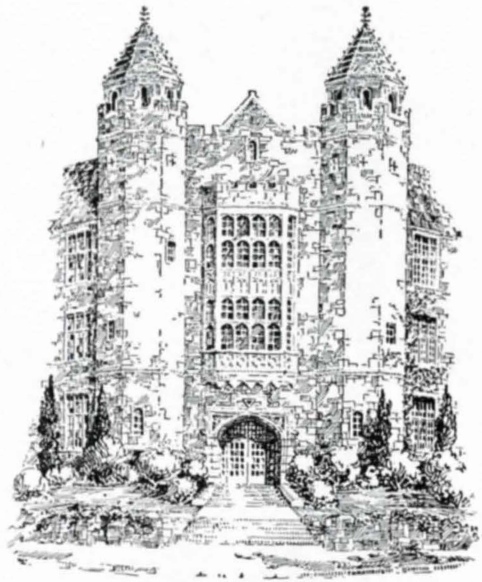

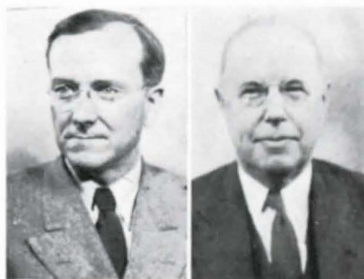

light and behold, it was very good."*

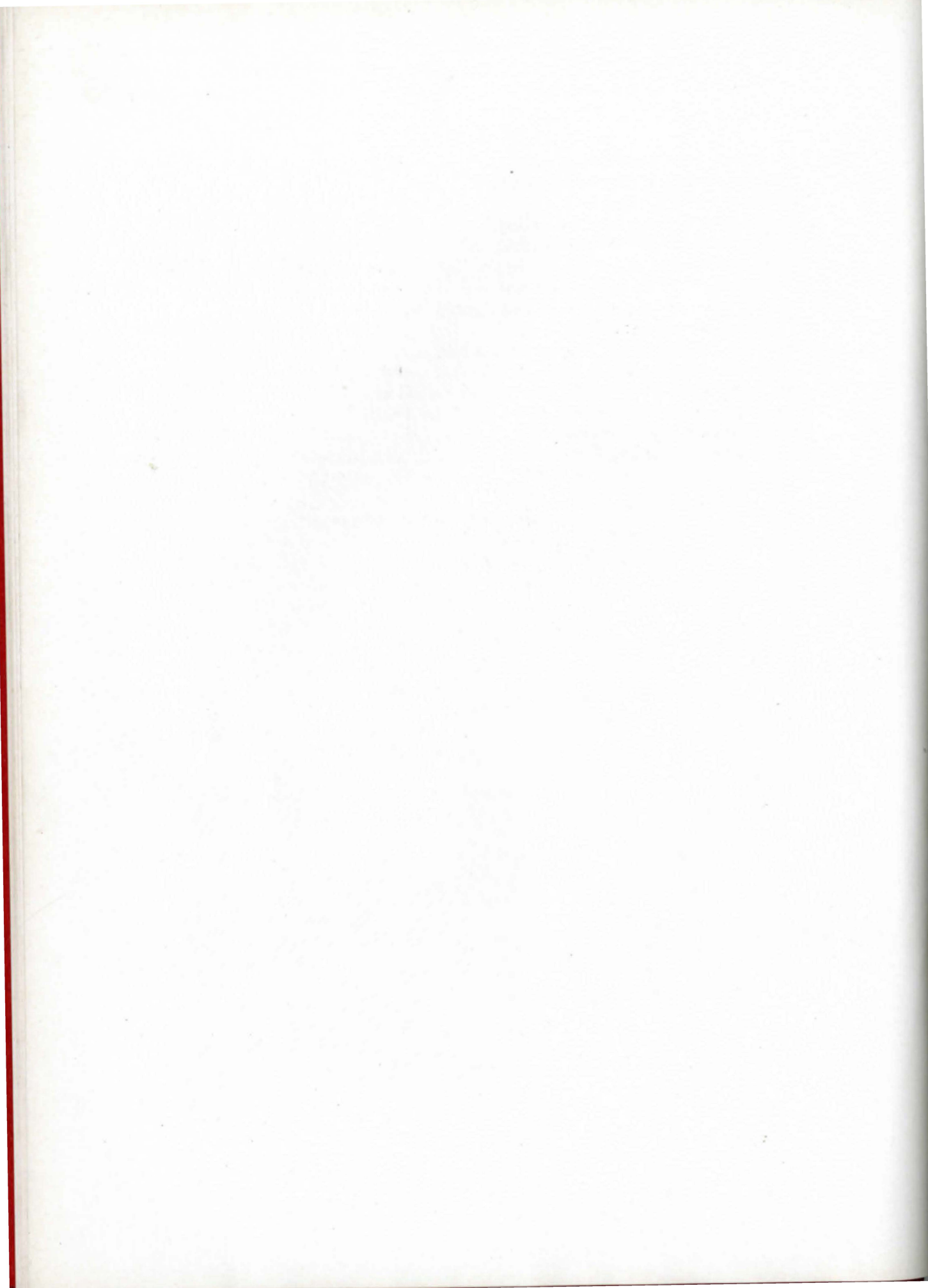

For behold, it was very good

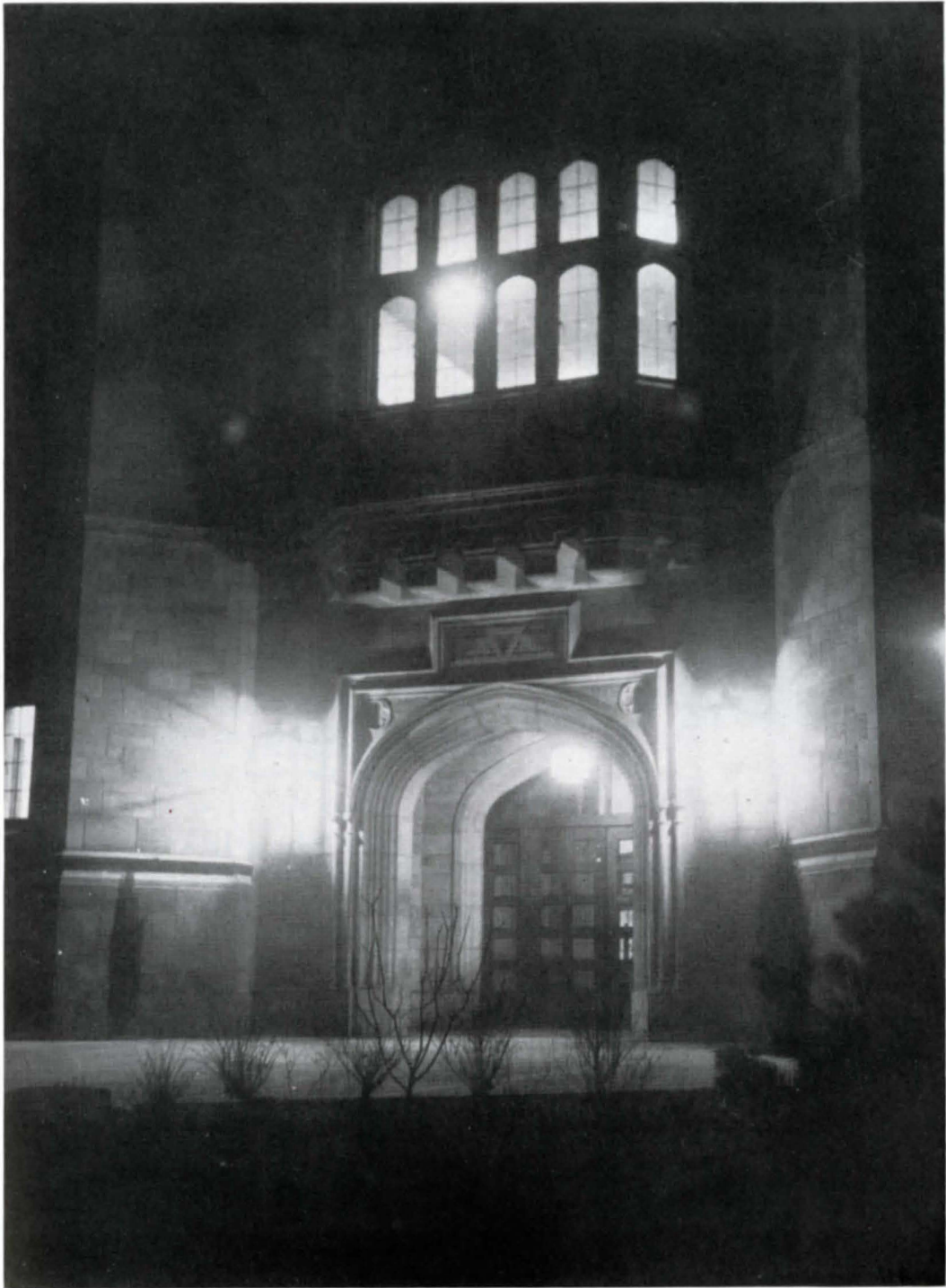
And man set himself unto his labors when the sun rose.

Coach Jack McPhee put out this season one of the best teams the college has ever had. With five veterans back and from new material he was able to mold a combination that played five hundred percent ball.

The Penguins steered a middle of the road course in the matter of wins and losses, winning ten games and losing the same number. In the matter of points the Penguins tallied 601 to the opponent's 610 points. The Penguins sank 219 field goals for a total of 438 points and 163 points from the foul line. On the other hand the opponents registered 235 field goals and tossed the ball through the meshes 140 times from the free throw mark.

Out of the nine games that have ended in one or two point decisions the Penguins won four and lost five. One additional point and the Penguins would have had a splendid record of fifteen victories. But that is another story.

As a nucleus for next year's team McPhee will have six of his varsity lettermen back in court attire. They are Jaffee and Green at center; Lackey and Williams at forward; Lewis and Centrello at guard.

To make a few comparisons, the Penguins beat Ohio College of Chiropody who in turn had beaten Wooster and doubled the score on Mount Union. Geneva College was held to a 32 to 24 victory after the Penguins had led 17 to 10 at the half way mark. Geneva doubled the score on City College of New York and laced Westminster.

From the present material and a few additions McPhee should be able to mold next season the best team in the history of the school.

Grove City—There. McPhee's Alma Mater and the Penguins had to win. The Penguins emerged from what proved to be the roughest game on the sced, with a 18 to 16 victory.

West Liberty—There. After having a good lead at the half the Penguins loafed and were given a 36 to 35 beating.

St. Vincents—There. St. Vincent's floor was too much for the McPheemen and they dropped a 33 to 18 decision.
