alpha Theta Delta, reigned as interfraternity queen.

Patricia Mariner, student nurse and a member of Gamma Sigma sorority, held top honors in 1949 as queen of the Pan-Hellenic Dance held at the Elms Ballroom.

Pan-Hellenic queen of 1950 Joan Parrott, attended by Barbara Flint, Carol Nord, Claire McKay, Lillian Salem and Marjorie Grimsley, was awarded the crown by her predecessor, Miss Mariner, at the dance held at Elms Ballroom.

JUNIOR PROM QUEEN ...

HISTORY OF JUNIOR PROM

YoCo's biggest undergraduate dance, the Junior Prom, was initiated as a school sponsored event in April, 1932. Pretty blonde Wilma Starr (now Mrs. Elton Burkey) reigned as first Junior Prom Queen at the dance in the Marble Room of Stambaugh Auditorium, the queen being the girl who was escorted by the president of the Junior class, James Marks.

Recipient of the crown in 1933 was Eunice Price, who was escorted to the dance by Ted Mecejko, president of the Junior class. The prom was again held in Stambaugh Auditorium.

Mildred Strain, Junior Prom Queen of 1934, attended the dance with her future husband, Junior class president Fred McFarland.

College undergraduate men chose Mildred Bothwell (now Mrs. J. Howard Hitchcock) queen of the prom in 1935. She had been selected queen of the Sigma Club dance in 1934 by the Lombardo Brothers. Credit is due Mrs. Hitchcock for naming the "Neon," which was published for the first time in 1935.

Ruth Wright (now Mrs. Robert Leighninger) got a majority of the college men's votes and was awarded the crown in 1936. Miss Wright's successor was Marjorie Wighton, who was elected Junior Prom Queen by men students in 1937.

Politics entered into the election of 1938, when a dispute arose between independent groups who wanted a write-in ballot. The ballot was approved by Student Council. The announcement of the winner, seventh Junior Prom Queen Rose Rosapepe, was made at midnight, the night of the dance.

Junior Prom royalty of 1939, Patsy Stanley was awarded the crown at the dance at Stambaugh Auditorium.

In 1940, Prom Queen Rachel Brown was selected by orchestra leader Carl "Deacon" Moore from five candidates chosen by men of the Junior class.

Natalie Clark was crowned queen in 1941 by the president of the Junior class.

A group of outside judges chose Jo Bregar queen in 1942, from candidates selected by Junior class men.

In 1943, Carol Jones, daughter of President Howard Jones, was appointed twelfth Junior Prom Queen by a board of judges from a group of candidates.

Top honors went to Beverly Benjamin at the prom in 1944, succeeded by Junior class choice Eleanor Love who wore the crown in '45.

Margaret Nicewaner was elected to reign over the Junior Prom of 1946. She was again honored the following year by being elected May Queen by her classmates.

In 1947, Nancy Cooperrider held the place of honor at the thirteenth consecutive Junior Prom to be held at Stambaugh Auditorium.

Barbara Hengen was crowned prom queen of 1948 at the Tri-Lan Ballroom.

The Elms Ballroom was the scene of the coronation of Donna Lewis in 1949.

This year's Junior Prom was presented in the traditional manner, with lovely Prom Queen Carole Anderson gracing the affair. Her attendants were Jeanne Lyons, Evelyn Downie, Mary Alice Joyce, and Betty Dimenno.

MAY QUEEN...

HISTORY OF MAY DAY

One of YoCo's most deeply rooted traditions, May Day was initiated on the campus on May 25, 1928, in an afternoon ceremony climaxed by the crowning of the senior class May queen, Ruth Taylor, by Mayor Joseph L. Heffernan. Following the outdoor program—a dance drama, a play, a May pole dance, and the coronation, a dance was held in the college auditorium, at which the queen and her court were again honored.

Successive springs saw other May festivities, with various school organizations participating in the campus programs. Pageants, pantomines, plays, stunts, and music by the orchestra and glee clubs lent a note of variety to each ceremony, along with the traditional procession of undergraduate girls in pastel gowns, the May pole dance, the floral chain of friendship, and the coronation ceremony.

In 1929, Frances Hall, now Mrs. S. Dean McBride, was crowned May queen by H. L. Nearpass, director of the college, in an impressive ceremony. Doris Dean, May queen of 1930, was crowned by the queen of the previous year, a custom which has carried to the present time. Betty Miller reigned over the May festivities in 1931. In 1932, the traditional floral chain of friendship was introduced as part of the ceremony by Miss Eleanor North, dean of women, in the festivities honoring May queen Marion Morgan (Mrs. Ed. Stetzel). Mary Catherine Welsh graced the campus as May queen of 1933. The following year Rachel Criffiths was elected to reign in the May Day activities.

The sixteen lovely co-eds pictured here have been the campus choice each year since 1935. May Day festivities followed the traditional pattern until war activities made necessary a change in the programs of 1942 and the three following years. The wartime ceremonies were held in the evening in the form of a dance and the crowning of the May queen. In 1946 the May fete was held on campus for the first time since the war, with a return to the normal program. The traditional afternoon ceremony was resumed, and the May dance was held in the evening at Stambaugh Auditorium. Similar activities marked the celebration of May Day for the next three years.

This year's festivities compared favorably with those of preceeding years to provide a finishing touch to another school year, and, for the seniors, a memorable end to college life.

YoCo's 1950 May queen, lovely Phyllis Galose, attended by Helen Alcott, Yvonne Nottingham, Pat Pennock, and Yvonne Person, graced the campus and dance held at Idora Park.



