YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Dr. Juanita Roderick, professor of Elementary Education at Youngstown State University, recently had two articles published on the subject of elementary education beyond the traditional classroom.

Dr. Roderick is current president of the Ohio Association for Gifted Children. She resides in Boardman and has been on the faculty of YSU's School of Education since 1965.

"Parenting - TV Viewing Habits, Family Rules, Reading Grades, Heroes and Heroines of Gifted and Nongifted Middle School Students" appeared in a fall issue of Roeper Review, A Journal on Gifted Education. Patricia Jackson of Brookfield, education specialist with Ravenna Township Schools, assisted Dr. Roderick.

"Parenting" discusses how family rules about television habits influence school progress. It also offers recommendations for parents about how to limit their children's TV viewing.

"Saturday Treasures on Campus" appeared in the Fall 1986 issue of Kappa Delta Pi Record. Dr. Roderick was assisted by Marianne K. Dove of Kent State University.

"Saturday Treasures on Campus" describes a program designed through the cooperation of the YSU School of Education and Youngstown area elementary schools. Gifted children, grades four through six, spent Saturday sessions on the YSU campus, being exposed to many diverse disciplines by faculty members. Student/parent questionnaires showed the program was a success.

Dr. Roderick holds a Bachelor of Science in Education degree from YSU, a Master of Science degree in Education from Westminster College, New Wilmington, Pa., and a doctoral degree from the University of Akron.

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
