YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - For the second straight year, Youngstown State
University had the lowest crime rate in comparison with eight other four-year
state-supported universities, according to the 1986 FBI <u>Uniform Crime Report</u>
(UCR), which was published this year.

Of the universities compared in the report, YSU showed the lowest rates in violent crime and property crime totals.

Richard Turkiewicz, director of Campus Security at YSU, attributes the low rate of crime on this campus to the student involvement in crime awareness.

Public response is "the best tool that we can have," said Turkiewicz. "It makes the job much easier."

The UCR included in its report figures from YSU, the University of Akron, Cleveland State, Miami University, Ohio State, University of Toledo, Bowling Green University and the University of Cincinnati.

In the UCR, the violent crime classification includes murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault.

YSU reported seven violent crimes - 3 robberies and 4 aggravated assaults - in 1986. The University of Cincinnati reported the highest number of violent crimes at 43, which included 4 forcible rapes, 5 robberies and 34 aggravated assaults. (Bowling Green, Miami and Akron also had only 7 violent crimes).

Property crimes, as classified by the FBI, include burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

In 1986, YSU reported 17 burglaries, 20 motor vehicle thefts and 229 larceny-thefts, a total of 25. Ohio State University, with a full-time

equivalent of 47,081 students, reported a total of 1,851 property crimes, the highest in this category.

YSU's 20 motor vehicle thefts was third highest of the eight. Cleveland State reported 44 and the University of Toledo 22.

Turkiewicz said the YSU community is very helpful in coming up with tips and cooperating with Campus Security, yet "very common-sensible."

Another reason he feels the campus crime rate stays low is the many events held on campus. The number of events, as well as the number of people attending them, has increased steadily over the past few years, he said, adding that many times multiple events are occuring at YSU.

"The more people there are on campus, the lower the crime rate is," said
Turkiewicz. "There's less opportunity for crime."

While the number of events requires additional Campus Security personnel,

Turkiewicz doesn't mind the extra effort. "Special events are really a boon to

crime prevention."

The director also noted that Campus Security's rate of apprehension in 1986 was 60 percent, up very substantially from the 1985 figure of 25 percent.

The significant increase in the rate of apprehension is due to the dedication of the Campus Security members and an "increase in assistance from witnesses and victims," Turkiewicz reported.
