YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Three of Youngstown State University's strong academic programs have received special funding totaling \$243,124 under the Ohio Board of Regents' Academic Challenge Program, Round Two.

The program provides grants that are incentives for Ohio's public colleges and universities to strengthen graduate and undergraduate programs.

The Dana School of Music received \$67,983 for music education. Donald Byo, chairman of the Dana School of Music, said the funds would be used to advance its interface program for music education students.

Future music instructors are placed in area schools to assist music teachers, thus gaining hands-on experience in their field, Byo explained.

He said sites for the interface program this year should include an inner city elementary school, a suburban middle school and a rural high school.

Dr. Paul Van Zandt, chairman of Biological Sciences, said the department's grant of \$65,541 would be used to "upgrade our animal care facilities and equipment." He added that some money will also be used to bring in guest speakers.

The Department of Counseling in the School of Education, which received \$109,600, will use the funds to further its existing programs and facilities, according to Dr. David Cliness, chairman.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Three of Youngstown State University's strong academic programs have received special funding totaling \$243,124 under the Ohio Board of Regents' Academic Challenge Program, Round Two.

The Dana School of Music received \$67,983 for music education. Donald Byo, chairman of the Dana School of Music, said the funds would be used to advance its interface program for music education students.

Future music instructors are placed in area schools to assist music teachers, thus gaining hands-on experience in their field, Byo explained.

He said sites for the interface program this year should include an inner city elementary school, a suburban middle school and a rural high school.

Dr. Paul Van Zandt, chairman of Biological Sciences, said the department's grant of \$65,541 would be used to "upgrade our animal care facilities and equipment." He added that some money will also be used to bring in guest speakers.
