YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Dr. Bari Lateef of Boardman, professor in the Department of Criminal Justice at Youngstown State University, recently served as consultant to the United Nations Development Program in Pakistan.

Dr. Lateef was advisor to the inspector general of police at Peshawar, which is the northwest frontier province of Pakistan.

Dr. Lateef was in Peshawar and Islamabad for about 10 days during YSU's break between the Fall and Winter Quarters. He visited forensic science laboratories in Peshawar and gave lecture to the laboratory staff. He also advised the administration about possible improvements in the forensic science services.

Dr. Lateef also met with the principal and staff of the Police Training School and discussed some revisions in police curriculum with the staff. His meeting with the criminal investigative staff centered around the role of forensic science services in the criminal investigation process.

Dr. Lateef is director of Tri-State Laboratories of Austintown, which does forensic work for the Youngstown Police Department, the Mahoning County Coroner's Office and the Mahoning County Sheriff's Office.

A native of Pakistan, Dr. Lateef joined the YSU faculty in March 1969. He is a member of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences, the British Forensic Science Society, the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences, and Sigma Xi, the Scientific Research Society.

The Department of Criminal Justice is part of YSU's Colleges of Applied Science and Technology.

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YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Office of Continuing Education/Education Outreach at Youngstown State University announces the course "Sociology of Aging" will be offered at Boardman High School, an off-campus "Where You Live and Work" location, beginning Tuesday, March 26.

To explain YSU admission procedures and explore educational options, Continuing Education/Education Outreach counselors will meet with prospective students of all ages at local libraires from Jan .22 through Feb. 28. These sessions will enable adults to discuss admission requirements, degree options, career planning, off-campus course locations, other Continuing Education resources, and on-campus day, evening, and weekend classes.

"Sociology of Aging" (Sociology 703), a credit course, is a study of the characteristics of aging. It includes problems faced by the aging individual and his or her family as well as society at large. Basic skills needed for providing services to, and for, the aged are also included. Prerequisite to this course is Sociology 500. Classes will meet from 6-7:50 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays to June.

Carol Franken, the instructor, has been on the Sociology staff at YSU since 1981. She is also a full-time staff member in the Gerontology-Geriatrics Department of the Northeastern Ohio University College of Medicine (NEOUCOM) at Rootstown.

There are three "Where You Live and Work" off-campus locations. In addition to Boardman High School, other courses will be offered at Hubbard High School and the General Motors BOC Assembly Plant at Lordstown.