THE DANA SCHOOL OF MUSIC

The Dana Musical Institute was founded in Warren, Ohio in 1869 by William H. Dana, son of Junius Dana, a wealthy and brilliant lawyer. The elder Dana, hoping to take William into his law firm, was bitterly opposed to his son's interest in music and refused to have any part of his foolish dream to start a music school. In spite of this opposition, young Dana rented a few rooms in a downtown business building and began teaching classes in theory and harmony. The furious father would no longer speak to his son and even went so far as to disinherit him. Then one lucky day, Junius accidentally walked in on a rehearsal of Handel's Messiah, was handed a score, and joined in on the singing. The old man was so impressed that he forgave William, and offered him all the financial assistance he might need to further his work.


The historic old hotel (in which Stephen Foster is said to have been a guest) on the corner of Park Ave. in Warren, became the site for the new Dana Institute. The school grew and became recognized as one of the finest music schools in the country. In 1888 at the exposition in Bologna, Italy, Brown's Medal was awarded to William H. Dana in recognition of his work.

After the death of William H. Dana, there was no one to head the school, and so the home of Charles S. Thomas on Wick Ave. was purchased and in 1941 the Dana School of Music became a part of Youngstown College. Dr. Henry V. Stearns became head of the school, succeeded by Mr. Hoffman who was dean until the fall of 1946 when Mrs. Dehnbostel was put in charge. In the fall of 1947, William H. Miller took over and is the dean at present.


THE SNOW-STORM

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

The School of Business of Youngstown College was founded in 1923 as an evening school and as a part of the Youngstown Y.M.C.A. building, Champion Street, and the school operated under the name of the Y.M.C.A. Business School.

In 1926 the school was moved to the John C. Wick estate, located at the corner of Wick and Lincoln avenues, where the main Youngstown College building now stands.

The Hall Business University, which at that time had served the students of this section for thirty-six years, was merged with the Y.M.C.A. Business School in 1928 and the new school started operating on June 1 of that year.


In 1939 the school was moved to the building it now occupies next door to the main college building.

Students of the School of Business have classes in the Main Building of the college as well as in the School of Business building, both of which are located three blocks from the Public Square of Youngstown, at Wick and Lincoln avenues. Constructed of Indiana limestone, and of English Tudor design, the spacious Main Building houses classrooms, laboratories, and offices of the College of Arts and Sciences. The Wick mansion, directly north of the Main Building, houses the offices and classrooms of the School of Business. It is an attractive old mansion which has been remodeled for school purposes.

WILLIAM RAYEN SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING

The William Rayen School of Engineering was made available to Youngstown College in January, 1946. This building now accommodates the classes in mathematics, physics, and engineering.


The basement in the rear of the building consists of two large rooms, 68 by 32 feet. One of these is used for housing some of the power generating equipment and the auxiliary equipment required for the mechanical engineering laboratory located on the floor above. The former consists of a 25 kw Cummings diesel driven generator, two vertical engine driven generators, 10 kw and 20 kw, and several smaller gasoline engine driven units. The other room is used for the metallurgical laboratory. It contains electric heat treating and melting furnaces, precision pyrometers, a 250,000 volt lead shielded X-Ray machine, and a well-equipped machine shop for general metal working. Two large classrooms, adequately lighted, are in the basement at the front of the building. One of these is used for a mechanical drawing room.

The main floor consists of four well-lighted classrooms, a study room, a library of technical books, the mechanical engineering laboratory, and the materials testing laboratory. The mechanical engineering laboratory contains a 60 kw turbogenerator, a 35 kw horizontal engine driven generator, a large pumping section for studying the characteristics of centrifugal pumps, a commercial installation of refrigeration and air-conditioning units set up for experimentation, together with a motor driven blower set up for determining the flow of air in ducts. Adjacent to the laboratory is a boiler room for the supply of steam in the study of thermo-dynamics and power engineering. The strength of materials laboratory houses a 400,000 pound Olsen tensile testing machine, a 60,000 pound Tiehle testing machine, a 10,000 pound Baldwin Southwark tester, and Fairbanks-Morse concrete briquet testing equipment. The laboratory also has Rockwell, Brinell, and Scleroscope hardness testing equipment, and a wide variety of high precision measuring instruments.

On the second floor are located the engineering drawing rooms, the physics laboratory and classroom, and the electrical laboratories. The two drawing rooms, 40 x 40 feet, are lighted with fluorescent streamers the full width of the rooms and are furnished with modern drafting room equipment. The physics laboratory, 68 x 38 feet, has ample floor space and head room for the use of the wide variety of experimental apparatus with which it is equipped. The laboratory has been furnished with apparatus which will permit the performance of the college grade experiments as published by the Central Scientific Company. Due to the large size of the laboratory the major equipment is completely assembled and available at all times for experimentation. The laboratory is wired for direct current, single- and three-phase alternating current. The physics classroom connects directly with the laboratory, a feature appreciated by student and teacher alike. In this room the demonstration-lecture table is provided with the usual gas, current, and water together with a variety of large-scale demonstration equipment. Visual aids, motion pictures, and slide films, are used to supplement the demonstrations.


The electronic laboratory is located on the second floor for the experimental work in electron dynamics and electronic applications. Various oscillators, high frequency generators, tubes, transformers, condensers, wave meters, and other apparatus are available for student use. The main electrical engineering laboratory is located next to the electronic laboratory and it consists of a room 68 x 38 feet. In the electrical engineering laboratory next to the electronic laboratory is located a double-generator, motor-driven set. This generator is capable of supplying 4,500 volts of direct current for electronic tube plate application in the electronic laboratory. A five kw motor generator with two interchangeable armatures for extending the range of electrical principles is available for student use. It may also be driven by a separate slip-ring induction motor rather than by its own synchronous. This motor generator set is designed especially by the Westinghouse Electric Corporation for educational institutions and a variety of experiments on rotating machines can be performed with this equipment.

Engineering Building in the Winter






